Forest County Board of Supervisors hold February meeting

The Forest County Board of Supervisors met Tuesday, February 17, at the Forest County Courthouse. The meeting was started with a report from Chairman Paul Millan. Chairman Millan reported on the proposed budget of Governor Scott Walker. He mentioned the possible freezing of the stewardship funding and how it would slow the growth of our county forest, but he did say that nothing is final yet. The joint finance committee and the parties in the state legislature still need to look over the proposed budget and have discussions.

Josh Jameson, Executive Director of the Forest County Economic Development, gave an update on the work in his office. He is finishing the technology grant for the Town of Wabeno. He is investigating sewer and water for Armstrong Creek. Josh said that he is looking into funding for courthouse security, fixing current buildings and putting broadband receivers on DNR towers. Blackwell just received a grant for broadband receivers. He is working with the Forest County Sheriffs office and starting the revolving loan fund. The Workforce Development Center is having an open house next week.

There were six resolutions on the agenda; approve The Emergency Fire Warden's List, approve the Forestry Department Annual Work Plan, authorize Forest County to participate in the County Forest Administrator Program for 2015, authorize request to DNR to provide the 2015 payment per Sec. 28.11(8)(b)1 for \$.50 per acre of County Forest lands, approve purchase of BCPL Block, approve Amendments to 15 year Comprehensive Land Use Plan and approve implementation of the Good Neighbor Authority Program. All the resolutions passed 16-0 with six supervisors absent.

Will the last person leaving Forest County please turn out the lights!

Last week we received the third mailing concerning the proposed off-road vehicle park that Forest County Tourism put in everyone's mailbox. It was absolutely shocking to find out that Forest County is not one of the most prosperous counties in the state. I'm sure none of us were aware of that.

We were told in no uncertain terms that Forest County is declining, as the headline on the card said. But, there are many statistics available these days on the internet, and not all of the stats for Forest County and the surrounding counties were printed on this card.

In case you threw your mailing away, it stated that Vilas County had tourism expenditures of \$203.24 million and that Oneida County's number was \$196.96 million. Forest County was rated number 68 in the state on tourism expenditure with a paltry \$11.77 million in tourism expenditures.

Is this a fair comparison? I think not. All it takes is a glance at a map of Wisconsin and you will see that Vilas County has a string of 26 lakes, and some of these lakes are also in Oneida County. Minocqua is also in Oneida County, and is water rich, which also means that they are tourist rich. Water and the shoreline that goes around every lake is a draw that Forest County can never have.

This being said, how does Forest County stack up on other statistics?

Checking the internet on the Department of Workforce Development, I found that Forest County had a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 9.6% for the year 2013, which is the latest data they had on the site. Vilas County had an unemployment rate of 9.8%, and Oneida County had a rate of 8.8%. The question is: Are these statistics significantly different? Another question is: Will an offroad vehicle park, financed by the taxpayers, turn us around with a lower unemployment rate?

While looking over statistics on various internet sites I came to the conclusion that Mark Twain was quite correct when he wrote: "There are lies, damn lies, and statistics." It is quite easy to find any number of statistics to show either how well Forest County is doing in comparison to its neighbors, or how poorly, or where they stack up in the state.

I think the questions that have to be answered in

this conflict over whether or not to build a park lies elsewhere.

We are told that an offroad park will bring in \$28 million dollars a year in revenue. Where did this number come from? Would WORVPI please explain how they arrived at this number. Who computed the 300 plus jobs the park is supposed to create? Why is only Forest County in decline when the state median income dropped. Why is Forest County in decline when the whole country was put in a decline in 2008, and still is in a decline that we haven't crawled out of yet?

Is an offroad park the panacea that will put us on top of the heap? I think the majority of the residents of this county have little, if any, faith in this project. There are various reasons for the scepticism.

When talking to people around the county, almost all are against the county spending money on a tourism attraction that leaves the county taxpayers with any kind of increase in taxes should it fail. While we have been told by some supporters that it won't cost Forest County residents anything at all, I think of all the meeting costs that have piled up since this idea began. That money comes from the pockets of Forest County residents. There are others who don't want the woods cut up by ruts or the noise that goes with internal combustion engines, and would like nature left alone. Still others don't believe that an offroad park will co-exist with the hunting and fishing. Many don't believe, as do I, that there is a big enough pool of customers to make such a large venture pay off, and I also agree with all of the other reasons.

That being said, it is perfectly alright to be for or against the park. Everyone is entitled to their own opinion, and even those who are on different sides of this issue usually agree on other matters.

I do find the Forest County bashing to be very annoying. People who live in this county are very well aware of the fact that this is not an area with a rip-roaring economy, and they are willing to give up the frenetic pace of city life for the positive qualities that exist here and in other northern counties. It is, I think, a compromise between a bustling economy and a lifestyle that is preferred by most residents, even though the author of this mailing doesn't seem to agree with that concept.

I also take exception to the idea that any growth in this or any other northern county is always related to the tourism industry. There is nothing wrong with having a healthy tourism business in the area, and this publication profits from that as well, but it is not the only direction we should look for economic growth. We already have some manufacturing in Forest County, and we might have more if we tried. That manufacturing we now have includes CPF Metal Fabricating, Snow River wood products, Hometown Trolley, Infinity Flooring, and Rosa Trailer, all in Crandon. Laona has Nicolet Hardwoods and two WD Flooring plants. Wabeno has Forest Sawmill. And in Newald, the world famous Cleereman Carriages have been manufactured since the 1950's. Cavour also has a thriving sawmill. And, I have probably missed a few. We shouldn't forget that there are numerous people who make a good living in the logging industry. We are hardly without enterprising people!

A logging activist from Libby, Montana, who I have heard speak twice and have interviewed for a magazine article says it best when he speaks of the tourism industry in Libby, which probably also applies to us as well: "Tourism is the frosting, but it isn't the cake."

I would also like to add that Wisconsin's median income (those damn statistics again) is 9.43% lower than it was in 2007, according to a survey by Google. There is still that recession to work our way out of, not just here, but statewide. We shouldn't be complacent about economic growth in Forest County, but we shouldn't just try to pull off a questionable enterprise paid for by the citizenry. I think we can do better, and I for one have no regrets about living most of my life in Forest County and the greater Northwoods of Wisconsin.

Addendum: Forestry in Forest County

After the above article was written, I was told of a DNR survey of Wisconsin's forest product industry county by county. It is an interesting summary of what we already have and probably take for granted. With the addition of National Forest timber sales, these numbers could be

improved upon. This data is from 2012.

Forest County is 87% forested with total forest land of 583,019 acres, of which 367,291 acres is public land and 215,727 acres private lands.

Forestry and logging produces 254 jobs with a total output of \$18.4 million and a value added of \$4.4 million.

Sawmill and wood products produce 180 jobs with an output of \$20 million and a value added of \$5.3 million.

The total of logging, sawmilling and wood products is 434 jobs with a total output of \$38.4 million. The payroll for this effort is \$5.2 million and 486 jobs are created with indirect employment.

It would seem that with more public timber on the market and more businesses adding value to harvested timber before it leaves the borders of Forest County, we have a chance for more opportunity in this industry.





Juneau expects to see farmers and agricultural professionals from all over Wisconsin, the UP, Minnesota, Illinois and even Canada.



Wisconsin State Patrol Law of the Month-February

Vehicles in a ditch along a highway or stuck in a snow bank on the side of a street are a familiar part of Wisconsin's winter landscape. Although drivers try to blame slippery roads for losing control of their vehicles, frequently the truth is they were driving too fast for conditions.

"Driving at the posted speed limit often will be too fast for conditions when there's ice, snow and slick spots on roadways or when visibility is reduced by snow, sleet and fog," says Wisconsin State Patrol Captain Nicholas R. Wanink of the Wausau Post. "The speed limit is set for safe driving on dry pavement with good visibility. You might not be able to stop or control your vehicle at the posted speed limit on a slippery road or during hazardous weather."

Slowing down when driving conditions are treacherous is not just common sense-it's the law. It is illegal to drive at speeds that exceed what is reasonable and prudent under existing road conditions. Drivers are required to adjust their speeds to take into account both the actual and potential hazards due to weather, highway conditions or other traffic.

A violation of this state law costs \$213.10 with four demerit points added to the driver's record. A second offense within a 12-month period costs \$263.50 with four additional points.

"The slogan 'Snow Means Slow' also applies to four-wheel drive and other heavy-duty vehicles, which can still slide, skid and fish tail while trying to slow down or stop on slippery roads," says Captain Wanink. "If you drive too fast for conditions and slide off the road or crash, you likely will have to pay for an expensive traffic ticket plus towing and vehicle repair bills. It's much cheaper, safer and certainly less frightening to maintain control of your vehicle by slowing down."






