The tragedy on Peshtigo Lake

Back in June of 1914, tragedy struck the greater community of Crandon. A row of small tombstones in the Crandon Lakeside Cemetery is a reminder of this tragedy that claimed the lives of three young people on a fine

Lester Grandine, a man who was well known in the Crandon area, and five children of the Silas and Jemima Smith family were having a picnic and swimming on Mud Lake, which most of us now call Peshtigo Lake. A sixth sibling, Warren, wasn't present. From the rather vague news account in the "Northern Citizen" from June 12, 1914, it is apparent that Jessie Smith, age 20 and Lester Grandine's intended wife; Jessie's brother, Perry Smith, age 13; and Hugh Smith, age 18, all drowned on June 7th, 1914.

While it is hard to find out exactly what happened that day, it is known that one of the Smith children stepped in a spring hole and was suddenly in over his head. It can be surmised that it was probably Jessie, but it could have been one of her brothers. Whatever the circumstance, the Smith brothers, and possibly Jessie, tried to help and were soon in distress.

From second-hand accounts from people who had grandparents there that summer day, there was a gathering of Range Line families on the shores of Peshtigo Lake. People were picnicking up and down the wooded south shore. When the cries of distress sounded, there was nobody to help. Very few people could swim in those days, much less have lifeguard training. Add in heavy wool swimsuits, and the ability to swim dropped some

Lester Grandine must have been terror stricken. His girlfriend was one of those in trouble. At least one story has it that she had gone to the aid of a younger brother and sister and found herself in trouble. Another version is that they were wading down the shoreline to visit other folks enjoying the day and stepped in a spring hole that was over their heads. Whatever the reason, there were three people drowning. Lester Grandine was also not a swimmer, but there was a boat fastened to a tree with a chain and a padlock. Using rocks, he frantically pounded on the chain managed to break it and got the boat in the water. One can only imagine his state of mind as he pounded on a chain that probably seemed to take forever to break, while he heard the shouts of the drowning friends and the people on the shore.

Reaching the young people in the spring hole, he attempted to bring them into the boat. In the meantime, other Smith siblings, understandably, went to the aid of their family members, giving Lester an even bigger chore. He did manage to get Jessie in the boat and the younger sister, but Jessie, seeing her brothers drowning, jumped back in to assist them. Because of her efforts, she also drowned. Lester saved one of the younger Smith boys, but in spite of his efforts, three young people drowned. The heavy, wool swimsuits that were the fashion of the day, had to compound the situation.

It is hard to imagine the horror of an afternoon that promised to be a day of relaxation and fun. People in following years would recount many times the terrible sight of Jessie Smith's body being carried from the water with her long hair hanging to the ground and streaming

The shock of that day for the Silas and Jemima Smith family was terrible and long-lasting. Lester Grandine had saved and lost his fiancé, and was in deep grief as well.

For most of the community, time healed the loss, but not for the mother of the three drowned young people. According to family members, she never fully recovered from the loss of her sons Hugh and Perry and daughter Jessie. Continued on page 5

Town of Lincoln breaks ground for new town hall

The town of Lincoln has been working towards a new town hall and garage. At a meeting on June 9, 2012, the building committee was granted permission to move forward with a plan to build. The electors of the Town of Lincoln granted the committee \$600,000 with a \$60,000 contingence to build on the current site on County Highway W.

The building committee then investigated all the possible directions to go when building. They sent request for bids to architects, general contractors, and construction managers. The committee felt that an architect and design group was the best option for the town. They hired Raash Architects and Design and hired Bayland Builders LLC as a general contractor.

The groundbreaking took place on Wednesday September 12. The building will be completed around the beginning of February, 2013. The finished project will be a 7800 square foot building. 4200 square feet will be a three stall garage. The rest will be used for offices and a small community center to be used for gatherings, town meetings and elections. Construction will start in the beginning of October.

The green outbuilding behind the existing town hall is scheduled to be moved. The person moving the building needs to have a permit out of Madison and is still waiting to receive it. The committee called Madison and asked about the permit and they believe that the permit will be mailed to them soon and that the building will be moved

A citizen asked about the budget. The committee explained that as bids came in, they would adjust where they needed to and that they will come in under the \$600,000 budget with a \$60,000 contingence. Jack Kloss and Wayne Dual are painting the inside of the building and this will save about \$10,000. Continued on page 9



Northern and Mississippi River zone duck seasons open Sept. 22

MADISON - Hunters looking forward to the opening of Wisconsin's 2012 duck season in the northern and Mississippi River duck zones on Sept. 22 should find good numbers of ducks, according to state wildlife officials.

"We will see what fall water conditions look like, but there is the potential for Wisconsin waterfowlers to have a really enjoyable hunting season," said Kent Van Horn, migratory game bird ecologist for the state Department of Natural Resources.

Fall wild turkey and ruffed grouse seasons open Sept. 15

MADISON - The 2012 fall wild turkey and ruffed grouse seasons are set to open, and state wildlife officials say that hunter prospects are good for both seasons. The turkey season will open statewide at the start of shooting hours on Sept. 15, as will the grouse season in Zone A. Grouse hunters interested in pursuing grouse in southeastern Wisconsin should be aware that the grouse season does not open until Oct. 20 in Zone B.

Overall, Wisconsin's statewide wild turkey population remains strong, and wildlife officials have set the number of fall turkey permits available at 96,700, a 1,000-permit increase over the number of permits offered during last year's fall turkey season. Permits were increased by 600 in Zone 2 and by 400 in Zone 7 in order to better accommodate demand by hunters.

After 30 years of sustained population growth and expansion across the state, turkeys are now found statewide, and local populations will likely nudge upward

9-11 vigil held in Crandon

September 11, 2001 is a day for people who are old enough to remember, can tell you where they were and what they were doing. It is the anniversary of the attacks on the World Trade Centers. Nearly 3,000 people died, workers in the buildings, on the planes, or emergency, police or fire and rescue workers. Les remembered how America banded together. This was the first Attack on American soil since the attack of Pearl Harbor.

Since that day, we have fought in Iraq and Afganistan. Navy seals have killed Osama Bin Laden. The ground zero site is cleared of rubble and America is rebuilding. This is a bleak spot in American history, but one that should not and will not be forgotten.

Les ended saying, " On this day, my prayer is that we would never have to witness this kind of attack on American soil again and that the terrorists and their leaders' hearts could be changed so that they would seek to do good instead of evil and seek peace instead of

The program was ended with a 21 gun salute and Larry Berg and the people in attendance singing God Bless America while cars passing by honked and gave a thumbs up.

National Public Lands Day

The Forest Service is waiving standard amenity fees on Saturday, September 29 in recognition of National Public Lands Day at hundreds of recreation sites nationwide.

The focus of National Public Lands Day is to instill a sense of shared stewardship and educate the public about the importance of natural resources. More than 170,000 volunteers are expected to provide assistance in the nation's largest, hands-on volunteer effort to improve America's public lands.

The Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest is hosting National Public Lands Day events September 28 on the Florence-Eagle River Ranger District and September 29 at the Northern Great Lakes Visitors' Center.

Members of the public are invited to help clear garlic d from the Anvil Lake Trail Friday, September 28.

Volunteers will meet at the on Highway 70 trailhead -- about nine miles east of Eagle River -- at 10 a.m., said Melissa Simpson, Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest Ecologist.

"We will be working to remove non-native invasive garlic mustard plants and install three boot brush stations at trailheads," she said. "This invasive plant is found throughout the hiking trails in the Anvil trail system and the Franklin and Butternut Lake areas."

"The Northern Great Lakes Visitor Center welcomes people to participate in an event on Saturday, September 29, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m." said Susan Nelson, project coordinator.

"We will begin in the Martin Hanson Theatre with a program about the history and significance of the Gitiganing and Mashkiki-Gitigaan gardens to the Anishinaabe," she said. "These gardens were prevalent on the Bad River and Red Cliff Reservations. "

After the presentation, volunteers will move to the Nature's Discovery Area to dig out the gardens, pull weeds and lay down weed barrier. Other work includes raking wood chips on the trail, cut buckthorn, repair the beaver lodge with mud and sticks, clean out the sand box and cut narrowleaved cattails along the wetland area, she continued.

"At noon we will have a pizza lunch followed by a showing of the Aldo Leopold movie "Green Fire" in the Martin Hanson Theatre," Nelson said.

Lester Grandine was given an award for his lifesaving efforts by a local church. He had rescued Amy and Lois Smith, and brought Hugh into the boat, but it was too late to save Hugh.

Eventually, Lester married Jessie's younger sister, Amy on June 21, 1922. They inherited the Smith farm from Amy's parents, in the Town of Lincoln, that is now known as the old Grandine Farm and is currently owned by Art and Barb Packard. The former farm fields are now supporting a red pine plantation that has been there for decades.

The Grandine "kids," Joe, Lois, John, Alice, Faith, Lester and Rosemary came out of the union between Lester and Amy, and they were consulted on this story.

John says he remembers fishing with his father on Peshtigo Lake when he was young, but remembers that Lester always avoided the spot where the Smith kids

Amy Grandine never went near the water, but she insisted that her children learned to swim. According to Faith, however, they were never allowed to go in the water past their armpits and had to face the shore. Faith credits her mother for having the courage to let their kids go in the water after the experience she had gone through.

As we end another summer here in the Northwoods, we realize that fun times can end in tragic circumstances, especially when in and on the water, just like it did 98 years ago.



Free Creative Arts Series events at Nicolet College include fiber art exhibit, ways to get free computer software







Invasive Mussels and **Dock Removal**

Fall is fast approaching and with it comes cooler temperatures and the itch to start preparing for the inevitable snow of winter. For many of us it is also time to start removing docks and piers for the year. Not many people think about invasive species when removing docks or piers but they come hand in hand. This time of year can be an opportune time to discover invasive species such as zebra mussels and Eurasian water milfoil. You may be thinking how are the two related. Let me explain it to you!

Zebra mussels and quagga mussels are the only mussels in Wisconsin that will attach to hard surfaces such as docks and boats. When you are removing your dock or boat from the water look at it closely. Do you see anything that is attached to it? Zebra mussels can be as large as a thumbnail or as small as a pencil lead. Young zebra mussels called veligers are difficult to see with the naked eye. If you rub your hand along the surface they will often feel like sandpaper. Rocks are also a great place to check for these critters.

Also when removing your pier look into the water. This is a great time to catch invasive plants such as Eurasian water milfoil. Eurasian water milfoil can grow extremely thick and can crowd out native plants and animals and make boat operation difficult by clogging props. Eurasian water milfoil looks very similar to native northern water milfoil. The key differences are the number of leaflets on a side of a leaf. More than 12 leaflets on a side is likely Eurasian water milfoil and less than 12 leaflets is likely a native milfoil.

If you see a suspect plant or animal please contact me at the information below. Place the suspect plant or animal in a Ziploc bag and add a little water. Then place the bag in the refrigerator or freezer. The best time to catch these plants and animals is early before they become established. Once established they become





or downward from year to year as weather determines annual levels of survival and reproduction.

The spring 2012 turkey harvest showed a 6 percent increase in Wisconsin, largely due to the unseasonably warm, dry weather that made for comfortable hunting conditions during most of the season. The increased harvest may have also been influenced by the mild conditions during the winter of 2011-12, which likely allowed turkey populations to enter spring in good shape.

Wisconsin also experienced warm and dry conditions during this year's critical June brood-rearing period, which should lead to good production and a better chance for hunters to encounter birds this fall. Biologists closely monitor harvest during the either-sex fall season, as excessive hen harvest can impact turkey populations. Recent hen harvests in Wisconsin have been very low, however, and hunters can enter the woods comfortable with the knowledge that current hen harvest rates do not play a significant role in the dynamics of Wisconsin's turkey flock. As during the 2011 fall season, hunters may use dogs statewide to hunt wild turkey this fall.

Hunters pursuing turkeys in Zones 1-5 during the fall 2012 hunt will again have additional opportunities to do so. During the 2009 and 2010 fall hunts, the season was extended on an experimental basis in these zones, from the day after the traditional 9-day gun deer season through Dec. 31. The proposal to make this extended season permanent was supported by the Wisconsin Conservation Congress and the legislature, and was made permanent starting with the 2011 fall season. This year, the extended season will run from Nov. 26 through Dec. 31 in Turkey Management Zones 1-5 ONLY.

Ruffed grouse

Ruffed grouse populations in Wisconsin appear to be entering a downswing, according to this spring's drumming survey results. Ruffed grouse populations are known to boom and bust over an 8-11 year period, and the index that the state uses to track ruffed grouse numbers decreased statewide by 25 percent between 2011 and 2012. This decrease isn't a surprise, as Wisconsin was overdue for the expected downturn, but weather conditions in the spring were excellent for nesting and brood-rearing, and should mean a good year for reproduction. First-year birds may therefore help offset the cyclic downturn in numbers, and hunters can expect good hunting again during the 2012 season.

"A lot of factors may be involved in the grouse cycle, perhaps most importantly the periodic invasion of northern raptors during the winter months," said Scott Walter, WDNR upland wildlife ecologist. "Harvest does not play a role. Research has shown that over 30 percent of a grouse population can be harvested without impacting future numbers, as most of these grouse would not have survived to breed the following spring anyway. Hunters should enjoy their time in the field with friends, and look forward to the next upswing in the cycle."

Hunters are encouraged to explore new areas of good cover in order to enjoy a successful hunt. "In years of relatively lower grouse abundance, there are still birds out there, but they tend to be concentrated in the best cover available. Areas of marginal cover that may have held grouse the past couple of years may not in the near future. Exploring the best cover you can find - dense young aspen stands intermixed with conifers and berryproducing shrubs, for example - will really be the key to success during the next couple of years. You need to get out there and look for them. Walking the same trails you have in recent years may not yield the same results," added Walter.

Turkey hunters are reminded of the blaze orange requirement for ground blinds on DNR lands during any gun deer season (please see page 9 of the 2012 Wisconsin Small Game Hunting Regulations for more information). Ground blinds on DNR lands left unattended during legal hunting hours must also have the owner's name and address or DNR Customer ID Number attached near the door opening. Ground blinds may not be left out overnight and must be removed entirely from the property at the close of hunting hours each day. Please note that these ground blind rules do not apply to ground blinds being used for hunting waterfowl or to blinds built only out of natural vegetation found on the DNR property, except that all waterfowl blinds situated on state-owned property and used in hunting waterfowl must always bear the name of the owner affixed permanently to the blind in lettering oneinch square or larger, even when a person is using the blind.

Grouse and turkey hunters should also note that during any gun or muzzleloader deer season, including the October 6-7 youth deer hunt, antlerless hunts, and CWD hunts (see the 2012 Wisconsin Deer Hunting Regulations for season dates), blaze orange clothing is required. A hat, if worn, must be at least 50 percent blaze orange.

Grouse hunters encouraged to "Be HIP!" if they also plan to pursue woodcock, mourning doves or other migratory game birds

Upland hunters that may harvest woodcock are reminded of the federal requirement to be registered with the Harvest Information Program (HIP) before hunting these and other migratory game birds. Registration is free and is available through all license vendors as well as online; hunters will only need to answer a few short questions. To learn more about HIP, visit http://dnr.wi.gov and search for "Harvest Information Program." Hunters who pursue both ruffed grouse and woodcock are also reminded that the woodcock season doesn't open until Sept. 22, although the ruffed grouse season in Zone A is open starting Sept. 15.

Though not a requirement for hunting ruffed grouse, federal rules do require that hunters use a plugged shotgun limited to holding 3 shells when hunting migratory game birds such as woodcock. These are both important points to remember even if you may only harvest woodcock opportunistically. Only non-toxic shot may be possessed for hunting game birds and animals, including grouse and wild turkeys, on federal Waterfowl Production Areas, Horicon National Wildlife Refuge, Necedah National Wildlife Refuge, and Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuges. Hunters are required to use non-toxic shot while hunting snipe and rail, and while hunting mourning dove on DNR-managed land. Hunters are encouraged to use non-toxic shot for mourning dove on private lands as well as for hunting woodcock.

"Continental breeding surveys that have been ongoing for 57 years reported record high numbers of ducks this spring. However, even with excellent continental breeding indications, local water levels and scouting will be the most important factors when pursuing ducks this fall, Van Horn said. "Though many areas are still dry, these conditions have promoted excellent growth of wetland vegetation. This means if water levels rise, migrating waterfowl will find plentiful food on the landscape. Wisconsin is fortunate to have 15,000 lakes and many miles of large rivers that will provide water for fall migrating ducks even during dry conditions."

Many of the ducks harvested in Wisconsin come from birds that breed in the state's wetlands. The four most abundant ducks in Wisconsin's fall hunting harvest are mallards, wood ducks, green-winged teal, and blue-winged teal, Van Horn said.

The daily bag limit is six ducks in total, not to include more than four mallards of which only one may be a Wisconsin is available by searching for "waterfowl" on the hen, three wood ducks, one black duck, two redheads, four DNR website dnr.wi.gov.

scaup, two pintail, and one canvasback. The daily bag limit for mergansers is five to include no more than two hooded mergansers. The daily bag limit for coot is 15.

The duck hunt in the northern zone opens at 9 a.m. Sept. 22 and continues through Nov. 4 followed by a five-day split (closure) from Nov. 5-9. This Monday through Friday closure to the duck and goose seasons was proposed by hunters during the public involvement process in order to extend the end of the north zone duck season to Nov. to allow for late season hunting, Van Horn

"According to harvest data about 90 percent of the duck harvest in the north zone is over by Nov. 1, so the remaining hunters are those that are very passionate about duck hunting and this change came from those hunters. We will see how this season goes and we can decide next year if the hunters would like to continue with this change," he said.

The Mississippi River zone also opens on Sept. 22nd and runs through Sept. 30, followed by a 12-day split, reopening on Oct. 13 and running until Dec. 2. Aside from opening day in each respective zone, hunting hours begin 30 minutes before sunrise. The southern zone duck season will open at 9 a.m. on Sept. 29, run through Oct. 7, and then close and reopen Oct. 13 through Dec. 2

"As always, hunters who do the early legwork scouting for good wetland conditions and observing what areas birds are using -- will be the ones having the best hunt. Hunter survey data in Wisconsin show that duck hunters who scouted three or more times harvested an average of 14.7 ducks while those who did not scout harvested an average of 4.8 ducks per season," Van Horn

Licenses and stamps required include a Wisconsin small game license, a Wisconsin waterfowl stamp and a federal migratory bird stamp. The \$15 federal stamp can be purchased at a U.S. Post Office. Hunters will also have the option of purchasing the federal stamp privilege at license vendors for an additional \$2.50 surcharge. The purchase will be noted on their license, but the stamp itself will arrive weeks later in the mail.

Waterfowl and other migratory bird hunters must also register each year with the federal Harvest Information Program (HIP), which places them on a list of hunters that may receive a mailing asking them to provide a summary of their harvest. HIP registration is free and can be done at the time hunters purchases their licenses, but can always be added later on if a hunter decides they may pursue migratory game birds.

State licenses and stamps, permits, and HIP registration are also available through Wisconsin's Online Licensina Center.

More than 20,000 apply for Wisconsin wolf hunting license

A total of 20,272 people have submitted applications for the drawing for a gray wolf hunting or trapping license for Wisconsin's first wolf season in more than 60 years. It is scheduled to begin Oct. 15. There were 19.788 applications from Wisconsin residents and 486 from non-residents.

The state Natural Resources Board approved a guota of up to 201 wolves that could be harvested during the first season, 85 of which are reserved for Native American Indian tribes within the ceded territory of northern Wisconsin.

The Department of Natural Resources plans to issue 1,160 licenses for the 2012-13 season. Those permits will be awarded by random choice in a drawing that will be held this week. Successful applicants will be notified by letter and then be able to purchase a wolf harvest license for \$100 for residents and \$500 for nonresidents.

The DNR received nonresident applications from people in 38 other states from Maine to California and Alaska to Texas, with the largest numbers from Illinois (179) and Minnesota (102).

Applicants who are not successful in the drawing will be awarded a preference point toward future drawings.

Starting with the 2013-14 season, one half of available permits will be issued randomly among all permit applications and the second half will be issued through a cumulative preference point drawing.

Dane County Circuit Court Judge Peter Anderson last month temporarily blocked wolf hunters from using dogs or training dogs to hunt wolves while he considers the lawsuit. A DNR motion to dismiss the case is scheduled to be heard on Sept. 14.

As a result of this ruling, the Department of Natural Resources is advising people that the use of dogs for tracking and trailing of wolves is not authorized when hunting wolves under a wolf harvesting license. Also, the use of dogs for training to track or trail free ranging wolves is not authorized at this time. As this is a temporary injunction, the injunction on the use of dogs for wolf hunting and training could be lifted at a future date.
