## 2013 Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey begins

MADISON -- The opening of the archery deer season on Sept. 14 marks the beginning of the 2013 Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey.

"Deer hunters often ask if there is a way they can tell state wildlife officials what they are or are not seeing from their deer stand, this survey provides them with the means to do that" said Jay Watson, wildlife survey technician with the Department of Natural Resources.

"With the Deer Trustee report recommending more input from the hunting public on herd status, this tool provides the hunter with an excellent way to communicate their sightings," Watson said. "All they need to do is record the date, number of hours, county, deer management unit, weather conditions, and the type and number of animals observed each day of deer hunting. Hunters can also enter their email address along with their observations and I will send them an email summary of their hunting activity at the end of the survey period."

Hunters can find survey instructions, record sightings, and view survey results online at the Wisconsin Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey page by searching the DNR website for "deer hunter wildlife." A tally sheet is also available for times when hunters do not have access to a computer.

#### Town of Lincoln opens roads to all-terrain vehicles



The Town of Lincoln adopted an ordinance to establish all terrain vehicle routes in the town and to regulate the operation of all terrain vehicles in the town.

While operating an all terrain vehicle, no person may operate an all terrain vehicle on the roadway portion of any highway in the town except on roadways that are designated as all terrain vehicle routes. Operation of all terrain vehicles on a roadway in the town that is an all terrain vehicle route is authorized only for the extreme right side of the roadway except that left turns may be made from any part of the roadway that is safe given prevailing conditions.

All roads in the Town of Lincoln will be open as access roads to the main mapped and signed routes. All main mapped routes shall be marked with uniform all terrain vehicle route signs in accordance with s.NR 64.12(7), Wisconsin Administrative Code. The balance of the town roads will be open as access roads to the marked routes.

No person may intentionally remove, damage, deface, move or obstruct any uniform all terrain vehicle route or trail signor standard or intentionally interfere with the effective operation of any uniform route or trail sign or standards if the sign or standard is legally placed by the

#### Fall wild turkey, ruffed grouse seasons set to open

MADISON - Biologists with the state Department of Natural Resources have noticed a large increase this year in the number of applications for the fall turkey hunt. One likely factor is that those individuals who purchased a conservation patron license were able to apply online and were not required to file a paper application as in the past. However, there has also been a significant increase in applications from individuals who did not purchase the broadly inclusive conservation patron license. Fall turkey hunting permits are awarded by lottery for each of seven turkey hunting zones.

"It just seems there is more interest this fall in turkey hunting," said Scott Walter, DNR upland wildlife ecologist. "Some hunters may have had more difficulty in drawing a preferred tag in some zones."



#### **Apricots**

Apricots are those beautifully orange colored fruits full of beta-carotene and fiber that are one of the first signs of summer. Although dried and canned apricots are available year round, fresh apricots with a plentiful supply of vitamin C and are in season in North America from May through August. Any fresh fruit you see during the winter months have been imported from either South America or New Zealand

Relatives to peaches, apricots are small, golden orange fruits, with velvety skin and flesh, not too juicy but definitely smooth and sweet. Some describe their flavor as almost musky, with a faint tartness that lies somewhere between a peach and a plum.

#### **Protect Your Eyesight:**

Your mother may have told you carrots would keep your eyes bright as a child, but as an adult, it looks like fruit is even more important for keeping your sight. Data reported in a study published in the Archives of Opthamology indicates that eating 3 or more servings of fruit per day may lower your risk of age-related macular degeneration (ARMD), the primary cause of vision loss in older adults, by 36%, compared to persons who consume less that 1.5 servings of fruit daily.

In this study, which involved over 100,000 women and men, researchers evaluated the effect of study participants' consumption of fruits; vegetables; the antioxidant vitamins A, C, and E; and carotenoids on the development of early ARMD or neovascular ARMD, a more severe form of the illness associated with vision loss. Food intake information was collected periodically for up to 18 years for women and 12 years for men.

While, surprisingly, intakes of vegetables, antioxidant vitamins and carotenoids were not strongly related to incidence of either form of ARMD, fruit intake was definitely protective against the severe form of this vision-destroying disease.

Three servings of fruit may sound like a lot to eat each day, but by simply tossing a banana into your morning smoothie or slicing it over your cereal, topping of a cup or yogurt or green salad with a half cup of berries, and snacking on an apricot, you've reached this goal!

#### How to Enjoy:

A few quick serving ideas:

- Add sliced apricots to hot or cold cereal.
- · The next time you make whole grain pancakes add some chopped apricots to the batter.
- · Give a Middle Eastern flavor to chicken or vegetable stews with the addition of dried, diced apricots.
- · Serve fresh apricots in your green salad when they are in season.



#### Making A Farce Of Wisconsin's Managed Forest Law

How many of us hunt on open Managed Forest Lands in Wisconsin? How many of us fish, hike, sight-see or cross-country ski on these lands? As of June 2013, our state had approximately 1.1 million acres of open managed forest lands - open to us all.

Yet in less than two weeks, our State Senate may be asked to vote on a bill that will deny us the privilege of accessing these open lands if the lands are within a proposed iron mining site. Senate Bill 278, authored by State Senator Tom Tiffany, will make a farce of a wellrespected program that was created in 1985 to promote sound forestry practices and open more land to the public for recreation.

According to our current law, the purpose of the Managed Forest Land (MFL) program is to "encourage the management of private forest lands for the production of future forest crops for commercial use through sound forestry practices, recognizing the objectives of individual property owners, compatible recreational uses, watershed protection, development of wildlife habitat and accessibility of private property to the public for recreational purposes. Wis. Stats. s. 77.80.

Landowners with at least 10 contiguous acres, of which 80 percent or more is forested, can apply to have their property placed in the Managed Forest Lands (MFL) program. The advantage to the landowners is that they pay a substantially lower tax rate on their land per acre.

Landowners can choose to have their land closed or open to the public. If they choose to "close" their land, they cannot close more than 160 acres per municipality. Landowners who close their lands pay a higher tax rate than landowners who choose to have "open" lands.

"Open" lands require the landowner to permit public access for hunting, fishing, hiking, sight-seeing and crosscountry skiing.

Under the Managed Forest Law, landowners commit to a 25 or 50 year sustainable forest management plan. Pursuant to the law, landowners can voluntarily withdraw from the program at any time prior to the expiration of the plan. At the time of withdrawal, the landowners are assessed a withdrawal tax and withdrawal fee.

The withdrawal tax is the higher of either the amount the landowner would have paid in taxes over the previous years the land was in the MFL program or five percent of the stumpage value of the merchantable timber on the land. The taxes paid already by the landowner, under either option, are subtracted from the higher amount. Wis. Stats. s. 77.88

Senator Tiffany authored SB 278 in order to promote the interests of one out-of-state mining company, Gogebic Taconite (GTAC), over the interests of the public. According to its Preapplication Notice to the DNR, dated June 17, 2013, GTAC's proposed mining site boundary along the Penokee Range encompasses 6,744 acres. These lands are owned by RGGS Land & Minerals, LaPointe Iron Company, and Chester Co. Limited. These lands are in the MFL program and are designated "open."

Under the ruse of drafting legislation that will protect workers on the mine site from protestors, SB278 will allow GTAC to close to the public these legally mandated

Our government seems insistent on taking away privileges we share as citizens of Wisconsin by drafting new laws that benefit special interests. If GTAC is sincere about protecting its workers at the potential mine site, the solution is simple - voluntarily withdraw the lands from the MFL program. Then these private lands will be closed automatically to the public.

Of course the company landowners would be responsible for deferred taxes on the land withdrawn from the program. News sources indicate The Town of Anderson in Iron County could receive as much as \$400,000, for example, if the land were withdrawn from the MFL program. was born in September 17, 1943, son of Richard McGuire, And the landowners would have to begin paying regular property taxes.

Rather than follow Wisconsin law, however, GTAC once again has lobbied our legislators to change our laws to its favor and our detriment. The public will lose. The municipalities will lose. But GTAC will get what it wants open" MFL lands closed to the public while the landowner companies continue to reap the benefits of the lower tax

If you hunt, fish, hike, sight-see or cross-country ski in the summer of 1998, through the Laborers of Christ, on open Managed Forest Lands, become informed. Then contact each of our State Senators and let them know your position on SB 278. Do it soon. Your privilege to access open managed forest lands is at stake.

## Mother Nature returns for her annual fall foliage tour – and it'll be a stunner!

MADISON -- Mother Nature is back for her compelling annual fall color tour, starring one of the state's fiercest economic powerhouses – the tree. And the best part is the admission – free!

"This is one of the most popular science shows running -- from curtain up to standing ovation," said Carmen Hardin, a forest science specialist with the Department of Natural Resources.

While the annual fall color show is always a huge attraction for the thousands who flock to Wisconsin, and contribute to the state's strong tourism industry, Hardin says it is the state's forest industry that is the basis of the show.

"It's all orchestrated by Mother Nature using the state's 16 million acres of forests. When they're not turning colors for all to 'ooh and aah' about, the trees help contribute \$2.6 billion annually in forest industry wages," Hardin said.

New fall color social media events

But the color show doesn't stop with the forest line. This year, the DNR Facebook page will host a fall color photo contest and the DNR Twitter account will issue periodic messages about where tree colors can be found along with some science facts on. People can look for the rules of the photo contest, Wisconsin's Color Contest, on the DNR Facebook page and the DNR Twitter messages to start around September 12.

"We'll help you find the best color – and you can share your finds with everyone on the DNR Facebook page," said Trish Ossmann, DNR social media Wisconsin. coordinator.

What about that science: When do trees turn and why?

In late summer, broadleaved trees respond to lengthening nights and cooling temperatures by reducing levels of a green pigment known as chlorophyll that is used in photosynthesis -- the production of sugars in the leaves. When the trees reduce their green pigment, the oranges and yellows in the leaves come through.

Red and purple fall colors have a different origin, and are due to anthocyanin pigments that are actively produced in late summer at the same time as the green chlorophyll deteriorates.

The brightest red and purple colors appear when autumn days are bright and nights are chilly but not freezing. These are the conditions which increase production of the red and purple pigments. Orange and yellow colors tend to be fairly constant from year to year because the orange and yellow pigments are always present in the leaves.

But some people reported they were seeing trees turning color early and dropping their leaves in August.

DNR Forest Health Specialist Bill McNee says this was due to last year's drought and the dry summer some areas of the state experienced again this year.

"Trees without enough water started to shut down early to reduce further water losses. This meant they went through the color change earlier than they normally would," McNee says.


"People often ask us where to go to see the best colors," Hardin said. "The answer is anywhere in the state. It's all a matter of keeping track where the color is traveling."







Prospects are good for both the fall wild turkey hunt and for the ruffed grouse season in zone A, both of which open with the start of shooting hours on Saturday, Sept. 14.

The fall turkey season runs through Nov. 21 statewide. The extended fall season runs Dec. 2-31 in turkey zones 1-5, which cover the lower two thirds of the state.

As during the past two seasons, hunters may use dogs statewide to hunt wild turkey this fall.

The grouse season in zone A runs through Jan. 31, 2014. Hunters interested in pursuing grouse in southeastern Wisconsin, in zone B, have a short season that opens a month later on Oct. 19 and runs through Dec. 8.

Overall, Wisconsin's statewide wild turkey population remains strong.

After 30 years of sustained population growth and expansion across the state, wild turkeys are now found statewide, and overall their numbers remain strong this year. Local populations fluctuate as weather affects survival and reproduction rates.

"Of course we had a late winter and cold wet spring," Walter said, "and this probably led to relatively low production. There were many field observations of late broods; even into August we had people reporting quailsized turkey poults. This is very small for this time of year."

This is an indication that first nests failed, prompting hens to start a second nest later in the spring, according to Walter. Even with a late start, these young birds grow very quickly, he adds, and as long as they are able to find sufficient food, they should be fine going into the winter, which is still a couple of months away

"The flip side of the weather coin is that 2012 was a fantastic production year," Walter said. "This should mean more adult gobblers are available to hunters.'

Biologists closely monitor harvest during the either-sex fall season, as excessive hen harvest can affect turkey populations. Recent hen harvests in Wisconsin have been very low, however, and hunters can enter the woods comfortable with the knowledge that current hen harvest rates do not play a significant role in the dynamics of Wisconsin's turkey flock.

Turkey hunters are subject to the blaze orange requirement for ground blinds erected on DNR lands during any gun deer season. Ground blinds on DNR lands left unattended during legal hunting hours must also have the owner's name and address or DNR Customer ID Number attached near the door opening. Ground blinds may not be left out overnight and must be removed entirely from the property at the close of hunting hours each day.

These ground blind rules do not apply to ground blinds being used for hunting waterfowl or to blinds built only out of natural vegetation found on the DNR property, except that all waterfowl blinds situated on state-owned property and used in hunting waterfowl must always bear the name of the owner affixed permanently to the blind in lettering one-inch square or larger, even when a person is using the blind.

Grouse and turkey hunters must wear blaze orange clothing during any gun or muzzleloader deer season. A hat, if worn, must be at least 50 percent blaze

Grouse hunters encouraged to "Be HIP!" certified if they also plan to pursue woodcock, mourning doves or other migratory game birds

Upland hunters that may harvest woodcock are subject to the federal requirement to be registered with the Harvest Information Program (HIP) before hunting these and other migratory game birds. Registration is free and is available through all license vendors as well as online; hunters will only need to answer a few short questions.

Wildlife officials ask that hunters record all of their hunting activity throughout the deer season, even if no wildlife sightings were made during a hunt. The survey period ends January 2014. These observations have provided the DNR with an index to abundance for many wildlife species.

Many other states in the Midwest and around the country use these types of surveys to gather hunter input into deer and other wildlife abundance.

This is the fifth year of the survey and deer hunters are asked to report their field observations of a variety of wildlife species, hunting conditions and hours spent pursuing game. This year 17,000 deer hunters were selected at random and sent a letter inviting them to participate in Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey. However, if you were not one of the hunters selected to participate we still encourage your participation to help provide insight into Wisconsin's deer herd.

"Whether you hunt opening weekend or all season long, this extra monitoring of our state's wildlife provides us with thousands of observations," Watson said.

The Deer Hunter Wildlife Survey overlaps another citizen-participation survey. Operation Deer Watch started Aug. 1 and runs through Sept. 30. The primary objective of Operation Deer Watch is to determine trends in deer reproductive success by reporting does and fawns seen together during the late summer and early fall. **Trail Camera Photos Wanted** 

The wildlife surveys program is also interested in photographs of rare or endangered species hunters may have captured on their trail cameras. Photos can be emailed to DNR Wildlife Management. 

## 13 Reasons Tea Is Good For You

Put down those saucer cups and get chugging - tea is officially awesome for your health. But before loading up on Red Zinger, make sure that your "tea" is actually tea. Real tea is delivered from a particular plant (Camellia sinensis) and includes only four varieties: green, black, white and oolong. Anything else (like herbal"tea") is an infusion of a different plant and isn't technically tea.

But what real tea lacks in variety, it makes up for with some serious health benefits. Researchers attribute tea's health properties to polyphenols (a type of antioxidant) and phytochemicals. Though most studies have focused on the better-known green and black teas, whit and oolong also bring benefits to the table. Read on to find out why coffee's little cousin rocks your health.

1.) Tea can boost exercise endurance. Scientists have found that the catechins (antioxidants) in green tea extract increase the body's ability to burn fat as fuel, which accounts for improved muscle endurance.

2.) Drinking tea could help reduce the risk of heart attack. Tea might also help protect against cardiovascular and degenerative diseases.

3.) The antioxidants in tea might help protect against a boatload of cancers, including breast, colon, colorectal, skin, lung, esophagus, stomach, small intestine, pancreas, liver, ovarian, prostate and oral cancers. But don't rely solely on tea to keep a healthy body - tea is not a miracle cure, after all. While more studies than not suggest that tea has cancer-fighting benefits, the current research is mixed.

4.) Tea helps fight free radicals. Tea is high in oxygen radical absorbance capacity ("ORAC" to its friends), which is a fancy way of saying that is helps destroy free radicals (which can damage DNA) in the body. While our bodies are designed to fight free radicals on their own, they're not 100 percent effective - and since damage from these radical oxygen ninjas has been linked to cancer, heart disease and neurological degeneration, we'll take all the help we can get.

**5.)** Tea is hydrating to the body (even despite the caffeine!).

6.) Drinking tea is linked with a lower risk of Parkinson's disease. When considered with other factors like smoking, physical activity, age, and body mass index, regular tea drinking was associated with a lowered risk of Parkinson's disease in both men and women.

7.) Tea might provide protection from ultraviolet rays. We know it's important to limit exposure to UV rays, and we all know what it's like to feel the burn. The good news is that green tea may act as a back-up sunscreen.

8.) Tea could keep waist circumference in check. In one study, participants who regularly consumed hot tea had lower waist circumference and lower BMI that non-consuming participants. Scientists speculate that regular tea drinking lowers the risk of metabolic syndrome (which increases the risk of diabetes, artery disease and stroke), although it's important to remember that correlation does not equal causation.

9.) Regular tea drinking might also counteract some of the negative effects of smoking and might even lessen the risk of lung cancer (good news, obviously, but not a justification for cigs).

10.) Tea could be beneficial to people with Type 2 diabetes. Studies suggest that compounds in green tea could help diabetes better process sugars.

11.) Tea can help the body recover from radiation. One study found that tea helped protect against cellular degeneration upon exposure to radiation, while another found that tea can help skin bounce back postexposure.

12.) Green tea has been found to improve bone mineral density and strength.

13.) Tea might be an effective agent in the prevention and treatment of neurological diseases, especially degenerative diseases (think Alzheimer's). While many factors influence brain health, polyphenols in green tea may help maintain the parts of the brain that regulate learning and

Though most research on tea is highly positive, it's not all definitive - so keep these caveats in mind before stocking up on gallons of the stuff:

1.) Keep it cool. Repeatedly drinking hot beverages may boost the risk of esophageal cancer. Give tea several minutes to cool off before sipping. 2.) The studies seem convincing, but a rat does not a human make. Chemicals in tea may react differently in the lab than they do in the human body. Tannins (and other good stuff in green tea)\_ may not be bioavailable for humans, meaning tea might not always benefit human health to the same degree as in lab studies suggest.

3.) All tea drinks are not created equal. The body's accrss to the good stuff in tea might be determined by the tea variety, canning and processing. and the way it was brewed.

The takeaway: at the very least, tea should be safe to consume - just not in excessive amounts. So brew up a batch of the good stuff - hot or cold and enjoy!

state, any municipality or any authorized individual. No person can possess a route, trail or standard sign unless lawfully obtaining it.

Additional restrictions include, all ATV operators will observe posted roadway speed limits, ride single file, and slow the vehicle to 10 miles per hour or less when operating within 150 feet of a dwelling.

The ordinance may be enforced by any law enforcement officer authorized to enforce the laws of the State of Wisconsin.

The Town of Lincoln and area ATV groups first concern is public safety. Speed and noise levels will be monitored and tickets will be issued to any person breaking the laws. If violations are excessive, the town can and will close the routes. The town board has opened stretches of trails over the past two years and have not encountered problems.
