## Wisconsin's Managed Forest Law Program; Can It Work For You?

Owning your own piece of forestland is great; getting the tax bill this month, not so great. Wisconsin's Managed Forest Law (MFL) can provide a big property tax benefit to woodland owners. It's not a free ride; there are trade offs to consider that may, or may not, be in line with your goals.

In short, the MFL gives a forest landowner of ten or more eligible acres a substantial property tax benefit in exchange for agreeing to practice sound forestry for a period of 25 or 50 years. There are a lot of details that flesh out this simple concept. I've assisted landowners enrolling in this program since it's inception in 1987. Following are answers to common questions I've received through the years.


1. How much money can I save? Lots. This is the primary reason for considering the MFL. A new entry will be taxed \$10.68 per acre instead of your regular property tax. Example: a wooded forty acre parcel is currently taxed at \$1600 per year. Under the MFL the owner would pay \$427.20; that's a savings of \$1172.80 annually! There is also a yield tax due if and when timber is harvested. This



# The 162nd nine day deer season



Of the 633, 602 gun deer license buyers, Wisconsin welcomed nearly 27,000 new resident hunters to the field based on the number of people who took advantage of discounted licenses for first-time-hunters.

"This year, the traditions of the nine-day were shared with a large cohort of new hunters. I want to thank all the seasoned hunters who encouraged someone new to join in the traditions of their hunt this year, and for those new hunters who took advantage of the opportunity to try hunting," DNR Sec. Cathy Stepp. "I am especially excited to see such a representation of new female hunters.

This year females represented 33 percent of resident adult First Time Gun Deer license buyers and 33 percent of resident First Time Junior Gun Deer license buyers. The number of female hunters aged 10 to 30 increased by 10 percent this year and overall, females made up 10 percent of all deer license sales, going into opening weekend.

Preliminary harvest summary

Cold temperatures opening weekend didn't curb interest in going out hunting, only the ability to stay out hunting. By the second half of the week, hunters found much more favorable conditions and put it to good use.

"It was downright brutal out there early in the week and the opening weekend totals reflected that," said Kevin Wallenfang, DNR big game ecologist who spent most of the week hunting and working in Vilas County. "Feedback from our deer hunter wildlife survey shows that, not surprisingly, hunters themselves felt the weather during the first half of the season ranked the poorest they've seen in the five years that we've done this survey."

This year's preliminary harvest totals indicate a total of 226,582 deer were killed, down 7 percent from 2012's call-in numbers. The preliminary tally showed hunters harvested 97,765 bucks and 128,817 antlerless deer. This compared to 2012 call-in registration figures of





# **Animal Resource Fund**

As our sixth year in operation draws to a close, we reflect on what we have accomplished in 2013, and make plans for doing more for animals in 2014. That's always our goal for each New Year.

It doesn't seem possible that we have been in operation that long, but we resigned from the Humane Society in January of 2008 and almost immediately began our work with A.R.F.

The winter months of this year were long, cold, and found many area pets in great need. Food being number one, we've managed to keep the food pantry well stocked with both dog and cat food and we distributed food to those feeding stray/abandoned/forgotten cats. Schaefer's store once again donated the plastic bags that we re-bag the food in, as well as a discount on the pet food. We assisted many families struggling to meet medical expenses for their sick or injured pets. While we are unable to completely cover extensive bills, we help as much as we possibly can, and never turn anyone away.

Mostly, it has been our hard work that brings in the revenue to keep our program afloat, along with donations from the faithful few that have long-standing ties with our animal welfare programs. Some of our donations come from those whom we have helped with their pets in the past, and they wish to pay-forward.

In May we held our Annual Spring Rummage sale, held at the Nashville Town Hall. The Town of Nashville, who has been an involved advocate for animals, allowed us the use of the hall as they do for all our fund raisers and clinics. The vendors who participate in the Wednesday Flea Markets at the hall were on hand to help with that sale, helping to make it once again a big success.

The last week-end in June found us at work at the Spring Brush Run. We were short a couple of our workers, but Dave Jr. and Sieg Schnappup came to the rescue, with Sieg getting initiated in frying chicken wings - a lot at a time!!

In July we set up at Kentuck day, selling our Kentucky Sweet Tea. Mother Nature threw us a curve on that one with unbelievably cold, miserable weather. Not to be out-done, we switched to hot coffee in midstream, sold a lot, and made the day worthwhile, money-wise, anyway.

Labor Day we were back working at the Brush Run kitchen, with our regulars back with us.

In November, we started a drawing for prizes, starting with a Chili Luncheon (prepared by Lindy Mezei), and Christmas Bazaar. Actually, you still have a chance to win some of our great prizes, while helping the animals. We will be doing our drawings at 2:00 P.M. Wednesday, December11.

# Not Just For Kids

Health News, By Christine Mattheis

From acne to allergies, it's common for adults to develop health problems usually reserved for the 18-and-under set. Fair? No. Fixable? Yes. Find out why you're at risk and

**Lactose Intolerance- Why now?** As you get older, your intestines naturally begin producing less lactase, the enzyme that breaks down lactose. About 60% of adults have trouble digesting dairy. Symptoms - Abdominal pain, flatulence and diarrhea after having milk or other dairy products. Treatment - No need to stop having your daily yogurt or occasional bowl of ice cream with your kids; just take an enzyme replacement like Lactaid before eating. "Be sure to experiment with your dosage at home", suggests Todd Mahr, M.D., a food allergy specialist with Gundersen Lutheran Medical Center in La Crosse, Wisconsin. "If you take too much, you won't have enough dairy in your stomach for it to act upon, and that can cause cramping." You could also explore dairy substitutes like soy milk and coconut milk ice cream.

Acne - Why now? Hormonal fluctuations related to your menstrual cycle and menopause increase the amount of oil the skin produces, as do sleep issues and stress. Symptoms - Adult acne is brought on by hormones, so you're more likely to get pimples on the bottom half of your face - cheeks, chin, mouth - than on your forehead. Treatment - Use over-the-counter cleansers and spot treatment that contain .5% to 2% salicylic acid or 2.5% benzoyl peroxide. (Benzoyl peroxide is available up to 10%, but adult skin is more prone to drying.) "Make an appointment with a dermatologist if your acne doesn't improve or leaves scars," says Family Circle Health Advisory Board member Debra Jaliman, M.D., author of Skin Rules: Trade Secrets from a Top New York Dermatologist (St. Martin's Press). He may recommend an anti-inflammatory gel like Aczone or an acne-bacteria-fighting antibiotic such as Solodyn.

Asthma - Why now? During menopause, rising and falling estrogen levels can cause inflammation in the airways. And some women experience asthma for the first time after a bad cold or the flu. Symptoms - Unlike kids, who usually have intermittent attacks, newly diagnosed adults are likely to deal with problems daily. They include dry cough, especially at night; tightness or pressure in the chest; difficulty breathing; wheezing; and extended colds that go to the chest. Treatment - Some people can get away with using only a fast-acting inhaler but may need to take a daily controller medication as well. "Work with your doctor to create an asthma action plan," suggests Clifford Bassett, M.D., an allergy specialist in New York City.



approximates five percent of the value of the harvest. It's important to consider your specific property tax situation. The preceding example assumes you do not allow public access to your property which leads to the next question.

2. Will I have to let other people hunt on my property? No. On a new entry you can "Close" (restrict access on) up to 160 acres per ownership within a municipality. Some large landowners split their ownership among family members or create separate legal entities to allow posting of more acreage. If you want to leave your land "Open" to public hunting, fishing, hiking, etc. the annual tax you pay is lowered to \$2.14 per acre per year. One is never required to allow motor vehicle access.

3. Will this be good or bad for wildlife habitat? Good. On most properties the prescribed management will be very positive for a variety of wildlife including deer, turkey and grouse. To enroll, a Certified Plan Writer (CPW) must develop a forest management plan for your property. The planning process will reveal what management options are suitable for your forest types and your property goals. Most MFL entries will have one or more required harvests during their 25 or 50 year enrollment period. Up to twenty percent of your entry can be either non-wooded (marsh, meadow, etc.) or designated as a "No Management Zone". Not every acre has to be managed the same way or for the same objective.

4. Can I have a cabin on the property? Yes. The program allows for seasonal use cabins and related buildings on MFL land. There are guidelines as to what structures are permitted. If you think a structure or building site may be used as a permanent residence or for commercial use it is best to exclude that part of the property from the entry.

5. What happens if I sell the property? The program runs with the property until it expires or an owner withdraws it from the MFL. There is a financial penalty if a person withdraws early from the program; it negates the effect of the tax benefit accrued over the years of enrollment. In other words, it does add up!

6. How do I enroll? You hire a CPW to develop the required forest management plan and application packet. The CPW serves as a guide in the enrollment process.

7. When do I enroll? The MFL management plan and application must be submitted by your CPW to the DNR by June 1 to be effective the following January 1. There's a lot involved in the process so it's important to start early.

8. Is the Managed Forest Law a good fit for my situation?

If you want to promote wildlife habitat, improve your forest, discourage subdivision and of course, save on taxes, this program can be an excellent fit.

If you think the use of the property may change, you don't want to make a long term commitment or you simply don't want a tree harvested for any reason, then the MFL may not be for you.





"Returning to private practice the last five years will actually make me a better judge than if I had remained on the bench. I have now seen the law from all sides. Having represented parties after being a Judge, places a person better in touch with what a crosssection of the public needs from the courts."

While most cases generally apply only to the client, on occasion a case comes into the office which can benefit the public as a whole.

Concerning health care, Kennedy sued the health plan available through Chrysler's Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA). The Administrative Record contained 7,303 pages, and the case was in court for three and one-half years. The final opinion was published nationally.

Some of the issues Kennedy brought forward in writing and at oral argument do apply to the general public. The CBA required ongoing decisions as to how long a person was approved for nursing home coverage. The decisions were either never made or lost. Kennedy argued, failure to comply with what the union agreement required violated Federal Regulations.

He further argued that when medical services have extended the patient's life, then this health care became medically necessary. When health care plans consider how long a person lives to be irrelevant, that point of view is unreasonable.

"The Chrysler case builds on my 1996 research, on file in Forest County, about a good faith rule of thumb for all concerned."

On April 15, 1994, Dr. Timothy Johnson appeared on ABC's 20/20, Transcript No. 1415 What's A Life Worth?-Health Insurance Injustice. Dr. Johnson summed it up: "Americans know we have to make decisions, but I think they want them made in open, honest consistent fashion without financial incentive."

When those inevitable health care questions come to court in the next six years, Kennedy has the unique experience to understand the challenges facing patients with their health plans.

Another aspect of being a good judge is personal dedication to blazing the trail by being the first court to interpret a new statute.

On April 17, 2012, land-use legislation at 2011 Act 170 took effect. That same day a local resident applied for a zoning variance. That variance was denied.

Questions of zoning and land use powers apply to property owners generally. I was the first attorney to use 2011 Act 170 to challenge the denial of a variance. My complaint filed July 6, 2012, alleged 2011 Act 170 deprived the Board of Adjustment of jurisdiction to require a variance.

Effective October 30, 2013, statewide case law would prove my position to be correct.

The faster someone takes the lead to help develop the law, the faster the benefits of the correct rule of law are available. Here, the opportunity concerning the land-use application and law taking effect the same day required Kennedy to promptly and accurately forecast what the correct rule of law would be. Again, this is what the public expects in a good judge.

"This is my third campaign for this office. As in the last two campaigns, I will continue to refuse to accept campaign money. Let's get the money out of politics. As in my last two campaigns, I will continue to refuse to accept campaign endorsements. We all want favoritism out of the judiciary."

"If elected, I will take a common sense approach to reducing tensions by first looking to points the parties agree on. I thank everyone for their interest in the nine Listening Sessions I set up, and look forward to the upcoming campaign."



# Early ice fishing and ice safety tips


Early ice offers some of the season's best fishing, but also a need for extreme caution due to ice conditions (or lack thereof.) Wisconsin recreation safety wardens sent out their list of top safety tips for the ice fishing season on Dec. 2.

Steve Avelallemant, fisheries supervisor for northern Wisconsin, says that early ice fishing can be some of the best fishing for walleye and northern pike. "Especially on shallow lakes, where the fish seem to be accessible and biting more earlier in the hard water season," he says.

Fishing pressure nearly triples in December in Wisconsin after lakes freeze over, based on results from a 2006-7 statewide mail survey of anglers. Anglers reported spending about 1,589,000 hours in December alone in that year, up from 624,000 hours in November, the survey showed.

Panfish, northern pike and walleye are most frequently caught in the winter, with 11.7 million, 866,000, and 750,000, respectively, based on the mail survey results.



# Snowmobile season on deck: Please keep the sled parked until trails are ready!

MADISON -- With winter storms powering through all parts of Wisconsin in recent days ushering in snow and cold, state recreational specialists are asking snowmobilers to prep their sleds for the season but to please hold off on hitting the trails until local authorities give you the green flag.

"Ultimately, the decision to open trails is made at the local level," Cathy Burrow, snowmobile trails grants manager for the state Department of Natural Resources, says of the many local officials and clubs who care for the trails. "While most landowner agreements state that trails can open by Dec. 1, snow, standing crops, trail inspections and weather conditions can dictate the actual opening date, which is announced by county officials."

Conservation Warden Todd Schaller, chief of the Bureau of Law Enforcement's Recreational Safety Program, says sometimes over-anxious snowmobilers can sometimes create problems by using the trails before they have been officially opened.

"In addition to being irresponsible, unsafe and illegal; it greatly threatens the landowner agreements that the club members have worked so hard to obtain and has resulted in closing large portions of trails throughout the state," Schaller says.

Snowmobile trail information such as conditions and openings can be found through county foresters, park and recreation officials, local snowmobile clubs, local chambers of commerce, and on the Snow Conditions Report on the Wisconsin Department of Tourism Web [exit DNR].

Wisconsin ranks among the top states in providing snowmobile trails, Burrow says. The DNR provides \$5.8 million in grants to maintain more than 18.700 miles of trails in the state.

Schaller says the DNR urges snowmobiles to stay on the trail and ride responsibly. Here are among the top things Schaller says snowmobilers can do now to prep for a fun, safe season:


\*Make sure your registration or non-resident trail passes are valid before you ride.

\*All riders at least age 12 and born on or after January 1, 1985, are required to have a valid snowmobile safety certificate.

\*Practice "Zero Alcohol," which is a personal choice not to drink alcohol until you're done riding for the day.

\*Review the snowmobile regulation pamphlet so you know the laws.


# State Patrol advises to stay in car after crash

Video footage of a massive crash near G e r m a n t o w n (www.youtube.com/watch?v=XHC27viPYtA) on Sunday, December 8, clearly shows the dangers of wintertime driving in Wisconsin. Although immense chain-reaction pile-ups are still quite rare, other single- and multiple-vehicle crashes as well as slide-offs are all too common this time of year.

To protect themselves after their vehicle has crashed or slid off a road, drivers and passengers are advised to stay inside their vehicles if at all possible, according to the Wisconsin State Patrol.

"If you are outside your vehicle, you have little or no protection against vehicles that can easily slide out of control on slippery roads. Your vehicle provides protection if you remain inside it with your safety belt fastened," said David Pabst, director of the State Patrol Bureau of Transportation Safety. "Unless you absolutely have to get out of your vehicle for an emergency, stay inside it, buckle up, call 911 on a cell phone or wait for a law enforcement officer to arrive."
