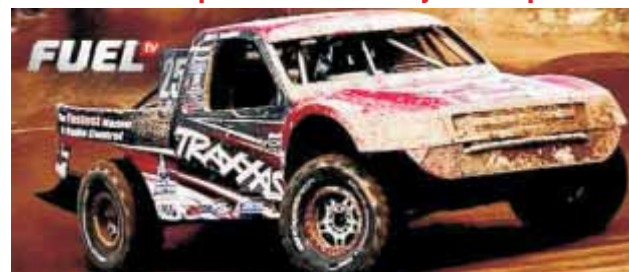

Clyde Sundberg Carvings on Display

This month the Crandon Public Library's David Brezovar display case highlights the beautiful wood carvings of a long time Crandon resident, Clyde Sundberg. Clyde was a self-taught, jackknife carver who moved his family to the Crandon area in 1946 and was a game warden for 35-years. The pieces on display are intricately carved from a single piece of wood and include "framed" pictures, a cant hook, a lumber-jack baby rattle, ducks, including one carved of sumac wood, and an open hand-fan which is carved in the open position and a must-see. The fan is of particular interest as the keeper of the collection, Bill Sundberg, mentioned that Clyde, his father, was taught to bend wood from a local native American. We would like to thank Bill for sharing his father's collection with the community.

Townsend Flowage Assoc. meets

 Ninety members of the Townsend Flowage Association squeezed into the Townsend Town Hall on Saturday, September 4, 2012. Most of those in attendance were there to hear an update on the drawdown of Reservoir Pond, McCauslin Brook, and the Townsend Flowage. The water levels of all three bodies of water are being lowered four to six feet in order to facilitate repairs of the Reservoir Pond Dam and to assist in the eradication of invasive species on all three waterways. A lengthy discussion seemed to answer all pertinent questions and concerns.

Another important item of business was to approve the expenditure of \$86,000 to purchase a newer (lightly used) weed harvester. Half of that amount will be covered by a DNR grant.

It was also noted that volunteers had logged 228 man hours this summer to harvest 165 loads of aquatic vegetation, almost triple the amount cut in 2011. The estimated weight of each load is 24,000 pounds of weeds (wet). Members also reported that preliminary results show no zebra mussels found in traps installed by volunteers at various points in the Townsend Flowage.

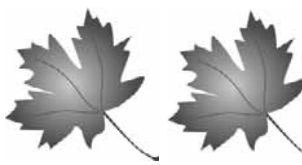

The town of Lincoln has been working towards a new town hall and garage. At a meeting on June 9, 2012, the building committee was granted permission to move forward with a plan to build. The electors of the Town of Lincoln granted the committee \$600,000 with a \$60,000 contingency to build on the current site on County Highway W.

The building committee then investigated all the possible directions to go when building. They sent request for bids to architects, general contractors, and construction managers. The committee felt that an architect and design group was the best option for the town. They hired Raash Architects and Design and hired Bayland Builders LLC as a general contractor.

The groundbreaking took place on Wednesday September 12. The building will be completed around the beginning of February, 2013. The finished project will be a 7800 square foot building. 4200 square feet will be a three stall garage. The rest will be used for offices and a small community center to be used for gatherings, town meetings and elections. Construction will start in the beginning of October.

The green outbuilding behind the existing town hall is scheduled to be moved. The person moving the building needs to have a permit out of Madison and is still waiting to receive it. The committee called Madison and asked about the permit and they believe that the permit will be mailed to them soon and that the building will be moved in a week or so.

A citizen asked about the budget. The committee explained that as bids came in, they would adjust where they needed to and that they will come in under the \$600,000 budget with a \$60,000 contingency. Jack Kloss and Wayne Dual are painting the inside of the building and this will save about \$10,000. Wayne is also keeping an expenditure sheet for the committee. This sheet will have all of the bills that the town will incur during the building process. If something comes in over budget, the committee will make changes to stay under the budget. The committee did state that they are safe in saying that the project will be under budget.

Another citizen asked how the town will handle the payments to the different companies that are working on the building. The committee stated that every job will be bid out. Everybody will get a chance to bid. The winning bid will receive the job and 10 percent of the payment will be held until the completion of the bid job.

The next meeting will be scheduled for the beginning of October and will be posted at the grocery store, dump and town hall.

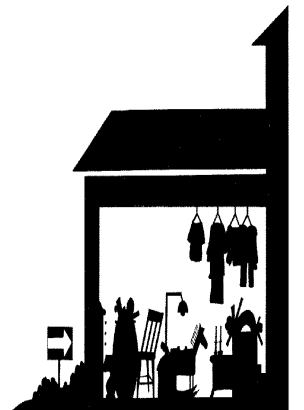

Insured families should schedule children's vaccinations with physicians starting Oct. 1st

Beginning October 1, families with health insurance will need to schedule their children's vaccination appointments with their health care provider rather than at local health departments, state health officials confirmed this week. A recent change in federal policy requires state-supplied vaccines to be targeted to children not covered by insurance.

Due to the state's widespread pertussis (whooping cough) outbreak, state-supplied pertussis vaccines will still be provided to any child visiting a local health department, regardless of whether they have insurance coverage, and state-supplied seasonal influenza vaccine will also be available to all children during the 2012-2013 flu season.

"All families will still be able to access these essential services," said Karen McKeown, Wisconsin Division of Public Health administrator. "Families with insurance that covers vaccinations should schedule appointments with their family physician, and those without insurance, or whose insurance does not cover immunizations, can still visit their local health departments to immunize their children."

Parents are encouraged to contact their insurance company if they are uncertain whether their insurance covers vaccinations.

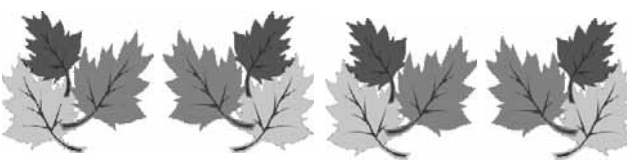
Children eligible for the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program, which provides publicly-purchased vaccines to children enrolled in or eligible for Medicaid and BadgerCare, and Native Americans and Alaskans aged 18 and younger, can continue to receive immunizations from participating public and private healthcare providers.

McKeown noted that immunization is the best way to protect children from many diseases that are potentially harmful and sometimes deadly, and encouraged parents to make sure children are up-to-date on their immunizations. Waterfowl Hunting and Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS)
 Waterfowl hunting is once again upon us. The sound of gunfire is once again filling the early morning air. Many people associate aquatic invasive species with summertime recreational activities such as boating and fishing. The truth is waterfowl hunters can spread aquatic invasive species just as easily. You may be thinking how can this be the case? Let me explain.
 Many waterfowl hunters still use boats to reach their hunting destination. When it is time to leave, these boats are often covered with aquatic vegetation. The vegetation is often inside the boat and hanging on the trailer itself. Remember Eurasian water milfoil spreads by fragmentation and it only takes a couple of inches to spread into a new waterbody. In a lot of cases water will also be inside the boat. Young zebra mussels, spiny water fleas, or the fish disease Viral Hemorrhagic Septicemia (VHS) can be held in water. Just like during the summer all water must be drained and all vegetation must be removed from the boat and trailer prior to leaving the landing. There are actually a couple more steps or places

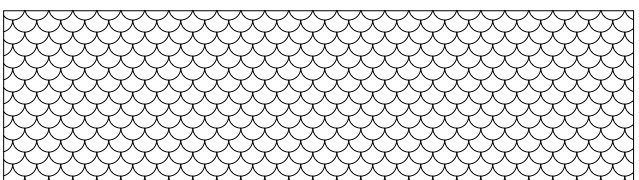

Beware of This Utility Bill Assistance Scam

Thousands of Americans have fallen victim to a fast-moving scam that claims to be part of an Obama administration program to help pay utility bills in the midst of a scorching summer.

The scheme has spread quickly across the nation in recent weeks with help from victims who unwittingly shared it on social media sites before realizing they had been conned out of personal information such as Social Security, credit card and checking account numbers.

People from all corners of the country report being duped, from New Jersey to California, Wisconsin to Florida, and all parts in between. The scam benefits from being cleverly executed and coming at a time when air conditioners in much of the country are running around the clock to tame record-high temperatures.

The Madison Water Utility issued a warning for its customers about the scam. The scam claims Obama administration will provide credits or apply a payment of \$1,000 to utility bills through a new stimulus program. The scam tells customers a new federal program will pay for utility bills, if they give their personal information, including their Social Security numbers. The victims are given fake bank information to use when they pay their bills online.

Wisconsin's Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection reported several calls Thursday.

"Earlier this summer, late spring, we heard about this for the first time," said Sandy Chalmers, of DATCP. "They're becoming more and more complex and they involved more money, and people have a lot to lose."

Utility officials said they do not make unsolicited phone calls, texts or e-mails asking for customers' personal information. Payments using the fraudulent bank routing number will not be accepted by the Madison Water Utility and payments cannot be applied to customers' bills.

Consumer Protection officials said they adamantly advise consumers to keep their Social Security numbers and other person information private. If customers have fallen victim to this scam, they should call the Wisconsin Consumer Protection hotline at (608) 224-4953.

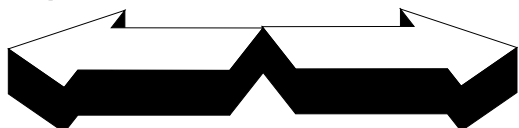

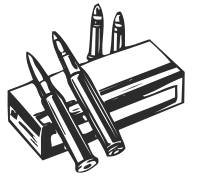

The Good, the Bad and Ugly in Forest County Lakes and Streams

By Kaylea Clark, 6th Grade, Laona

The good: There's lots of fish. The good in Forest County lakes are our natural resources like clean water, trees and sand.

The bad and ugly: People not following the law about cleaning boats. People throw garbage in the lakes then seagulls eat it and die or after fishing, they leave their bobbers on the ground and animals eat it. They also leave string on the ground and animals get tangled in it and they can't get away and they die.

I think we should clean our boats and should pick up our garbage. We should also take care of our lakes because we are killing lots of fish and other animals.

I love summer because we get to go camping and swimming and I want to be able to swim in clear water.

The good: There's almost nothing more relaxing than sitting by the edge of the beautiful lake, watching the waterfowl drift gently by, and perhaps taking a swim or a boat ride. However, when algae reaches high levels, it can make a normally pleasant experience much less so.

The bad and ugly: We've probably all seen it. Green scum in the water. A funky smell comes from it. Algae in a lake is usually a good thing. Most other life in the lake depend on it for food, oxygen production and the nutrient cycle. However, too much algae can be a problem. Algae blooms are not only ugly and sometimes stinky, they can also use up dissolved oxygen and cause fish kills, stop the growth of other plants by shading, clog intake pipes and sometimes even release poisons into the water. Blue-green algae can be particularly bothersome since it tends to accumulate rapidly. It's toxic.

So what causes algae to get to high levels? Lots of nutrients entering the lake from the surrounding water provides too much food for algae, allowing them to grow out of control.

What can we do to keep our lakes clean from algae: Have our septic tanks pumped, inspected at least every three years and use less fertilizer on your lawn. Repair eroded shore lines, driveways or steep slopes on your property. When it rains, the bare soil carrying the bad particles is washed into the lake.

Simple food safety tips for packing school lunches

Keep food safety in mind as you prepare your child's school lunch, says Terri Miller, University of Wisconsin-Extension Nutrition Coordinator. Miller has some recommendations for packing a safe lunch.

--Make sure your hands, food preparation surfaces and utensils are clean. Use hot, soapy water to help remove bacteria. Keep family pets away from food preparation areas and off kitchen counters. And encourage your children to always wash their hands before they eat or help you in the kitchen.

--Wash fruits and vegetables before packing them in your child's lunch. Rinse them under running tap water, including those with skins and rinds that are not eaten. Blot dry with a paper towel before packing. Be sure to keep cut or sliced fruits cold. Sliced peaches or bananas, or other light-colored fruit, will benefit from dipping in lemon juice or sprinkling with a commercial anti-browning preparation to keep them looking their best.

--Keep hot foods (soup, chili, stew) hot by using an insulated bottle. Fill the bottle with boiling water and let it stand for a few minutes. Empty the bottle and then fill it with piping hot food. Keep the bottle closed until lunchtime. Discard leftovers that arrive home in the insulated bottle at the end of the school day.

--Cold foods should stay cold. If you pack a cold lunch and store in the refrigerator the night before, it will stay cool longer the next morning. Insulated, soft-sided lunch totes can help keep perishable foods chilled; simply add a cold source, such as a small frozen gel pack or frozen juice box. Any perishable food (meat, poultry or egg sandwiches, or dairy products) not eaten at lunch should be discarded.

--Sometimes a field trip will require that lunch be packed in a brown paper sack. When that is the case, opt for non-perishable foods such as peanut butter or cheese sandwiches, crackers, or packaged pudding or fruit. A frozen juice box will serve as a disposable cold source and should be thawed and ready to drink by lunchtime.

And speaking of containers, resist the urge to reuse plastic sandwich or bread bags when packing school lunches, Miller says. Bacteria can spread from one product to another, increasing the chance of spoilage or illness.



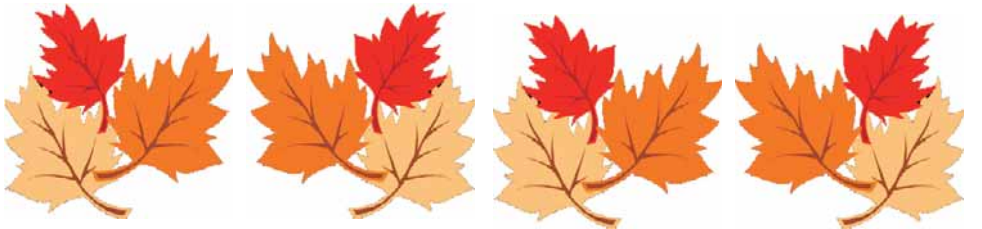
