

More Older Adults Struggling with Substance Abuse

The abuse of alcohol and controlled substances is on the rise in older Americans according to a study in the journal Addiction. An estimated 2.8 million older adults in the United States meet the criteria for alcohol abuse, while that number is expected to reach 5.7 million by 2020. A 2013 report found that the rate of illicit drug use is up as well -- from 2.7% in 2002 to 6% in 2013. While substance abuse is increasing, so is the number of individuals seeking treatment for such issues. In 2008, 231,200 people aged 50 and older sought treatment for substance abuse -- up from 102,700 in 1992 according to the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration.

Experts cite an assortment of reasons that may cause older persons to suffer from substance abuse or dependence. Peter A. Bamberger and Samuel B. Bacharach co-authored a study titled, "Retirement and the Hidden Epidemic," funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) to study substance abuse in older adults. They found that the impact of retirement on substance abuse was "anything but clear cut, with the conditions leading to retirement and the economic and social nature of the retirement itself, having a far greater impact on substance use than simple retirement itself." Some retirees are lonely and depressed turning to alcohol or drugs to quell mask these difficulties. Other may drink to deal with the loss of family, friends, colleagues and careers. Simple boredom is also a common cause of substance abuse in older persons. Another cause is a metabolic slow down in later years. Someone who once may have been able to drink two or three glasses of wine and feel no loss of control, may have more difficulty processing that volume of alcohol later in life.

Additionally, many physicians are not properly trained in diagnosing or discussing substance abuse issues with older people. Some signs of chemical dependence, such as memory loss and disorientation, may be misinterpreted as symptoms of aging.

Another misconception is that older adults do not benefit from treatment. Paul Sacco, an assistant professor of social work at the University of Maryland, who researches aging and addiction says, "There's this lore, this belief, that as people get older they become less treatable. But there's a large body of literature saying that the outcomes are as good with older adults."

nature of good people, and Americans lose millions of dollars to fraudulent donations every year. To help you make sure that your money goes to the cause you intend, the Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Alliance suggest the following tips:

- · Never send cash! Always make donations by check. Make a check payable to the charity, not the name of an individual who happens to be soliciting on behalf of the charity.
- · Be wary of names that closely resemble the names of well-known organizations.
- · Don't feel quilty about not giving. Reputable charities understand that not every person is in a position
- · Never feel pressured to give immediately. It is always a good idea to take some time to think over any decisions to donate to a charity.

In addition, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection has developed a handy contribution checklist to use when reviewing solicitations or discussing a contribution with a telephone or in person solicitor. You can ask:

- · Are you a paid solicitor or volunteer?
- · What percentage of my contribution goes toward salaries?

- · What is the specific purpose of the organization?
- · What kinds of services and programs carry out the purpose of the organization?

If the solicitor is unable or unwilling to answer these questions, insist that you receive written materials before making a decision about donating to the organization.

For instance, the Department of Regulation and Licensing maintains a list of all registered charitable organizations in Wisconsin. You can inquire about a particular charity by contacting the department at the phone number listed at the end of this article. 



President Jim Aschinger Called the Regular Meeting to Order at 6:01 p.m. Present: Jim Aschinger, Scott Reeves, Rick Krawze, Frank Shepard, Jr., Kay Connors, Laurie Asher, and Dawn Cote. There were no quests in attendance. Notice has been posted in accordance with Wis. Stat. 19.84.

Rick Krawze, Jr. led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Krawze, seconded by Connors to approve the Agenda. All in favor, motion carried.

OPEN ACTION ITEMS:

Referendum Planning - Dawn Cote and Laurie Asher shared the Baird Budget Forecast Model with the Board. They also reviewed the two referendums that are currently in place. A referendum approved by voters in 1995 for the Building Debt of \$209,000 per year will expire this year. A second referendum approved in 2010 for \$350,000 per year will expire in 2016. This reduces the revenues for the District by \$559.000 in the next two years.

The Board reviewed a variety of scenarios based off this initial forecast. The Board will review the scenarios presented and further discussion will follow at the December regular school board meeting.

Additional Teacher's Aide Position - Mrs. Asher presented a proposal to meet additional early childhood needs for the remainder of the year. Our elementary special education teacher will service any early childhood students. Additional paraprofessional time is also needed to meet the student's goals. Mrs. Asher requested 2.5 hours a day of additional paraprofessional time. Motion by Krawze, seconded by Reeves to approve the additional hours. All in favor, motion carried.

Safely disposing of household pharmaceutical waste

Waste pharmaceuticals include a wide variety of items such as over-the-counter and prescription medications, controlled substances and sharps (i.e. medical waste used to puncture such as needles). Wastes come in the form of solid pills and capsules, creams, liquid and aerosols. Guidelines for properly managing these wastes differ depending on where the waste is created, handled and disposed. Some residential health care facilities may qualify as households.

Recommended disposal options for households:

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) recommends the following: **REDUCE** pharmaceutical waste whenever possible

- Use all antibiotics as prescribed by your doctor.
- Buy only as much as can reasonably be used before the expiration date.
- When prescribed a new medication, ask the doctor to prescribe only enough to see if the medication will work for you and in the lowest dose advisable. That way, if the medication doesn't suit you, less goes to waste. Do the same for your pet's medications.
- · Reconsider the use of products that claim to be antimicrobial or antibacterial. Plain soap and water is as effective as antibacterial soaps. The Center for Disease Control recommends plain soap in its hand washing procedure.

REUSE/RECYCLE drugs when possible

- · Wisconsin allows certain pharmacies to take back unit doses of drugs for cancer
- · You may be able to donate other items, however, the circumstances where this is possible are limited. While it is a noble intention, it is very unlikely that medications from households would be acceptable for use overseas. If you see an opportunity to do this, approach with caution and research the program well.


DISPOSE of the remainder properly

- · If you have narcotics or other controlled substances, contact your local police department to find out if the police will accept them. Some police departments accept noncontrolled substances too, but you should find out exactly what yours will accept before dropping off the items.
- · Whenever possible, take your unused pharmaceuticals to a pharmaceutical collection program or event. They are not collected at permanent household hazardous waste collection facilities due to the legal requirements.
- If a drug collection program does not exist in your area, encourage your health care provider, local governments and local law enforcement to develop one.


Note: If you choose to store your waste for a pharmaceutical collection event, please minimize the risk of accidental poisoning, overdose or diversion (illegal use by someone other than the intended person) by storing medications out of reach of children or in a locked cabinet.

- If you have no other options, do not flush your unused pharmaceuticals. Instead, dispose of them in the trash. Especially if there is a risk of accidental poisoning, overdose or diversion, it is better to dispose of household pharmaceuticals than to hang onto them. When placing unused pharmaceutical in the trash, be sure to:
- -- Remove or mark over all labels that identify the materials as pharmaceuticals or that could provide personal information about you, including prescription information that someone could try to refill;
- tractive to children and thieves by dissolving them in a small -- Render them una amount of water or alcohol or by grinding them up and mixing them with coffee grounds or kitty litter; and
 - -- Put them in a second container or small plastic bag and hide them in your trash.
- · Never burn pharmaceuticals or personal care products in a burn barrel. Uncontrolled burning can create dioxins and other air pollutants.
- Do not put sharps in the trash! Syringes, lancets and other sharp medical items should be managed separately.



For Old Time's Sake



We take our roads for granted, and when it is a road that has served the area for many decades, we have no idea of the labor it took to build the road. This old picture if from the Colburn collection, and is likely from the Wabeno area. Who needs a dozer or a dump truck when you have lots of labor?



Before trucks and hydraulic loaders, logs were hauled to a railhead or to the sawmill on sleighs loaded with a-frame jammers. A team of horses was trained to pull logs up the skids seen on the left and then hold their position until the log was placed. The logs were picked up by a small hook on each end of the log, pup hooks, that were fastened to each end of a yoke that was fastened to the main line. It worked most of the time, but sometimes a hook slipped out of the log and one or both ends came tumbling down. Men were injured, and often killed when this happened, and it paid to stay on either end of the log as the two men holding the tag lines are demonstrating.







Natural Resources Board approves revisions to state's invasive species rule

MADISON -- The Natural Resources Board voted to approve revisions to the state's invasive species rule at their December 10 meeting in Madison. Known as NR40, revisions include the listing of additional species and delisting of currently regulated species under the state's Invasive Species Identification, Classification and Control rule of the Wisconsin Admin Code.

"This proposal results from several years of work with stakeholders to develop an approach based on sound science and common sense that meets the department's charge from the legislature to address invasive species," says Dreux Watermolen, social science services section chief.

One revision includes changing the status of the Emerald Ash Borer from prohibited to restricted. Currently, the beetle responsible for the destruction of tens of thousands of ash trees in Wisconsin is classified as a prohibited species. Under the rule, prohibited species are those not widespread in the state and whose spread can be prevented or limited to certain areas using eradication methods. Since the first discovery of EAB in Wisconsin in 2008, and its listing as a prohibited species in 2009, it has spread to 19 counties prompting a proposal to change the EAB regulatory status to restricted.

Restricted species are those already found in the state and may be more widespread. Eradication is improbable but the spread can still be managed. Measures to manage the spread of EAB will still be used such as Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection quarantines and DNR firewood transportation restrictions. Under the new revisions to NR 40, possession is legal and control is not required for restricted

Job market strong for Nicolet College Architecture Technology grads

The job market is about as good as it gets for Architecture Technology graduates from Nicolet College. The last graduating class posted a 100 percent job placement rate and many students had landed goodpaying jobs even before they finished the program, according to Jeff Labs, Nicolet College Architecture Technology instructor.

"There's no question, the job market for people with Architecture Technology skills is extremely strong," Labs said. "This is true for the Northwoods and across the state. I get calls almost every week from employers looking for people with these skills."

Kelly Heidenreich graduated from the program last year and is one of the students who started working in the field before she even finished the two-year associate degree.

"I'd have to say things worked out very well," said Heidenreich. "I really liked the program and learned the skills I needed."

What's interesting about Heidenreich's situation is that she lives in the small and rural Forest County town of Argonne, pop. 162, and she landed a job as an architectural designer with Argonne Lumber just down the road from where she lives.

"I was shocked, honestly," she said of that lucky turn of events.

As for the job market, the Great Recession of 2008 and 2009 rocked the construction industry and its subsequent need for architectural designers but today the demand is back and going strong.

"There was one point last summer when I had 20 different house plans going at once," Heidenreich explained. "That's a lot of projects and it was starting to get a little crazy."

While the improving economy has been a big factor in the employment picture, Labs explained that changes in the Architectural Technology field and a new curriculum that is taught in the classroom have also been factors.

For many, images of blueprints, 3D computer models, and mathematical formulas to calculate any number of functions probably come to mind when they think of the field.


While students still study all of these things, that's only part of story.

"The field has really evolved into a science all of its own," Labs said. "Homes and other structures are actually quite dynamic. There're a lot going on. Different processes, different dynamics and that's why we take an integrated approach and incorporate building science into every class. This goes well beyond aesthetics and simply designing a structure that looks nice."

Earlier in her life Heidenriech had built two homes of her own and remodeled a third.

"Back then I knew what things had to be done to build a home but I didn't know why things had to be done a certain way," she said. "Now I do know why. It's very interesting."

Season Affective Disorder (SAD) Awareness

Many people get the "blues" in the fall and winter-but for some, it's more than just feeling down. During this time of year, seasonal affective disorder (SAD) symptoms begin to appear for many. SAD is also called "seasonal depression" or "winter depression." The more common symptoms of SAD - a recurrent type of depression - are:

- Feeling depressed most of the day, almost everyday
 - Feeling hopeless
 - Feeling sluggish and tired
 - Feeling more agitated
 - Low energy
- Finding things are less interesting than they used to be
 - Problem with sleep
 - Changes in appetite or weight
 - Difficulty concentrating
 - Frequent thoughts of death or suicide

Stress can be a trigger for SAD symptoms. These symptoms usually begin to appear during the latter part of the fall and beginning of winter months in October and November. Often symptoms will dissipate as weather becomes warmer and sunnier towards April and May. However, for some people, the opposite is true and they become depressed during the beginning of spring and summer. Those who feel SAD symptoms during the summer months typically experience a different set of symptoms including: insomnia, decreased appetite and weight loss, and anxiety.

Although experts do not know what causes SAD, there are some common experiences and traits. For example, women are more likely to have SAD than men. People who live further from the equator where there are fewer hours of daylight are also at greater risk of developing SAD. Those who are between 15 and 55 years old are most likely to have SAD, while older individuals are less likely to suffer from SAD symptoms. As people age, the likelihood of getting SAD will lessen. Those who have a close relative with SAD are also more likely to have SAD themselves.

There are treatments available that include light therapy (also called phototherapy), medication and psychotherapy. It is likely that the treating doctor will do a mental health assessment when first meeting with a client who has SAD symptoms. In addition to treatment, many report that regular exercise is helpful as is getting more sunlight. Other people report that complementary and alternative medicine can help with SAD symptoms. It is important to talk to your doctor before you start a new exercise program or complementary and alternative treatment to make sure it is a safe choice for you.

Many people who have SAD find that their symptoms are responsive to light therapy. There are different types of light therapy available. Studies show that morning light therapy sessions seem to be the best time for light therapy to work, although some prefer to divide light therapy treatments over different times of the day. Generally speaking, most will need at least 30-90 minutes of light therapy a day, although this varies by person and the light intensity. Before any method of therapy is initiated, please consult with your doctor.

If you are feeling depressed, please discuss your feelings with your doctor or therapist. While some primary care doctors have experience with SAD, other doctors may refer to a psychiatrist or specialist for treatment. If you are concerned that a friend or loved one has SAD, it can be supportive and non-judgmental to the feelings that person expresses, and to encourage him or her to seek help.




