#### Ziolkowski named President of Wisconsin County Forest Administrators

Effective May 1, 2014 Dave Ziolkowski, Forest County Forest Administrator, will begin his service as President of Wisconsin's County Forest Administrators. There are 29 counties in Wisconsin with county forests established under state statutes §28.10 and §28.11, collectively these counties manage nearly 2.4 million acres of public forest lands.

Each year, county forest administrators from the 29 counties choose one of their own to lead and represent them on a wide variety of issues. Dave Z is their current choice for President. The President works closely with the Executive Director, Assistant Executive Director, and Board of Directors of Wisconsin County Forests Association (WCFA), a non-profit quasi-government organization representing the forestry interests of member counties. Jane Severt, WCFA Executive Director offered; "Dave is an excellent choice to serve as President of our County Forest Administrators. Dave's 28 year tenure in the County Forest Program and his knowledge regarding important issues on our public forests will undoubtedly prove to be a tremendous asset for our organization in the coming year".

Forest County Forest Administrator Dave Ziolkowski, "Dave Z," has been in charge of the Forest County forests for 28 years, and in the interim has also been given the job of administering the recreation program as well.

The county recreation program includes the Veteran's Memorial Park on the south end of Lake Metonga, 54 miles of state-funded ATV trail (the Wolf River and Nicolet trails), 405.8 miles of state-funded snowmobile trail, which includes 100 miles added during Dave's tenure and paid for with state grants.

When Dave started with the forestry program, the county managed 10,810 acres of timberlands. The acreage has increased to 13,643 acres with recent acquisitions.

The idea behind adding more timberlands is to increase the amount of logging and forest products available to the area, while enhancing public access and recreation for hunting, fishing, berry picking and any other outdoor activity. Dave says they are particular in picking out tracts of land that are growing average or above average northern hardwoods that have existing roads and property lines. Several of the recent purchases join county land, which is also a plus in land selection.

This is a purchasing plan that is future-oriented. While the crew in the county forestry office looks for timberlands that can provide an immediate return, and some of the recent tracts have already provided stumpage that has been sold, it is also a way to create high quality timber stands that will supply Forest County with stumpage revenue well into the future with sustainable management techniques.

These purchases are paid for by DNR Project Loans. In turn, 50% of the costs of the land and acquisition costs are then paid off with grants through the state Stewardship Fund. The remainder of the loan, which is interest free, is paid back when timber is harvested. Each year, 20% of the annual stumpage revenue is paid to the state to cover the loans.

Dave said that there are future plans to add more acreage as appropriate lands and funds are available, which will provide revenue and recreation opportunities for generations to come.

## Spring Fish & Wildlife Hearings Monday April 14

The Annual Spring Fish and Wildlife Hearings will be at the Crandon High School auditorium on Monday, April 14, 2014, at 7:00 p.m.

A revised and improved proposal to allow anglers to use the fishing technique called trolling on inland waters statewide is up for a vote at the 2014 Spring Fish and Wildlife Hearings on April 14 around the state.

The trolling rule change is the only proposed specific rule change to be voted on at the 2014 hearings. However, people interested in natural resources management have an opportunity to provide their input by advisory vote and testimony to the Department of Natural Resources and the Conservation Congress on many other advisory questions that may affect future fish and wildlife regulations.

The spring hearings cover three major areas: elections for county Conservation Congress delegates; DNR proposed wildlife and fisheries rule changes; and Conservation Congress proposals for possible future rule development.



#### May 12 – 16 Lottery Credit Week

The Forest County Treasurer's Office is dedicating the week of May 12th to help all Real Property Owners who were eligible, receive the lottery credit on their 2013 tax bill. If the property owner did not receive the credit, and meets the eligibility requirements the Treasurer's Office will help you complete the paperwork and file the forms with the Department of Revenue to receive the late lottery credit an ensure that the credit is applied to their 2014 bill.

To qualify for the lottery and gaming credit, an owner must be a Wisconsin resident, the owner of the dwelling, and use the dwelling as their primary residence as of the certification date (January 1, 2013). If temporarily absent typically for a period no longer than 6 months (hospital, vacation, incarcerated, etc.) it is the home to which the owner returns. Principal dwelling means any dwelling used by the owner of the dwelling as his/her primary residence. A property owner may claim only one primary residence. The lottery and gaming credit cannot be claimed on business property, rental units, vacant land, garages, or other property that is not the primary residence of the owner. {Sec. 79.10 (1)(dm), (9)(bm), Wis.

To verify if you received the lottery credit please visit the Forest County Website www.co.forest.wi.gov and click on Land Records Data. If you did not receive the credit and you qualify to receive it contact the Treasurer's Office at 715-478-2412 and they will assist you in completing the necessary paperwork to receive the credit for this year and future years. The lottery credit can only be obtained by having a signed application on file.

#### Avoid problems with black bear

MADISON - With the arrival of spring, black bears have begun to emerge from their dens in search of food. State wildlife officials are encouraging homeowners statewide to take precautions to reduce the potential for problems with hungry bear.

"More than 800 complaints about bear are called in each year," says Brad Koele, Department of Natural Resources wildlife damage specialist.

Koele says many of these conflicts occur as a result of some type of attractant such as bird feeders, garbage cans, grills, or pet food left outside and accessible to bear. Although conflicts can occur anytime bear are active it is especially important to remove attractants during the spring when bears are emerging from dens and natural foods are limited.

"Just because you see a bear does not mean it's a causing conflict," Koele adds. "Black bears normally avoid contact with people. However, when food sources are available bears can quickly learn to associate humans with food and can become a nuisance. Highly habituated bears can be dangerous and may need to be euthanized. Preventing the problem in the first place is the best solution for both humans and bears."

It is illegal to intentionally feed bears in Wisconsin, but it is also important for homeowners to make sure they are not unintentionally feeding bears by allowing a food source to be accessible near their home. Wildlife biologists encourage residents to follow these steps to avoid attracting bears:

\*Don't knowingly feed a bear;

\*Completely remove bird feeders, even during daytime hours. Bears are active during the day and may cause problems even if the feeders are out only during that time.

\*Reduce garbage odors by rinsing food cans before putting them in recycling containers or garbage cans:

\*Keep meat scraps in the freezer until garbage day, and if possible, keep garbage cans in a closed building until the morning of pick-up. Commercial dumpsters should be locked;

\*Keep pet food inside or inaccessible to bears even during daytime hours;

\*Keep barbeque grills and picnic tables clean.

"If a bear is near your home, wave your arms and make noise to scare it away," Koele said. "Then back away slowly or go inside and wait for the bear to leave. When scaring the bear away, make sure it has a clear escape route. Never corner a bear or shoot at a bear with a firearm in an attempt to scare the bear away."

If a bear finds food such as bird feed or garbage near a home it will likely return. The visits will eventually stop when food is no longer available. Bears will periodically check sites where food was once available, so it may take several days to weeks before the bear will quit visiting a site once the food source has been removed.

"If you encounter a bear while in the woods you should stay calm and not approach it. Give it space, walk away, and watch from a distance. Never approach a sow with cubs," Koele said.

Wildlife officials say it is also unlawful and unethical to shoot at bears.

"We get reports every year from bear meat processors of legally harvested bear that have large amounts of bird shot in the meat. Sometimes it is so bad that the meat must be disposed of," says Michael Zeckmeister, northern wildlife supervisor.

Shooting at bears with a shotgun is illegal, extremely inhumane and could result in significant injuries or even be fatal to the bear.

"There are a variety of non-lethal, humane abatement options available for resolving conflicts with bears," Zeckmeister said.

Homeowners who are unable to resolve a conflict with a bear should contact the U.S. Department of Agriculture -Wildlife Services toll-free line at 1-800-433-0663 for properties in Southern Wisconsin, and 1-800-228-1368 for properties Northern Wisconsin. The Department of Natural Resources partners with USDA-Wildlife Services for responding to black bear complaints.

## More than 90,000 pounds of donated venison for food pantries in 2013

MADISON -- Hunters, meat processors and food pantries helped the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and its partners donate more than 90,000 pounds of venison to those in need in 2013.

"We are very proud to be part of this community-based program," said DNR Secretary Cathy Stepp. "Anytime we can have a safe, successful deer hunt and donate valuable food to our pantries it's a win-win for Wisconsin."

More than 2,000 deer were donated through the DNR deer donation program and processed packages of ground venison were distributed to food pantries statewide. The number of deer donated decreased by 27 percent compared to 2012, likely a result of fewer deer harvested.

"Regardless of the number of deer donated, the program is always considered a success," said DNR wildlife damage biologist Dan Hirchert.

Since the program began in 2000, hunters have donated more than 85,000 deer and more than 3.8 million pounds of venison. The collected meat is distributed to Wisconsin families in need of food assistance. The program relies on cooperation with counties across the state, U.S. Department of Agriculture-Wildlife Services and community programs like Hunt for the Hungry and Target Hunger. These organizations help organize donations, coordinate processing, and distribute venison.





# Extended ice cover expected to

MADISON - With ice 3 feet deep still covering many lakes in northern Wisconsin and yet more snow delivered last week, state fish biologists are expecting an increase in fish kills due to low oxygen levels in some shallower lakes.

As a result, anglers and lakeshore property owners could see an increased number of fish littering shorelines throughout Wisconsin this spring when the ice

"We expect some winterkill every year, but we're likely to see more due to heavy snow and the long ice cover," says Paul Cunningham, Department of Natural Resources fisheries ecologist. "Shallow lakes with large amounts of aquatic vegetation and mucky bottoms are prone to this problem. They have much lower oxygen capacity to begin with, and that oxygen is consumed as the plants decay, leaving little for fish and other aquatic life as the ice cover prevents oxygen from the atmosphere from entering the lakes."

Winterkill is a natural process occurring when fish don't have enough oxygen. In ice capped winters, most oxygen in the water comes from aquatic plants. However, when the ice and snow cover is thick, plants cannot get the sunlight needed, and instead of producing oxygen, they die back and decompose. Last year, DNR documented 18 fish kills caused by low dissolved oxygen levels in winter.

Cunningham says it's rare for lakes to experience total winterkill. Tributaries or springs where oxygen supplies are better are usually temporarily sought out by some fish.

"For some waters, partial winterkill is a natural, beneficial process that results in increased growth rates and improved size structure of the survivors and a better fishery all together," he says. "On more shallow lakes with excessive algae blooms, winterkill can have negative impacts to anglers because the majority of game fish die, and rough fish like black bullheads and carp survive, making it a challenge to restore and maintain game fish populations in these lakes."

Fortunately, usually enough fish survive, either in

the lake or in connecting waters, to repopulate the lake in a couple of years. Only for extreme die-offs is fish restocking necessary, Cunningham says.

Rehabilitation of winterkill lakes typically involves restocking of species such as northern pike, largemouth bass, yellow perch, pumpkinseed and bluegill. After completing fish kill investigations, local fisheries biologists make the decision to request fish for restocking in the extreme cases of severe winterkill. DNR has contingency plans to increase production of largemouth bass and northern pike that may be needed for restocking lakes that are severely impacted by winterkill this year.

#### What to do if people see a fish kill

While the lack of oxygen normally kills fish in later winter, the fish may not be noticed until a month after the ice has melted from lakes. The dead fish are preserved by the cold water under the ice, but start decomposing as the water warms and the bloated fish float to the shore.

People witnessing a fish kill are asked to note the water body, fish species and approximate number of dead or dying fish and contact their local fisheries biologist or call the DNR TIP line at 1-800-TIP-WDNR, 1-800-847-9367. Do not collect fish samples from a suspected winterkill fish

There are several things we can look for to distinguish a winter kill," says Cunningham. "One sign is that the dead fish may appear fuzzy from a fungus infection, which is normal in winterkills. Another sign is the strong smell of sulfur dioxide, which smells like rotten eggs.

Other distinguishing factors include the species of fish affected and the rate of decomposition.

"With winterkills, fish may be partially decomposed, depending on when they died," says Sue Marcquenski, DNR fish health specialist. "And if the dead fish are comprised of all the different species in the lake at the time of ice out, winterkill is the likely cause."

If dying fish or fish in distress are observed this spring, the cause may be different than winterkill. If dying fish are observed, please contact local fisheries biologists or the DNR TIP line and indicate fish are actively dying (not



## Ministry Saint Mary's Hospital can help with Advance Directives

Ministry Saint Mary's Hospital, along with other national, state and community organizations, is leading a massive effort to highlight the importance of advance healthcare decision-making—an effort that has culminated in the formal designation of Wednesday, April 16, as National Healthcare Decisions Day (NHDD). As a participating organization, Ministry Saint Mary's is providing information and tools for the public to talk about their wishes with family, friends and healthcare providers, and execute written advance directives (healthcare power of attorney and living will) in accordance with Wisconsin state laws.

As you are well aware, there are more options in healthcare technology than ever before. However, you may not always be physically able to choose what treatments you need or want. For this reason it is important to plan in advance for future medical choices.

The planning process begins with each person knowing their health condition and how it could change. One of the most important factors in formulating your advance directives is choosing your healthcare agent. An appropriate healthcare agent may not always be the person who loves you the most, but someone who understands your beliefs and views. After formulating your plan, completing an advance directives document will record your choices.

Advance directives should be completed by anyone over the age of 18 and should be updated when choices change. Completing your advance directives can be considered a wonderful gift to friends and family because if a medical crisis should arise, everyone can work together to honor your wishes. Also, completing your advance directives can greatly reduce family and medical conflicts during an already stressful time.

"As a result of National Healthcare Decisions Day, many more people in our community can be expected to have thoughtful conversations about their healthcare decisions and complete reliable advance directives to make their wishes known," said Susan Kirby, Community Link Coordinator, Ministry Saint Mary's Hospital. "Fewer families and healthcare providers will have to struggle with making difficult healthcare decisions in the absence of guidance from the patient, and healthcare providers and facilities will be better equipped to address advance healthcare planning issues before a crisis and be better able to honor patient wishes when the time comes to do so."

If you are ready to take the first step in completing your advance directives, you can find out about the process by attending an Advance Care Planning workshop at a Ministry Health Care hospital in your area. To find out times and locations, contact the number below that is most convenient for you.

Upon completion, this document should be shared with your healthcare agent and your healthcare provider(s). The original advance directive documentation should be retained for your records.

## Crandon High School learns about distractive driving

April is National Distractive Driving Awareness Month. Sheriff John Dennee gave an informative presentation to the Crandon High School students on April 7th

Sheriff Dennee explained that there are many different examples of distractive driving, such as, changing the radio station, talking to friends on the phone and in the car, drinking, eating and putting on make up. The number one cause of distractive driving is texting.

Texting has caused 1.6 million accidents every year and 330,000 injuries. Texting causes 11 teen deaths a day. Texting is also the main reason for 25 percent of all accidents. Texting while driving is the same as having drank four beers and then driving. Drivers are at a 23 percent greater risk to get into an accident and brake reaction speed drops 15 percent if a person is texting while driving. Texting has become the number one killer of teens in auto accidents.

Sheriff Dennee showed videos of what happens when someone texts while driving and also showed pictures of accidents that one of the drivers were texting while driving.

Sheriff Dennee ended the presentation with explaining that, all drivers young and old need to, "Expect the unexpected while driving." There are many different reasons for accidents across the United States, and we all need to be attentive while driving and hopefully we can reduce the number of accidents.





may vote for the delegates to represent their county on the Wisconsin Conservation Congress. A photo ID is required in order to receive ballots to vote for delegates. Each April, there is one 2-year term and one 3-year term available for each county. Attendees at the annual county meeting have the opportunity to nominate themselves or another resident. Citizens of that county in attendance at the meetings then have the opportunity to vote on the nominees

#### **Deer herd status meetings**

New for 2014, the annual spring deer herd status meetings will be held in conjunction with the Spring Fish and Wildlife Hearings. Herd status meetings provide an early opportunity for hunters and other interested individuals to discuss the current status of the deer herd and ask other deer management questions.

Local wildlife biologists will present information about new deer hunting rules and regulations that were recently adopted as part of the deer trustee report's twoyear management review. The herd status updates and new rules for 2014 presentation will follow the Conservation Congress delegate elections and discussion on the proposed fisheries rule change.

#### Trolling proposal revised since last year's vote on the same

Under the 2014 trolling proposal, anglers on inland waters could troll with one line anywhere in the state without having to consult the regulations booklet for county- or water-specific rules. There also will be many inland waters where trolling will continue to be allowed with three lines per angler and additional areas where three-line trolling would be allowed. "Trolling" means trailing a lure or bait from a boat being propelled by means other than drifting or rowing.

"This is an improved version of the statewide 'three-line' proposal that was voted on last year at the hearings," says Tim Simonson, DNR fisheries biologist and co-chair of DNR's musky team. "After last year's mixed vote results, local biologists and Conservation Congress representatives developed this compromise version with several key opponents and county delegations to gain broader support."

Simonson says that one key goal of the compromise proposal was to allow musky anglers to trail a sucker behind a boat, under power, while casting with another rod.

Under current rules, trailing a sucker or other minnow behind the boat while under power, however briefly, is considered trolling and is allowed in a confusing patchwork of counties and locations. Trolling is currently allowed on all waters in 18 counties; on one or more specific waters in 45 counties (105 total waters); and on the boundary waters with Iowa, Minnesota and Michigan, except on Vilas County boundary waters. Trolling is not allowed on any other waters, except that certain disabled anglers can troll anywhere by special permit, Simonson

The compromise was adopted by the Natural Resources Board last May; the Governor's Office on Regulatory Compliance then asked the board to get broader input on this modified rule at this year's spring hearings.

"Trolling has no known harmful biological effects where this method is already allowed in Wisconsin or in surrounding states and provinces", Simonson says.

#### Fish advisory questions on trout, bass and panfish

Attendees at the hearings and meetings will also get the chance to help shape future panfish, trout and bass fishing management in Wisconsin. Reviews of panfish and trout management and regulations are underway, and DNR will soon be launching a review of bass management.

"The spring hearings provide another vital avenue to gauge desires from our angling partners attending the hearings," says Jon Hansen, a DNR fish biologist involved in an ongoing panfish management planning effort and a leader of a coming effort to review bass management and regulations.

"Public input has thus far revealed a mixed bag of interest regarding how we manage panfish, but most of the attention has been on statewide regulation changes. The upcoming spring hearing questions build off what we have learned so far by asking attendees whether they want to attempt to manage for larger panfish on individual lakes that are currently not meeting management goals," he

Bass questions focus on an increasing interest in using regulations that liberalize harvest but protect larger bass, with one of the questions attempting to get an updated perspective on what anglers consider a "trophy bass," Hansen says. "Responses from the hearings will help inform our coming effort to review what bass regulations we have in Wisconsin and how they are applied to the diverse array of lakes we manage."

Finally, a suite of advisory questions allow anglers to weigh in on ideas for expanding trout fishing opportunities by extending trout seasons.

#### Wildlife advisory questions

Among the DNR wildlife advisory questions are whether people who fail to apply for limited draw hunting or trapping permits for three or more years to maintain preference points they have previously acquired and whether people who have missed a limited draw permit application should still be allowed to apply for a preference-point-only.

Wisconsin has established limited draw

preference systems for bear, bobcat, fisher, otter, wolf, and turkey hunting management. All of these preference systems have slight variations but two rules or laws are consistent between the drawings: people who do not apply for three consecutive years lose any preference points they have earned in previous years when they were not successful in the permit drawing and people must apply for the permits by established deadlines and there are no exceptions, even for people who have missed the application deadline but would still like to apply for a preference-point only.

Other wildlife questions are whether people should be able to transfer a limited draw harvest permit or points by simply allowing transfer to any other person who is legally able to hunt or trap in this state and whether Wisconsin should allow the use of foot cable restraints during the latter potion of the furbearer harvest seasons, beginning on December 1.

#### **Natural Resources Board advisory questions**

The state Natural Resources Board has an advisory question on establishing a single hunting stamp which would be purchased by all hunters but would be less expensive, earmarking funds for waterfowl/wetland, pheasants/grassland, and turkey management purposes as in the past and allowing any additional funds to be available for forest management and hunter recruitment. Currently Wisconsin has separate stamps for turkey, pheasant, waterfowl, inland trout and Great Lakes trout and salmon.

Other Natural Resources Advisory Questions are on restricting deer baiting and feeding 10 days before and during the traditional nine-day firearm season and legalizing the harvest of white and albino deer statewide.

#### **Conservation Congress advisory questions**

The Conservation Congress also has a large number of advisory questions from the executive committee and the various study committees. Among the advisory questions are whether to ask the Wisconsin Legislature to give the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources authority to develop a hunting season for tundra swans; whether Wisconsin should offer additional deer registration opportunities to include inperson, phone in, or online; and whether there should be legislation that would allow the owner of a hunting dog the ability to retrieve their hunting dog without landowner's permission.


