Where we live, learn, work and play matters to our health

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin's Population Health Institute have unveiled the second annual County Health Rankings. Nearly every county in the country is ranked on health outcomes (how healthy we are) and on health factors (how healthy we can be). This information helps counties see where they are doing well and where they are not, so they can make changes to improve health. To view the rankings, visit www.countyhealthrankings.org.

We've known for some time that our county faces challenges. In the 2011 County Health Rankings, Forest County ranked low on overall health 66 out of 72 compared with other counties in the state. This ranking is based on premature death, poor physical and mental health days, and low birthweight.

When we look at the health factors that are making it difficult for residents to maintain a healthy lifestyle, Forest County ranks 69 out of 72. When looking at health behaviors, such as smoking, obesity, drinking, motor vehicle crashes, and teen birth rates, the ranking is 54 out of 72. The Rankings also indicate that Forest County is at-risk for poor health when it comes to social and economic factors that affect health, such as poverty rates, unemployment, and education, where it ranked 70 out of 72. Forest County does have some strengths in the area of physical environment, such as air quality and recreation, where it ranked 37 out of 72.

With this knowledge, we can take steps to improve the health of our residents. We can use this information to work with community leaders to take action so we can implement programs and policy changes that improve health in Forest County. We can use this information when implementing the Community Health Improvement Plan. The five year health plan is a collaborative effort of community partners and citizens and it identifies priorities, goals and strategies to improve the health of the community. The 2011-2015 Community Health Plan will be released in the next few months and teams will be working on the top priorities that were identified: Nutrition, Physical Activity and Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse.

We know from the Rankings that Forest County needs to do more to improve our health in these areas which will eventually lead to better health outcomes. Everyone in our community has a stake in being healthy. Working together, we can make Forest County a healthier place to live, learn, work and play. Back Day.

This gives the home owner a chance to rid themselves of dangerous expired, unused and unwanted prescription drugs. On Saturday, April 30th, at the Crandon City Hall, you can turn in these unwanted meds and prevent accidently taking them or having them stolen from your medicine cabinet.

Last year, the DEA collected over 242,000 pounds of prescription drugs at 4,100 sites nationwide.

"I encourage every American to take advantage

"I encourage every American to take advantage of this valuable opportunity to safely dispose of unused, un-needed or expired prescription drugs," said Gil Kerlikowkse, Director of National Drug Control Policy. "Preventing these readily available and potentially deadly drugs from being diverted and misused is something each and every one of us can do to help reduce the epidemic of prescription drug abuse that is harming so many Americans."

This event is sponsored by the Forest County Health Department, The Forest County Sheriff's Department and the Crandon Police Department, and is open to citizens countwide.







Northern Legislators to hold Rhinelander Hearing on State Budget

State Senators Jim Holperin (D-Eagle River) and Bob Jauch (D-Poplar) announced today they will host a public hearing on the 2011-2013 state budget on Saturday, April 16 from 10a.m. till 1p.m. at Nicolet College (LRC Theater) in Rhinelander.

Holperin said the Rhinelander hearing is one in a series of similar sessions being hosted by Democrats statewide in response to the Joint Finance Committee scheduling only four "official" budget hearings statewide, the fewest in 25 years, and none in far north central Wisconsin.



Chamber Chit Chat

An Informational Series from the Forest County Chamber of Commerce

If you travel anywhere in the United States and stay overnight in a hotel, motel, bed and breakfast, inn or other lodging facility, chances are high that you'll pay a room tax. According to the National Tax Journal article, "The Impact of the Hotel Room Tax", 47 out of 50 states in the U.S. levy taxes on hotel room rentals. In 2008, 69 of 72 counties in Wisconsin did the same.

If charging a room tax is a widely accepted practice across the nation and Wisconsin, then why not here in our own community? That's the question the Forest County Chamber of Commerce had been asking itself for some time. After educating themselves on the room tax process and making the determination that it would be a good fit for Forest County, the Chamber began to focus its energy on bringing the process to our community.

As a result, the Forest County Tourism

Commission was formed in 2008. It would be the task of this Commission to bring municipalities in the county on board with room tax, and to oversee and manage the promotions, projects and events to be funded by collected

The Commission, which was appointed by the Forest County Chamber of Commerce, consists of the following positions: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Board Member. Each participating municipality is encouraged to appoint a representative to sit on the board as well, so that their community has a voice in the decision-making process.

Before going into the actual dollars and cents since its inception, let's first look into the what, who and where of room tax. Below is a brief overview:

--What is room tax? A room tax is one mandated by a municipality on sleeping room rentals at lodging facilities. --What is the purpose of room tax? The purpose of room tax is to provide funding for tourism marketing and

promotions within the area.
--Who pays the room tax? The tax is added by the lodging facility to the customer's bill. The guest renting the room pays the tax.

--Where does the room tax revenue go? The lodging facility forwards the collected room tax to the municipality on a quarterly basis. The municipality then forwards 70% of the room tax revenue on to the Commission while retaining the remaining 30%.

--What can room tax revenue be spent on? State law requires that at least 70% of room tax revenue be spent on tourism promotion and development, which is the primary function of the Commission. The participating municipality may use their 30% as they determine.

Collection of room tax in Forest County began in May of 2008, and participating municipalities included the City of Crandon, the Town of Lincoln, the Mole Lake Community, the Town of Hiles, and a voluntary contributor from the Town of Nashville. At the end of the year, a total of \$31,466 in room tax revenue enabled the Commission to begin formation of a marketing plan. That's not counting the 30% kept in each participating municipality!

The first full year of collections in 2009 exceeded the Commission's expectations with a total of \$47, 050. Financial support granted by the Commission included: 2010 Forest County Visitor Guide, a professional tourism seminar given by Gary Mueller, a Facebook promotion including the purchase of billboard space, the Crandon Centennial Celebration, and a Discover Wisconsin / Trail Nation television episode. The biggest project was the acquisition and development of the new Forest County Visitor Center. Promotional grants were awarded to: Mole Lake TRAILS Powwow, Art in the Square, Kentuck Day Festival, Mole Lake Heritage Festival and Main Street businesses for snowmobile signage.

Although final numbers are not in yet for 2010, the estimated room tax revenue should exceed \$55,000. Financial support granted by the Commission included: 2011 Forest County Visitor Guide, a Discover Wisconsin television episode, which included the Mole Lake Community, and sending Chamber and Commission


representatives to Milwaukee for the annual Governor's Conference on Tourism, as well as the Green Bay Sport Show. Promotional grants were awarded to: Biker Rally Poker Run, Kentuck Festival and Art in the Square.

Proposed projects for this year include continued support of the Forest County Visitor Guide, and establishing informational locations across the county. Perhaps the most important project this year will be revamping and revitalizing the Chamber website to make it more attractive for web users.

Although the room tax process is not yet countywide, the Commission will continue to strive towards that goal. If a municipality has lodging facilities but is not participating in the room tax process, it is missing an opportunity to not only improve its bottom line, but to avail itself of tourism promotion dollars to help promote local events.

WPS Customers Risk Losing Service After April 15

Green Bay, WI - WPS is reporting that more than 20,000 of its customers are four months or more behind on their utility bills. Those customers could face disconnection of their service after April 15, 2011, unless they make payments or arrangements before then.

"This year, the size of the bills is about the same as last year," said Tom Russell, Credit and Collections Manager, "but the number of customers who are behind is just a little lower. We don't want to resort to disconnecting service to customers who are significantly behind, but unless we come to some kind of arrangement with them, it is certainly a possibility." Public Service disconnected service to more than 16,000 customers in 2010.

"We owe it to our good-paying customers to be diligent in our efforts to collect," Russell said.

Russell urged customers who are behind and have not yet contacted the utility to do so right away. Waiting until near the end of the winter period when disconnects are not allowed will make it more difficult to make arrangements to keep service on, he said. "Those customers who contact us early to make arrangements are likely going to find we're more receptive than those customers who wait," he said. Customers can call (866) ${\tt 215-5812}\,to\,make\,arrangements\,for\,payment.$

There is also the matter of facing payment of a security deposit in the amount equal to their highest four months bills in a row for residential customers who are documented as not paying during the winter period, according to Russell. Public Service has collected security deposits totaling more than \$1 million from more than 1,000 customers (WPS pays interest on the security deposit). "In all, it's just better for customers who are having difficulty to contact us now rather than later," Russell said.

WPS has electronic options for payment listed on its Website: www.wisconsinpublicservice.com. Options include automatic monthly withdrawal from bank accounts, as well as one-time payments.





ESTABLISHMENT OF A QUALIFIED TIMBER BIDDER'S LIST

The Forest County Potawatomi Community is establishing a qualified bidders listing for timber sales on lands owned by the Forest County Potawatomi.

To be included on the qualified bidders listing and bid on timber sales, Tribal policies require a logging company to be approved by the Executive Council of the Tribe and meet the following qualifications:

- Ability to obtain and maintain comprehensive liability and worker's compensation insurance
- The Ability to obtain and maintain bonding.
- The Ability to obtain and maintain applicable certification and/or licenses.
- Proof of ownership/lease arrangements of appropriate logging equipment and technical know-how.
- Timber Sale policies also have limitations on right to bid following contract revocation, limitations on the amount of timber under contract to a single contractor or related company and requirements for contractor to be on site 70% of the time.

Deadline for 2011 applications is May 9th, 2011. 2-5 timber sales are expected by the end of 2011.

Drugs to help smokers quit?

Nicotine in tobacco is a very addictive drug - but several effective medications can help you stop smoking. In some cases these medicines may double your chances of quitting for good.

First step: You can increase your chances for successfully quitting by working with your health care provider. Discuss the pros and cons of various drugs to decide what's best for you.

Nicotine replacement: Over-the-counter nicotine gum or patches and prescription nasal sprays or inhalers can help reduce nicotine cravings.

Oral medication: A prescription antidepressant, bupropion, eases cravings by altering brain chemicals. It may also help slow weight gain.

Varenicline, another prescription product, binds more strongly to body cells than does nicotine. This helps to diminish cravings and lessen the enjoyment of smoking. In studies comparing the oral medications, varenicline was more effective at stopping smoking, but bupropion was better at preventing weight gain.

Be sure to ask your provider about the potential side effects of the medicines and their proper use.

Energy drinks good for you?

Energy drinks promise enhanced athletic performance and a quick boost. But are they healthy? And do they live up to their claims?

Despite the hype, energy drinks are little more than thirst quenchers high in caffeine and sugar, like typical soft drinks. Caffeine in heavy doses can be dehydrating and interfere with sleep, especially if you are caffeine-sensitive, which seems to defeat the purpose of an "energy" drink.

Some fans of energy drinks mix them with alcohol - an unhealthy and potentially dangerous combination that could raise heartbeat and blood pressure, and lead to heart attack in some individuals. Energy drinks to relieve the effects of alcohol? Like coffee, they won't help - even if you feel sober, your blood alcohol level remains the same.

Need a boost? Take a walk, drink water, skim or low-fat milk, and eat a healthy snack high in fiber.



## Message to parents of prom kids

The 2011 prom season and graduation is fast approaching. The Forest County Law Enforcement Agencies want to take this opportunity to encourage all individuals that choose to participate in these events, to have an enjoyable but safe time. We ask that you have a conversation with your child regarding the importance of making smart decisions, especially with regards to the possession or consumption of alcohol and driving after drinking.

Under Wisconsin law, no one under the age of 21 can legally consume alcoholic beverages without their legal guardian present at all times. In the event that your child leaves your presence after consuming alcohol, they may be subject to a fine if caught with alcohol in their system.

As a parent, you yourself or someone you know may be planning on hosting a party where alcohol will be present. Please know that it is against the law to furnish alcoholic beverages to minors. Distributing alcohol to an underage person, other than your own child, may subject you to substantial fines and possible criminal charges. Additionally, the Wisconsin Supreme Court has ruled that if someone drinks and becomes injured in a motor vehicle accident after leaving a party where alcohol is served, that the hosting adults can be hold liable for damages. These hosting adults, referred to by the courts as "Social hosts" are held liable under a civil theory of negligence if they furnish alcohol to a guest they know or should know is under the age of 21.

Lastly, Wisconsin has a zero tolerance approach when it comes to minors that choose to drive a motor vehicle after they have consumed alcohol. The law states that your child can not have even one drop of alcohol in his/her system while they are operating a motor vehicle.

We ask that you, as a parent, encourage your child to make the smart choices and take part in alcohol and drug free events. We remind you that our goal is for all to have a fun experience but safe one as well.



## Take heart!! Soon we'll hear the Spring Peepers!

Spring peepers are to the amphibian world what American robins are to the bird world. As their name implies, they begin emitting their familiar sleigh-bell-like chorus right around the beginning of spring.

Found in wooded areas and grassy lowlands near ponds and swamps in the central and eastern parts of Canada and the United States, these tiny, well-camouflaged amphibians are rarely seen. But the mid-March crescendo of nighttime whistles from amorous males is for many a sign that winter is over.

Spring peepers are tan or brown in color with dark lines that form a telltale X on their backs. They grow to about 1.5 inches (3.8 centimeters) in length, and have large toe pads for climbing, although they are more at home amid the loose debris of the forest floor.

They are nocturnal creatures, hiding from their many predators during the day and emerging at night to feed on such delicacies as beetles, ants, flies, and spiders.

They mate and lay their eggs in water and spend the rest of the year in the forest. In the winter, they hibernate under logs or behind loose bark on trees, waiting for the spring thaw and their chance to sing.

#### Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest funded to enhance local kids' natural resource programs

Rhinelander, WI: April 4, 2011 The U.S. Forest Service today awarded nearly \$56,000 and a Children's Forest designation to the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest (CNNF), in support of conservation education programs that are hosted at the Northern Great Lakes Visitor Center (NGLVC) in Ashland. These programs provide children more opportunities to experience the great outdoors, learn about nature, and build a lasting commitment to conservation and land stewardship.

"The value of expanding our programs for

children must not be underestimated," said U.S. Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell. "Young people are tomorrow's stewards of our public lands, and we have a duty to help them develop a lasting connection and passion for conservation of America's great outdoors.

This special Children's Forest designation will help to highlight the strong interagency partnerships that are based out of the NGLVC. Through the partnerships with National Park Service, US Fish and Wildlife, University of Wisconsin - Extension, Wisconsin Historical Society, Friends of the Center Alliance, quality programs for children and families have been made available for over 13 years. The Children's Forest designation will invigorate these existing partnerships as well as create new ones, in turn increasing the linkages that provide opportunities for kids to connect to nature.

"We are very pleased to be one of the National Forests to be receiving the Children's Forest designation and associated funding. This designation allows us to bring even more to the table with our ongoing work with partnerships. These partnerships are essential in helping connect the youth to their natural world," said Forest Supervisor, Paul Strong.

The Forest Service has been a leader in conservation education and recreation opportunities for more than a century. The agency's conservation education programs build on the principles of education, stewardship and skill development that result in career pathways for future stewardship leaders. These same principles support the goals identified in President Obama's America's Great Outdoors report and by First Lady Michelle Obama's Let's Move Outside campaign and can also be a catalyst to help combat the rise in childhood obesity, diabetes and heart disease.

The funding, which was already in this year's agency's budget, leverage existing partnerships and will be distributed to "More Kids in the Woods" projects and "Children's Forest" programs. Nationally, the Forest Service has committed \$1 million to these cost-share programs that build on long-term partnerships that will result in a roughly 2.5-to-1 return on the agency's investment.

The mission of the U.S. Forest Service is to sustain the health, diversity, and productivity of the nation's forests and grasslands to meet the needs of present and future generations. The agency manages 193 million acres of public land, provides assistance to state and private landowners, and maintains the largest forestry research organization in the world.

## A Wimpy Car: Ramblings of a "baby Boomer

As a member of America's Baby Boomer generation of the Post World War II economy, I can remember all kinds of what I call "wimpy" cars from the 1950s and 1960s. Soon we may all be driving wimpy electric cars which may run on ears of field corn. And although this technology is quite necessary; I am a bit saddened. As an aging baby boomer I still remember what it felt like to ride "fast and furious" back in the 1960s. The thrill of the 1964 Pontiac GTO Coupe, the 1968 Chevrolet Camaro SS 396, and 1966 Mustang Shelby GT Fastback. I long for those early rides in sports cars such as the 1960-1968 Chevrolet Corvette series and the big block 1969 Dodge HEMI Charger and the list goes on. I realize the importance of maintaining a safe clean environment for the future of mankind. I thank God every day that he gave me the chance to grow up as a member of the baby boomer generation. I remember day dreaming all day about working on my car after school with the savings earned as a "carry-out" boy at the local A & P. The chance to ride in fast cars with big block engines and the unparalleled thrill of going zero to sixty in seven seconds, slamming all four gears and pinned back against the front seat.

The unique quality about the development of the wimpy automobile was its concept of a "no frills", cheap to own and inexpensive to operate for the masses of people. The 1950s has been what can be called Detroit's Golden Age. The cars produced during those years dramatically changed the appearance of automobiles to reflect the pop culture.

The Soviet Union launched its Sputnik 1 or Elementary Satellite-1 becoming the first Earth-orbiting artificial satellite launched into an elliptical low earth orbit on 4 October 1957. This became the first in a series of satellites collectively known as the Sputnik Program. While the Russian Sputnik launch was a single event, it marked the start of the Space Race as this event caused our country to wake up. As a result the US was certainly not going to play second fiddle to any country when it involved the conquest of outer space.

Anyway, back on planet earth, believe it or not the race for space had filtered down to automobile design. Who could ever forget the Oldsmobile Rocket 88 and its so called Rocket 88 engine. Its rendition of a twin-engine rocket blasting upward was a feature of its exterior chrome accent and matching hood ornament, complete with tail lights that resembled the base of contemporary rocket engines which became quite the rage. There was a pent up demand for new cars in the fast-expanding post World War II era economy of the 1950s. The 88 appealed to many ex-military personnel who were young and had operated powerful military equipment. The 88 enjoyed great marketing success, inspiring a popular 1950s slogan, "Make a Date with a Rocket 88", and accompanied by a song, "Rocket 88", often considered the very first rock and roll record. Starting with the trunk-lid emblem of the 1950 model. Oldsmobile would adopt the rocket as its logo, and the 88 name would ultimately remain in the Olds lineup until the late 1990s, almost until the end of the Oldsmobile line itself

Unlike the fabulous features and designs of emerging space age themed sports cars such as the Chevrolet Corvette for example, the Ford Thunderbird, as well as the flamboyant exteriors and interiors of the big Chryslers and Buicks; the wimpy

car simply ambled across the landscape virtually unnoticed.

Cars in the later fifties were exceedingly ornately trimmed. Lots of big and gaudy chrome bumpers in concert with fenders and hood ornaments glistened in the sun. Inside, special accents of chrome window knobs, door locks, door handles and dashboards gleamed and sparked to appeal to the eye and to the touch. The big luxurious vehicles offered owners a mobile status symbol with bright colors and chrome making an artificial aerodynamic statement with the use of unusually large extended tail fins. The design of the cars of the 1950s with the exaggerated tail fin has never been duplicated. These fins did not help with vehicle speed, nor improve engine performance in any way, but the unique and elaborate quality created stylistic parallels

throughout the auto industry.

Power steering, power brakes and automatic transmissions were emerging as features which new car buyers could expect in their vehicle. Long and sleek, many American automobiles generally obtained poor gas mileage in a time when gas was plentiful and very reasonably priced. Way back then, air conditioning was a special "add-on" feature as well as tinted windows and these big cars had enormously large trunk space.

One of the common pranks by youth back then was to find out how many kids could hide inside the trunk so as to get into places like drive-in movies and area county fairs. I even participated once back in 1965 when gaining access to a rural southern Ohio hot rod drag strip.

An important point to note is that during the 1950s and 60s each year the body style changed dramatically as if to outdo a

previous year. The 1955 Chevrolet versus 1957 and then onto the was a period in which many countries experienced a severe gasoline shortage, spurred mainly by an oil-embargo against the United States and other pro-Israel countries by the Organization of Arab Petroleum Exporting Countries and later, by the Iranian revolution in 1979. Until the fuel shortage occurred in the United States, domestic auto manufacturers had been creating cars that were increasingly large and powerful, referred to as "muscle cars" but had not placed much focus on fuel efficiency. In 1970, the federal United

States Environmental Protection Agency was established.
When gasoline became scarce and expensive,
popularity soared for small, fuel efficient automobiles, most of
them from overseas. The Volkswagen Beetle continued to sell well and companies such as Toyota and Honda began exporting their fuel-efficient vehicles to America in ever greater numbers. Early Toyotas and Hondas were not known for being attractive, but they were known for requiring fewer trips to the gas station, where lines were long and, in many areas, the amount of fuel a customer could purchase was rationed. If anyone still remembers the wimpy 1971 Honda 600 two-door hatchback, will probably most remember how tiny it was. I think a golf cart had more room! By the 1974 model year, the emission standards had tightened such that the de-tuning techniques used to meet them were seriously reducing engine efficiency and thus increasing fuel usage. The new emission standards for 1975 model year, as well as the increase in fuel usage, forced the invention of the catalytic converter for afterusage, forced the invention of the catalytic converter for after-treatment of the exhaust gas. This was not possible with existing leaded gasoline because the lead residue contaminated the platinum catalyst. In 1972, General Motors proposed to the American Petroleum Institute the elimination of leaded fuels for 1975 and later model year cars. The production and distribution of unleaded fuel was a major challenge, but it was completed successfully in time for the 1975 model year cars. All modern cars are now equipped with atalytic converters and unleaded fuel can now be found almost everywhere. The drawback was that you could be prosecuted if you modified or tampered with your personal automobile's exhaust system. During the 1980s and 1990s, American car manufacturers recognized that they were losing a great deal of the car market to foreign auto makers. That led to American car companies such as General Motors to create their own lines of small, fuel efficient vehicles.

One of the most successful lines of small, fuel

efficient wimpy American cars was the Geo line. The Geo Metro, a small, bubble-shaped hatchback, was built around a 3-cylinder motor that got close to 50 miles per gallon on the

General Motors introduced the Geo line during a time when fuel was inexpensive and plentiful. Consumers soon time when fuel was inexpensive and plentiful. Consumers soon grew less interested in small, fuel efficient wimpy cars and more interested in large "status" vehicles such as luxury sedans and sport utility vehicles, which featured more room and more power but significantly, lower fuel efficiency.

Although the production of fuel-efficient, gasoline-

powered cars has risen and fallen with the price and availability of gasoline in the consumer market, attempts to produce a vehicle that does not run on gasoline have been ongoing. In fact, many early cars ran on electricity, although they never became popular. Experimental cars that run on battery power, water, and biologically-derived fuels have been produced by engineers, car companies, and universities for decades. Most early alternative fuel vehicles proved to be cost-prohibitive, however, and not in high demand in the marketplace. Although they did not require gasoline, they were expensive to manufacture and maintain and yes...still very wimpy.

A new urgency due to rising fuel costs and limited fuel supplies has led to a renewed public demand for fuel-efficient vehicles. Environmentally conscious consumers are interested in driving the so called environmentally friendly "green" vehicles that have both a lower impact on the planet and on their pocketbooks.

This new urgency for what I maintain is still a wimpy car has resulted in new efforts to create cars that run on alternative fuels and to create cars that have greater fuel efficiency. The United States government has responded with stricter standards that tie greater fuel efficiency standards to requirements that the auto industry produce cars with a lesser impact on the environment.

Hybrid vehicles that run both on gasoline and battery power are rolling in greater numbers off both foreign and domestic assembly lines. Bio-diesel stations that sell fuel made from corn and other crops are increasingly available in more populated areas. And now with gasoline anticipated to climb to five dollars per gallon, we all shall soon be driving wimpy electric cars which may by fueled on ears of Indiana field corn...blah! Imagine yourself toolling around in a 71 horsepower General Motors "Smart ForTwo...yikes, I can't!"

We will have to adjust to plugging our car into an electric outlet before we go to bed and might be just lucky enough to make a 150-mile round trip the next day. Wow, think of the trip planning possibilities to Auntie Em's out in the land of OZ of Kansas!

As an aging baby boomer I always long for the 1960s and the heydays of the big block engines of cars such s the 1964 Pontiac GTO Coupe, 1968-69 Chevrolet Camaro SS 396, 1966-70 Mustang Shelby GT Fastback, 1960-1968 Chevrolet Corvette series, the 1969 Dodge HEMI Charger and the list goes on. I know it is vital that we maintain a way of life which promotes a safe clean environment for the future of all mankind. Fred Flintstone and Barney Rubble used their feet to propel their stone age cars...an interesting concept. "Not!"

I thank God every day that he gave me the chance to grow up as a member of the baby boomer generation. The grow up as a member of the baby boomer generation. The chance to ride in fast cars with big engines and I remember the thrill of going fast! WOW! The lyrics of the 1960s Beach Boys tunes "She's Real Fine my 409" still rings in my head.
