Spring Election 2014

Two new faces on the Forest County Board and four on the Crandon City Council Wabeno School Referendum passes

The dust has settled, and the rhetoric is almost over, the people have chosen their candidates to govern and sit in the judge's seat.

Running a rigorous campaign, Robert Kennedy, Jr. failed to unseat incumbent Leon Stenz for the position of Judge in Forest and Florence Counties. Judge Stenz piled up 1,576 votes in Forest County against 1,000 votes for Kennedy. The Florence County total was 454 for Stenz and 194 for Kennedy.

The Town of Lincoln had both seats for County Supervisor in contention, and in Ward 1, challenger Larry Sommer edged out Steve Bunda by a vote 95 to 93. The results are not necessarily final, as four absentee ballots are still out, and if they arrive by Friday at 4:00 p.m., the results could change. In the other contested Lincoln race, Donald Dehart, Jr. retained his seat, beating Kathryn Gibbs by a vote of 73 to 27.

Laona's races for County Supervisor held some surprises. Incumbent Jack Matuszewski was defeated by Judy Tackes Savard by a total of 78 to 36. In Laona Ward 1, last-minute write-in Ron Karl tied incumbent Mike Albrecht at 76 to 76, but with the addition of Wabeno Ward 2, which comprises District 10, Albrecht carried the day with a vote of 16 to 4, which gave him a final vote total of 92 to 80.

Incumbent Willy Connors, Jr. held off a challenge by Erhard Huettl, Jr. to hold on to his seat in District 11, which is the Town of Freedom and Wabeno Ward 5, to win by a total of 120 to 82.

In Nashville Ward 1 and Town of Crandon Ward 3, Dave Campbell ran unopposed after the retirement of Tom Vollmar.

The Wabeno Area School referendum was decided in favor of the referendum by a vote of 285 to 219.

The City of Crandon will have some new faces on the City Council. Don Gryczkowski, Jim Houle, Bill Ison and Jim Asher ran unopposed on write-in campaigns and will replace Larry Blasius, Katie Kulinski, Bruce Walentowski, and Franz Gerber.

Crandon Raceway celebrates 45 years in 2014

CRANDON, Wis. (April, 2014) - It started with a TV broadcast of the Baja 1,000 off-road race. And some 45 years later the sport of short course off-road racing, which was born here at Crandon International Off-Road Raceway, is at its peak in terms of popularity around the nation and beyond.

Back in 1970 the Crandon Area Jaycees and some 150 volunteers, led by President Rolland Yocum, pulled off what was to be called the inaugural Crandon Brush Run 101. The day began with a breakfast at the high school, with the racers - some 100 of them in dune buggies, modified cars and trucks and motorcycles taking off from the Forest County Fairgrounds at 1 p.m. Chicago area off-road enthusiasts Wally Schauer and Jim Zbella would win the grueling contest with a time just over three hours.

Not knowing it at the time, the city of Crandon, located 100 miles north of Green Bay, would have written the first chapter of a now 45-year storied history of off-road racing, setting the stage for what's now viewed as the Mecca of short course off-road racing - aka the Big House. "Back then the Jaycees basically just took that Baja racing they saw on TV and re-created it through the woods around Crandon," explained current Crandon Raceway President Cliff Flannery. "It wasn't until we got bumped from one farmer's property to another that this short course idea really began to take root."

And the reason it did? Beyond the revolving door of landowners that would have to agree to allow the racing on their property - plain and simple - fans complained that they couldn't see all the action from their seat.

So in 1979 the Brush Run moved to Pitt's Field, a five-mile track that would be the harbinger of what we know today as short course off-road. And five years later, in 1984, the Brush Run would move to its existing venue, Plummer farm, which is now the home of Crandon International Off-Road Raceway as we know it today.

Crandon's then new 1.75-mile track, of which 95-percent is viewable from the spectator area, was cutting edge. The club members were visionaries, quite literally crafting a completely new sport from an existing one. What used to take several hours and was hardly fan-friendly now took less than a half hour and played out right in the fans' sightlines!

Crandon's story spread like wildfire amongst the tight-knit off-road community. And as the name recognition of the drivers grew, including off-road legend Walker Evans, Crandon's reputation as a big time event caught the attention of television producers - namely ESPN. It got so big they added a second event, a spring race, which officials re-badged as the Brush Run. And in 1989 ESPN would broadcast its first of many Crandon events, the Labor Day contest now being called the "World Championships."

The Nicolet State Trail and Wolf River State Trails will reopen for hiking, biking, horseback riding, dual sport cycles and ATV use on May 1, 2014.

Accelerated Welding Program at Nicolet College offers quick path to rewarding career

Anyone interested in a welding career can now earn a college credential in less than seven months through Nicolet College's Accelerated Welding Technical Diploma program.

Classes will run over the Summer and Fall semesters, June 2 to December 19.

"The accelerated format is a great way for students to quickly get the skills they need to start careers in this high-demand field," said Brigitte Kumbier, dean of Trade and Industry at Nicolet. "The courses provide extensive hands-on training and many students actually start working part-time after the first semester and then advance their skills during the second semester."

Classes will run Monday through Friday during the Summer Semester and Monday through Thursday during the Fall Semester.

Along with highly skilled instructors, the college also has tutors right in the classrooms to help when students have difficulty with any subject matter. And when it comes time to start their careers, Nicolet's job placement specialists work closely with area employers to create a smooth pathway for students to enter the workforce, Kumbier explained.

Wages in the Northwoods start at around \$12 to \$14 for entry-level welders and can quickly climb to well above \$20 an hour with experience and advanced skills, she added.

Demand for skilled welders is also high, with the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development forecasting nearly 10 percent job growth between 2010 and 2020 in north central Wisconsin.

Kumbier noted that Nicolet tuition is significantly less than that at private schools and Nicolet students are eligible to apply for federal financial aid. The Nicolet College Foundation also has scholarships earmarked specifically for Welding students.

Skills taught include oxyacetylene, stick, TIG, MIG, submerged arc, flux core and resistance welding

What's happening in Laona High School's Business Education Department? This past month the business economic students have started an online stock market simulation. This is a free stock market simulation where the students get to use real time data with fictitious investment money. The students start with \$100,000.00 to invest and have to diversify with a minimum of at least five different stocks. The student team with the most value in their portfolio at the end of the 12-week period will win our contest.

Students will learn how to invest in the stock market as well as strategies for playing the simulation. They are learning the difference between the different types of investment options they have, like high vs. low risk stocks, commodities, mutual funds, and foreign investment market options. From an economic standpoint students are learning how events that happen in society affect the confidence of the stock market. The situation involving the US and Russia has been a great example as many of the students have watched their investments slide over the past couple weeks. This is also teaching the students how volatile the market can be daily, and how long term investments usually are the best strategy. Giving students an opportunity to experience real life situations with little personal risk has been enjoyable for them, and a great learning experience.

Green Bay, WI - Wisconsin Public Service Corporation (WPS), a subsidiary of Integrys Energy Group, Inc. (NYSE: TEG) today filed a request for new utility rates in 2015 with the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSCW). The proposal calls for an 8.0% increase in electric rates and a decrease of 0.5% in natural gas rates. The company's electric rates have remained relatively unchanged since 2008 and gas distribution rates have decreased over the same period.

In recent years, WPS has been able to delay anticipated increases due to lower fuel costs.

If approved, and applied equally to all customer classes, the new rates will result in an increase of about \$6.00 monthly for a typical residential electric customer using 600 kilowatt-hours per month. A natural gas customer using 800 therms annually would see a \$0.34 monthly decrease. These rate changes continue the trend of WPS typical residential natural gas customers paying less than they did in 2008 — not including the savings they've seen from overall lower gas market prices WPS passes along directly to customers when it purchases the gas for consumption. While prices did increase due to the colder-than-normal winter this year, the 12-month rolling average total cost of distribution and gas prices are about 23% lower than in 2008.

For about the cost of the monthly plan for a single

While electricity rates have increased over the years, they have done so at a pace less than ordinary inflation (see chart that follows) — making electricity an even better value for customers. Reflected in the chart below are periods of relatively stable rates when new infrastructure (generation plants and distribution/transmission lines) were not needed to serve customers. The periods of steeper growth primarily reflect the costs to build infrastructure.

"We've found ways to manage and reduce costs while making several improvements for our customers," said Patrick Campshure, WPS Rate Case Consultant. "Customers expect that from us, and rightfully so."


In its request to increase electric rates, the company cited a number of factors, including: Completion of a one-time fuel refund to customers which had the effect of keeping rates flat in 2014.

- *Increased fuel costs for power plants.
- *Increased transmission costs.

*Improved electric reliability by converting company distribution lines with lower performance history from overhead to underground.

As always, rate cases are an iterative process during which WPS and PSCW evaluate the most current data to arrive at final rates sometime near the end of 2014.



Local deer herd status on agenda at spring hearings

SPOONER - State wildlife biologists invite anyone interested in the status of their local deer herd to attend the annual spring fish and game hearing at 7 p.m. Monday, April 14, in their county.

In the past, early spring herd status meetings were based on groupings of deer management units, with more than 130 of these units across the state bounded primarily by large rivers and highways. In the future, deer will be managed at the county level making it useful to discuss herd status at the Department of Natural Resources annual spring fish and game rules hearings which are held simultaneously on the second Monday in April in each of the 72 counties.

These hearings provide an opportunity for hunters and other interested individuals to hear a herd status report for that county and to learn about new deer hunting rules and regulations. Deer herd management throughout Wisconsin relies heavily on information provided by the public, and at each of these hearings local wildlife staff will be on hand to speak with interested participants regarding deer management in that area. Here are some hearing locations in this area:

*Florence County - Florence Natural Resources Center, 5631 Forestry Drive, Florence

*Forest County - Crandon High School, 9750 US Highway 8 West, Crandon

*Iron County - Mercer Community Center, 2648 West Margaret Street, Mercer

*Langlade County - Antigo High School Volm Theater, 1900 10th Avenue, Antigo


*Oneida County - James William Middle School, 915 Acadia Lane, Rhinelander







Collaborative teamwork is the name of the game for Nicolet College IT students

Talk about learning how to work as a team!

Nicolet College's Information Technology (IT) Program is piloting a new technology on campus that emphasizes greater collaboration between students to master any number of IT skills.

The new learning stations are centered around high-tech tabletop projectors that beam course content onto, well, a big white table. Students then gather around the table to collectively solve any given IT issue.

"It's a great tool to teach students how to work together," said Scott Biscobing, Nicolet IT instructor. "Not only are they learning about Information Technology, but they're also learning how to work as a team."

Going into the program, IT student Ilija Lukic imagined most of his time would be spent in lectures listening to instructors drone on for hours.

"Boy, was I ever wrong," Lukic said. "Everything has been a lot more hands-on than I thought it was going to be. It's really been a lot more personable, working one-onone with my instructors and the other students."

This fall Lukic will graduate with his second associate degree from Nicolet, this one a Computer Support Specialist credential. Last year he earned the Web Analyst/Programmer degree.

IT instructor Ethan Blue said the increased emphasis on learning – and doing – in a collaborative environment is driven by the environment graduates will find when they enter the workplace.

"IT isn't about sitting alone staring at a computer screen all day," Blue explained. "There's a lot of personal interaction that goes into launching projects and solving problems. Knowing how to work as a team is a huge part of making these things successful and our new collaboration stations really teach that."

As for Lukic's thoughts on the quality of instruction he's received during his five semesters at Nicolet: "It's been fantastic! I love these guys!"

Earth Science class tours Seaman Mineral Museum



Once at the museum, the students looked at the different mineral exhibits and were required to compile their own virtual mineral collections of favorite minerals or minerals that caught their eye.


After completing the tour, students were able to view some of the ice sculptures from the recent Ice carnival that was held on campus before returning to school.


