Staying Safe in Forest County Get Vaccinated!

Forest County is currently seeing an increase in COVID-19 cases. The Forest County Health Department wants residents to be aware that the Delta variant is in Wisconsin and spreading throughout the state, including our county. The COVID-19 vaccines remain the best way to protect yourself, your family, and your community from COVID-19 and its highly infectious Delta variant. The Delta Variant spreads more rapidly than previous strains and may cause many more infections, resulting in loss of work days and/or school days.

Like other vaccines, vaccine breakthrough cases will occur, but the vaccines are working. People who experience breakthrough cases are more likely to experience mild symptoms. The vaccine helps protect against the worst outcomes: hospitalization, severe infections, and death.

Across Wisconsin in July 2021, people who were not fully vaccinated were diagnosed with COVID-19 at a rate nearly three times that of those fully vaccinated. People who were not fully vaccinated were hospitalized with COVID-19 related illnesses at a rate of 2.7 times higher than fully vaccinated individuals. Fully vaccinated people saw a 10-fold reduction in risk of dying from COVID-19 compared to people not fully vaccinated.

Conservation Corner Cont. from pg. 1 planting can provide beautiful flowers all summer long. They will bring more wildlife to your yard and deter geese and even reduce mosquitos.

Through the DNR's Surface Water Grants program you can learn about the Healthy Lakes program and their grant opportunities. Healthy Lakes & Rivers offers a 5 Step Process to apply and receive funding.

1. Review the grant application. Visit the Wisconsin DNR's Surface Water Grants Website to learn more about the grant program. Check in with your local DNR Environmental Grant Specialist and Lake Biologist to be sure your group is eligible to apply and get guidance on next steps.
2. Recruit shoreland property owners to participate. Contact folks around your lake or river to see if they are interested in implementing a Healthy Lakes & Rivers practice on their property. Successful recruitment tools include presenting at your lake or river organization meeting, surveying your community, hands-on workshops, and good ol' door knocking.
3. Complete initial site visit and design work.

Once you know who will be implementing Healthy Lakes & Rivers practices on their property, set up site visits to identify where the practices will be implemented and determine if any design work is needed.

The following resources can help make your project happen:

1. Local citizen champions – perhaps a master gardener or retired engineer
2. Landscapers
3. Native Plant Nurseries of Wisconsin
4. Wisconsin Restoration Contractors
5. Graduates of the Lakeshore Habitat Restoration Training for Professionals
6. County Land and Water Conservation Departments
7. Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and University of Wisconsin-Extension professionals
8. Healthy Lakes & Rivers Team members
9. Decision Tool: Managing Runoff with Healthy Lakes & Rivers Practices
4. Apply for funding.

Use your shoreland property owner list and site visit work to complete the Healthy Lakes & Rivers Grant application. In the application list participating properties and the best practice(s) and cost(s) for the given properties. You should also describe the lake(s) and/or rivers(s), partners, and how the project fits into other planning efforts. Healthy Lakes & Rivers applications are due November 1st each year, and funding is determined by March. The grant program is competitive and successful applicants give considerable thought to their project before applying. Work with your regional DNR Lake Biologist and Environmental Grants Specialist to create a strong application.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS:

1. Application
2. Authorizing resolution
3. Map with project (i.e. parcel) locations
5. Your grant is awarded. Congratulations! Now what?

The DNR will notify you whether or not you received a grant award. If you were successful, you will receive a Grant Agreement soon after this good news. The Grant Agreements are standardized across all Healthy Lakes & Rivers projects and require the same deliverables. Healthy Lakes & Rivers Grants are reimbursement grants. This means the shoreland property owner or grant applicant spends his/her/their own money and then gets reimbursed by the state. Be sure to track volunteer time and project expenses. Now you are ready to roll! Again, if you're interested in a project, Forest County

Booster dose recommended for immunocompromised individuals

The Department of Health Services and the CDC now recommend a third dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine for those persons with a compromised immune system.

Those who qualify for the additional dose include people 12 years of age and older with medical conditions, including:

- Active treatment for solid tumor and hematologic malignancies
 - Receipt of solid-organ transplant and taking immunosuppressive therapy
 - Receipt of CAR-T-cell or hematopoietic stem cell transplant (within two years of transplantation or taking immunosuppression therapy)
 - Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome)
 - Advanced or untreated HIV infection
 - Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids (≥20mg prednisone or equivalent per day), alkylating agents, antimetabolites, transplant-related immunosuppressive drugs, cancer chemotherapeutic agents classified as severely immunosuppressive, tumor-necrosis (TNF) blockers, and other biologic agents that are immunosuppressive or immunomodulatory
- Individuals with weakened immune systems may not develop adequate immunity following vaccination. These individuals are also more likely to develop serious illness with COVID-19 and may spread the virus to others in their home. Adding an additional dose to the series for immunocompromised people could help better protect those most vulnerable to COVID-19.

The third dose should be the same as the previous doses given. There is no additional dose recommended for those who received the J&J vaccine.

The Forest County Health Department will be relocating our office space from August 23 until November 1, 2021 due to renovations at the courthouse. We will not be able to give booster doses in our office. Please call us at 715-478-3371 and we will help you find a location to receive a vaccine or booster dose if indicated. We encourage you to call your health care provider to check if they recommend that you receive a booster dose of the COVID-19 vaccine.

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign begins Wednesday

Law enforcement agencies across Wisconsin will boost patrols in the next few weeks as part of a national effort to end a deadly and preventable crime on the roads.

The Wisconsin State Patrol (WSP) is joining the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign from Wednesday, August 18 through Labor Day. The goal is not just to make arrests, but to avoid injuries and deaths.

“What makes these deaths so tragic is that they are preventable,” Wisconsin Secretary-designee of Transportation Craig Thompson said. “They result from the terrible decision to get behind the wheel while impaired. We hope the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign will make drivers think twice before they make a mistake that costs someone their life.”

Alcohol contributed to more than a quarter of all traffic fatalities last year in Wisconsin.

Drug-impaired drivers are also putting people in danger on the roads. Last year, there were 2,250 drug-related crashes that caused 80 deaths. That’s up from 1,749 crashes and 59 deaths in 2019.

Law enforcement agencies are dedicated to ending impaired driving, but they need help from every driver, every day.

“Our daily mission is to protect travelers on our highways and eliminate the risks of impaired driving, but safety is everyone’s responsibility,” WSP Superintendent Anthony Burrell said. “We’re asking drivers to choose safety as the summer travel season wraps up. Together we can save lives.”

Agencies are using specially trained officers to combat impaired driving during the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, including multi-jurisdictional enforcement task forces. State Patrol officers will work with a team in Milwaukee and Waukesha counties.

WSP’s Drug Recognition Experts (DREs) are also called on by communities to help in impaired driving cases. The WisDOT Bureau of Transportation Safety has operated the DRE program for almost 30 years, certifying officers to identify and apprehend drug-impaired drivers. 50 of the state’s 72 counties have at least one DRE.

In addition, the State Patrol is training all troopers and inspectors in Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE). ARIDE helps officers more effectively observe drivers suspected of being impaired and make an informed decision on whether to arrest.

Resources are available to help eliminate impaired driving. The “Drive Sober” mobile app is free to download to help drivers make a plan. The app includes a “find a ride” feature to help locate mass transit and taxi services.

Nicolet College Learning in Retirement returns to some in-person classes for Fall/Winter session

The Learning in Retirement program at Nicolet College will return to some in-person classes this fall and early winter with upcoming classes covering more than 30 different topics.

“Over the past year we heard time and again how people missed getting together for classes,” said Brenda Peltier, Nicolet LIR coordinator.

“They missed that social aspect but they also understood why we couldn’t see each other in person because of the pandemic. Now that we have a COVID vaccine and more and more people are getting vaccinated, we’ve decided to bring back some in-person classes that follow Nicolet’s COVID guidelines.”

Due to the recent increase in cases in the Northwoods, Nicolet has returned to requiring face masks that cover the nose and mouth when inside all Nicolet buildings. This applies to students, staff and the general public. Appropriate physical distancing is also required when indoors.

GROUNDWATER COORDINATING COUNCIL RELEASES ANNUAL REPORT NITRATES, PFAS TOP LIST OF IMPROVEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Groundwater Coordinating Council today shared key recommendations for protecting and preserving vital groundwater resources in its 2021 annual report to the Wisconsin State Legislature. The recommendations focus on evaluating and addressing drinking water contamination from nitrates, perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS) chemicals, and viruses and other microbial pathogens.

The council is an interagency group that is directed by law to assist state agencies in the coordination and exchange of information related to groundwater programs. Administrative support for the council is provided by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The council prepares an annual report each year that summarizes the operations and activities of the council, describes the state of the groundwater resource and its management and makes recommendations.

Nearly three-quarters of Wisconsinites rely on groundwater as their primary source for drinking water. Wisconsin's groundwater also plays a critical role in supporting the state's agricultural and tourism economy – whether it's to irrigate crops, water cattle and process a wide variety of foods, or feed trout streams and spring-fed lakes. The council supports the sustainable management of groundwater quantity and quality in the state to ensure that safe groundwater is available for everyone's use, while protecting and improving our health, economy and environment now and into the future.

"New groundwater challenges continue to arise in Wisconsin and the Groundwater Coordinating Council is at the forefront of bringing people together to identify effective solutions that ensure Safe Water For All," said Jim Zellmer, DNR Deputy Administrator, Environmental Management Division. "Building off of Gov. Tony Evers' declaration of 2019 as the Year of Clean Drinking Water, the work continues to improve the safety of Wisconsinites' drinking water with an added focus on helping our most vulnerable residents."

Three of the key recommendations in the report address some of the most prevalent and pressing issues in Wisconsin water quality, including:

Protecting groundwater from nitrate and other agricultural contaminants;

Addressing public health and environmental concerns from perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS) chemicals; and Evaluating groundwater for viruses and other microbial pathogens

Areas of the state with a greater density of agriculture generally have a higher frequency of nitrate and pesticide detection, especially in areas of the state with susceptible geology and soils. The report recommends supporting research assessing conservation plans that identify and encourage the use of alternate cropping and nutrient management practices that help prevent agricultural nitrogen from reaching groundwater. The council also recommends developing an outreach program to spur action to implement these plans.

Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS) chemicals have been detected in drinking water and groundwater throughout Wisconsin. The report highlights the challenges of removing PFAS from groundwater. The council recommends establishing PFAS groundwater enforcement standards to guide cleanup efforts and safeguard public health and continuing to identify PFAS sources and their potential impacts to groundwater and the environment. The council also supports the Wisconsin PFAS Action Council in developing and coordinating statewide PFAS initiatives.

Viruses and other microbial pathogens have been found in municipal and private wells, challenging previous assumptions about how they persist and move in groundwater. Identifying where and when pathogens pose threats to human health is fundamental to improving drinking water quality. The council recommends working with partners to increase awareness of waste disposal practices and their risks and costs.

The 2021 report also highlights the need for increased support of applied groundwater research to protect and preserve our valuable groundwater resources. Wisconsin is recognized as a national leader in groundwater research largely due to the council's well-established research funding process. Increased funding could be used to address emerging groundwater contaminant concerns such as PFAS.

The Groundwater Coordinating Council was formed in 1984 to provide a framework for state agencies to coordinate activities and exchange information on groundwater. Today, the council and its subcommittees regularly bring together staff from more than 10 different agencies, academia, institutions and organizations to collaborate on a variety of research, monitoring, data management, education and planning issues. These activities increase coordination between agencies to avoid duplication, create efficiencies and maximize limited resources. 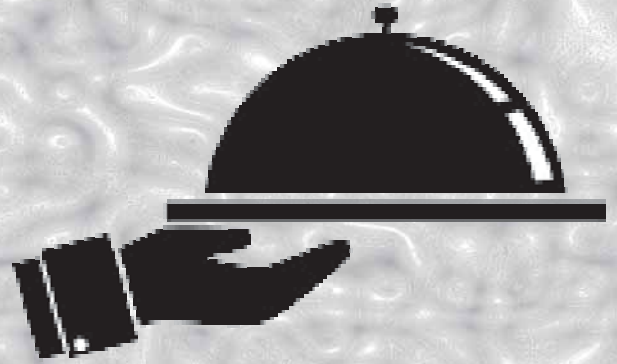

Alvin Meal Site Reopens Congregate Dining Site Starting on September 9th

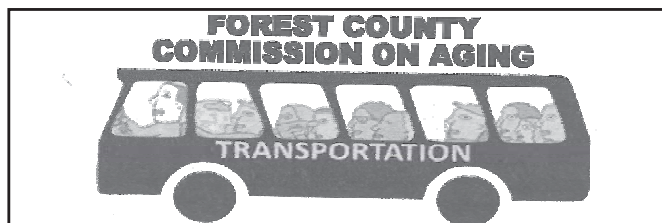
We are excited to announce that the Alvin Dining site will be reopening on Thursday, September 9th. We will be serving on Thursdays at 4:00 pm just like we did before the pandemic started. The dining site has a new Site Manager, Tammy Wolfe who is taking over for Florence Kostka who has decided to retire after many years of services and many amazing meals. Flo will be around for awhile to help train Tammy. We wish Flo a happy retirement and welcome Tammy into her new role.

We do have a few details we want to share with you all about the re-opening. First of all, as COVID is still a concern in our community, we are hopeful everyone who wants one has been able to secure a vaccine. If you are one who has not been vaccinated but wants to be, you can call the Forest County Health Dept. at 715-478-3371 or our office at (715) 478-3256 for information on where to get a vaccine or contact your medical provider. We respect your privacy and will not ask if you have been vaccinated, please keep in mind that if you are unvaccinated, it will be highly encouraged that you wear a face covering when you are not eating to protect yourself! At our tables, we will be sitting 6 feet between households. Anyone residing together or individuals who live separately but are together often are considered a household. We will be making a seating chart in your household or group of friends 6 feet from another household.

Speaking of reservations, you will need to call Tammy to reserve a spot. We will offer Carry-out meals for our participants who are not yet comfortable congregating with others outside of their home. When you call the dining site manager you will need to let her know if you are dining with us or needing a carryout meal. If you are going to use the Carryout meal option, we will be asking those participants to come to the dining site one half hour before we begin serving the congregate dining participants to help the flow of service.

Anyone with a fever, cold, loss of sense of smell or taste or flu symptoms will not be able to join us that day and can take their meal home with you. If you are reserved to dine with us on a day that you are under the weather, please call the dining site manager and let her know that you will need your meal to go and when you will arrive to the site for someone to bring your meal out to your car. We do not want to spread any virus or bacteria to anyone else, whether it be COVID, the flu or just a nasty cold. No one likes to be sick and as we age we develop complications where a simple cold can linger and cause negative effects for a long time.

We will be resuming activities at the dining site. We ask that after participating in Bingo or playing cards that you wash your hands. There will be hand sanitizer available at the dining site but it is not an alternative to washing your hands with soap and water. To reserve a meal you can call Tammy at (715) 545-3490. 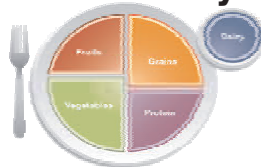

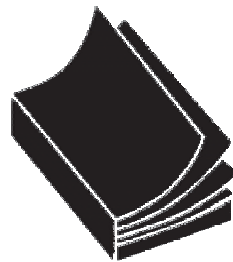

Nicolet College surpasses \$1 million mark in textbook savings for students

Nicolet College has passed the \$1 million mark in textbook savings for students as the college continues to expand its efforts to offer free and high-quality instructional materials.

"This is a wonderful milestone and I'm absolutely thrilled we were able to deliver these savings to students," said Cindy Domaika, manager of Open and Instructional Resources at Nicolet.

"This million dollars represents food on tables, child care, bills paid, and a host of other things that students do not have worry about and can instead concentrate on learning."

Domaika launched the Open Education Resource (OER) program in the fall of 2018.

To date, about 8,100 Nicolet students have financially benefited from the program that has reduced or eliminated their textbook costs.

"When you look at the numbers, that's by far the majority of students who have enrolled in credit classes at Nicolet since we started the program," Domaika said.

"We're a relatively small college, which makes reaching that \$1 million mark that much more meaningful."

She also noted that the college expects to expand the program in the future as more quality content becomes available.

The majority of the instructional materials come from oercommons.org, a vast, content-rich website where educators from across the globe openly share a wide variety of instructional material that is available at no cost.

Sources range from electronic textbooks to videos and PowerPoint presentations to a wide variety of other content that is available entirely in an electronic format.

Domaika stressed that all of the material that makes it into a Nicolet OER class goes through a rigorous review process to ensure it meets academic standards.

"We make sure that all of the material is peer reviewed by faculty at other colleges and universities," Domaika said. "The quality has to be there in order to make it into a Nicolet course."

Every Nicolet class has a list of course competencies that outline the subject matter to be learned in that course. To gather the educational material that covers all of the competencies, Nicolet instructors and Domaika work hand in hand to find the appropriate course content that students can access for free.

"There was a time when some students would have to spend well over a thousand dollars a year just on textbooks," said Domaika, who previously managed the Nicolet Bookstore and saw first hand the financial toll that took on students.

"It was getting ridiculous. It was a very real barrier that I'm glad we've been able to significantly reduce and in some cases completely eliminate so students can get the college education they need to help them get ahead in life."
