County Board Executive Committee meets with a discussion of ORV park

It was a lively meeting of the Forest County Board Executive Committee last Tuesday evening, with good audience participation. The main topic of conversation was, of course, the proposed ORV park.

The meeting started with a letter read by Melinda Otto regarding the vote at the full county board meeting last week that was a "no" vote on closing the meeting to the public so WORVPI could present the results of their "scoping" phase of the proposed park. According to Otto, it was perfectly legal to go into closed session to discuss the park. She said it was "not a proud moment for the county board." According to Otto, people have been threatened and are worried about losing business because of this debate. Otto expressed an opinion that the proposed park would be good for the county, and wants to see all the facts brought to the public. She wasn't clear, at least to me, how presenting those facts in a closed session would inform the public. Lemaster echoed my thoughts when he stated that if scoping details are brought out in a closed session, then county board members can't legally discuss those details with constituents.

But, the meeting brought out any number of remarks and comments from some of the Forest County Chamber members that were encouraged to attend the meeting by the Chamber. Most were in favor of the park, at least in principle, but there were others who didn't like the idea.

One of the big concerns was should the taxpayers be put at risk should this effort fail. A question was asked by Jim Houle: "What is WORVPI bringing to the table?"

Another concern was the loss of hunting lands to a park. Jim Odekirk spoke of ethics, and asked what code of ethics are followed, and thought that WORVPI board members who are also county board members should not vote on issues concerning the park. Otto disagreed.

Supervisor Chaney spoke up and said that the public ultimately should decide if taxpayer funds should be used to purchase land for an ORV park, referring, presumably, to having a county-wide referendum on the topic.

Odekirk pointed out that county board members had said that the public would decide and that taxpayer money would not be used for the purchase of the park. He was directing his comments to Chairman Millan.

Rebates offered on new woodstoves & other heat sources

The American Lung Association and Wisconsin Public Service is offering a unique exchange program that rewards you for becoming more energy-efficient by upgrading your heating appliance.

To qualify, your current wood-burning stove must be non-EPA certified and be the primary source of heat in your home. You can work with your local retailer to obtain a rebate. To find the closest participating retailer go online to www.lungwi.org/woodstove. This information, by the way, was supplied to us by Tri-County Heating in Crandon.

There are also rebates available for other heat sources, including natural gas, propane, and wood pellet heat sources, as well as outdoor and indoor wood furnaces.

You should apply for a rebate voucher from your retailer.

Unfortunately, Forest County residents don't qualify for this, but in our reading area, Oconto and Langlade County residents do.

Are we re-inventing the wheel? Seems an appropriate use of an old phrase, because it appears that Forest County already has an off-road vehicle park. In several conversations with Cliff Flannery, he told me that they are working on expanding the extreme off-road course that will be home to a competition in August.

According to Cliff, they have already built a course with obstacles, mud pits, etc. to challenge off-roaders and their vehicles. Currently, the course is on 80 acres, but there are plans to expand the size of the course and put in more challenges to the 4x4 aficionado.

The plan is to open the course to the public on a daily basis to those who like this sport, and that would include 4x4s and ATVs. Appropriate insurance is currently being negotiated.

It would make sense to consider using the Raceway grounds for more than the competitive events that already exist. The infrastructure is already there, with a campground, toilets and showers, an office and with the eventual building of an ATV trail from the track to the Wolf River State Trail, there would be an added incentive to use the facility on a more regular basis, giving extra financial help to keep the historic raceway open and fiscally healthy. This, in turn, would also add jobs to the area and help businesses.

The existing facility may be just what the proponents of a new park are striving for, without public debt and the politics that are swirling around the issue.

DNR joins plastics recycling initiative

MADISON - The Department of Natural Resources has joined a statewide public-private initiative to reduce plastic waste and increase plastic film recycling in the Badger State. The Wisconsin Wrap Recycling Action Program (WRAP) enlists retailers, manufacturers and local governments in collecting recyclable plastic film from their own operations

Grocery and other retail stores, distribution centers, volunteer groups and local governments can support Wisconsin WRAP by collecting their own plastic case wrapping, bags and packaging material, by setting up a local collection program and by registering their locations as community drop-off centers. Private citizens can participate by recycling their clean and dry packaging wrap.

The DNR's website provides free information on how to recycle plastic bags and film and how to find local drop-off locations. The site also provides free education materials, signs and posters for local governments, businesses, volunteers or civic groups expanding their plastic film recycling and outreach efforts.

"It's a great chance for local businesses and organizations to accomplish something positive for the environment and create jobs in Wisconsin while keeping valuable materials out of local landfills," said Cynthia Moore of the DNR's Waste and Materials Management Program.

Plastic film recycling recovers clean, dry plastic wrap, bags and film and reuses them as raw material for manufacturing products like new plastic bags, composite lumber, park benches and playground equipment.

While wrap, bags and film are in high demand, many people are not aware they are recyclable. Retail drop-off points are crucial to the WRAP project because plastic wrap, bags and film clog curbside recycling machinery and are difficult to separate from other materials. The plastics industry strongly encourages recyclers to use retail drop-off locations rather than include them in curbside collection programs.

The DNR is partnering with the American Chemistry Council's Flexible Film Recycling Group and GreenBlue's Sustainable Packaging Coalition to make Wisconsin the first and model state for the WRAP initiative. Wisconsin WRAP provides a way for businesses, distribution centers and other local organizations to facilitate community waste reduction efforts while modelling sustainable practices of their own.

A 2012 DNR plastics recycling study concluded that Wisconsin could realize substantial economic benefits by recycling more of the valuable plastic film that currently ends up in landfills.

By volunteering as a community drop-off center and encouraging customers to reduce, reuse and recycle their own bags and wrap, businesses like Roundy's have already helped Wisconsin tap the potential of recycled plastic as an industrial feedstock. By distributing educational materials about plastic film recycling, communities in Outagamie County, Dunn County, Eau Claire County and the city of Milwaukee are already helping to keep film and wrap out of local landfills.

In Outagamie County, for instance, recycling coordinator Christine Miller and the Sustainable Communities Network have circulated educational materials and display posters for local stores

"What truly makes WRAP unique is the way it gives businesses and local governments the control to fuel and expand their own recycling success," said Moore, "In this way, local governments and industry become recycling leaders.'

To the Editor:

On April 22, I wrote a letter to the Members of the Forest County Board in anticipation of their having to vote for or against a motion to exclude the Public from a Board Meeting that evening. The agenda for the meeting included presentation of information relative to the controversial 10,000-acre off-road park to be funded by the taxpayers. It also included a resolution authorizing Paul Millan to make application, on behalf of County Taxpayers, for grants and County loans totaling about \$2,500,000 for the first 2000 acres of the planned 10,000 acre park. That letter asked the Board Members to consider the Public's right to know what their Government is doing. The Board, by a substantial majority and to their everlasting credit, voted against excluding the Public. In response, the consortium of off-road park promoters determined it better to maintain secrecy than to allow any of the Public to know how they want to spend public funds or use public lands. Offered the opportunity to set their proposal in front of the Public, they declined...and left the meeting. Interesting, isn't it?

Then, a new meeting was scheduled for a week later. I believe for the ostensible purpose of allowing the Chamber of Commerce to weigh in and, somehow, get things back on track, so that those promoters have access to our representatives, without our knowledge.

I don't know what the meeting produced. But, I am told that Melinda Otto castigated me, in my absence, for having written the letter a week earlier pointing out the Public's right to know. I'm told that, in her view, I had no business writing such a letter to the Board.

I understand her frustration. It's tough to believe that you have knowledge superior to those of your electors. It's really tough to be sworn to keep your electors in the dark while you make decisions on their behalf. But, to be in that position while Citizens come to meetings and demand their rights to open government, can become really exasperating.

However, if she does not see the benefits of open government, then she needs training on the proper role of elected officials as servants of the Public. She may well need instruction on the rights of the Public, almost totally unfettered, to be completely informed as to their governments proceedings and to access and address their representatives. If she thinks that she can deprive me, or any of my fellow citizens of those very basic rights, I think she will be in for a rude awakening.

The basic premise is that you are buying a product or property at your own risk and should personally examine and test for obvious defects and imperfections.

Our transaction is the proposed 10,000 acre ORVP idea being sold to the Forest County and state taxpaver by WORVPI, FCEDP. Forest County Chamber of Commerce and seven Forest County supervisors. Much promotion of the concept and project economic impact of the park has been filtered to the public, but no real financial data and business plan have been shared with the people. We have heard over and over that the public should stop asking the same questions and let the group from WORVPI finish their hard work, then, after phase two is completed WORVPI and FCEDP will release their complete plan. We The People also were told at the meeting in the Laona school by our county chairmen, Paul Millan, when asked by a member of the audience, "Who will decide on the ORVP" Millan said, "We will all decide." Millan also said in a county meeting "No county tax dollars will be used for the park."

Last Tuesday night in the county board room, during a Special County Board meeting, WORVPI and Forest County Economic Development Partnership had their chance to do the right thing and lay out their complete plan to the public as promised. But, because they wanted to maintain their secrecy and control over the issue, they declined not to disclose the details of the park to the public. Jim Scheussler grabbed his computer and projector and left the room while Dick Steffes was trying to explain why they cannot disclose WORVPI's planned acquisitions.

The cost of the first land acquisition is in the range of 2.5 million for 2,154 acres to be paid for by you the Forest County taxpayer, some directly and some indirectly. It is a complicated scheme including different grants from state stewardship and loan programs, some paid back with timber revenue from all Forest County lands, and others paid back with taxpayer funds.

The next largest hurdle for the ORVP promoters is state law governing the use of managed forest and stewardship lands. It is not permissible to take a fee for usage and definitely not legal to run 4x4 trucks on said lands under contract with the DNR for reduced tax status.

A bill has been proposed in the state assembly AB-369, that would allow municipalities to open their woods trails to off road use, thus by-passing the DNR restrictions. This bill has the full support of John Schnorr the president of WORVPI. But the juxtaposition of the 10,000 acre park proposal for Forest County vs AB-369 that would allow any county in Wisconsin to open their trails and woods roads to 4x4s could render the Forest County park obsolete.

I will miss not seeing Andy O on Long S because whenever he drove past me. he would always have something smart or funny to yell to me out his truck window that made me smile. I enjoy running with my grandsons, Nathaniel and Dylan. Somehow the running gene skipped a generation in my house. I get to wear really bright-colored clothing and shoes. I find interesting things along the way. I once found my sister Chris's wallet on Hwy. 55 when I was running. I get a lot of thinking done when I run, in fact, I can solve all the world's problems while I run. I can listen to all the Bon Jovi, Michael Bolton and George Strait that I want to. 



First community meeting on scenic byway held

The Forest County Economic Development, Sokogain Chippewa, Wisconsin Department of Transportation and the University of Wisconsin Extension are working on developing a scenic byway in the northwoods. The byway will start in the Town of Langlade using Highway 55 and heading North. When the byway reaches Argonne, a loop start to form with the byway continuing on Highway 55 to Nelma and north on Highway 32 to the Military Road. The byway continues on Military Road until Highway 70 and then the scenic byway goes across Highway 70 until it meets Highway 55.

The first community meeting was held on Wednesday, April 23, at the Mole Lake Lodge and Conference Center. The meeting was held in two parts, the first part of the meeting was informational. Dennis Leong of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation explained what a scenic byway is. A scenic byway is a stretch of road that is at least 30 miles in length, is a state highway, a numbered state or federal non-interstate highway, that offers travelers outstanding scenic views or historic resources combined with unique recreational, cultural or other educational opportunities. A scenic byway can potentially be designated a National Scenic Byway or All American Road, such roads are marketed to national and international travelers. It also brings additional recognition and economical benefits.

Ron Krueger and Patrick Wontor showed the attendees photos a long the proposed byway and explained the how they started the process making the byway a reality. Steve Nelson of the UW Extension explained the next step of asking the communities for their help on what should be posted with signs along the highway.

The second phase of the meeting was breaking into small groups. The groups were formed by what town you lived in. Each group thought of what they felt should be posted on the byway and then the information was collected. The group will sort out the information and use it to move forward on the project. There will be more meetings on this issue to come.





Stop Wasting, Start Saving (The Environment)

You don't have to install solar panels to be ecofriendly. Here are easy ways to conserve energy, water, trees and natural resources, generate less trash - and save money, to boot.

Water: It's easy to take water for granted, but remember that for many people around the world, access to clean drinking water is a luxury.

Stop wasting by:

- ·Only running your dishwasher and laundry machine when they're full.
- ·Installing a toilet flapper and a low-flow showerhead.
 - Taking shorter showers.
- •Turning off the water while brushing your teeth, washing your dishes or shaving.
- Washing your car without water. Eco Touch has a line of waterless car cleaning and detailing products that will leave your vehicle sparkling without using a drop of water. (Learn more at EcoTouch.net)

Paper: The average office worker uses 10,000 sheets of paper a year - multiply that by everyone who works in your office building, and you've got a small forest right there. Plus, Americans use about 68 million tons of paper and paperboard every year at home, and there are 350 million magazines and 24 billion newspapers published each year, which eventually end up in the trash (or, hopefully, the recycling bin). Yikes!

Stop wasting by:

- · Using both sides of paper and buying 100% recycled paper.
- · Taking the initiative and starting a recycling program if your company doesn't already recycle paper.
- · Recycling paper, newspapers, magazines and mail when you're done.
- · An even better solution, converting to online newspaper and magazine subscriptions, if you like to take your reading materials with you on your commute, or, ahem, into the bathroom, invest in an e-reader.

Plastic Bags: Did you know that every year enough plastic bags are produced in the US to cover the entire state of Texas? Crazy visual, huh? And those plastic baggies are not biodegradable, so the ones that aren't recycled (which would be the majority - plastic bags, snacks and wraps are only recycled about 9 percent of the time, according to the EPA) leak chemicals into our soil and water supply as they break down over time.

Stop wasting by:

- Investing in reusable grocery bags.
- · Avoiding taking more bags and packaging than you need from takeout restaurants, drugstores and supermarkets.
- Using a reusable lunch bag if you carry your lunch to work.

Food: You might be surprised to find out that food releases the toxic chemical methane when it decomposes. And since 14 percent of the food we buy ends up in the trash, that's not good.

Stop wasting by:

- · Bringing last night's dinner to work for lunch the next day, and using leftover meats and veggies to create salads, casseroles and soups.
- · Composting food scraps to create your own organic fertilizer (sans toxic chemicals) for your lawn and garden. It's easy to do: you can buy a compost bin or make your own, using a trash can, a little water and some soil.
- · Being knowledgeable about those expiration dates. Before you toss that yogurt or trash those eggs, keep this in mind: Those "best if used by" and "sell by" dates don't actually mean that's the date when your groceries go bad. They indicate when the food is at its freshest, and most foods last a lot longer than we think. For example, milk is actually fine for up to 10 days past the "sell by" date, and frozen meat never goes bad.

Paper Towels and Wipes: Disposable cleaning wipes and paper towels might make cleaning up spills and wiping down counters a lot easier, but they're a lot harder for the earth to get rid of than the rags your mom used. Most end up in landfills, where their hazardous chemicals can make their way into our water and soil.

Stop wasting by:

· Using cloth napkins and towels whenever possible. And we don't mean use it once and then toss it in the laundry. Then you'd be bacy to wasting water. Reuse!

closed session because of a resolution on the agenda to purchase land for the park, that they thought shouldn't be voted on immediately following the closed session.

So, the meeting went, with discussion on both sides of the issue. The discussion ended when the Executive Committee went into closed session to decide on the membership of various county committees.

What was the eventual outcome of this open discussion? The meeting ended with that not completely clear, but there was talk of having another special meeting of the board to meet with WORVPI without a vote on a land purchase resolution following a closed session on the possible land purchase. Possibly, that meeting would only have a closed session on the issue of land purchases, which is a legal reason to close a meeting, giving the public in attendance a look at the completed scoping process.
