



Message from Mark Charlton ,President of Wisconsin Dual Sport Riders Club

I am President of the Wisconsin Dual Sport Riders Club. We are having our 7th annual the Ride for Research benefitting the UW Carbone Cancer Center. Our ride is to raise money for Breast Cancer research. We will have it June 8th and 9th. John Newton, the heart and soul of our club, started doing this as a way to give back to a part of the state that is economically lagging behind the rest of the state. Many members of the club have family or grew up in the area. The bonus of an event like this is that 200 people get to enjoy over 250 miles of trails and roads over a weekend. The club is sanctioned by the AMA (American Motorcyclist Association). A 100 year old organization dedicated to promoting motorcycling. This is a National event where by people come from all parts of the country to ride our trails dirt roads, old logging roads and roadways in a 100 mile radius of Wabeno, on street legal motorcycles (Dual Sport Bikes) . We will ride about 250 miles over the weekend. All entrants are required to submit to a sound check to ride, (89 DB or less). The research doctors from UW Madison will be talking about breast cancer on Friday night at the Wabeno fairgrounds at 6:30 this is open to the public. I think we can all safely say we will topple the \$100K mark with the UW Carbone Cancer Center this year. That's an awesome accomplishment given that our ride is relatively small compared to other cancer fundraisers. Below are some of the things we have done outside of the Ride for Research, not to mention the businesses we have supported. There has been studies as to the economic impact of rides like this, and we estimate 200 riders and another 200 friends or guests that come will spend about \$60,000.00 to \$80,000.00 on amenities, gas stations, lodging, groceries, restaurants and bars, etc.. Coming into the area in ONE weekend. We have given The St Ambrose youth group of Wabeno a total of \$18,550 over the years and I know they do great things with that money for those kids.



The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water includes rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can, also, come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water stems. "The Forest County Potawatomi Tribe is honored to be involved with such a great event at Crandon," said Gus Frank, Forest County Potawatomi chairman. "We first got involved with off-road racing through Jeff Kincaid and Johnny Greaves. Those two supported us proudly across the nation and our relationship would grow with Crandon and, eventually, the F.C.P.C. Cup race. So it's a great honor to again be involved with such an exciting event as it enters its 20th year summer."

Akin to the steeped tradition of Indianapolis Motor Speedway, off-road racing's version of the "Brickyard" and "Indy 500" takes place at the nation's premier short course racing facility, Crandon International Off-Road Raceway. The first of two major short course off-road events at Crandon round four of the 2013 Traxxas TORC Series, presented by AMSOIL the annual Crandon Brush Run - takes place this weekend, June 29-30.

Some Crandon track info and quick facts:

Crandon's initial track, back in 1970, was a 25mile long loop and racers would run it four times. Barely a quarter of the entrants would finish the entire race.

Since then the short track has gone from 1.75 miles to 1.5, and most recently to 1.25 miles to allow spectators an unimpeded view of the entire track.

Average attendance at the Brush Run is around 10,000 fans per day, whereas Crandon's Labor Day event draws 15,000 fans per day.

The last race of the day is the 20th Annual F.C.P.C. Cup, pitting the top PRO 4x4 trucks versus the top PRO 2WD trucks in a winner-take-all grand finale.

Mopar/Ram's Rob MacCachren has won the F.C.P.C. Cup three times (1995, '00 and '01) and is the defending F.C.P.C. Cup champion.

Crandon's "Land Rush" is off-road short course racing's version of an MX start!

With racers and trucks/buggies, crews and offroad fans converging from all points on the U.S. map, the small logging town of Crandon, (population: 1,961), is awash in activity. And since 1970 the off-road phenomenon has played out in Crandon, making it the nation's longest-running short course off-road competition.

Forest County Veterans with in-process claims: If you receive this letter referenced below from VA, please complete the Certification Letter and if you have any question as to whether you are filling it out correctly please call the Forest CVSO at 715.478.3722 or email me at vetshelp@co.forest.wi.us with questions. If you come into the office without an appointment, I will not be able to see you immediately. I will make an appointment for you to return at a later date.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has identified approximately 190,000 subsequent claims pending initial development. In an effort to expedite the processing of these claims, VA will batch deliver an automated special 38 U.S.C §5103 notice to each identified claimant.

The notice will also provide the claimant the option to have his or her claim expeditiously processed based on the evidence of record.

If the claimant elects this option, he or she will complete and return to VA a specific certification attached to the notice, indicating the election, and, if the claim meets the other requirements, VA will expeditiously process the claim to achieve a timely decision.

The claimant may notify VA of their election by mail (which will be received by the scanning vendor), by logging onto ebenefits, or by calling the VA Benefit Information line.

In Phase 2 and beyond the subsequent notices will be sent approximately every two weeks until the backlog is eliminated.

If you do not have a pending Pension or Service Connected Disability claim submitted more than 180 days ago, you will not receive a letter.

Tricare Young Adult Program

When the Affordable Care Act was signed into law in 2010, one of the most talked about provisions was language that allowed parents to keep their children on their health insurance plans until they turned 26. Although many civilians enjoyed this benefit, the same could not be said when it came to children who were covered under Tricare. the military's plan for service members. WASHINGTON - The Department of Veterans Affairs has launched a new hotline — 1-855-VA-WOMEN to receive and respond to questions from Veterans, their families and caregivers about the many VA services and resources available to women Veterans. The service began accepting calls on April 23, 2013.

Some women Veterans may not know about highquality VA care and services available to them," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki. "The hotline will allow us to field their questions and provide critical information about the latest enhancements in VA services."

The hotline is staffed by knowledgeable VA employees who can provide information about benefits including health care services for women. Callers can be linked to information on claims, education or health care appointments as well as information about VA cemeteries and memorial benefits. Staff can answer urgent questions and provide referrals to homeless and mental health services as well as provide Vet Center information.

Women make up nearly 15 percent of today's active duty military and 18 percent of National Guard and Reserve forces. The population of women Veterans using VA benefits including health care is growing rapidly. Since 2000, the number of women using VA health care more than doubled, from nearly 160,000 in 2000 to more than 354,000 in 2012. Based on the upward trend of women in all branches of service, the number of women Veterans-and female VA users—will keep climbing.

VA is committed to making improvements for the growing population of women Veterans, including the way it communicates with them. In 2010, VA established an outbound call center to contact women Veterans and encourage them to enroll in VA health care.

"In VA health care alone, women constitute only 6 percent of VA patients, but those Veterans have a high perception of the quality care they are receiving," said Irene Trowell-Harris, director of VA's Center for Women Veterans.

"Many women who served don't self-identify as Veterans and therefore don't think they qualify for VA benefits. We need to correct existing misinformation and misperceptions so we can serve more women Veterans with the benefits they've earned."

Women Veterans are entitled to apply for the same benefits as their male counterparts, which include health care and pharmacy benefits as well as education benefits, disability compensation, home loans, employment assistance and more.

would annually send 25% of US timber sales in the forest to area schools.

"Over 1.5 million acres of northern Wisconsin are federal forest and unavailable to fund our schools," Mursau said. "The least we can do is use timber sale income to educate our kids, keep schools open, and keep local employees close to both their workplace and their kid's schools."

Under current law, Wisconsin sends national forest income to local townships. Under Mursau and Swearingen's proposal, town governments will be held whole by a proportional increase in federal payments-inlieu-of-taxes on a per acre basis.

"Our large northern schools have long bus routes, low population density, less property base and all the same education requirements as the rest of Wisconsin schools," Swearingen said. "National forest income will give our kids the resources they need to stay academically competitive with the rest of Wisconsin and the nation."

The Joint Finance Committee is expected to finalize its deliberations this week. The Wisconsin State Legislature expects to finalize all components of the state biennial budget, including national forest income for schools, before June 30th.

Healthy Eating Habits

Simplify your diet. Simplify your diet, don't go overboard with counting calories, and pay more attention to colors and freshness. You can start by adding more fruits and veggies while taking out sugary things like chocolates. Add a salad (full of different color vegetables) to your diet once a day or switch from butter to olive oil when cooking.

Moderation is key. It doesn't matter if you switch to eating healthier fruits and veggies if you still eat them in huge portions. Remember to reduce portion sizes and don't eat them as often. Don't look at certain things as off limits, when you ban certain foods, it is natural to want those foods more, and then feel like a failure if you give in to temptation.

Eat foods high in fiber. Eat foods high in fiber, things like fruits, vegetables, beans, and whole grains. These foods are considered good carbohydrates nutritious, filling, and relatively low in calories. Eat more fish and nuts, which contain healthy unsaturated fats. Substitute olive or canola oil for butter or stick margarine.

Eat your Protein. Protein gives the energy to get up and move and keep moving. A lack of protein in your diet can slow growth, reduce muscle mass, lower immunity, and weaken the heart and respiratory system. A few good sources of protein are red meats, beans, and nuts. Try not to make protein the center of your diet, but to eat a balanced meal with protein, whole grains, and fruits and veggies.

Add Calcium. Calcium builds strong bones and helps keep your body healthy. Recommended calcium levels are 1000 mg per day, 1200 mg if you are over 50 vears old. The best source of calcium is going to come from dairy products such as milk and cheese. Other sources are leafy greens like mustard greens, romaine lettuce, celery, broccoli, fennel, cabbage, summer squash, green beans, and asparagus.

The speaker for the May meeting of the Nicolet AARP Chapter 1191 was Gary Donaldson, the pharmacist from the Nicolet Pharmacy in Lakewood. Gary Donaldson spoke to the AARP group about Medicare and the benefits resulting from the Affordable Care Act commonly referred to as Obamacare. Medicare coverage has not changed much although there are a few provisions of the act which will significantly benefit recipients.

One provision is the elimination of enhanced payments to Medicare Advantage Plans which strengthens the financial future of Medicare by eliminating a program which had very little benefit to recipients but added significant cost to the Medicare program. Another provision is to gradually eliminate the "donut hole" for drug coverage which will reduce cost to enrollees while improving access to care. Some members were skeptical, but it has been shown that too many Medicare recipients quit taking the drugs that they need when they reach the donut hole resulting in expensive care later. Obamacare is a politically sensitive subject and this generated much discussion, but members agreed that statics show the United States in comparison with other industrialized nations has had the highest cost of care and is among the lowest in providing access to healthcare for its citizens. Mr. Donaldson closed the discussion with the announcement that he is now licensed to provide vaccinations at the pharmacy including shingles vaccines for people 50 years and older.

The Nicolet AARP Chapter members attended two special outings in May. The first was a trip to Oconto where several members car-pooled to watch the Machickanee Players perform. Members had a delicious chicken and tips dinner and watched the play "Tally Up," a thoughtful comedy. The second outing was the annual Spring Fling held at Lynda's Sky Harbor in Crivitz. Members enjoyed a delicious meal of chicken and ribs followed by entertainment.

- Whole grain waffles or pancakes and turkey sausage or bacon
- Cold cereal that is high in fiber and low in sugar with low-fat milk, and fresh berries
- Whole-grain toast with peanut butter and a piece of fresh fruit

Sometimes eating actual food in the morning isn't always an enticing thought. Another option is to drink a fruit smoothie made up of fresh fruit, low-fat milk or juice, yogurt, and a scoop of protein powder. Another option may be drinking a meal replacement shake, but make sure to read the label and make sure that any meal replacement shakes has a well-balanced ratio of carbs, protein, and fat.






