Win Abney passed away peacefully in the presence of family on December 29, 2014, at the age of 90. In the weeks prior to his death, one could still find him splitting wood, caring for horses, reading, completing daily crossword puzzles, and deer hunting. Win cherished his time with family and many

were able to join him over the holidays.

Win was born to Lilly (nee Derickson) and Armster Abney on June 30th, 1924. He spent his early years in Nashville, WI. In 1938, the Abney family moved to Crandon and established a horse farm that remains in family hands to this day.

In 1941, Win enrolled at UW-Superior to pursue a career in education. While there, he joined a church youth group where he met his future wife, Patricia. Inducted into the service in 1942, he temporarily left Superior to serve in the military. At the end of WWII, Win returned and reunited with Pat. Win enjoyed a long and dedicated career in education, first serving as a teacher and principal in the Crandon School District. He went on to become a K-12 principal at Minong, WI, high school principal at Eagle River, WI, and superintendent of schools in the Eagle River School District before concluding his career in 1987 as a Crandon School District guidance counselor.

During the summer months, Win worked with his family to provide horses for riding programs at several area camps. From his teen years on, he worked as a riding instructor spending 63 seasons at Camp Towering Pines for Boys in Eagle River. Throughout the years, many of his children and grandchildren joined him in camp pursuits, and his son, Jerry, continues in this tradition today.

Win never failed in his role as provider and was a source of steadfast love, humor, friendship, comfort, adventure, encouragement, and wisdom. His presence will be dearly missed. those who have passed on are remembered by those who knew them.

While many of these sayings and stories are those that are passed on, many are from my memory. In these winter months and long evenings that can often lead to introspection and remembering past times, we urge you to write down and pass on your favorite stories or sayings so they can be shared on these pages. As with my memories, there are some dandy sayings and stories that can't be published in a paper read by all ages, most can, and we urge you to share them with our readers.

When us older folks think back, many of us remember the wisdom and humor passed on by some of our bar owners from the 1950's through the 1970's and 80's. Charlie May, Ken Fannin, Duck Tyler and George McMillion left many of us with memories, some of which can be printed.

Charlie and Ethel May built their tavern and gas station, plus a farm, back in 1939. Charlie had a pet phrase for everything. If you were trying to collect some money from somebody, you were "Out gathering nuts." I put nicknames on many of the people he knew, and one of those was Clyde Wilbur. Clyde spent most of his life being called Deep Purple, and many of us just shortened it to Purple. He said the name was given to him by Charlie when he was helping him build the tavern still in use by Bill May today, but he couldn't remember why he earned the new name. When Charlie was asked, he couldn't recall either, but until the day he died, Clyde was called Deep

Ken Fannin operated where Pack 'Em Inn is now, and later he ran Mable Conn's tavern where County W hits Hwy 8. Fannin likes to tell a story about a large man who was trying to pick a fight with a much smaller guy. Eventually, the small man had enough and took the big man up on his invitation for fisticuffs. Going out on the sidewalk, Fannin said the battle started and didn't last long. The little fellow knew how to box, and he hit the bully more times than he could take, knocking him down to the sidewalk and causing plenty of damage to his nose and eyes. Fannin enjoyed seeing the bully get his, and loved telling the story. The smaller but tougher man went on his way, and the bully came back into the bar. Through puffed lips he said the little so and so sure could hit hard, and Fannin added; "And often!"

Duck Tyler was running Duck's Bar back then, hence the name. He liked being a gruff character, but he was a big-hearted man who like kids, often stopping them on the sidewalk after school and passing out candy bars. As a part-time bartender for Duck in the late 1960's, I was able to see some interesting things. He often hung around the bar after you had taken over bar tending duties, and I watched him quietly slide a hundred dollar bill to a man who was having a hard time financially at Christmas. He whispered, "This isn't a loan. Get those kids some Christmas presents and get the hell out of here." He liked to take people out to eat, and a couple of times I was pressed into tending bar as he took a dozen people or so out to eat on him, leaving me all alone without a customer to talk to. Then he would go across the street and clean out Fannin's customers as well. Ken would come over and order a drink on Duck, seeing as he didn't have anybody to wait on and it was Duck's fault. One time, as Duck was cleaning out his customers, he said wait for me, and grabbed his jacket, turned out the lights and went along. He told Duck that if he was stealing all his customers he would have to feed him too, and Duck told him to get his

A George McMillion line that was told for years was when George was doing one of his periodic bouts of lumberjack work. He readily admitted that he was one of the world's worst tree fallers. The story is that George was sawing and when the skidder came up the trail with the horse, he hollered at George asking him which way the tree was going to fall so he would know where to move the horse and himself to a safe spot. George's response was, "How the hell would I know, I haven't cut it off yet!"

Another saloon keeper story I ran into while working on the Wabeno Centennial Book was about John Mallow, and it gave an insight into his sense of humor. Mallow had a saloon, among other enterprises in Wabeno. One day he was gazing out the front window and watched one of the homesteaders go by with an ox cart that was piled high with provisions for the farm to be. Mallow watched him go by and said," Look at that S.O.B. All those groceries, and I'll bet he doesn't have a drop of whiskey in the house!"

Medication misuse leads to thousands of hospitalizations and deaths each year in the U.S. By staying involved in your health care, you can lower your risks and get the most from your medicine. Learn these 6 steps to safe medication:

1. Maintain a list of ALL your medicines. Include prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medicines and vitamin, mineral and herbal supplements. Always bring your list to health care visits or for hospital stays.

2. Learn why you need specific drugs. You're more likely to use them correctly, know what to expect and report any problems to your provider.

3. Ask about possible side effects. Some drug side effects may bother you at first but soon ease up. Call your provider if you have serious, persistent or recurrent reactions; you may need a different medicine or dosage.

4. Ask about possible interactions when using multiple drugs. If you use alcohol or tobacco, ask about any impact from these substances while taking medicines or supplements.

5. Learn how to use each medicine. Ask your provider when to take it and for how long. Whether it's a prescription or an OTC medicine, read the label and always use as directed.

6. Try to have all prescriptions filled at the same pharmacy. It will track all your drugs and alert you or your provider if a new drug might cause problems. Your pharmacist is a vital member of your health care team, ready to assist and answer your questions.

Manoomin display currently in the Crandon Library

My Woodland Indian "Minwaajimo" (telling a good story) display which focuses on the Sokaogon Mole Lake Woodland Ojibwe "manoomin" wild rice history/culture, is now open inside the lobby of the Crandon Public Library and will continue through the month of January.

Long before European explorers and Christopher Columbus set foot on the shores of the North American continent, the indigenous peoples thrived in the dense forests of what is now called Forest County, Wisconsin and the once abundant wild rice harvested in the late summer was a major food source and continues to be harvested locally to this day.

Let us never forget the 30-year fight to stop a proposed deep-shaft mining operation from opening here. Water quality was the deciding factor in winning this battle against billion dollar corporate exploitation and bringing about the legal issue of "treatment as state" which brought an end to the future degradation to the natural pristine headwaters of the Wolf River, the precious home of the wild rice beds.

This display will also be featured in an upcoming Crandon Public Library Newsletter. The proposed Wolf River-Nicolet Scenic Byway (State Hwy. 55/32 Forest County, Wisconsin D.O.T. Scenic Byways Program) runs adjacent the wild rice beds.

Wabeno sent two teams to the gigantic First Lego League tournament held at Appleton East High School on November 16th. The all-day tournament packed the Appleton East Patriot gymnasium as 53 teams competed in categories including basic engineering and robotics, research presentation, technical interviews and teamwork challenges. It was Wabeno's first competition in the FLL.

In the K-3 Junior FLL category Wabeno's entry, "Scuba," won first out of nine entries in the costuming and banner presentation category. Their cowboy/cowgirl theme wowed the judges and landed them the "Picasso Award."

In the grades 4-8 competition, Wabeno's entrant, "The Just Us League," composed of four fourth graders and two sixth graders, found themselves up against 43 teams, many composed of kids much older and more experienced in FLL. Wabeno fared well in the engineering and robotics competition with their robot, "Bill" completing several missions and amassing a score that put them in the upper half of the competition. They also made a strong showing with their newscast-style research presentation and video. Their overall combined robotics and presentation scores weren't quite enough for them to advance to the sectional as one of the top fifteen entrants.

"I was blown away by the level of expertise and programming these teams had," said one Wabeno parent. "And I was really thrilled to see our Just Us League hold their own on the robotics end of things. Someone who hasn't seen something like this probably has no idea how huge it is and how tough the competition is."

In the morning Wabeno's kids weren't sure what they would be up against, and they feared they might really get buried by the competition. The attitude at the end of the day might have best been summed up by robot operator Dylan Cloud's joyous exclamation of, "We did...decent!" The Just Us League is now confident that they can compete very well next year having experienced the competition and gained insight into what the judges are looking for. The teams will start meeting again in January, and the kids are already plotting strategies for next fall.



State health officials confirm pediatric influenza death

First reportable death for the 2014-2015 influenza season

MADISON The Department of Health Services and the City of Milwaukee Health Department today confirmed that a child in the city of Milwaukee has died from complications related to influenza. In Wisconsin, deaths from influenza are only reportable if they are pediatric (under age 18) deaths.

Because of patient confidentiality laws and out of respect for the family, neither the Department of Health Services nor the City of Milwaukee Health Department will be releasing the decedent's sex, age, race or location of residence.

"Seasonal influenza is not life-threatening for most people; however, this is a serious disease that can be especially dangerous for children, older adults, individuals with compromised immune systems and those with chronic health illnesses," said Karen McKeown, State Health Officer. "It is still important to get a flu shot to help protect yourself and your friends and loved ones who may be at high risk for complications from the flu." The flu shot can reduce the severity of flu symptoms among those who get the flu, and reduce rates of hospitalization and death.

Influenza is a contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus. The flu vaccine helps prevent complications that can be caused by the flu, such as pneumonia or hospitalization. With few exceptions, officials recommend that individuals aged six months and older be immunized. Getting vaccinated against influenza is especially important for people aged 50 and older, and those with underlying health conditions. Getting vaccinated is equally important for those who have frequent contact with young children, as children are hospitalized or die from flu complications each year in the United States.

Flu season for Wisconsin generally occurs between late October and May, with peak activity around late January or early February.

Influenza can range from mild to severe, and in some cases can cause life-threatening complications. Symptoms can come on quickly and include fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, nasal congestion, body aches and tiredness. If someone does get the flu after getting vaccinated, it is more likely to be a milder

To get your flu vaccine and vaccine for your family, contact your health care provider, pharmacy, local public health department or tribal health clinic, or go to www.flu.gov (link is external) to find a flu vaccination center near you.

Health officials also suggest these important

- ** Wash your hands often with soap and water, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- ** Cover your cough or sneeze with your upper sleeve, and try to avoid touching your face with your hand. If you use a tissue, throw it away after one use.
- ** Use your own drinking cups and straws.
- ** Avoid being exposed to people who are sick with flulike symptoms.
- ** Eat nutritious meals, get plenty of rest and do not smoke.
- ** Frequently clean commonly touched surfaces (e.g., doorknobs, refrigerator handle, telephone, faucets).

If you think you have the flu, call your doctor. Stay home, rest, drink plenty of liquids, and avoid using alcohol and tobacco.
