

Camp 5 Museum has been selected by Plum Creek to receive a grant for \$4,799.07. The grant will be used to pay for the surrey that is used for the Green Treasure Forest Tour. The new surrey replaces a vehicle that saw service for 40 years and was in need of replacement.

For those who have not experienced Camp 5, or have not taken the time to take the forest tour, it is highly recommended to do so. The trip through the surrounding forest and the various timber types and types of management is a mini-forestry course, and is a living example of how forest management works. This is important in times when some environmental groups try to tell the public the evils of logging and loggers. The tour takes the visitor through a sustained yield forest that has been logged for over a hundred years and is still a thriving, growing and beautiful forest. The tour is narrated by a knowledgeable person, and better understanding of logging and forestry is gained by those taking the tour.

Plum Creek's Bill O'Brion said that Camp 5 is one of three entities that received a Plum Creek grant this year, and cited that fact that the Green Treasure Forest Tour tells the facts about the Sustainable Forest Initiative practiced by Plum Creek.

O'Brion said: "Plum Creek has a long relationship with Camp 5 and Sara Connor and her work with historic logging camps. We like to work with small communities where we own land and our employees live and work. And, logging history is important to us."

Camp 5 and the historic Lumberjack Special steam train is a destination tourist attraction. That is, that people will come to Forest County just to experience the ride on Ol' Four-Spot, the museum, the petting zoo, along with the Green Treasure Forest Tour and the pontoon ride on the Rat River, another educational tour. Camp 5 is a great place to take kids and grandchildren, and there is food on the grounds.

On July 28, the Stihl Timberworks Lumberjack show will take place on the grounds of Camp 5. The show draws live audiences of over one million combined, Timberworks Lumberjack Shows is an exciting and entertaining adventure providing a unique blend of sports, history and comedy and includes an opportunity for the audience to experience a nostalgic logging competition of the early 1900s. Visitors will see lumberjacks climbing poles at lightning speed, competing with the crosscut saw. In addition, the Cowboys will be back on October 6th, and Fall Festival will be held on September 22, 29 and October 6th.





Honey can be substituted for sugar in the diabetes diet. Honey is quite similar to sugar, so there is no real advantage for substituting honey for sugar. Unlike sugar, honey provides some minerals - but only in trace amounts.



Homeless count to take place in Forest, Langlade, Oneida and Vilas Counties

On Wednesday, July 25, 2011, The Northern Wisconsin Initiative to Stop Homelessness (N*WISH) Continuum of Care will be joining homelessness palitions/continuums around the state in completing a local count of individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Staff and volunteers will count persons in shelters as well as persons residing on the streets, under bridges, or similar places not meant for human habitation.

"The Point In Time count is a state-wide initiative, and this is the fifth time we will be counting unsheltered individuals in the Northwoods," states Lori Hallas, Housing Team Leader for Forward Service Corporation. She explains that teams of individuals will be in Rhinelander, Minocqua, Eagle River, Antigo, and other larger communities to locate individuals sleeping in public places. "This is just once piece in the process of helping identify and assist individuals in crisis," Hallas concludes.

The collected data will assist the community in understanding the scope and size of local homelessness; engage in programs and service development, and to apply for state and federal funding. This state-wide count occurs twice a year, once in January and once in July.

The Northern Wisconsin Initiative to Stop Homelessness (N*WISH) Continuum of Care was established in November, 2009. N*WISH is comprised of various state government & public housing agencies; non-profit & faithbased organizations as well as funding & advocacy groups. This collaborative system exists to increase awareness and acts to promote and support the eradication of homelessness in Forest, Langlade, Oneida and Vilas Counties.

Drinking for Health

Water accounts for approximately 60 percent of your total body weight. The river of life, your blood, is made up of 90 percent water. Water is the most abundant substance in the human body. An average adult carries about 11 gallons on board at any given time. Water carries the oxygen and nutrients your body needs, and helps to flush out the contaminants your body doesn't.

Water helps to lubricate the joints, regulate your temperature and aids in digestion and metabolism. If you are like most people, you are not drinking enough water. Think about it. When was your last drink...of the purely H2O kind thank you! Consider that experts recommend you consume between three to four quarts of water in a day, or around .5 ounces of water per pound of your body weight. Wow, now that seems like a lot of water to be drinking?? Do you wait to drink until your body says, "gee, I'm thirsty"?? Then you are about a quart and a half low already or roughly 5 percent dehydrated. Take stock of your daily routine and your physical conditioning and possible ailments. Chances are, if you were in-taking the correct amount of water, you might feel better.

Fatigue and mild headaches are a sign that you are becoming dehydrated. Your output of energy will be less if you are not consuming enough water.

Dehydration can lead to accidents by causing progressive loss of coordination and inability to concentrate and can predispose you to various ailments such as heat illness, hypothermia or frostbite. Just because it is cold doesn't mean you aren't losing water either. In a cold, dry climate, your body can lose up to a quart of water a day just through breathing.

Now that's a scary thought, I bet your feeling pretty thirsty about now!!

The main message in this article is to make you aware of how important water is and how healthy it can make you, so if you are a good water drinker, keep drinking, but if you aren't a good water drinker -- get started! Be a drinker -- water that is! Stay healthy!

### Pass The Banana

A professor at CCNY for a physiological psych class told his class about bananas. He said the expression 'going bananas' is from the effects of bananas on the brain.

**PMS:** Forget the pills - eat a banana. The vitamin B6 it contains regulates blood glucose levels, which can affect your mood.

**Anemia:** High in iron, bananas can stimulate the production of hemoglobin in the blood and so helps in cases of anemia.

**Blood Pressure:** This unique tropical fruit is extremely high in potassium yet low in salt, making it perfect to beat blood pressure. So much so, the US Food and Drug Administration has just allowed the banana industry to make official claims for the fruit's ability to reduce the risk of blood pressure and stroke.

**Brain Power:** 200 students at a Twickenham (Middlesex) school (England) were helped through their exams this year by eating bananas at breakfast, break, and lunch in a bid to boost their brain power. Research has shown that the potassium-packed fruit can assist learning by making pupils more alert.

**Constipation:** High in fiber, including bananas in the diet can help restore normal bowel action, helping to overcome the problem without resorting to laxatives.

**Hangovers:** One of the quickest ways of curing a hangover is to make a banana milkshake, sweetened with honey. The banana calms the stomach and, with the help of the honey, builds up depleted blood sugar levels, while the milk soothes and re-hydrates your system.

**Heartburn:** Bananas have a natural antacid effect in the body, so if you suffer from heartburn, try eating a banana for soothing relief.

**Morning Sickness:** Snacking on bananas between meals helps to keep blood sugar levels up and avoid morning sickness.

**Mosquito bites:** Before reaching for the insect bite cream, try rubbing the affected area with the inside of a banana skin. Many people find it amazingly successful at reducing swelling and irritation.

 $\mbox{\bf Nerves:}$  Bananas are high in B vitamins that help calm the nervous system.

Overweight and at work? Studies at the Institute of Psychology in Austria found pressure at work leads to gorging on comfort food like chocolate and chips. Looking at 5,000 hospital patients, researchers found the most obese were more likely to be in high-pressure jobs. The report concluded that, to avoid panic-induced food cravings, we need to control our blood sugar levels by snacking on high carbohydrate foods every two hours to keep levels steady.

**Ulcers:** The banana is used as the dietary food against intestinal disorders because of its soft texture and smoothness. It is the only raw fruit that can be eaten without distress in over-chronicler cases. It also neutralizes over-acidity and reduces irritation by coating the lining of the stomach.

**Temperature control:** Many other cultures see bananas as a 'cooling ' fruit that can lower both the physical and emotional temperature of expectant mother. s. In Thailand, for example, pregnant women eat bananas to ensure their baby is born with a cool temperature.

**Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD):** Bananas can help SAD sufferers because they contain the natural mood Enhancer tryptophan.

**Smoking & Tobacco Use:** Bananas can also help people trying to give up smoking. The B6, B12 they contain, as well as the potassium and magnesium found in them, help the body recover from the effects of nicotine withdrawal.

**Stress:** Potassium is a vital mineral, which helps normalize the heartbeat, sends oxygen to the brain and regulates your body's water balance. 

# Traffic deaths have increased in the first six months of this year

Although last month was tied for the tenth safest month of June in terms of traffic deaths since World War II, the number of fatalities for the first six months of this year was still approximately 15 percent higher than during the same period last year.

According to preliminary statistics from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT), 266 people have died on Wisconsin roads in 2012 as of June 30, including 42 motorcycle operators, five motorcycle passengers, 16 pedestrians, and three bicyclists. That compares with 230 traffic fatalities during the same period last year. Traffic fatalities at the end of June also were one more than the five-year average for the first six months of the year.

Last month, 61 people were killed in 56 crashes in Wisconsin, which were nine more deaths than in June 2011 and four more than the five year average for the month of June. The safest month of June in terms of traffic deaths since World War II occurred in 1946 with 45 fatalities and the deadliest was in 1956 with 115 fatalities.

"There's no better time than right now to stop this recent increase in traffic fatalities," says State Patrol Major Sandra Huxtable, director of the WisDOT Bureau of Transportation Safety. "Law enforcement officers around the state are out in force this summer to deter speeding, distracted driving, and drunken driving as well as ensure drivers and passengers are buckling up. For instance, 120 law enforcement agencies are receiving federal funding to put more officers on patrol for the Summer Heat speed enforcement mobilization that runs to July 18. But they can't do it alone. Everyone needs to take responsibility for their safety and the safety of others on the road. We all have to do our part."



# Sun Kissed Skin or Over Exposure

Whether you're planning a day at the beach, a quick walk in the park, or plan to tan for a winter wedding, here are the facts about UV-rays.

What's the difference between UVA and UVB? UVA penetrates the skin more deeply than UVB, and causes skin aging and wrinkling. UVA is a contributor and may initiate the development of skin cancers. UVB is the main cause of sunburn, and is responsible for causing most skin cancers.

So how do you protect yourself? Cancer.org uses this simple theory: "Slip! Slop! Slap!... And Wrap" "Slip on a shirt, Slop on sunscreen, Slap on a hat, and Wrap on sunglasses to protect eyes and sensitive skin around them."

Covering up with long sleeves, long pants, or skirt: dark colors are preferred to light, and tightly woven fabrics are better than loosely woven. Dry fabric is also more protective than wet.

There is some work in choosing the right sunscreen, and how to apply it. Always make sure that sunscreen is a UVA & UVB protectant (broad-spectrum). When using an SPF of 30 and applying it thickly, it's equal to 1 minute of UVB exposure in a 30 minute period. So if you are in the sun for 1 hour using SPF 30 it's equal to 2 minutes in the sun totally unprotected.

What SPF should you buy? No sunscreen will protect you 100% but here's the difference between SPF 15 and SPF 100. SPF 15 will filter out 93%, SPF 30 about 97%, SPF 50 about 98%, and SPF 100 about 99% of rays. Apply about a palmful of sun screen to your body, and reapply every 2 hours. Waterproof products can protect up to 80 minutes, and water resistant only 40, so these products should be reapplied sooner.

Expensive sunscreens are not necessary. WebMD has the top 3 Consumer Reports "Best Buy" sunscreens listed as: Up & Up Sport SPF 30, No-Ad with Aloe and Vitamin E SPF 45, and Equate Baby SPF 50, additional brands can be found online.

Wearing a hat, and sunglasses can reduce sun exposure to head, and eyes. Make sure the hat has at least a 2-3 inch brim all the way around and sunglasses should block 99% to 100% of UVA and UVB rays.

Use the shadow test: if your shadow is shorter than you, the suns ray's are the strongest, and protection from the sun is most important.

Indoor Tanning: Seems safe doesn't it? Here are some facts.

- Tanning indoors 1x per month increases your risk of malignant melanoma (most deadly skin cancer) b y Ultraviolet radiation is a proven human carcinogen. The international Agency for Research on Cancer lists UV tanning devices in Group 1 of the most dangerous cancercausing substances.
- •10 minutes in a sunbed = 10 minutes in the Mediterranean sun.
- People who tan indoors are 74% more likely to develop melanoma, 2.5 more likely to develop squamous cell, and 1.5 times more likely to develop basal cell carcinoma all common skin cancers.

Check you skin often, as changes to moles can happen rapidly. Look for the ABCD's.

- · Asymmetry: Most moles are symmetrical and round. Be on the lookout for those that change shape and become asymmetrical.
- Border: Watch for moles that are uneven and irregular around the edges.
- · Color: Moles should be a uniform brown color. Moles that are different shades of brown or black may be a skin cancer and should be evaluated.
- Diameter: If a mole becomes larger than the tip of a pencil eraser, you should check with your provider.



# Update on Holt & Balcom Logging Camp Museum Restoration

The Holt & Balcom Logging Camp Museum in Lakewood has been undergoing a meticulous restoration. The project began in 2008 when a new roof was installed and other critical repairs were conducted. As of this week, the log replacement and refacing is finished. While there is still work to be done, the major part of the renovation is complete.

To answer two frequently asked questions, no taxpayer money was used to restore the Museum. All the money was raised through private donations. And even though many of the logs have been replaced, many are original from trees that were born long before the American Revolution. Thus the camp retains its listing on the national Register of Historical Places.

In May 2011 the building was lifted and a new foundation installed. This added \$25,000 to the project's cost, but now the museum stands high and dry. "We needed to do this right," says Camp Curator Kathleen Marsh. "We didn't want another group to have to restore the museum 25 years from now because the logs we installed rotted away again from moisture seeping up from the ground."

The Restoration Committee used local labor as much as possible. Northwoods Roofing (Argonne) replaced the roof with more authentic rolled roofing; Gem Heating (Lakewood) did the woodstove/chimney work; Duane Harris (Wabeno) took down a tree near the building; Jim Kmecheck (Tippler) lifted the building. All foundation work was done by Frank Erler Masonry (Lakewood) and Cliff Aderholdt is serving as project electrician. Historical reconstruction experts Jerry Dewane (Astro Log Homes), Robert Kleinhaus, and Chris Neumeyer, (Valders) did the log work.

In addition to our paid contractors, several local businesses volunteered time and/or contributed materials. McCauslin Golf Course provided a forklift and co-owners Don Bartels Jr. and Ted Bartels did site cleanup. McCausin Logging (Townsend) cut and delivered the new logs; Kevin Marshall (Lakewood) did the landscaping; Jeff Kroll and Brian Eisner (Townsend) milled and delivered new floor beams from an oak tree donated by Frank Erler.

The project would never have happened without numerous volunteers such as Norbert Langer (Lakewood); the students from Job Corps (Blackwell); Ron Viaene (Townsend) who has been in charge of carpentry; Bob Brown (Lakewood) who repaired and painted the windows; Pete Christianson and son Eric (Townsend) and Chad Demerath (Lakewood) who will do the stonework and replace the bunkhouse floor. Kathleen and Jon Marsh provided the Astro crew a home away from home by letting the men stay free of charge in their cottage on the Townsend Flowage.




