

Gary Zimmer, the Ruffed Grouse Society's (RGS) coordinating biologist, was appointed to the Wisconsin Natural Resources Board by Governor Scott Walker during a forestry industry tour of northern Wisconsin on April 5, 2013.

'Gary has had a long and distinguished career, and his knowledge will be a huge asset. By joining the Board, Gary will be able to advocate for good sustainable ways to manage our forests," Gov. Walker said when making the announcement.

When learning of Zimmer's appointment, RGS President and CEO John B. Eichinger said, "This appointment by Governor Walker is a great tribute to Gary's knowledge and experience and reflects positively on the work of the Ruffed Grouse Society in the state of Wisconsin."

Having worked for the U.S. Forest Service for 18 years in addition to his time as coordinating biologist for RGS, Zimmer has a long history of forestry and wildlife conservation.

I feel I can offer a lot to the Board," Zimmer responded in accepting the appointment," Zimmer said, adding, "for the last 34 years, I have been dealing with Wisconsin natural resources issues on a daily basis, and as my professional career is coming to a close, I see no better way to give back to the citizens and natural resources of this State,".

"I was contacted by several individuals, including some legislators, who felt I should consider applying for the position. 





#### Keep grocery bags from toppling in the trunk



#### It takes a community to raise a child

The title of this article is a phrase attributed to an old African proverb. Its exact origin seems to be lost in time. In 1994 children's author Ms. Jane Cowen-Fletcher released her book, published by Scholastic Press, and the title, It Takes A Village, shares the story about a young African girl who searches for her younger brother, only to find the rest of the village has also been watching over him as well. Right here in Forest County we are moving quickly in a positive atmosphere in partnership with the National 4-H Youth Mentoring Program, the Office of Juvenile Justice Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) and the University of Wisconsin. Recently the Sokaogon Mole Lake Indian community has joined in and has engaged both adult mentor volunteers and Mole Lake youth. The focus shall be on a series of positive activities, which shall soon be implemented. The activities under the heading of 4-H, are so designed as to steer young people away from the possibilities associated with juvenile delinquency.

Associate Attorney General Tom Perrelli announced the Attorney General's Task Force on Children Exposed to Violence on October 13, 2011. This Task Force is part of the Attorney General's Defending Childhood Initiative, a project that addresses the epidemic levels of exposure to violence faced by our nation's children. Based on the testimony at four public hearings, on comprehensive research, and on extensive input from experts, advocates, and impacted families and communities nationwide, the Defending Childhood Task Force has issued a report to the Attorney General presenting its findings and comprehensive policy recommendations in the fall of 2012. The report will serve as a blueprint for preventing children's exposure to violence and for reducing the negative effects experienced by children across the United States.

A 2009 DOJ (Department of Justice) study showed that more than 60 percent of the children surveyed were exposed to violence within the past year either directly or indirectly. Sixty percent of American children were exposed to violence, crime, or abuse in their homes, schools, and communities. Almost 40 percent of American children were direct victims of two or more violent acts, and one in ten were victims of violence five or more times. Whether as victims or witnesses to violence, this exposure is often associated with long-term physical, psychological, and emotional harm. A higher risk of engaging in criminal behavior later in life and becoming part of a cycle of violence is also of great concern. Children are more likely to be exposed to violence and crime than adults. Almost one in ten American children saw one family member assault another family member, and more than 25 percent had been exposed to family violence during their life. A child's exposure to one type of violence increases the likelihood that the child will be exposed to other types of violence and exposed multiple times. These children are more likely to abuse drugs and alcohol; suffer from depression, anxiety, and posttraumatic disorders; fail or have difficulty in school; and become delinquent and engage in criminal behavior.

In 2011, guns were used to murder 8,583 people living in the U.S., according to the most recent FBI data available. Among those murdered by guns, there were 565 young people under the age of 18, and 119 children ages 12 or younger -- the latter number nearly equivalent to six Newtown mass shootings. And these figures include only homicides

Therefore in an effort to prevent the potential of juvenile delinquency locally, a group of Mole Youth ages 10 thru 17 who have expressed an interest will become active in a variety of positive and stimulating activities. The current list of four activities includes the art of layout, design and construction of traditional Native Powwow dance regalia. Each youth will create an individually designed dance outfit by cutting, sewing and stitching the various materials and components necessary so as to be able to wear their outfit at Powwows. An introduction to the sport of golf will also take place at golf courses in both Pickerel and Laona, Wisconsin. An exciting and educational remote control car racing club will also be established whereby each participant will receive a remote control car, at a reduced cost as part of a grant. Each youth will be required to assemble a "build your own" car kit and then compete on a regular basis at a Crandon remote control racetrack. The building process will provide the important knowledge and skills necessary to also be able to fix the car when necessary. And fourth, a community organic garden, in concert with the Sokaogon Chippewa Environmental Protection Department, will be established in Mole Lake.

A community garden has the potential to offer these young participants a variety of unique learning experiences, thereby enabling these young people to gain valuable "hands-on" capabilities along with the satisfaction of watching the fruits of their labor materialize. "With the magnitude of the many possible juvenile delinquency distractions facing our youth today; it's a community's responsibility to help raise its children and it has to start now and it must include positive activities and experiences."

#### Visitors to Wisconsin State Parks reminded parks open to hunting in April.

MADISON - Visitors to Wisconsin State Parks are being reminded they may encounter hunters on park properties this April, under a new state law that went into effect this year.

There are limited hunting opportunities available in April, mainly spring turkey hunting, according to Scott Loomans, hunting regulations specialist for the Department of Natural Resources.

While the parks are also open for trapping, the only open trapping season is for beaver and otter north of Highway 64. Beaver and otter traps are placed underwater and otter trapping is allowed by permit only.

"The primary reason the board approved opening the parks to hunting in April was for the spring turkey season, and the parks are only open for the first three of the six spring turkey hunting periods," Loomans said. The spring turkey season opens April 10, and the third period runs through April 30.

There were previously 16 state park properties open to the spring turkey hunting season by special permit only, and those 16 remain open only to those hunters who have a park-specific permit to hunt on those properties. Special permits for these 16 park are issued through the same permit application process as permits for regular turkey zones. Hunters had to apply for those permits by the Dec. 10 application deadline, and all available permits for state park units were issued through the application process, so there are no general state parks zone permits

While hunting and trapping would also be allowed in state parks for unprotected species such as opossums, skunks and weasels, there is very little hunting or trapping conducted for theses except to deal with animal nuisance problems, Loomans said.

available for over-the-counter sales.

The Legislature approved Sporting Heritage Bill, Wisconsin Act 168 in 2012. The law is intended to expand and outdoor recreation opportunities and make it easier for people to participate in hunting, trapping and fishing. Among other things Act 168 provided first-time hunters,



anglers and trappers discounts on licenses; provided incentives for people who recruit others to buy licenses; increased safety education; and expanded hunting opportunities and opened park properties to trapping for the first time.

Under its authority under Act 168 to restrict hunting in parks for safety reasons, the state Natural Resources Board limited hunting in the spring from April 1 through the Tuesday nearest May 3. This year that is April 30. In the fall, gun and archery hunting and trapping are allowed in the open areas of the property from Nov. 15 through Dec. 15, except that archery hunting is allowed through the Sunday nearest Jan. 6.

Hunting is only allowed within the parks in areas designated as open. Closed areas include within 100 feet of designated use areas, such as parking lots, campgrounds and picnic areas, as well as within 100 feet of certain trails. Additional areas within parks may be closed due to safety concerns. Also some state parks have property that is within municipal boundaries where the discharge of firearms is prohibited.

"It is each hunter's responsibility to know what areas within a park are open to hunting and which areas are closed," Loomans said. Maps indicating closed and open areas are available on the DNR website (search for keywords "hunting state parks"), at park offices, and they will be posted at parking areas and other locations within parks.

Visitors should note that some current state park signs still indicate that hunting and trapping is prohibited on state park properties. Park managers around the state are in the process of removing the outdated signs but some will likely still be in place when the spring turkey season opens April 10.

#### Elk population still growing but no hunt in 2013

MADISON -- After reviewing all available information on Wisconsin elk, state wildlife officials and several key partners recently agreed that the elk herd has not grown to a sufficient size to support a hunt this year.

The Department of Natural Resources recently hired a deer and elk research scientist who provided a full analysis of 18 years of elk information, from their reintroduction to now, to develop a long-term population estimating model. This model, along with input from other wildlife experts, tribes, and partner groups led to the decision to postpone Wisconsin's first elk hunt.

"There are many positive and exciting things happening in the elk program that we believe will help the herd continue to increase," said Kevin Wallenfang, big game ecologist who heads up the elk management program for the DNR. "The long-term success of the herd is the priority. But we realize this decision will be a disappointment for those hopeful that this would be the year for the first hunt."

According to state law, a Wisconsin elk hunt may not take place until the population surpasses 200 animals. Located near Clam Lake in Ashland County, the herd has seen moderate growth since the release of 25 elk in 1995.

"While we'd have liked to see a hunt finally happen, this does not affect other plans to help the herd prosper, which may include bringing in additional elk," Wallenfang said. "We've already seen the many benefits that having elk creates, and hope to move ahead with expanding those benefits."

As part of a recently revised elk management plan [PDF], the Natural Resources Board approved recommendations to bring additional wild animals into Wisconsin from a willing donor state. Those plans received strong public support and, if they come to fruition will help accelerate herd growth, spread animals across a wider area of their range, and start a second herd in Jackson County near Black River Falls.

"There remains strong public support for establishing wild elk in Wisconsin and our partners remain committed to the long-term success of the elk reintroduction program," said Wallenfang.



#### Late winter takes a toll on owl population

MADISON, Wis. - This year's long winter is having an impact on owls in Wisconsin, including three species of rare owls that have come down from the boreal forest north of the U.S. border.

Every few years, there is a crash in the populations of small rodents that forces owls to move south in search of food. That is exactly what has happened this year and because of it, Wisconsin is becoming a temporary home to three species not normally seen here: the northern hawk owl, the great gray owl and the boreal owl.

To see these three species in the state is rare, yet they've been spotted in Door, Ashland, Douglas and as far south as Racine and Kenosha Counties. A great grey owl is currently being seen at the Capital Brewery in downtown Middleton.

"Unfortunately, long winters and early springs, coupled with unfamiliar landscapes, increased roads and other risk factors, have taken a toll on some of these rare visitors," explained Ryan Brady, natural resources research scientist with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. "Great grey owls and northern hawk owls are prone to vehicle collisions as they hunt over roadside ditches. Boreal owls may begin hunting by daylight to find food, and may turn to backyard bird feeding stations in hopes of finding mice attracted to spilled seed."

The DNR is interested in learning more about where these birds are seen, regardless of whether they are alive. Should you see a great grey, northern hawk, or boreal owl, you are encouraged to fill out a rare bird sighting form (http://wsobirds.org/?page id=3208) on the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology's website. Please note the species name, location, date, and any other information you can provide about the sighting. The information will be used to better track the movement of these birds and will help biologists better understand ways that we can be a good "host" to these special visitors.

terminal apron to aid with emergency nighttime Medical Evacuation (Medevac) operations and overall terminal security.

The project was awarded the outstanding airprt project for the year 2012.

One of the City's stipulations for the project was to have the airport re-opened in time for the annual Brush run off-road racing event in Crandon. Held on Labor Day weekend. The event brings competitors from all over the world and has a significant financial impact on the local community. Airport traffic increased considerably during the week leading up to the event due to the impact of this event, project bidding documents indicated a required Substantial Completion date of Aug. 24, 2012, one week prior to Labor Day.

Pitlik & Wick, Inc. was selected as the Prime Contractor for the project. Work began on July 10, 2012. Over the subsequent weeks, Pitlik & Wick completed all earthwork and sub grade preparations for the new pavement areas, and pulverization and fine grading of all existing pavement areas. Excess pulverized asphaltic material was strategically used as base course for the new pavement areas.

George Luey was the construction superintendent and Jeff Anderson was the foreman for Pitlick and Wick during the non-paving operations. Brad Pitlik was superintendent of paving operations. Matt Malicki was the Bureau of Aeronautics project engineer. Brent Dahl was the resident engineer and Marijean Hoppe was the project manager for Becher Hippe Associated. Asphalt testing services were provided by Tony Rosling of Quest Civil Engineers. Weekly progress reports and inspections were made by Mayor Rob Jaegar, Crandon Airport Commission members Steve Conway, Norm Knoll and Bill Bates and Mike Smith, City Maintenance Supervisor.

The Crandon Project was considered with six other airport projects as the outstanding project of the year and the award was received early in 2013.

#### 5 Ways to Save Your Brain

Is Alzheimer's preventable? Some experts say yes. Lifestyle changes could reduce the prevalence of the disease by 25 percent, according to research presented at last year's Alzheimer's Association International Conference. And even experts who disagree note that all these behavioral changes are still smart health bets.

Get head to toe healthy. Diabetes, depression and heart disease have all been linked to increased risk of Alzheimer's. The very same cholesterol plaques and inflamed blood vessels that clog your heart, for example, also clog the arteries that carry blood and oxygen to your brain. "Reduced blood supply to the brain can be a huge determinant of who gets Alzheimer's disease and when they develop symptons," says P. Murali Doraiswamy, M.D., professor of psychiatry and geriatrics at Duke University Institute for Brain Sciences and coauthor of The Alzheimer's Action Plan (St. Martin's Griffin). Now's the time to commit to keeping your weight down, your stress in check and your cholesterol, glucose and blood pressure at optimal levels by engaging in regular aerobic exercise. You should also embrace a heart=healthy diet that's heavy on fresh produce (like berries, which studies have shown promote brain health), fatty fish (rich in omega-3 fatty acids, which may protect against mental disorders) and whole grains but light on saturated fats, red meat and highly processed foods.

Protect your crown. Alzheimer's disease is believed to be caused by plaques and tangles of protein in the brain, which essentially interrupt brain circuitry and reduce memory function. Injuries to the brain - even microtraumas that may result in only a short loss of consciousness or state of confusion - add further "dead"



zones" to the brain and make it that much more vulnerable. Bottom line: You, your husband and the kids should always wear your seat belt and use a helmet whenever you skate, bike, ski or participate in an activity where head injury is a risk. Enforce those rules with the whole family.

Step out of your comfort zone. One of the major discoveries in the field of brain science is that even as we age, we can stimulate the growth of new brain cells and bolster our brain circuitry. Those extra connections act like a "cognitive reserve" that your brain can turn to when other cells die off or become deadened by injury or Alzheimer's plaques. "To most effectively stimulate and strengthen connections in the brain, you have to engage in activities that are challenging, new and take you off automatic pilot," says Doraiswamy. If you're a numbers person, consider doing crosswords. If you're a word person, perhaps take up bridge. You might even pick up one of the many software programs, like Posit Science or Lumosity, that are designed to boost your memory and overall cognitive skills.


Socialize Regularly. In a study of people over 50, those with larger social networks showed smaller declines in memory as they aged. Doraiswamy explains that this may be because social individuals tend to engage in more brain-boosting mental and physical activities and may have stronger brain circuitry, plus socializing may reduce the negative effect of stress on the brain. Even if you're not the belle-of-the-ball type, make an effort to get out with others. Join an exercise class or a book group, or pass up that solitary walk with Rufus for an hour with other pup lovers at your local dog park.


Find solutions. Writing lists, using a BlackBerry calendar and slowing yourself down so you can pay attention aren't like wearing a girdle: They don't cause your memory to atrophy by providing support. "Even the best memory champions write things down when they don't want to take the chance of forgetting something.," says Doraiswamy. Head to the bookstore to pick up a self-help book that offers memory -boosting strategies.



#### State fire and recycling officials recommend people seek alternatives to burning

MADISON – This spring state environmental officials are recommending options such as recycling and composting to replace open burning of trash and yard debris, alternatives that can help the economy and also keep dangerous pollutants out of the air. While it is legal to burn some yard waste in certain areas, state forestry officials caution that debris burning is the number one cause of wildfires in Wisconsin, causing about 30 percent of the state's wildfires each year. "Don't let the recent rainfall lull you into complacency," says Catherine Koele, wildfire prevention specialist with the Department of Natural Resources. "Wildfire season is upon us and the weather can change quickly. All it takes is a day or two of dry and windy conditions to elevate the fire danger." Burning trash in Wisconsin is illegal because of its environmental risk. A study by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency found that 15 households burning trash each day emits the same amount of cancer-causing dioxin and furan emissions as a 200-ton-per-day municipal waste incinerator that uses high-efficiency emissions control technology.

"Open burning of any material – plastic, paper or wood – produces a variety of hazardous and toxic air pollutants, including carcinogens such as arsenic, benzene and formaldehyde," said Brad Wolbert, DNR waste and materials management program section chief. "Children and people with asthma are especially harmed by smoke from burning garbage. If you burn trash, you're affecting your health and the environment more than you know."It's also illegal in the state to burn recyclable materials such as glass, plastic, metal containers and clean paper, as well as agricultural and horticultural plastics such as silage film, haylage bags, bale wrap, woven tarps and nursery pots and trays. If these materials cannot be recycled, they should go to a landfill or other legal disposal facility, not a burn barrel or pile.

"Every community has a recycling program for plastic, glass and metal containers, and paper," Wolbert said, "and for yard debris, composting is the best option." Wolbert noted that composting and recycling are the preferred alternatives to burning and provide many additional environmental and economic benefits. Search for "open burning" on the DNR website for more alternatives to burning.

If burning is the only option for yard waste, a burning permit from the DNR is required to burn debris piles or for broadcast burning any time the ground is not completely snow-covered. Permit holders are authorized to burn vegetative materials, such as leaves, brush and pine needles. Permits are designed so that people burn safely when and where the risk of wildfire is minimal.

Customers can obtain permits online or by calling 1-888-WIS-BURN from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. They may also visit their local ranger station or emergency fire warden to receive permits. Once an individual has a burning permit, he or she must call or go online after 11 a.m. on the day of the planned burn to check daily fire restrictions.
