In Favor of the Wabeno Referendum

On Tuesday, April 1st, voters of the School District of the Wabeno Area will be asked whether or not they support increasing the mill rate to pay for a shortfall in school funding. By way of this letter, I would like to explain why this referendum is necessary and ask the residents of the Wabeno School District to support it.

Due to declining enrollment and a congruent decline in state funding, the Wabeno School has been forced to operate at a deficit. The deficit for school year 2013-14 is \$700,442. This deficit is projected to increase in each successive year. By school year 2016-17, the projected deficit will be \$1,695,542. 1

To cover this shortfall, the district has been depleting its fund balance. At the end of the last school year, the balance was over \$4.6 million. At the end of the 2013-14 school year, the balance will be just over \$3.9 million. By the 2016-17 school year, all of the fund balance will have been depleted and the district will be about \$138,000 in the hole. 1

The District has long recognized this problem and has hosted a series of "Two Cents Events" over the past few years. Many thoughts have been offered on how to reduce costs and increase revenues. Some of these ideas have been successfully implemented. Last year, a referendum to increase the mill rate failed to pass by a mere 34 votes. This set into motion efforts to pass a scaled-back version that will be on the ballot this Tuesday.

The referendum is asking district property owners for an additional \$750,000 per year for school years 2014-15, 2015-16, and 2016-17. It proposes to do so by increasing the mill rate from the current 5.62 to 6.29. It



USDA Encourages Early Registration for FSA Programs

WAUSAU, WI, March 21, 2014 - The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia today recommended that farmers and ranchers who plan to participate in FSA programs register in advance. Producers are encouraged to report farm records and business structure changes to a local FSA Service Center before April 15, 2014.

Enrollment for the disaster programs authorized by the 2014 Farm Bill, including the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP) and the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) will begin by April 15, 2014.

'We expect significant interest in these programs," said Garcia. "Early registration should help improve the sign-up process and allow us to expedite implementation of the programs. I strongly encourage producers to complete their paperwork ahead of time." Examples of updates or changes to report include:

New producers or producers who have not reported farm records to FSA.

Producers who have recently bought, sold or rented land. Those producers need to ensure that changes have been reported and properly recorded by local FSA county office personnel. Reports of purchased or sold property should include a copy of the land deed, and if land has been leased, then documentation should be provided that indicates the producer had/has control of the acreage.

Producers that have changed business structures (e.g. formed a partnership or LLC) need to ensure that these relationships and shares are properly recorded with FSA. Even family farms that have records on file may want to ensure that this is recorded accurately as it may impact payment limits.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. If an elector is not registered to vote, an elector may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the elector presents proof of identification in a form specified by law unless the elector is exempted from this requirement, and, if the document presented does not constitute proof of residence, the elector provides proof of residence. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

On referenda questions, where paper ballots are used, the elector shall make a cross (X) in the square at the right of "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall make a cross (X) in the square at the right of "no" if opposed to the

On referenda questions, where optical scan voting systems are used, the elector shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question

On referenda questions, where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall depress the button next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall depress the button next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot and promptly leave the polling place.

After an official paper ballot is marked, it shall be folded so the inside marks do not show, but so the printed endorsements and inspectors' initials on the outside do show. The elector shall then deposit his folded ballot in the proper ballot box, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The elector shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. If a central count system is used, the elector shall insert the ballot in the ballot box and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

After an official touch screen ballot is marked, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

Admission to this hour-long film, presented by the Rainbow Hodags student club, is free and open to the public.



Yes, that's the title of my response to a letter from "the WORVPI Board" you may have read the very long letter to the editor signed "WORVPI Board", which was forwarded by e-mail to all the County Board Members, and placed in the Forest Republican newspaper last week, I found the very long letter interesting, I'm wondering if all 17 currently listed WORVPI Board members were consulted before this letter was published? I did notice, that it contained no personal signatures.

What curtain you ask? How about the curtain that has come down around WORVPI's {Wisconsin Off Road Vehicle Park Inc.'s}planned 10,000 acre 'premier destination" "Lambeau Field of Off Road Parks", where by Jim Schusslers own words "People with pockets full of money will come, spend their money, and go home".

Boy, the tune sure has changed in the last 6 months that we have been debating this "Off Road Vehicle Park"! Back then, once the Park was in operation, the streets were going to be paved in gold, it was going to be the salvation of the County, people were going to flock here year round to spend their money at WORVPI's Off Road Vehicle Park, WORVPI was already collecting money for a first year pass to "their" park, and then some of us started asking questions.

would then be gradually reduced to 6.11 in 2015-16 and 5.92 in 2016-17. What this means is that, if your property were valued at \$50.000 the referendum would increase your school taxes by approximately \$34; if your property were valued at \$100,000 the referendum would increase your school taxes by approximately \$67.

So what happens if this referendum does not pass? The school district would try one more time next year. In the meantime, the district would reduce its fund balance by another \$750,000, thus compounding the problem for the future1. Ultimately, if the referendum were to fail, the budget would have to be reduced by \$1.6 million. This would require severe cuts and could include all of the followings:

Cut the number of elementary teaching positions in half (eliminate 6). This would mean classes of about 32-34 instead of the current 16-17.

Eliminate 3 Junior/Senior High teaching positions.

Eliminate 4 aide positions.

Eliminate an administrative position.

Eliminate non-required programs such as Music, Art, Band, Family and Consumer Education, Technology Education, and Counseling.

Eliminate all Sports/Extracurricular Activities and Activity Buses.

Folks, this referendum isn't about financing a new auditorium or sports facility. It's about simply continuing to offer what the Wabeno School System currently offers.

Over the past year we've all read about efforts to promote economic development in our area. Consider this: economic development starts with our own children. If we want our kids to have a shot at a good future, we have to offer them the best opportunity for a good education. And if we want to retain our young adults, we not only need to provide them with good economic opportunities, we need to offer them a good school for their own children.

At the same time, please also consider that that prospective new residents will be looking closely at the state of our school system. Let's continue to offer them an excellent program for their kids as well.

Over the past couple of years I've taken the opportunity to volunteer at the elementary school. I can attest that the residents of the Wabeno Area School District have a school that they can be very proud of. The teachers and staff are giving it their all in spite of reduced funding, compensation, and, in my opinion, under-appreciation for what they contribute to our community. They are spread thin as it is. I hate to think of what doubling their class sizes would

I also hate to think of the impact on the tax base if a number of these relatively good-paying jobs were to go away overnight. We'd probably lose some additional families from our community; it would not only be the economic loss of teachers' salaries, but also their spouses and the loss of state funding for their kids.

Please join me in supporting our children's future. Please vote Yes on the Tuesday April 1st referendum.

WPS may accept payment arrangements to keep customer service on after winter moratorium ends April 15

Green Bay, WI – Wisconsin Public Service (WPS) reports that as of the end of February 2014, nearly 26,000 of its customers were four months or more behind on their utility bills. Customers could face disconnection of their utility service after April 15, 2014 unless they make prior payments or arrangements. State law bars utilities from disconnecting residential service from November 1 to April 15 annually. WPS reports that the number of customers past due is slightly higher than last year but the amount they owe is substantially higher because of the colder winter.

higher because of the colder winter.

"We don't want to disconnect service to customers who are behind, but unless we come to an arrangement with them, disconnection is a good possibility," said Kerry Spees, WPS spokesperson. "We owe it to our good-paying customers to be diligent in our efforts to collect." WPS disconnected service to around 15,000 customers in 2013.

Spees urged customers who are behind and have not yet contacted the utility to do so right away by calling (866) 215-5812. Waiting until near the end of the winter period when disconnects are not allowed will make it more difficult to make arrangements to keep service on the said. "Those customers

arrangements to keep service on, he said. "Those customers who contact us early to make arrangements are going to find we're more flexible with payment options than those who wait, he said.

Residential customers who have not qualified as low income and have not paid during the winter also face paying a security deposit equal to their highest four consecutive bills WPS currently holds security deposits of more than \$2.6 million from more than 3,000 customers (WPS pays interest on the deposit). Customers who struggle with winter bills could choose the WPS Budget Billing program, in which they pay an average bill monthly rather than seasonal high and low bills. WPS also has electronic options for payment listed on its Website: wisconsinpublicservice.com. Options include automatic monthly withdrawal from bank accounts, as well as one-time payments. Most WPS locations no longer accept walk-in payments, but do have drop boxes. For a list of a u t h o r i z e d p a y s t a t i o n s, c h e c k: www.wisconsinpublicservice.com/home/locations.aspx. WPS reminds customers that payments to a drop box or pay station take 1 or 2 days to process.



Each week Amanda will also document the life of a Crandon woman in history on the library's website and in this column. This week's featured local history female at the Crandon Public Library is Lulu Shaw, the first female mayor in the state of Wisconsin! In fact, Lulu's mayoral election was such a momentous occasion it was mentioned in a New York City newspaper in 1923(New York Evening Telegram). Lulu Parnell Shaw was born in the town of Omro in 1866 to Samuel and Louise Shaw. She became well educated in business and law. Ms. Shaw was one of the early publishers of the Forest Republican in Crandon (The Wisconsin State Journal). She spoke at the 5th annual convention of the North Central Wisconsin Union Young Peoples Society of Christian Endeavor in Stevens Point on the subject of Sunday school work (Stevens Point Journal). Lulu fought for the vote when she organized a women's suffrage club in 1914(Madison Wisconsin State Journal). In April of 1923 she was elected the mayor of Crandon over her opponent Otto A. Bock. Shaw died October 21, 1937 after a brief bout of pneumonia (The Oshkosh Northwestern). I encourage everyone to come to the library to view the display next to the Children's Room. The case features photos of Lulu as well as the book of the Common Council Minutes where she signed all of her mayoral decrees.



person alerts, hazardous situation alerts, and informational advisories. This is a free service for public safety agencies and inflicts no cost to the taxpayer.






