Wisconsin County Forest Program exceeds certification standards

for forest sustainability Forest County gets good grades

Rhinelander, WI Results from a third party audit of twenty-seven of Wisconsin's County Forests are in and for the 11th consecutive year these forests have exceeded the standards for certified forests as set by the Sustainable Forestry Initiative (SFI®) and/or Forest Stewardship Council (FSC®). SFI and FSC are two of the most widely recognized forest certification systems in North America. Representatives of NSF-International Forestry Program and Scientific Certification Systems Global Services conducted the evaluations and certification of Wisconsin's County Forests. Certification means that these forests are managed according to strict environmental, social and economic standards.

According to Jane Severt, Wisconsin County Forests Association Executive Director, "The 2015 certification audit results demonstrate the exemplary efforts individual county forest administrators and their staff make to properly manage these public properties. Collectively, county forests in Wisconsin represent the largest public landholding in the state covering 2.4 million acres."

The focus of the Wisconsin County Forests is to insure the long-term health and sustainability of forest ecosystems while providing benefits to the public. Primary objectives of these forests include resource and timber management, recreational opportunities, wildlife habitat improvement and watershed protection.

Wisconsin's County Forest system provides more than 6,000 miles of snowmobile, ATV, skiing/hiking trails and forest roads along with a wealth of hunting and fishing opportunities. Forest products from these forests generate over \$30 million annually in timber sale revenue for the counties and townships encompassing these lands and are a significant contributor to Wisconsin's \$20 billion timber industry.

A cooperative management framework between the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the counties provides the opportunity for the county forest group certification program. DNR holds the group certificates for the 27 participating counties and provides technical support to county forest management efforts. Paul Delong, Chief Forester of the DNR states, "Our department works closely with the staff of the County Forests to manage these healthy, productive and sustainable forests. The county forest program is a unique partnership that stretches back 86 years and it's a great example of how local governments and state agencies can work together in addressing statewide needs."

According to County Forest Administrator Dave Ziolkowski, Forest County sold \$322,917 in 2014. To date, Forest County's woodlands have generated, \$301,736 for 2015. In addition, the county park at the south end of Lake Metonga had a record year with \$105,000 in revenue.

Forest County's audit of their county forest gave the county good marks on green tree retention, which means that there was minimal damage to the residual stand, helping produce another good crop of trees in the years to come. Forest County was also lauded for leaving adequate seed trees in the clear cuts, and given good grades on the minimal amount of rutting and erosion.

All harvested deer will be registered electronically in 2015. Hunters have three options for registering their deer: online at gamereg.wi.gov; electronically at a participating in-person registration station; or via telephone at 1-844-GAME-REG (1-844-426-2724)

Registration via telephone requires callers to enter the first three digits that correspond to the county of harvest. It is important to remember that only one digit needs to be entered for each letter. For example, Crawford County would be entered as 2-7-2 for C-R-A. The registration system will ask for clarification if counties have a similar abbreviation.





Upon completion, students will have the opportunity to take the state certification exam, which is required to work as a Nursing Assistant in Wisconsin.

"It's becoming increasingly common for graduates who pass the certification exam to enter the workforce but also continue taking classes at Nicolet," said Health Occupations Dean Lenore Blemke.

"They use the Nursing Assistant credential as a stepping stone to the one-year Practical Nursing diploma and then continue on to earn the two-year associate degree in Nursing."

She noted that demand is high for those with a college credential in the health occupations with job placement rates for Nicolet graduates commonly in the 90 to 100 percent range.

According to the college's 2013-14 Graduate Follow-up Report, the median annual

starting wage for Nursing Assistant graduates was \$22,219 and almost twice that at \$41,493 for those graduating with the two-year associate degree in Nursing.

Finding a Deal Instead of a Steal: **Trustworthy Discount Prescription Cards**

Discount prescription drug cards - you have probably received them in the mail before and felt happy at the thought of a little savings at the prescription counter. Although discount prescription drug cards that offer real savings do exist, use caution before using any discount card.

Reading fine print and asking a few questions can go a long way in determining whether the discount card you received is a potential scam. If a card requires you to pay a fee prior to using the card, it may be a scam as discount cards are generally free. Inspect what the card is offering. If it says it will replace your insurance or Medicare, then it is probably a scam.

In addition to looking for fees and offers, review who is requesting these fees and making these offers. Figuring out who is behind the card can provide great insight to whether the card is safe to use. For example, some Wisconsin counties such as Brown, Rock, Kenosha and Sauk now offer a discount prescription drug card through the National Association of Counties (NACo).

After you determine whether a discount card is safe to use, keep reading the small print. Look for information about who is eligible to use the card, or where the card may be used. A card may only be used by individuals under 65, associated with a specific pharmacy, or limited to purchases of prescription drugs not covered by insurance.

One note about prescription drug discount cards generally: you may face some difficulty shopping for the best deal on your prescriptions using discount cards. Some pharmacies may require you go to into the pharmacy with the discount card and won't give you pricing over the phone.

prior to receiving the price of the prescription with the discount. Like researching discount cards to find out if they are safe to use, you may also have to do some leg-work to determine where you can receive the best deal on your prescriptions with discount cards.

Stepping back from the discount prescription drug cards you receive in the mail, other options exist. Stores like Walgreens, Target, Walmart and Shopko offer discount cards, though each store varies in whether it charges for the discount card. These store cards may offer you a lower price Party and Bingo - LAONA on generic or 90-day prescriptions. In addition to store ALVIN pharmacy discount cards, you can also search for Thursday - October 22 - Chili, vegetable sticks, fruit ounts on specific brands of prescription drugs.

There are a variety of ways you may be able to save Thursday - October 29 - Chicken mashed potatoes, pears, money on your prescription drugs. 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

Chronic Inflammation: What you need to know

Chronic inflammation occurs when the immune system's powerful defenses are switched on -- and stay on. Doctors have discovered many things that can cause chronic inflammation in the arteries: everyday infections, such as gum disease or the stomach-ulcer bacteria *H. pylori*; substances released by excess tummy fat; and plain old aging.

How it happens: Chronic inflammation is bad for the heart because it contributes to plaque buildup in the arteries. Here's how that works: When inflammatory chemicals discover LDL particles in artery walls, they send macrophages to eradicate the unwelcome cholestorol. The byproducts of this attack are foam cells that are the basis of plaque. As plaque grows, it develops a hard, fibrous cap, but inflammatory compounds can weaken this protective lid, making it susceptible to rupturing into the bloodstream. Other inflammatory compounds encourage blood to clot, and if constant, low-grade inflammation causes a steady supply of these compounds in your bloodstream, it can also lead to a heart attack.

What's New:

Predictive qualities. The link between internal inflammation and heart disease emerged only within the past five years or so. Now we know that chronic inflammation may help doctors predict which patients with near-normal cholesterol levels could go on to have heart attacks.

Detecting it: Doctors use a blood test for an inflammatory marker called C-reactive protein (CRP). Results under 1 mg/dl are ideal, 1-3 mg/dl is normal, and over 3 mg/dl indicates potentially chronic inflammation.

Standard Medicare Care: So far, there are no drugs for chronic inflammation, although statins, beta-blockers, and low-dose aspirin may act as anti-inflammatories. Doctors are also exploring whether low doses of antibiotics are appropriate for people with low-grade, persistent infections.

Viability of Self Treatment: High for most people -- but only if you take care of your whole body. Flossing, for example, is important to eradicate gum infections. Taking care of your digestion is important to minimize the bacteria that cause ulcers. Also, lose belly fat and eat more inflammation-cooling omega-3 fatty acids (found in cold-water fish such as salmon and in canola oil, nuts, flaxseed and fish-oil supplements).

Can they take my home?

Consumers are often concerned that outstanding debt can lead to creditors taking possession of their most valuable asset -- their home. While one has a right to worry that this could happen, there are certain procedures that must be followed for a creditor to take an interest in one's home. Also, a creditor is often limited to placing a lien on the person's home. This does not mean the creditor takes possession of the home and forces the debtor out.

What is a Lien?

A lien is a notice attached to property informing others that a creditor claims the homeowner owes them money. A lien is typically a public record. It is generally filed with a county records office. Liens on real estate are a common way for creditors to collect what they are owed.

To sell or refinance property, there must be clear title. A lien on a house or mobile home make the title unclear. To clear up the title, the lien must be paid off.

Here are three common scenarios and the process and exceptions for creditors to gain an interest in a debtor's home.

Standard Creditor (i.e. credit card, medical debt, etc.)

First, a standard creditor cannot take possession of a person's home outright. They can, however, put a judgment lien on a home. To get a judgment lien, the creditor must file a lawsuit in court and have judgment granted in their favor. If the person then sells his or her home with a judgment lien attached to it, he or she must pay the lien off first from the proceeds.

Like many areas of law, there are a couple of caveats:

- Liens on real estate are granted for 10 years
- The first \$75,000 of a home's value is exempt

DHS/Estate Recovery

Estate recovery is a means for the state to seek repayment from recipients of home health and long-term care benefits. One tool the state may use to recoup those costs is placing a lien on the beneficiary's home.

DHS may file a lien on:

- A home and all property used and operated in connection with that home
- A mobile home and the land it sits on, when the member owns the land
 - A home placed in a revocable trust
- Life estates created on or after August 1, 2014
 DHS may file a Notice of Intent to File a Lien when a Medicaid member:
- Lives in a nursing home or inpatient hospital and is required to contributed to the cost of care
 - Has a home
- Is not expected to return to live at that home However, DHS will not enforce a lien while any of those relatives of the member reside in that home:
 - Spouse
 - Child who is under age 21, blind or disabled
- Sibling who has an equity interest in the home and lived in the home continuously beginning at least 12 months before the member's nursing home or hospital admission

Reverse Mortgages

A reverse mortgage is a loan that allows a senior to convert the equity in his or her home into cash. The loan balance becomes due when the senior sells the home, passes away or moves out permanently.

If a person passes away while living in the home, the estate does inherit the home, but there will be a lien on the title. If the heirs wish to retain the property, the full amount of the loan must be paid regardless of property value. The amount due to loan maturity is the principal borrowed plus any accrued interest and mortgage insurance premium. If the heirs sell the home for 95% of fair market value but the amount due is more, they are not required to pay the outstanding balance.

If the balance due is not paid, the lender may have the right to force a foreclosure on the property. If a surviving spouse remains in the home, he or she may be able to avoid foreclosure but that determination would require looking at the specific facts of the case and terms of the reverse mortgage.

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Your brain and body need all three macronutrients (carbohydrates, fats and protein), and getting the right amounts of these nutrients can give you energy.

About half your calories should come from carbohydrates, about 30 percent from fat and about 20 percent from protein. Various nutrition experts argue about those percentages, and you may find you prefer a diet that's lower in fat or lower in carbs, but nonetheless, you need all three macronutrients.

Healthier Foods Increase Your Energy

With that macronutrient balance in mind, each of your meals and snacks should contain some amount of protein, complex carbohydrates and fat. The best choices are whole foods or minimally processed foods rather than highly processed foods. Choose a fruit or vegetable (or more than one) for each meal, some whole grain and something with a

For example, breakfast can be a slice of whole grain toast with peanut butter and a banana. The toast and banana provide complex carbohydrates you need for energy, along with some fiber and the peanut butter adds protein and some fat. For a mid-morning snack, choose plain Greek yogurt and add fresh berries and nuts. Lunch can be a turkey sandwich with cheese on whole wheat bread with a salad on the side. For dinner, enjoy a salmon filet with brown rice and asparagus. See the pattern? Each meal or snack has a complex carbohydrate, some protein and a little fat and includes one or more fruits or vegetables.

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
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
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Open enrollment for Part D is upon us

The open enrollment for Part D drug plans is upon us. The AEP or annual enrollment period is October 15 through December 7, 2015.

This is the time when each individual can opt out of the current drug plan they are in and choose another plan. The reasons you might do this is because your current plan has increased their premium, or increased the deductible or co-pays for the medications you are on.

Each plan has a formulary. The formulary is a listing of drugs that your plan carries within that plan. It is vital that you check this formulary to make sure that all your medications are covered to avoid non-coverage at a later date. The formulary is a catalog of medications by name and dosage. It is very important to check to make sure of the coverage.

The open enrollment is the time of changes. It is the time to check your current status and review everything in the event there is a need to change plans.

Who is eligible? Any individual who receives health care coverage through the Medicare program.

How much will prescription drugs cost? Costs under Part D will vary according to the plan choice, medication needs and income level. Many Medicare beneficiaries will have to pay a monthly premiums for Part D coverage. Those with lower incomes will qualify for LIS, which is a low income subsidy to assist with drug costs. This will allow lower income seniors to avoid a premium, deductibles and low cost for your co-pay of the medications.

What happens if I have other prescription drug coverage? Many Medicare beneficiaries have prescription coverage through sources such as employer based retiree benefits, Seniorcare, Medicare or Medigap insurances. If so, you have creditable coverage.

This is a reminder to anyone who has had difficulty with their present drug plans and would like to change the plan they have.

I would encourage you to watch the mail for anything from your present drug plans. You may receive an update with changes to your present plan. This is very important to read these notifications of changes.

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

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

Utilities will inform consumers of their monthly "budget billing" amount, and typically review the budget every six months. If consumers choose this option, monthly usage should be monitored closely to ensure the result is not a large balance due at the end of the cycle. **Energy Assistance**


