New County Board Supervisors seated, officers selected and a meeting on the ORV park set

Last Tuesday afternoon, April 15th, the Forest County Board met and seated the new members and swore in the entire board for the next term of office. Election of officers was held.

Paul Millan, Armstrong Creek, retained the office of County Board Chair, running unopposed. Terry Lukas, Laona, was reelected as First Vice-Chair, who was also unopposed, as was Bucky Dailey for Second Vice-Chair. The Highway Committee had just enough nominations to form a committee, with Lemaster, Connors, and Lukas selected. The Executive Committee needed to fill two slots, and there were three nominees for the two positions. Lemaster and Collins beating out Albrecht.

A new County Veteran's Service Officer was chosen with Robert Koplein receiving the vote of the board.

A memorandum of agreement with the DNR in relation to the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship program to continue to enable County Forester Dave Ziolkowski to proceed with land purchasers that will increase county forest lands was approved.

Two other items followed on the agenda. One resolution put before the board was to authorize the purchase of the Roder block of forest land. This up to 30-acre purchase will provide access to 250 acres of existing

Some results from the annual Spring Wildlife and Fisheries Hearings

About 60 people showed up at the Spring Wildlife and Fisheries Rule Hearings at Crandon High School last Monday evening. They voted in an advisory capacity on the rules and regulations that affect their outdoor sports and environment.

Certainly, some of the issues have little or nothing to do with this area, the hearings are held statewide, and it is a good representation of the attitudes of Wisconsin sportsmen on what they like and don't like in the rule books issued with licenses.

One of the big items on the agenda was the question of deer baiting. The question was whether or not hunters supported a suspension of deer baiting for ten days prior to the traditional nine-day deer hunt and during the hunt.

Forest County agreed with the ban on baiting with a vote of 25 to 21. Statewide, hunters voted 3,639 to 2,180 to stop baiting. There have been votes in previous years to stop baiting, but the rules were never changed, so whether or not this vote will mean anything is up for conjecture.

There were numerous questions on fishing regulations concerning panfish. Anglers in Forest County preferred to not have the daily bag limit changed from 25 to 15 by a vote of 21 in favor and 22 against lowering the daily catch. Other proposals to lower the daily catch to 10 panfish a day and another at 5 fish per day had little support in Forest County. Statewide the 15 per day limit was also shot down by a vote of 2,274 to 3,374 with a much wider margin on the 5 and 10 fish limits against.

Panfish management was supported in Forest County when it came to high minimum lengths in specific waters by voting 24 to 18 in favor. Across the state, anglers disagreed with Forest County by voting 2,639 yes and 2,893 against this management tool.

Statewide, trout fishermen voted 3,112 for and 1,746 against extending the trout fishing season until October 15. Forest County disagreed with the rest of the state by voting no to this proposal by a vote of 10 to 33.

Bass fishermen voted no by a margin of 2,998 to 2,598 on the proposal to increase the size of the trophy bass regulation from 18 inches to 20 inches. Forest County agreed with other bass anglersby a vote of 15 to 29.

Surprisingly, there was a vote held on whether or not to lift the restriction on shooting albino or white deer. While most hunters, I think, never worry about this restriction, it was there to be voted on, and in Forest County the vote was resounding No, with a margin of 15 for and 31 against. Statewide, hunters agreed with Forest County with a yes vote of 1,915 for shooting white deer and 3,939 against.

The hunting of tundra swans was another question posed to hunters, with hunting proposed on the Mississipi River, where swan numbers are high compared



Free DNR "First Turkey Certificate" new way to honor first-time turkey hunting success

MADISON - More than 135,000 hunters take to the woods each year in Wisconsin to pursue the wild turkey, many for the first time.

To help preserve these memories, the Department of Natural Resources will provide first-time successful turkey hunters with a free, personalized certificate if the hunters fill out an electronic form and, if they want, submit a photo of themselves with their turkey. "It's our little way of saying congratulations to all of the first-time successful turkey hunters - we wish them all many more years of successful hunting," says Scott Walter, DNR upland wildlife ecologist.

The reintroduction of the wild turkey is one of Wisconsin's greatest wildlife success stories. For many hunters, their first turkey harvest provides one of their most memorable hunting experiences, Walter says.

"I cherish the time I've spent taking my children on their first turkey hunts and certainly all hunters know how special that first turkey harvest is," he says. "We hope that providing this certificate will help preserve those great memories for the newest members of Wisconsin's turkey hunting community."

The turkey certificate program begins with the 2014 spring season (including learn to hunt turkey events and the two-day youth hunt) and continues through the fall hunt.

Hunters are asked to fill out information about when and where the turkey was harvested, the bird's weight, spur length and more. This information will be displayed on the individually customized certificate. It can also include a picture of the hunter. Certificates will be sent electronically to the successful hunter within a few weeks.

"We hope the certificates will be a great memento that can be displayed proudly and help preserve memories throughout a long hunting career," said Walter.

This certificate program first originated for first-time deer hunters and may be expanded in the future to include other game species. First-time hunters that successfully harvest a turkey can submit their information and a picture of their turkey by visiting dnr.wi.gov and searching keyword "turkey."

County Board meets Cont. from pg. 1 county land and will tie County W to the Wolf River Trail, providing access to snowmobilers and will provide some timber revenue.

Another item on the agenda was authorization to purchase another tract of land called the BCPL block, which would tie into adjoining county ownership. It should be reiterated that the funding for these land purchases is paid back, interest free, by 20% of the total yearly county receipts from timber sales and not by a sale-by-sale basis.

This is when the meeting became interesting. There was a motion made to table the resolutions for the purchase the two tracts of land so these resolutions could be combined with another resolution to purchase land for the proposed ORV park, making one grant request for all.

This met opposition from Supervisor Chaney, Shaffer and Landru, who voiced support for the Forestry Department's efforts to increase the county forest without hindrance.

After much debate, it was decided to give permission to start the granting process on the Roder block and table the process on the BCPL block. The next step is to combine the BCPL granting process with a possible land purchase for the ORV park. Because there is until May 1st to file the requests, it was decided that there was time for the delay on the BCPL purchase, with WORVPI bringing their conclusion of the scoping phase to the board next Tuesday.

The WORVPI presentation will be at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 22, at the county boardroom. If you would like to attend, save the trip, as the meeting will be closed to the public. The reason for the closure is that there will be a discussion of the land purchase at the meeting. Land purchases and personnel issues are legal reasons for closing meetings to the public, but there is some discussion of why the entire meeting has to be closed instead of just the portion that pertains to land purchase.

There is a resolution being drafted that will give the county permission to borrow money for this land purchase, should it get the votes on the board. This resolution will likely be acted on at the April 22nd meeting, and if so, it will authorize Chairman Millan to act on behalf of Forest County to submit applications to the State of Wisconsin for land acquisition grant and loan funding as well as complete a land acquisition project that would enable the county, it is thought, to obtain money for the land using the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program for a grant, a loan under the DNR County Forest Project Loan Program or an interest-bearing loan from the Bureau of Commissioners of Public Lands.

Numerous supervisors have stated, including Chairman Millan, that taxpayer dollars would not be used in funding an off-road park.

We will have to wait and see.

What's Happening at Laona High?



The 7th grade physical education class performs their individualized warm ups

The Laona High School Physical Education classes have been working on improving personal fitness levels. Each student is tested quarterly to evaluate their levels of fitness in aerobic endurance, abdominal strength and endurance, upper body strength and endurance, flexibility and body composition. They are tested using the Fitnessgram testing protocol, which is different than what most people remember from school. No longer are results based on comparing each student to one another. Now, results are based on research data points. There are two categories each student can place in, the "Healthy Fitness Zone" or the "Needs Improvement Zone". Each student can view their levels through a Fitnessgram software program the school district received last year from the Presidential Youth Fitness Program. Data is logged and then tracked so students can see how much they have grown and where they are now. Currently, each student in 7th, 8th and 9th grades have set goals and have implemented personal plans to improve their fitness levels. This plan has become their warm up the first 8-10 minutes of class. We will find out how much they are working in a few weeks when we do a halfway check!

These health-related fitness components are just a small step of what physical education has become today. Physical education is more than just playing games, its about educating each student to understand the importance of lifelong physical fitness and providing them the skills to do so. As fitness concepts are emphasized in the physical education curriculum, each student will leave school with the knowledge and tools to support a life of health and wellness.

GREEN BAY, April 11, 2014—The Alzheimer's Association applauds the signing of the Silver Alert bill into law today by Governor Scott Walker. Silver Alert is a notification program for older adults with cognitive impairments like Alzheimer's and dementia who go missing. It enables police throughout the state to use the existing Crime Alert Network to promptly send statewide notices when a senior citizen goes missing. Similar to Amber Alerts that help locate missing children, it is designed to help people who have Alzheimer's or other cognitive issues.

"On behalf of our advocates, families and those we serve, I am so pleased Governor Walker signed the Silver Alert bill today. This critical program puts in place a comprehensive system to ensure that when someone with Alzheimer's or a related dementia becomes lost while wandering they are reconnected both quickly and safely with their loved ones," said Kim Kinner, Alzheimer's Association Greater Wisconsin Chapter executive director.

The bill honors Leo and Claire Baeb, an elderly couple who became lost last year during a drive from their home in Townsend to Green Bay for a doctor's appointment.

Representative Ken Skowronski (R) – Milwaukee, Chad Weininger, R-Allouez, and Neenah Republican Dean Kaufert were sponsors of the Silver Alert bill in the Assembly. State Sen. Dave Hansen, D-Green Bay, sponsored the Senate version. Both the Assembly and Senate unanimously passed the legislation earlier this year.

About 30 states, including Florida, Indiana and Connecticut, have Silver Alert-type systems in place.

More than 110,000 people in Wisconsin are living with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia and six in 10 people with dementia or Alzheimer's disease will wander — repeatedly. 

History Of Easter

Easter is one of the most celebrated festivals of the modern Christian church. According to St. Bede, an English historian of the eighteenth century, Easter owes its origin to the old Teutonic mythology. The name Easter was originally derived from the word Eostre. Eostre was the ancient Greek goddess of spring. It was believed that every year, Eostre returned to Earth after a long, cold winter and brought along with her the light and warmth of Spring. Thus, ancient Greeks held pagan festivals to welcome Eostre and herald the onset of spring.

The Pagan festivals always coincided with the vernal Equinox on the 21st of March every year. Though the Greek were not fully cognizant of why and when spring comes, they believed Eostre must be pleased to ensure that she returns year after year. The festivals were lavish feasts that celebrated the booming of new flowers, the chirping of birds, butterflies, and sunshine and in general the feeling of rejuvenation that is inherent of spring.

The Christian church however, changed the Pagan festival from a celebration of spring to a celebration of the resurrection of Jesus. In 325 A.D. the church also changed the date of the festival. The festival was no longer held on the spring equinox. Instead, as per the Church Council of Nicaea henceforth it was to be held on the very first Sunday following the full moon on or after the vernal equinox. Thus, today Easter is celebrated on different dates every year and can occur as early as March 22nd or as late as April 25th.

Some people even believe that Easter is related to the Hebrew celebration, the Jewish Passover, Passover is celebrated to mark the freedom of the Israelis from bondage and slavery after 300 years. It was during Passover in 30 A.D. that Christ was crucified for being blasphemous. The resurrection happened three days later on what is today known as Easter Sunday. The early Christians, many of whom were raised as Jews considered the resurrection and Easter as a new part of pascha. Thus the early celebration of Passover came to be celebrated as Good Friday and Easter.

Today grand scale events mark the celebration of Easter in the United States and across the globe. Many traditional symbols of Easter continue to dominate the scene while new traditions are being part of the festival too. Thus. 

Register of Deeds Promotes Consumer Protection

Forest County Register of Deeds, Cortney Britten would like to announce that AB-592 relating to: solicitation of a fee by a business or individual for a public record, granting rule-making authority, and providing a penalty, recently passed and was signed into law by Governor Walker on April 8th, 2014 as ACT 247.

The legislation requires non-government agencies to specify there is no requirement to purchase a public record or deed from them, list what government agency does provide that record, and include the pricing of that government agency. The legislation puts specific perimeters on solicitations that companies can send consumers.

Over the past few years, there has been a significant increase in deed-processing schemes that target new and existing homeowners. Homeowners receive official looking notices recommending they obtain a deed and property profile to their home in order to confirm their ownership in the property for a fee that is anywhere between \$60 to \$90. Although the practice is legal, it is certainly unethical to use strong language and insinuations to lead customers to believe they must pay a large sum to get copies of their documents, when in reality it costs just a few dollars. Britten states "the property profile and deed are already public information in her office and you can stop by anytime to take a look for free."

Most homeowners should have received the original deed when they purchased their property. If not, they can obtain a copy through the Register of Deed's office for a minimal fee of \$2 or \$3 depending on the number of pages. Fees are governed by Wisconsin State Statute 59.43(2)(b).

"These scamming companies are taking advantage of Wisconsin consumers during one of the most important purchases of their lives," Britten said. "Often these solicitations are so official looking that overwhelmed new homeowners will pay the fee without realizing it is not required. This law maps out certain requirements so these letters are more easily identified as unnecessary. Your Forest County records are available immediately at the Register of Deeds Office at a fraction of the cost"

The same situation is also occurring from companies wanting to assist consumers in obtaining copies of their birth certificate. Companies have the consumer fill out the standard state vital records request form and then charge the standard state fees of \$20 plus an additional \$69 "service" fee.

Says Britten, "the Register of Deeds office does not send out solicitations for real estate or vital records. If you ever receive a letter offering to assist you in obtaining copies of your real estate records or birth certificate, please stop by our office or give us a call and we will be glad to help."



to other parts of Wisconsin. Forest County barely went against this proposal with a vote of 23 yes and 24 no votes.

A single stamp proposal to replace the trout stamp, the turkey stamp, etc with a single stamp for all hunting pursuits for \$5 and the same for fishing stamps was voted for by a margin of 3,212 to 2,374 for hunting stamps and 3,300 for and 2,265 for fishing stamps.

There were many more proposals put in front of the attendees, and some of the results published here may or may not be of interest to you. Complete results of the voting on the proposals is readily available on the DNR website, should you be interested.

Spring sports are a great opportunity to reduce, reuse and recycle

MADISON -Whether on the field or in the stands, athletes and fans can get active this spring by reducing, reusing and recycling at the game. Recycling specialists at the Department of Natural Resources advise a few simple steps that can cut sports' carbon footprint and ensure that everybody wins in the long run.

Tips for teams and athletes

Lots of athletes, teams and families already pitch in by recycling any aluminum cans or glass bottles they bring to the games, buying from sports resale shops or using hand-me-downs, but there are plenty of other ways to reduce or recycle.

For instance, when you buy sports equipment, don't forget to reuse or recycle the plastic film, hard plastic and cardboard packaging the equipment came in. If you bike or skateboard to games or practice, you might be interested to know that bicycle and skateboard recycling is growing in popularity. Check with your local bike or resale shops to see if they recycle bikes or parts. You can also recycle old athletic shoes through programs like ShoeBox Recycling and Nike's Reuse-A-Shoe (both links exit DNR).

There are ways to help the earth on the sidelines, too. Lots of teams fuel up on snacks like apples and oranges - the good news is these items are completely biodegradable! You can save cores, peels and rinds for

Local High School Students Attend Transition Conference

On Thursday, April 10, students with disabilities from Rhinelander, Northland Pines, Lakeland, Crandon, Laona, and Wabeno schools participated in "Navigating Your Future", a transition conference presented at the Rouman Cinema. The conference was presented by the County Communities on Transition, a tri-county committee representing Forest, Oneida, and Vilas counties. The purpose of the conference was to discuss topics related to students transitioning from high school, with its support services provided through special education, to post-secondary plans, such as going to college, to a technical college, or into a work situation. Support services beyond high school will vary and are available through a variety of community agencies.

The central theme for the conference was self-advocacy; that is, knowing and requesting services for yourself based on a knowledge of what your own strengths, weaknesses, and needs are. The keynote speaker was Bob Metropolis, an artist and author from Minocqua, who told of his own struggles to overcome some obstacles in his way and how that did not keep him from pursuing his dreams of becoming an artist. Students then rotated through 4 different sessions to hear information on four different aspects of adult life. Students listened to Sgt. Tyler Young, police liaison officer for Rhinelander High School, discuss rights and responsibilities when students become 18. Nancy Watry, Manager of Human Resources for Expera, spoke about what qualities employers are looking for in potential employees and how making a great first impression is so important. John Bates, a counselor for Disability Support Services at Nicolet, had 4 Nicolet students who receive academic supports speak about advocating for the services they need while attending college. Cheryl Theisen and Melissa Frederick, nurses working at the Human Service Center, talked to students about managing their own medical needs, health care, etc. In addition, several community agencies, such as the Aging and Disability Resource Center, Forward Services, Headwaters, the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, Midwest Independent Living Consultants, and Nicolet College, all had tables with information and representatives available to speak with students about services they may be able to provide.

Lunch was provided and raffle prizes were given away, which added an element of excitement to the day. Overall, students had many positive things to say about the day and felt they gained valuable information by attending the conference.

THIS DAY IN HISTORY:
APRIL 21, 1918 - World War
I: German fighter ace Baron
Manfred von Richthofen,
known as "The Red Baron",
is shot down and killed over
Vaux sur Somme in France.
He is considered the top ace
of that war, being officially
credited with 80 air combat
victories.

Originally a cavalryman, Richthofen transferred to the Air Service in 1915, becoming one of the first members of Jasta 2 in 1916. He quickly distinguished himself as a fighter pilot, and during 1917 became leader of Jasta 11 and then the larger unit Jagdgeschwader 1 (better known as the "Flying Circus"). By 1918, he was regarded as a national hero in Germany, and was very well known by the other side.

Richthofen was shot down and killed near Amiens on 21 April 1918. There has been considerable discussion and debate regarding aspects of his career, especially the circumstances of his death. He remains perhaps the most widely known fighter pilot of all time, and has been the subject of many books, films and other media.
