Record crowds & unreal racing highlight the 2013 off-road World Championship® at Crandon

Labor Day Weekend event deemed a 'smashing success' by race officials; spectacular 1st/2nd son/father finish in AMSOIL Cup's highpoint of racing



CRANDON, Wis. (September, 2013) - The Wisconsin northwoods sure got a heaping helping of excitement last weekend when the Traxxas TORC Series. presented by AMSOIL's short course-off road extravaganza rolled through town - quite literally - beginning with a parade that shut down Highway 8 and packed the streets of Crandon's business district in anticipation for the 44th annual running of the Crandon International Off-Road Raceway World Championship®.

The highlight of the three-day event was Sunday's running of the \$40K AMSOIL Cup - a handicap race pitting the powerful TORC PRO 2WD and PRO 4x4 classes against each other in a winner-take-all dash for the cash.

Short Course off-road racing's best storyline of the year came together as the sun set on the final race with the Abrams, Wis.-based family race team of CJ & Johnny Greaves (Monster/Toyota/Maxxis) going 1st/2nd, respectively, in the AMSOIL Cup. Catching his son on the last corner of the last lap in the PRO 4x4 (Johnny's ride) versus PRO 2WD (CJ's ride) handicap race, the elder Greaves may - or may not have (depending on if you ask him, or the 20,000-plus fans in attendance) - let up on the gas just a smidge, allowing CJ to take the win by about the thickness of a Monster Energy front bumper decal.

The epic AMSOIL Cup finish today will easily go down in Crandon racing folklore forever.

"Feels like I'm at the Super Bowl or something ... yeah, we are at the Super Bowl of off-road," said Johnny Greaves over the P/A system, barely above the din of the raucous Crandon faithful from the Greaves' home state of Wisconsin.

"We were both out there going for the win. And once I got through the traffic and up to the front - and saw CJ leading – I was like 'Is this really happening?' Then the old man was right up on him, nipping at his rear. "But he (CJ) turned it one and edged me out ... that little \$&!%!"

Added CJ: "All I remember was hearing over the radio 'THAT'S YOUR DAD KNOCKING ON THE DOOR!!!' We both were going for the win. This feels unreal. Hopefully we can do it again next year."



Other big winners on the weekend included: Rob MacCachren (Traxxas/AMSOIL/BFG), who swept the premier PRO 4 class victories, including Saturday's Crandon World Championship® victory; Argonne, Wis.'s Jeff Kincaid's (Traxxas/AMSOIL/Maxxis) emotional tribute to his late father (Doug Kincaid Sr.) after winning Saturday's PRO 2WD World Championship, followed by Bryce Menzies (Red Bull/KMC Wheels/Peak) dominating the PRO 2s on Sunday. Luke Johnson (Red Bull/Under Power/BFG) wrapping up TORC's PRO Buggy class season championship while California's Bradley Morris (K&N Filters) swept the PRO Buggy races at Crandon; CJ Greaves winning the PRO Light World Championship on Saturday and Traxxas/AMSOIL/Maxxis' Keegan Kincaid (Jeff's son, grandson of Doug Kincaid Sr.) winning Sunday's PRO Light contest.

Computer scam warns Chief Dan Packard

A very recent computer scam seems to have hit some residents of the Northwoods.

If your computer screen is suddenly and unexpectedly locked and you are seeing a "Mandiant USA Cyber Security—FBI Department of Defence—USA Cyber Crime Center—Attention! Your computer has been locked up for safety reasons listed below" message, then your computer is infected with the newly appearing ransomware called Mandiant U.S.A. Cyber Security-U.S.A. Cyber Crime Center \$300.00 Scam Virus.

The message advises that there had been child pornography sites accessed, that there had been pirated music or videos downloaded, and "bulk-spamming" had been done. The message advises that in order to have the computer unlocked, the subject would have to pay a fine of \$300.00 (and advises how to go about submitting payment), and that the subject would have only 48 hours in which to do so. The message states that if payment was not submitted within the time specified, the subject could possibly face prison time.

This virus may invade your computer through the following ways:

- 1. By opening an unknown email and clicking a strange link attached in it or downloading the attachment, which contains a virus;
- 2. By opening the unknown website and clicking a malicious link on it:
- 3. By downloading free applications and movies from the Internet.

Tips for Eating Well -When You Don't Feel Like Eating

Eating can be a challenge when you don't have an appetite. Here are some suggestions to help you manage a few more bites when you don't feel like eating.

• Eat smaller amounts often - When you don't feel like eating, a lot of food can be overwhelming. Keep portions small, but nearby. Nibbles and sips count!

• Consider high-calorie choices - To keep up your strength, eat foods like tuna or egg salad, pudding, ice cream and peanut butter and crackers, which are nutritious energy boosters

• Force fluids - Dehydration is a serious condition. Keep fluids handy and use a straw to make it easy to take sips. Sports drinks, which replace lost electrolytes, may also be an option.

• Choose finger foods - Foods that can be eaten out of your hand are easy to eat. Foods like open-faced sandwiches, toast squares, fruit wedges, and waffles with jam instead of syrup can be eaten with your fingers. Remember fruits, vegetables and whole grains - These foods contain many

vitamins, minerals, fiber and photochemicals (other naturally occurring compounds in

foods that may promote health). Yellow and red peppers have great flavor, color and vitamins and are usually more easily digested than green peppers. Fresh, frozen or canned fruits make great snacks. Whole and multi-grain crackers, cereals, and breads can be used a finger-food snacks. • Eat old favorites - Over the years you may have given up some of your favorite

foods because of cost, preparation time, or salt, fat or calorie content. Eating "comfort foods" like macaroni and cheese, chicken soup and pudding can provide needed energy and nutrients. Total intake of food is more important than the sodium or fat content of individual foods when you are not feeling well.

•Eat with company - Even when you don't feel very well, it is good to have company! Invite neighbors, friends or family members such as grandchildren to share a meal or snack.

• Try liquid supplements - As a last resort when you can't get food down, use liquid nutritional supplements. The "liquids" can be used in instant puddings, as a frozen dessert and as a shake between meals. Avoid using these as a total meal replacement. These nutritional supplements do provide a balanced, concentrated source of nutrition and can help sustain your nutritional status when you really don't feel like eating.





Economic development effort taking shape for Wabeno's future

Wabeno—The Friends of Wabeno met again on August 28 to review a draft proposal for a ten year revitalization plan and vision for Wabeno, highlighting the many assets and supportive events in the area. Friends President Mary Beck pointed out that the area's lakes, rivers, streams and hiking trails provide the platform for Wabeno build upon. She also noted that the community is blessed with active groups such as the Dual Sport's biannual rallies and the strength of the ATV and Snowmobile Club

Building upon those assets, Beck presented a conceptual drawing of potential pedestrian trails encompassing the North Branch of Oconto River and Range Line Creek, both of which pass through the town. Wabeno Chairman Butch Piontek will be meeting with the United States Forest Service to investigate possibilities to work together. 



Fall wild turkey, ruffed grouse seasons set to open

MADISON - Biologists with the state Department of Natural Resources have noticed a large increase this year in the number of applications for the fall turkey hunt.

One likely factor is that those individuals who purchased a conservation patron license were able apply online and were not required to file a paper application as in the past.

However, there has also been a significant increase in applications from individuals who did not purchase the broadly inclusive conservation patron license. Fall turkey hunting permits are awarded by lottery for each of seven turkey hunting zones.

"It just seems there is more interest this fall in turkey hunting," said Scott Walter, DNR upland wildlife ecologist. "Some hunters may have had more difficulty in drawing a preferred tag in

Prospects are good for both the fall wild turkey hunt and for the ruffed grouse season in zone A, both of which open with the start of shooting hours on Saturday, Sept. 14.

The fall turkey season runs through Nov. 21 statewide. The extended fall season runs Dec. 2-31 in turkey zones 1-5, which cover the lower two thirds of the state.

As during the past two seasons, hunters may use dogs statewide to hunt wild turkey this fall.

The grouse season in zone A runs through Jan. 31, 2014. Hunters interested in pursuing grouse in southeastern Wisconsin, in zone B, have a short season that opens a month later on Oct. 19 and runs through Dec. 8.

Overall, Wisconsin's statewide wild turkey population remains strong.

After 30 years of sustained population growth and expansion across the state, wild turkeys are now found statewide. and overall their numbers remain strong this year. Local populations fluctuate as weather affects survival and reproduction rates.

"Of course we had a late winter and cold wet spring," Walter said, "and this probably led to relatively low production. There were many field observations of late broods; even into August we had people reporting quail-sized turkey poults. This is very small for this time of year.'

This is an indication that first nests failed, prompting hens to start a second nest later in the spring, according to Walter. Even with a late start, these young birds grow very quickly, he adds, and as long as they are able to find sufficient food, they should be fine going into the winter, which is still a couple of

"The flip side of the weather coin is that 2012 was a fantastic production year," Walter said. "This should mean more adult gobblers are available to hunters.'

Biologists closely monitor harvest during the either-sex fall season, as excessive hen harvest can affect turkey populations. Recent hen harvests in Wisconsin have been very low, however, and hunters can enter the woods comfortable with the knowledge that current hen harvest rates do not play a significant role in the dynamics of Wisconsin's turkey flock.

Turkey hunters are subject to the blaze orange requirement for ground blinds erected on DNR lands during any gun deer season. Ground blinds on DNR lands left unattended during legal hunting hours must also have the owner's name and address or DNR Customer ID Number attached near the door opening. Ground blinds may not be left out overnight and must be



These ground blind rules do not apply to ground blinds being used for hunting waterfowl or to blinds built only out of natural vegetation found on the DNR property, except that all waterfowl blinds situated on state-owned property and used in hunting waterfowl must always bear the name of the owner affixed permanently to the blind in lettering one-inch square or larger, even when a person is using the blind.

Grouse and turkey hunters must wear blaze orange clothing during any gun or muzzleloader deer season. A hat, if worn, must be at least 50 percent blaze orange.

Grouse hunters encouraged to "Be HIP!" certified if thev also plan to pursue woodcock, mourning doves or other migratory game birds

Upland hunters that may harvest woodcock are subject to the federal requirement to be registered with the Harvest Information Program (HIP) before hunting these and other migratory game birds. Registration is free and is available through all license vendors as well as online; hunters will only need to answer a few short questions.

What Are The Federal Poverty Levels For 2013?

When applying for many public benefits, often eligibility is based on income and sometimes on assets. The income guidlines follow certain federal poverty levels (FPL) depending on the particular program you apply for. Here is a table of federal poverty levels for 2013. Take a look at these and compare what your monthly income is. Keep in mind that all sources of income will be included when applying for benefits, regardless if the income is taxable or not. Income reported must be the gross amounts, (before any deductions are withheld).

	100% FPL	120% FPL	135% FPL	150% FPL	160% FPL	200% FPL

For an example: There is a program available for those on Medicare to get their Part B premiums paid for. There are 3 different levels of the Medicare Savings Program and each level specifies a different federal poverty level for eligibility. The qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) level uses the 100% FPL as the income guideline. The other two levels would include persons in the 120% and 135% FPL's.

When applying for the Medicare Part D Extra Help, income eligibility is based on the 150% FPL or less. There again are 4 different levels based on the different levels of FPL that would determine what percentage of the Extra Help Subsidy you would receive. Sounds pretty complicated but we receive up-to-date and tables that give us excellent resources when counseling individuals on the various programs.

The SeniorCare program begins at the 160% FPL and has 4 levels up to 240% FPL. Actually this program is very unique in the fact that there really is no income limit, but depending on the cost of your prescriptions in comparison with your income, you may not use the program. However, it is creditable coverage, you don't have to enroll in a Part D plan for your prescriptions, and your cost is only \$30 per year if you are not taking any prescriptions. It saves you from a penalty!

Food Share is based on the \$200% FPL or less. The Wisconsin Home Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP) accepts applicants who are at or below 60% of the State Median Income Level and not a federal poverty level. The Homestead Tax credit program has an annual income limit of \$24,680 for 2012. Your refund is calculated by comparing tables with income and the amount of property tax or rent paid.

MADISON – Two dozen anglers, fishing instructors, representatives of conservation groups, bait shop owners and the Conservation Congress have been tapped for an advisory group to help shape the future of panfishing in Wisconsin's inland waters.

"The stakeholder group is one more opportunity for us to gather public input to help create a management plan for inland waters," says Joanna Griffin, the Department of Natural Resources fisheries biologist leading the planning effort. "We are asking these stakeholders to work with us to use the angler surveys in combination with regulation evaluations and analyses to develop goals and objectives."

DNR has had management plans in place for many years for game fish species; biologists and some anglers believe such attention is necessary for panfish, reflected in proposals from the Conservation Congress in recent years, including in 2013, to reduce the daily 25 fish limit on panfish on select lakes.

Such concerns and analyses of fish populations showing panfish size going down statewide have spurred DNR to develop a management plan. As part of the process, DNR held public meetings in the spring and conducted an online survey to gauge angler preferences for their panfishing experiences, Griffin says.

Panfish survey results [PDF] revealed that anglers are evenly split on whether to keep the current statewide bag limit of 25 panfish per day and differ on size and number of fish they want to catch.

"The survey results are interesting. There is a clear split between people who are satisfied with their panfish fishery and people who want a change," Griffin says. "We hope the stakeholder group can help us try to get a better handle on panfish stakeholder diversity and attitudes."

The stakeholder meeting runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sept. 14, 2013, in the Legacy Room of the University of Wisconsin Stevens Point Dreyfus University Center, 1015 Reserve St.. The meeting is open to the public but there are no formal input opportunities.

Panfish are by far the most commonly targeted and caught category of fish in Wisconsin. Wisconsin results for the 2011 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service survey of anglers showed that 75 percent of them identified themselves as panfish anglers and that 71 percent of the hours spent fishing were spent fishing for panfish.

As a category, panfish are by far the most common fish caught by anglers in Wisconsin although anglers report walleye as their favorite target. Wisconsin anglers reported catching 88 million fish in the 2006-7 license year, of which 57.7 million were panfish, according to a statewide mail survey done that year. About 25.7 million of those panfish were kept.





Youth Waterfowl and regular season Canada goose hunts about to open

MADISON - The popular two-day youth waterfowl hunt takes place Sept. 14-15 this year, followed by the regular Canada goose hunting season in the Exterior and Horicon zones, which kicks off Monday, Sept. 16. Youth Waterfowl Hunt

This special hunt offers youth age 12-15 – or those 10 and over hunting under the mentored hunting law - the opportunity to learn skills from an adult without some of the pressure that might be encountered during the regular season.

Normal season bag limits apply. All license and stamp requirements are waived, although participants still need to be HIP registered (free of charge) and if they wish to hunt geese during this time they would need to possess an early season goose permit. Licensed adults may also hunt geese since the early goose season is open during these dates.

While many youth enjoy this special hunt alongside a parent or relative, each year about one in seven hunters are able to participate solely because a family friend, neighbor, or volunteer mentor was generous enough to take the time to teach them the tradition of waterfowling, said Kent Van Horn, DNR migratory game bird ecologist.

Another great opportunity would be a learn to hunt waterfowl clinic. For information on this and other learn-to-hunt opportunities, visit dnr.wi.gov and type "learn to hunt" in the search box.

Regular goose season

"With resident Canada goose breeding numbers similar to recent years and improved production of the Ontario breeders, hunters should have ample opportunities this year, and will again enjoy a full 92 days of hunting in the Exterior zone with a two bird daily bag limit." said Van Horn.

When combined with the 15 days of the early season, this puts Wisconsin at 107 days of Canada goose hunting this year, the maximum season length allowed by international treaty".

On opening day of duck season in each zone, the 9 a.m. start of shooting hours also applies to goose hunters in both the Exterior and Horicon zones.

Exterior Zone Canada goose seasons

*In the Northern zone: Sept. 16 - Dec. 21

*In the Southern zone: Sept. 16 - Oct. 6 and Oct. 12 - Dec. 21

*In the Mississippi River subzone: Sept. 21 - Sept. 29 and Oct. 12 - Jan. 2

The goose season is closed during the duck season split in both the south zone, which is closed Oct. 7-11, and the Mississippi subzone, closed Sept. 30 - Oct. 11. Horicon Canada goose season

The Horicon zone Canada goose season has two time periods:

*H1 runs Sept. 16 - Oct. 27

*H2 goes from Oct. 28 - Dec. 16.

Hunters who applied for the Horicon zone will receive six harvest tags. The daily bag limit is two Canada geese. Boundary and tagging requirements were discussed and approved during the summer regulatory process. These changes to the Horicon zone will take effect in 2014. Archers can take up deer hunt beginning Saturday, Sept. 14



MADISON – Cooler evening temperatures are a signal to many bow hunters that the Sept. 14 opening of Wisconsin's archery deer season is just around the corner.

"For those of us who love to bow hunt, it's an exciting time of the year and anticipation runs high," said Kevin Wallenfang, the big game ecologist for the state Department of Natural Resources and an ardent, enthusiastic bow hunter.

With good conditions hunters can hope to see plenty of deer in most areas of the state, said Wallenfang. Archers set an all-time record buck harvest last year, he said, including yet another new state record trophy deer shot in Fond du lac County.

"In general, during the past couple of years we've had conservative antierless quotas in the north to allow herds to increase," Wallenfang said. "As a result, I'm hearing from a lot of folks that they are seeing more deer across the north than in recent years. In addition, we continue to have good numbers of deer in most farmland areas."

Many archers in the chronic wasting disease management zone will be pleased to see the absence of a four-day October gun hunt, which has been the norm in recent years. The only interruption of the archery season will be a two-day statewide youth hunt Oct. 5-6.

Hunters understand, Wallenfang said, that all properties are not created equal when it comes to deer abundance. Deer change their movements in response to weather, food availability and other factors and are not evenly distributed through a deer management unit. Aerial surveys often show a large number of deer in one square mile of habitat with very few deer in one of the neighboring square-mile blocks.

As always, there is no substitute for scouting and pre-season contacts with neighboring land owners, Wallenfang said.

The 2013 archery deer season runs from Saturday, Sept. 14, through Thursday, Nov. 21 and then from Saturday, Nov. 23, the start of the gun season, through Jan. 5, a Sunday. As always, there is no deer hunting of any kind on the Friday preceding the gun deer hunt. This single day separates the early and late bow deer seasons.

Archery deer hunters will again be allowed to hunt during the regular nine-day gun deer hunt in November and for the second year will be able to fill a gun license deer tag with a bow or crossbow during the gun deer seasons. During the gun deer season, bow hunters are required to follow the same blaze orange clothing regulations as gun hunters.


There were 263,852 licensed archery hunters in 2012 who harvested a total of 94,267 deer, up from 255,426 archery hunters who harvested 90,200 deer in 2011.

Wallenfang urged bow hunters to be especially careful when climbing into and out of deer stands. This is when most injuries occur.

"Things are shaping up to be another excellent year. Be safe in your stand, wear a harness, and enjoy the fall woods."

Governor Proclaims September 'Don't Text & Drive' Awareness Month

Wisconsin State Patrol, AT&T and AAA Teaming Up on Series of High School Events to Highlight Dangers of Texting & Driving

MADISON, WI, Tuesday, September 3, 2013 As students head back to school, Governor Scott Walker has proclaimed September as "Don't Text & Drive: It Can Wait®" Awareness Month throughout Wisconsin and is urging all residents, particularly teens, to never text behind the wheel.

"Texting has become the way many people communicate today, which means some people are doing it at the worst possible time while driving," said Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent Stephen Fitzgerald. "While Wisconsin bans texting and driving, we must continue to raise awareness about the deadly consequences of this practice and urge all drivers to never text and drive."

The Wisconsin State Patrol, AT&T and AAA also announced today that they are teaming up once again on a series of high school events around the state to drive home the dangers of texting and driving. Assemblies are currently scheduled for September 19 at La Crosse Logan High School and Waukesha South High School, with events being planned throughout the school year in cities across Wisconsin.

Since 2010, AT&T, AAA and the State Patrol have partnered together to hold events in 25 cities throughout the Wisconsin, reaching over 16,500 high school students.

"Studies show teens continue to text and drive, even though they know it's dangerous and against the law," said Scott T. VanderSanden, president of AT&T Wisconsin. "We are proud to partner with the State Patrol and AAA to raise awareness about the dangers and challenge all drivers to take the pledge to never text behind the wheel."

AT&T is urging all Americans to pledge to stop texting and driving, and to join with others on September 19 -- "Drive 4 Pledges Day" to make a lifelong commitment to never do so again. The company is calling on all drivers to go to www.ltCanWait.com to take the no-texting-and-driving pledge and then share their promise with others via Twitter (#ItCanWait) and Facebook.

AT&T first launched the It Can Wait campaign in 2009 to educate the public about the dangers of texting while driving and encourage consumers to take the pledge to not text and drive at www.ltCanWait.com. More than 2 million pledges have been made to never text and drive. The campaign has now turned into a national movement with support from organizations all across the country, including the Wisconsin State Patrol and AAA.

In August, the It Can Wait movement released a new documentary directed by acclaimed filmmaker Werner Herzog called "From One Second to the Next" that shows the aftermath of texting and driving.

The film features the Wisconsin story of Xzavier Davis Bilbo, a Milwaukee boy who is paralyzed from the diaphragm down after he was hit by a texting driver as he was crossing the street. The documentary is being distributed to nearly 40,000 high schools across the country, including in Wisconsin, along with hundreds of government and safety organizations.

Texting is one of the most dangerous activities a driver can do behind the wheel. Those who send text messages while driving are 23 times more likely to be in a crash. Texting while driving also causes more than 100,000 car crashes on American roadways each year, according to the National Safety Council 1.

Teens are particularly at risk. While 97% of teens say they know texting while driving is dangerous, 75% say the practice is "common" among their friends, according to an AT&T survey2.

Wisconsin's law, effective as of December 1, 2010, prohibits sending an e-mail or text message while driving and imposes a fine of up to \$400. As a primary enforcement law, officers may stop and ticket drivers solely for texting and driving. Wisconsin is among 41 states and the District of Columbia that ban text messaging by all drivers.

The events at Wisconsin high schools will feature the AT&T documentary and AAA's distracted driving simulator.

"AAA has long been warning the public of the dangers of distracted driving," said AAA Wisconsin Regional President Tom Frymark. "By partnering with educators, the State Patrol and AT&T, we hope to get the message across to even more Wisconsin drivers that texting and driving is a dangerous mix."




