More on the dismal deer hunt and send game camera pics to the DNR!

We are sorry, but we had the deer count from 2014 in last week's paper. Haste makes waste, as they say. but I haven't been able to find a county-by-county deer kill tally for 2015 either. I don't want to pick on the DNR, but their website is like navigating your way around the Long Swamp if you were dropped in the middle of it on a moonless night. Then again, maybe I'm not electronically hip enough.

I did find that the opening weekend buck kill in Forest County was down to 399 this year, and last year's opening weekend produced 478 bucks. This is a decrease of 16.53%.

We have had good response on the story of the deer hunt from last week. Most deer hunters can end a deer season happily enough, if they don't have a buck, if they can see some deer. This certainly wasn't one of those seasons, and the 2014 season wasn't a banner season either.

People who had game cameras out reported more wolves than deer, and wolf tracks, according to some, were more plentiful than deer tracks. The usual people to blame are DNR personnel, but as we know, they aren't the culprits.

It would seem that radical environmentalists have more pull with federal judges than the deer hunters or the DNR. As has been with federal timber sales, people who live in urban areas believe they know what is best for timber production, wildlife and residents of rural northern Wisconsin counties. This begs the question as to what and how these enviros gather the information on wolf populations or any other wildlife and plant statistics here in

In last week's paper, we mentioned two things that dedicated deer hunters should probably do.

One is to fill out the DNR Game Survey that can be picked up online. We mentioned this in the last issue, and we also had a short piece on sharing game camera shots with the DNR. If we expect the folks at DNR to go to bat for us legislatively and with federal judges, we should give them some ammunition. Picture after picture showing more wolves than deer on a bait pile should help, not to mention the bear and bobcats.

For those who missed the message last week, come January it will be illegal to bait or feed deer in Forest County due to a CWD deer found within ten miles of Forest County. The CWD deer was in a game farm just south of Three Lakes, and the ban will also be in Oneida and Vilas counties.



Retired Army medic Olympia Rios jump starts nursing career with credit for prior learning at Nicolet College



Military veteran Olympia Rios served for more than 20 years in the Army, spending much of that time working as a medic.

"My goal was to retire from the military and also learn something I could use afterwards," said Rios, who retired from service this past April.

But when she first left, she didn't know for sure if she wanted to leap right into a second career after spending more than half of her life in the military.

"I knew I wanted to go to school for something, but I wanted it to be something fun," she said. "I've always loved baking and pastries, so I enrolled in Nicolet's Culinary program."

She had also considered the college's Nursing program to draw on her past experience.

"But when I looked at all of the prerequisites to get into the Nursing program, it was a lot. I wasn't ready for that so I veered toward Culinary."

"It's like a fast-track for veterans," Rios explained.
"You can actually get college credit for what you already know. It's pretty awesome."

With help from Bobbi Apfel, tutor and health career and placement coach at Nicolet, Rios reviewed the testing material to prepare for the exams.

She passed with flying colors, earning 22 credits for the skills and knowledge she acquired as an Army medic.

"Next fall I'll be in the Nursing program, which is incredibly exciting," she said. "This saved me a lot of time and money and that's huge."

Rios also offered advice to other people, veterans and non-veterans alike, thinking about attending Nicolet.

"Just go for it," she said. "Take the leap and you'll be proud you did. Everybody at Nicolet was so helpful. They're going to do everything within their power to help you succeed."

Statewide crackdown on drunken driving begins Friday

'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over' campaign runs from December 18 to January 3

Law enforcement agencies across the state will be out in force to combat drunken driving during the national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign from Friday, December 18 to Sunday, January 3.

"Enforcement and educational efforts to prevent drunken driving, like the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign, have helped reduce deaths from alcohol-related crashes by approximately 51 percent and injuries by 55 percent over the last 10 years in 7:45 a.m. For more info call 715-473-2613. Wisconsin," says David Pabst, director of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's (WisDOT) Bureau of Transportation Safety.

Wisconsin residents also support law enforcement efforts to stop, test and arrest drivers who make the irresponsible and reckless decision to get behind the wheel while impaired during the holiday season. According to the 2015 AAA Consumer Pulse Survey conducted in September and October, 78 percent of the Wisconsin respondents (nearly four out of five) agreed that there should be an increased law enforcement presence to catch impaired drivers during the holiday season.

The 2015 AAA Consumer Pulse Survey also showed:

- · If they drink while away from home, 39 percent of the respondents always use a designated driver, and 17 percent frequently use a designated driver.
- · Of the respondents who drink, 36 percent consume more alcohol than usual at Christmas events and parties, and 38 percent consume more alcohol than usual on New Year's Eve. Christmas and New Year's Eve were the two most popular holidays for drinking.
- · Of the respondents who drink, 56 percent said that they were more likely to use a designated driver during the holidays.
- "Impaired driving is a major problem in our state, and AAA Wisconsin supports the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign," says Vicki Hanson, regional president for AAA Wisconsin. "If you know someone who is under the influence of alcohol or drugs, do not let them drive.
- To help prevent drunken driving, WisDOT offers a free Zero In Wisconsin Drive Sober mobile app, which includes:
- A Find-a-Ride feature that uses a smart phone's GPS to locate alternative transportation—including taxi services, mass transit, Uber and Lyft.
- · A blood alcohol estimator.
- · A designated driver selector.
- · Interactive games that help determine whether drivers should give up their car keys.

5 Foods You Think Are Healthy But Aren't

Don't let them fool you. Get the scoop on five foods often mistaken as diet-friendly.

1. Wraps. They can trick you into thinking they are a healthy choice because they're thin, but each wrap is often big enough for two people! Depending on its size, a wrap alone can bring 300 calories to the table. Also, wraps tend to be made with refined grains, instead of the dietary fiber you need. Don't be deceived by colorful choices like green spinach wraps. One look at the ingredients list and you'll probably find spinach listed all the way at the bottom, meaning the amount of spinach you're actually eating is negligible.

2. Veggie burgers. They seem like super food because "veggie" is in the name, right? Veggie burgers can be a healthy option when they're made with mostly vegetables. The problem is that many frozen and prepared varieties contain more fillers, like yeast and corn starch, than actual veggies. Your best bet is to look at the

ingredients list and make sure the first item is a vegetable. Each patty should be no more than 150 calories and have 7 grams of protein. Any veggie patty with more than 10 grams of protein is likely made with more wheat gluten and soy protein than actual veggies.

3. Couscous. Couscous tends to have a healthy reputation because it's popular among vegetarians. But be careful. Its main ingredient is semolina flour, just like plain white pasta. So if you think you're eating healthy -- think again! You might as well order your favorite fettuccine dish! For only one-third of a cup, couscous will set you back 230 calories! Opt for whole-wheat couscous or quinoa instead.

4. Gluten-free bread. Just because it's gluten-free doesn't mean it's healthy. Gluten-free products are intended for those who are intolerant to whole grains like wheat, and they're typically filled with sugar, sodium, and refined grains to make them taste better. Without whole grains, gluten-free bread is missing key nutrients like naturally-occurring fiber and B vitamins. For healthy gluten-free foods, look for products that list a whole grain, like brown rice flour, as the first ingredient.

5. Taco salad. When you're at a Mexican restaurant, taco salad usually seems like a healthy choice on the menu. It may be the healthiest option, but it can still sabotage your diet. These salads are generally served in a tortilla shell that's been deep fried. They're typically loaded with ground beef,





Better management needed for public lands

In the midst of abundance why are we, in the West, smothering in an airtight cage of poverty and ecological destruction?

The western United States has become a welfare state dependent on federal handouts in the form of Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) and Secure Rural Schools (SRS) funds. Eastern politicians refer to PILT-SRS as "Western Welfare" and with good reason. Our government has removed our ability to support ourselves. There is no reason for this. We want to contribute to America's success and it is high time we did.

Fires have raged across the western landscape and needlessly consumed millions of acres. Human lives and personal property have been lost. Critical habitat for animals and endangered species has been destroyed. Billions of tons of greenhouse gases are released into the atmosphere and our water is becoming more polluted from ensuing mismanagement practices forced upon federal government by the environmental lobby and its litigation strategies.

In 2012, 246,000 acres burned in Idaho County. Conservatively using just 20 percent of what actually burned reveals some staggering numbers: 1.23 billion board feet (BDFT) of timber burned. The value at \$300 per thousand BDFT equates to \$369 million. The multiplier in a timber manufacturing economy is five to seven, but if we use only three this equated to over \$1 billion in lost economic activity within Idaho County and its surrounding neighboring counties.

That's lost salaries, which pay taxes to fund schools, county governments, social security, Medicare, Medicaid, workman's compensation and unemployment taxes. Twenty-five percent of this resource value used to be returned to the county to fund education and roads. That would have been \$92.25 million to Idaho County. Almost 13 million tons of greenhouse gases were released into the atmosphere and over 750,000 dead animals were also left in the wake of this destruction. All this now rots on the ground. This year, another 250,000-acres-plus burned on federally managed lands in Idaho County. Much of this could have been prevented.

In an attempt to build cooperation, several collaborative attempts have been organized across the West. Idaho and Clearwater counties have been engaged in a process of collaboration for eight years known, nationwide, as the Clearwater Basin Collaborative.

With respect to environmental organizations like the Idaho Conservation League and the Idaho Wilderness Society, it would appear that anything but cooperating and building trust is part of their goals. Idaho County Commissioner Skip Brandt expressed his frustration stating, "Through the collaborative process, conservation groups have worked on some projects but will not entertain any substantial changes to their stranglehold on land management policies." Commissioner Don Ebert of Clearwater County summed it up best when he stated, "The environmentalist at the table are absolute in their resolve to determine what we should be satisfied with."

Since this collaborative process began, 50 million acres of federally managed land in the West has gone up in smoke and 7.9 billion tons of greenhouse gases have been released into the atmosphere polluting our air and water supplies. Critical wildlife habitat is destroyed while millions of animals perish in the fires and economic losses are exceeding hundreds of billions of dollars. All of this because of irrational logic, litigation and junk science fostered by an over-zealous environmental community seeking their brand of management.

While we sit at tables talking, these organizations continue to pursue a legal strategy to lock up the land and us out. Ironically, when they prevail in the courts -- and they do more often than not -- they get paid by the American taxpayer using the Equal Access to Justice Act. The environmental community has grown from a ragtag group hanging and protesting from trees to well organized businesses complete with corporate structures and boardrooms.

They represent a portion of corporate America complete with \$80 billion in assets and an annual contribution to our nation's GDP of \$7 billion annually. Is it really about saving the environment or making money? Our Western communities' health, safety, welfare and economic vitality hang in the balance, and one has to wonder do they even care?

In the West we do care. Properly managed lands provide a better quality of life, a healthier ecosystem, quality habitat for wildlife, cleaner water and air, and better recreational opportunities. It brings balance to injustices being perpetrated upon our western communities by an environmental lobby who just does not seem to care.

We must not be content with the current situation. There are better ways of managing the public lands. We have the solutions to the challenges facing us but we must unite. We need better access and better management, and as elected county officials we are closest to the people and better understand the challenge before us. Within our counties, our state county organizations, and NACo we have the power to band together and work towards the common goal of securing a brighter future for our children and our grandchildren.


