The kids played games, won prizes, and the adults bought items from the bake sale, and the profits will be used to support the K-9 Unit. Look for the bunny to be back next year!



Walking aids such as canes and walkers can be invaluable to people with mobility difficulties, but improper or insufficient training in their use may contribute to an increased risk of falls, according to a study conducted in Belgium.

A study published in the Journal of Geriatric Physical Therapy followed older adults, aged 63 to 94, in a residential care facility in Belgium. Approximately half of the study's participants used a walking aid (most used a four-wheeled walker, while some used a two-wheeled walker or a cane). Even after accounting for falls that were contributed to by medication, previous falls, older age or slower walking, researchers determined that those who used walking aids were nearly four times more likely to fall than those who did not.

The researchers determined that older persons whose gait has been altered may be taking smaller steps and walking more slowly, contributing to an increased risk of falling.

Researchers caution not to conclude from the study that walking aids themselves are problematic. Rather, they highlighted the correlation between the use of a walking aid and an increased likelihood of falls. Therefore, researchers say it is vital that older persons who utilize a walking aid be properly trained to ensure the device is used properly and provides safer mobility practices. One problem with walking aids is that individuals who lose balance may not be able to recover as quickly due to gripping or holding the walking aid. When balance is lost, the aid may become a hindrance, rather than a safety device.

While it may be easily taken for granted, researchers suggest that someone who uses a walking aid should receive proper training to learn how to keep their balance, maintain a safe gait, as well as ways to avoid falls. Training should include more complicated maneuvers such as opening and closing doors and navigating stairs.

The aging process requires individuals, caretakers, family members and friends to rethink ideas that may seem simple. In order to safely use a walking aid. individuals who face mobility challenges must be able to safely incorporate the use of the device into their activities of daily living so that the device is used properly and does not accidentally cause a dangerous fall that it was designed to prevent.

The Longest Loss: Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia national program offered locally

The Hospice Foundation of America's 22nd Annual Living with Grief ®Program entitled "The Longest Loss: Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia" will be presented on Wednesday, April 22, 12:30 - 4:15 p.m. at Ministry Saint Mary's Hospital's Conference Rooms 1&2 (lower level), 2251 N. Shore Drive, Rhinelander. The prerecorded program is moderated by Frank Sesno, Director of the School of Media and Public Affairs at The George Washington University. When the diagnosis is Alzheimer's disease or other dementia, grief doesn't wait for death. Grieving can begin in the doctor's office when patients and families receive confirmation of illness. Over a span of what may be a decade, multiple losses associated with Alzheimer's disease or dementia become a pervasive part of everyday life for millions of patients, their families and friends. After the death, survivors' grief may be complicated by the nature of a lengthy disease process that has changed their relationship with the deceased. Through a combination of candid, compelling interviews and live, in-studio discussion, experts will identify how medical and social service professionals can best help patients, families and themselves cope with loss and grief associated with these progressive illnesses.

Mr. Sesno will lead the panel of noted authorities that includes: Charles Corr, PhD, former Chair of the International Work Group on Death, Dying, and Bereavement and current caregiver; Kenneth J. Doka, PhD. MDiv, Professor of Gerontology, College of New Rochelle and participant in 22 Living with Grief® programs; Nancy Pearce, LISW-CP, licensed gerontological social worker with expertise in communicating and connecting effectively with persons with dementia; Peter V. Most people who expect the fire department to show up don't think about the extra work that needs to be done once those trucks head back to the firehouse.

So, to all of you, who serve our local communities, as fire department, rescue squad, and law enforcement/dispatch personnel---Thank you, so much, for what you give to all of us.





Scam Alert! Don't be so quick to wire money to your "favorite grandchild"

The combination of cold weather and tax season makes this a prime time for financial scams. People are at home more due to the cold and are more likely to answer phone calls. Older Americans are a favorite target of unscrupulous scam artists. According to research by Stanford University, those over the age of 65 are 34% more likely to have lost money on a financial scam than those in their 40s. Some scams to be on the lookout for include:

Tax Identity

Tax season presents many opportunities for theft and fraud. Fraudsters call or email people stating that they are from the IRS and provide an address to send money to for back taxes. Others are stealing Social Security numbers (SSNs) and filing tax returns with the stolen

The Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection provided a press release outlining the following ways to reduce a person's risk of falling victim to tax identity theft:

- File your tax return early in the tax season before identity thieves do.
- · Use a secure internet connection if you file electronically. Don't use unsecure, publicly available Wi-Fi hotspots at places like coffee shops or hotel lobbies.
 - Mail your tax return directly from the post office.
- · Shred copies of tax returns, drafts or calculation sheets you no longer need.
- · Respond to all mail from the IRS as soon as
- Know that the IRS won't contact you by email, text or social media. If the IRS needs information, it will first contact you by mail.
- Don't give out your SSN or Medicare number unless necessary. Ask why it's needed, how it's going to be used and how it will be stored.
- · Get recommendations and research a tax preparer thoroughly before you hand over personal information.
- · If your SSN has been compromised, contact the IRS ID Theft Protection Specialized Unit at 1-800-908-4490. • Check your credit report at least once a year for
- free at annualcreditreport.com to make sure no other accounts have been opened in your name.

Sweetheart Scam

Scammers have also been targeting older women on online dating sites. The scammer will have conversations with the unsuspecting woman and eventually profess his love for her. Then the scammer will find himself in some sort of predicament where he needs funds immediately, such as a stolen briefcase on a business trip.

Grandparent Scam

The scammer calls and claims to be "your favorite grandchild" or close relative and is in some sort of crisis that requires immediate cash to remedy. The victim is then convinced to wire funds, send a prepaid credit card or send cash via courier.

If you receive this sort of call, you should ask questions only your grandchild would know, such as the name of a pet.

Boost your mood with exercise

Have you ever tried exercise to relieve stress or a bad mood? Chances are you felt better afterward. Scientific research has demonstrated that the link between exercise and mental health is strong, though not fully understood. Research shows exercise provides short and long-term psychological improvements, including:

- 1. Reversing stress Exercise can help provide an immediate distraction from stressful worries and frustration. It helps you cope by producing a sense of calm as it relieves muscle tension and boosts energy. It's important to choose exercise options you enjoy.
- 2. Building self-esteem Achieving fitness goals, even small ones, can build confidence, restore positive feelings and give you a sense of control, as well as improve your body image.
- 3. Lifting depression Working the muscles releases mood enhancers in the brain, and may reduce chemicals that worsen depression. Alleviating a depressed mood and anxiety generally takes a longer course of exercise. The best results may occur with moderately intense aerobic workouts lasting 30 to 40 minutes most days of the week. They may significantly cut symptoms of moderate depression. Weight training might also be effective.

Is staying fit mentally the best incentive for staying active? It offers an immediate reward: Moodboosting benefits can happen within minutes, while the physical effects of regular exercise, such as weight loss and increased muscle mass, can take weeks.
