Public informational meeting on proposed amendments to 15 year plan

A public informational meeting on the proposed amendments to the 15 year comprehensive land use plan to allow a MRA park was held on Tuesday, June 2, in the county board room in the Forest County Courthouse. Over 100 people, who were almost entirely opposed to changing the fifteen year comprehensive land use plan to allow a MRA park on county forest land filled the board room and hallway.

Don LeMaster, chairman of the Forest County Forestry and Recreation Committee addressed the audience. LeMaster explained that all comments were to be addressed to the forestry committee. Each person had three minutes to speak. The comments need to be about the proposed amendment changes.

The majority of the comments addressed to the committee were against the changing of the 15 year comprehensive land use plan. Here is a sampling of the comments submitted:

Bruce Clark, a resident of Laona, stated, "I don't think you have the information needed to amend the plan, so I would vote against amending the plan to add a park."

Christine Mueller commented, "We bought our property in 1974 and we have been permanent residents for fifteen years, we have had rentals on Lake Metonga for over ten years. I always get comments on how nice it is and how quiet it is. I live within 50 yards of the Wolf River Trail and the town road is ATV accessible. I have never had anybody ask about it. People that come up here for tourism that stay in our rentals are up here for the quite. If you now have enough information to bring a recommendation to the board, why do we not have enough information to do a referendum?"

Marge Scardino commented, "I am not necessarily against a park because we don't have enough information, but it seems to me that if a private enterprise has a great idea that would bring a lot of money to the county and a lot of money to them, that they would have investors lined up and they would not need to borrow Forest County's tax dollars. I do not believe that tax payers dollars should be involved in private enterprise."

AIS funding plan suggested

While Wisconsin has provided well for the management of its state forests, that is not necessarily the case for its highly valued lakes and rivers, according to the former Vilas County invasive species coordinator.

Ted Ritter, who spent a decade helping lake associations manage their lakes, said it's time for Wisconsin to boost its funding for lake management -- similar to a program to fund forest management started nearly 80 years ago. Ritter said Wisconsin's landscape includes slightly over one-half million acres of state-owned forests, more than 1 million acres of inland lakes and 32,000 miles of continuously running rivers and streams. He said it's those lakes and rivers that need help today.

"We have gradually come to realize that lakes and rivers need to be managed if they are to survive our use of them," said Ritter. "However, management is often expensive and a state budget of \$10 million per year doesn't come close to getting the job done and that includes roughly \$4 million for aquatic invasive species." Forest management got a big boost in 1937, when Wisconsin's Constitution was amended to include Article VIII, Section 10, which authorized the state to "appropriate moneys for the purpose of acquiring, preserving and developing the forests of the state through a tax on property not to exceed 0.2 mill (\$0.20 per \$1,000 of property value)."

That forest mill tax is applied to all taxable property and is the only property tax imposed by the state. All other property taxes are levied by local municipal and county governments, school districts, technical colleges and local special taxing districts.

"The forest mill tax is portrayed on the first line of our annual tax bills as 'Wisconsin property tax,'" said Ritter.

Less than 10 years ago, the forest mill rate was adjusted downward in 2007 to \$0.1697 per \$1,000 of property value. Ritter suggests that was likely due to an huge increase in property values.

Although the forest mill tax represents a seemingly insignificant portion of property tax bills, and is therefore easily overlooked, Ritter said it generated \$80 million in revenues during fiscal year 2012-'13 to support a \$100 million state forest budget according to the Wisconsin Legislative Fiscal Bureau.

Meanwhile, Ritter said the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) annual budget for management of inland lakes and rivers is in the vicinity of \$10 million, or 10% of the state forest budget. The discrepancy now frustrates Ritter, who wants to see more lake management.

"Most of Wisconsin's forests had been stripped prior to 1937 and there was obvious need for state management of the scarred and barren landscape. Waterfront property was not yet in high demand and therefore still inexpensive," said Ritter. "Recreational use of surface waters was in its infancy. The importance of managing lakes and rivers was not obvious in 1937."

But waterfront property has long since become prime real estate throughout Wisconsin.

"Lakes and rivers are now cherished and widely recognized as irreplaceable resources," said Ritter. "Increased public usage of surface waters has paralleled demand for ownership of waterfront property."

Ritter said the strong yearning to recreate on or live adjacent to the state's water resources has led to rapid and sometimes excessive development of shorelines, depletion of critical natural habitat, manipulation of water levels, deterioration of water quality, overharvesting of fisheries, the introduction of invasive species, an ever-increasing tendency for user conflicts as recreational equipment grows steadily larger, noisier and more environmentally unfriendly, and other issues.

He said that's why more funding is needed and a mill tax could be the answer. Even if a lake management mill tax of \$0.0800 per \$1,000 of property value (one-half of the forest mill tax) were applied to all taxable property, Ritter said it would generate \$40 million for lake management.

Ritter, who worked for the Vilas County Land and Water Conservation Department, said county governments have the authority to tax landowners for local lake and river management programs (assuming doing so wouldn't result in exceeding state-imposed levy limits), but typically don't exercise it. The same is true for cities, villages and towns.

"The primary reason is that surface waters are state owned and the responsibility for managing them is thought by local governments to rest with one state agency or another, not with local governments or local landowners," said Ritter. "With no governmental bodies or agencies at any level having adequate fiscal responsibility for lake and river management, concerned property owners around waters in need of management have few options."

Ritter said that leaves management to local lake organizations of lake property owners, but there are many others using the lakes.

"Doing nothing and allowing resource degradation to continue is in no one's interest," said Ritter. "Committing to management programs at the lake organization level, knowing that some property owners will voluntarily dig deep in their pockets while others contribute nothing, contradicts a desired sense of equality."

Ritter said some lake organizations choose to form lake districts. The self-taxing authority of lake districts enables the costs of management programs to be distributed equitably across all taxable properties within the districts' boundaries.

"Lake district formation is often prompted by the need for local funding to offset the state deficit and is therefore understandably controversial," said Ritter.

Looking at forest management, Ritter said there is no need for forest tax districts as the statewide forest mill tax provides for state management of those lands.

"There would be little or no need for lake districts if we would provide funding to manage the lakes," said Ritter. Ritter said he hopes to raise awareness of the disparity in funding for the management of Wisconsin's water resources and state-owned forests.

"We love our lakes and rivers. Our track record for finding new ways to use them without understanding how we also abuse them is both impressive and frightening," he said. "But we are pushing the resilience of these complex, fragile and irreplaceable ecosystems to their limits. Without appropriate management actions, we will love them into extinction."

Ritter said Wisconsin's lakes, rivers and state forests are of huge economic value. Gov. Scott Walker recently announced the tourism industry had an economic impact of \$17.5 billion on the state in 2013.

"All are owned by everyone and used by many. But unlike the forests, our surface waters are managed by few who absorb too much of the cost," said Ritter. "The financial shortfall for their effective management cannot continue to rest on the shoulders of local property owners."

Ritter said it's time for the state to help its lakes, just like they did the forests nearly eight decades ago.

"The people of Wisconsin have provided for the financial security of our forests for over 75 years," he said. "We need to do the same for our lakes and rivers while preservation of these resources is still possible."

Leave your firewood at home, help protect the forest

Rhineland, Wisconsin (May 29, 2015) – Campers and recreationalists visiting the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest are reminded to leave their firewood at home.

The Forest has firewood restrictions in place to slow the spread of emerald ash borer (EAB), an exotic beetle from Asia that kills ash trees. The restrictions prohibit visitors from bringing firewood to the Forest from any distance greater than 25 miles away.

Since 2002, EAB has spread to 22 states, including Wisconsin and two Canadian provinces. In spite of state and federal quarantines that limit the movement of wood products and nursery stock, the insect continues to be discovered in new locations. Movement of infested firewood is the likely cause of new infestations beyond normal dispersal patterns of the insect.

In addition, other pests and diseases such as gypsy moth and oak wilt often hitchhike on firewood, too. The best advice? Buy it where you burn it! Acceptable firewood to bring to the CNNF includes:
 --Wood gathered from within the Forest with a valid permit
 --Firewood purchased from a vendor within 25 miles of the National Forest destination or brought from home that same distance
 --Wood that has been certified by the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (certified wood can be brought into the Forest from a distance of more than 25 miles)

"The threat of an EAB infestation on the National Forest is very high even with quarantines and firewood restrictions," said Jerry Van Cleve, Forest Silviculturist, Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest. "Please do your part to protect our northern forest by leaving your firewood at home."

There were people in favor of the amendments in attendance. Here is a sampling of what they said: Mike Gruett commented, "I am the president of the Forest County Chamber and a local business man of 35 years. I am speaking tonight under the direction of my executive committee, who passed a unanimous ballot in support of a MRA park in Forest County. Our chamber represents 132 dues paying businesses or individuals in every town or governing body in the county. "Forest County is 67 out of 72 in generating tourism dollars according to the 2014 Department of Tourism. Langlade County generated 41 million and Vilas and Onieda county combined generated 415 million. These numbers indicate an opportunity be met by Forest County to take a proactive stance on attracting a MRA park. Gruett ended his statement saying he was speaking on behalf of the 132 chamber members and not just an individual.

Jim Hausinger commented, "Tourism is a key component of a successful economy for businesses located in the area. Tourism is Wisconsin's third largest industry and a source of stable employment for people residing in Forest County. Just as the state is promoting Wisconsin as a premier four season traveling tourism destination, it behooves the Forest County Board of Supervisors to approve the proposed amendments to the fifteen year plan to approve policies for the development of a motorized recreation area on county forest land. At this time, Forest County ranks 63rd in the state for tourist spending. Promoting tourism to reduce the rank and increase the tourist spending should be our number one goal."

Bill Connors made a motion to pass the proposed amendments to the full county board. Larry Sommer seconded the motion. A roll call vote was then taken. Bill Connors and Larry Sommer voted aye, Bill Chaney, Dave Campbell, Don DeHart and Don LeMaster voted no. There was one absent. The proposed amendments will not be passed on to the full county board.

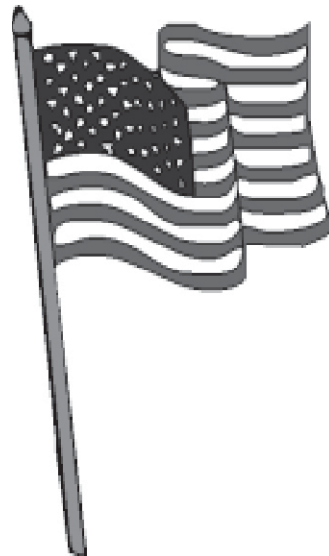

EDUCATIONAL INFORMATION

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, includes rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

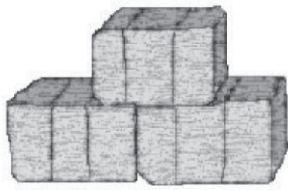

Stay Active with Arthritis

A growing number of Americans contend with the daily challenge of joint pain from arthritis. Needless to say, having achy joints discourages physical activity. But be assured, the right exercise has the potential to offset the progression and life-changing disability of arthritis.

If you've been diagnosed with osteoarthritis, exercise tailored to your affected joints can increase your range of motion and reduce stiffness. Exercise also strengthens your muscles to help cushion pain and improve mobility. For example, your hips will have less work supporting your body weight if your quadriceps and gluteal, hamstring and abdominal muscles are stronger.

Start with your health care provider, who can offer safe, effective guidelines for increasing your activity. Next, consult a physical therapist to teach you specific exercises you can do at home. It's important to understand and closely follow your exercise prescription.

Keep it low impact. Good choices include aerobic exercise, such as walking, gentle yoga and modest muscle-strengthening routines. Aquatic exercise is especially beneficial for people with severe arthritis. It meets many fitness goals by building flexibility and muscle as well as heart and lung capacity.

Find activities you enjoy, and aim for 150 minutes of exercise a week (i.e. 10 minutes 3 times a day, 5 days a week). Then, enjoy the benefits - greater comfort, confidence and ability to cope with those nagging joints.

Townsend Flowage Assoc. meeting, Kevin Masarik speaker

The Townsend Flowage Association held its semi-annual meeting on Saturday May 23 at the Townsend Town Hall. Kevin Masarik, groundwater education specialist from the University of Wisconsin Stevens Point, was the guest speaker. Kevin's job is to educate private well owners, school children, and the general public regarding a universal human need: potable water.

Kevin used a fascinating visual aid to show the relationship between ground and surface water. "Somewhere between 70 and 90% of water in lakes and streams originates as groundwater," he said, "a fact that seems to be a surprise for most people. These two sources of water are interconnected in a way that makes protection of both vital." There were numerous questions from the audience, but one seemed to be on everyone's mind: What about the quality and supply of my well water?

"The amount of precipitation and high capacity wells are the primary factors that affect water table levels," Kevin answered. "Most residents in northern Wisconsin depend on groundwater pumped from wells for their daily living needs. For some time now, scientists have been addressing the issue of how human behavior affects the amount and composition of water that falls as snow and rain. More recently, there are concerns regarding high capacity wells which pump mega-millions of gallons for use in cities, industry, agriculture, and bottling. We must strike a balance, but if we all use water wisely, we can ensure that our wells never run dry."

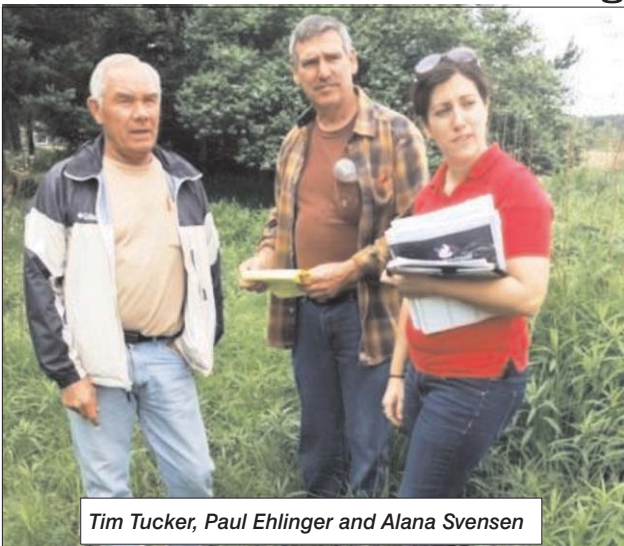
