Photo ID required at the polls What to expect at the polling place

Now that people are bringing their IDs to vote, voting at your polling place will be a little different. Just remember to be patient; not everyone will be as prepared for these changes as you are.

State It

As always, you'll need to state your full name and address for the election official who checks you in. They'll check your information in the poll book. Understandably, some people are uneasy about announcing their name in public, but it is the law, and it helps ensure openness in elections.

Show It

Next, it's time to show your photo ID. That way, poll workers can compare your face to your photo and confirm that you really are you.

The address on your ID doesn't have to be current. And the name on your ID doesn't need to be an exact match for your name in the poll book. (So, Richards who go by Rich, Bobs who are also Roberts and Susans with IDs that say Sue can relax.) Of course, there are certain requirements. Your ID should look like you, even if you've colored your hair, shaved your beard or lost some weight.

Sign It

Finally, you'll sign the poll book (unless a physical disability prevents it). Your signature or mark should go right next to your name and address. Now you're ready to vote.

How to get a free Wisconsin State ID if you do not have a Wisconsin Drivers License

To get a free ID card, you will need to take a few documents to your Division of Motor Vehicles office.

There's a long list of documents you can use below, but most people will be fine with a certified birth certificate, a Social Security card and a utility bill or cell phone bill. You'll notice that some records, like a certified birth certificate, satisfy more than one category.

Just be sure to bring originals — photocopies don't work — and check the box that says "ID for Free" on your application. Once it's complete, you'll get a receipt (valid for 45 days) that you can use at the polls until your state ID arrives by mail.

The documents fall into four categories:

Proof of Name and Date of Birth, Proof of Identity, Proof of Citizenship or Legal Status, Proof of Wisconsin Residency

Crandon and Wabeno to participate in Statewide Open House

Selecting and Scheduling Open House Sites

In order to provide a consistent visitor experience at sites across the state, there are a number of criteria which should be used in selecting local sites to be part of the Open House event. These include:

1. Buildings or sites included in the Open House event must be open during the hours of 10 am – 5 pm on Saturday, May 14th, and entrance must be free during these hours (although you may provide visitors the opportunity to leave donations). It his highly recommended that sites are staffed with experts on the historic and/or cultural significance of the site during the open house, and scheduled tours or talks are highly encouraged. A minimum of 5 sites is required per community, though communities may identify as many sites that meet program criteria as they are able to secure and staff.

How to feed the birds, but not the deer



Most of us know that deer baiting in Forest County is no longer legal because of a CWD deer in an enclosure in Oneida County. That deer was within ten miles of Forest and Vilas Counties, so all three counties have a deer baiting and feeding ban. People who routinely fed deer in their back yard cannot legally do the feeding now. This brings up the question of feeding birds.

According to the DNR, bird feeders must be higher than a deer can reach, so the feathered friends can still get their handouts as long as the deer can't reach the feeder. Another rule is that the feeder(s) must be within 50 yards of the house.


Friends of Wabeno Plan for 2016

that adults get 150 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity per week. That's 2 hours and 30 minutes, the same amount of time you might watch a movie. The good news is that you can spread your activity out during the week, so you don't have to do it all at once. You can even break it up into smaller chunks of time during the day. It's about what works best for you, as long as you're doing physical activity at a moderate or vigorous effort for at least 10 minutes at a time.

Remember you should try to combine muscle strengthening activity like weights, resistance bands, lunges, squats...with activity that gets your heart pumping like walking, swimming, dancing, biking.

Info on the Zika Virus from the Forest County Health Dept

Zika virus infection is a disease transmitted to humans by the bite of infected and mosquitoes. The first human case of Zika virus occurred in 1954, and since then, there have been outbreaks in many areas of Africa, Southeast Asia and the Pacific Islands. It has recently spread to Central and South America and the Caribbean. Reported U.S. cases are associated with travel to a highrisk area. Currently there has been no report of Zika virus infections in Wisconsin travelers. The species of mosquitoes that can transmit Zika virus is not yet found in Wisconsin.

About 80 percent of people who are infected with Zika virus may not have any symptoms. Illness may develop in 20 percent of infected people. Symptoms are generally mild and can last for several days to a week. Common symptoms are fever, rash, joint pain, conjunctivitis (red eyes), muscle pain or headache. Severe symptoms and death are uncommon. There is no vaccine, or specific medication treatment for Zika virus illness. Supportive care is recommended.

Zika virus can be transmitted from the mother to the baby during pregnancy. Zika virus infections may be associated with microcephaly (a medical condition in which the circumference of the head is smaller than normal because the brain has not developed properly or has stopped growing) and other poor birth outcomes of babies born to infected mothers. Further research is needed to determine the relationship between Zika virus and birth defects, but women who are pregnant or trying to become pregnant should exercise caution, consult a doctor to get advice before traveling to high-risk areas, and take precaution to prevent exposure to mosquito bites.

2. Sites should feature buildings with architectural interest, historic importance or significant cultural connections.

3. The building or site is normally closed to the public, OR; the part of the building you are opening is normally closed to the public, OR; the building or attraction is normally open to the public but charges a fee, OR; the building or attraction is planning to host a special event or activity on site as part of the Open House Event.

4. Permission from the building owner/tenants has been secured in writing.

- * Masonic Temple
- ** Older Businesses in Historic Buildings
 - 'Behind the scenes' tours of churches including trips to steeples, crypts, etc.



Gray wolf is not endangered in Wisconsin

If you want to hear about a federal program that has succeeded — maybe too well — you should hear what Wisconsinites tell us and our staffs about the return of the gray wolf.

The wolf justifiably spent the better part of three decades on the Endangered Species List, an extraordinary level of protection that has allowed a remarkable increase in the population of this top-level predator across a third of our state. Wolves have responded so well that they are no longer hunting just for deer and they are no longer living far from humans.

Farmers tell about losing cattle routinely to wolves. Worse, they feel they have no control over a growing threat, said Mark Liebaert of South Range. A member of the Douglas County Board, he's also the treasurer of the Wisconsin Farmers Union Board of Directors. He hears from many northern farmers alarmed by increasing wolf attacks on their livestock.

Liebaert farms cattle not deep in the North Woods but only 15 miles from downtown Superior. Wolves hunt his cattle and they are not frightened off by humans. "They have spread," he said. "They're into agricultural areas."

That is an effect of the extraordinary rebound that led wildlife experts in the U.S. Department of the Interior — as far back as 2011 — to determine that the gray wolf in the western Great Lakes is no longer endangered. The population was "fully recovered and healthy," said President Obama's secretary of the interior.

This federal "delisting" meant that state wildlife agencies could begin to manage the population so the wolf's ongoing role in the ecosystem did not come at the expense of farmers, loggers, sportsmen and people who simply live in the northern third of our state. Numbers have been growing so rapidly that the quota-limited, state-sanctioned wolf hunts during the winters of 2012-13 and 2013-14 resulted in just over 500 wolves being legally harvested.

The rapid growth in wolf numbers is also why so many people across the state are angry that in 2014, a judge in Washington, D.C., overruled the wildlife experts and returned the gray wolf to the Endangered Species List. The judge's decision ignored science and took the management of wolf population out of Wisconsin experts' hands. It left Wisconsinites with no say.

"People can't walk their dogs" safely in rural areas, said Liebaert. They fear losing beloved companions "because the wolves come out of the woods." Farmers seeing their livestock attacked can do nothing. "I could legally shoot my neighbor's dog if it were harassing my cattle," he said, "but I cannot shoot a wolf that's killing them."

Proper wildlife management can prevent that kind of absurd situation. It means that wolves and people can get along. The first step is to return to the course that the U.S. Department of Interior deemed appropriate — delisting the gray wolf. That's why we've each led congressional efforts in the House and the Senate by introducing bills last year, and pursuing legislative action to do just that. And just last week, Sen. Johnson filed an amendment to an energy policy bill to accomplish the same thing.

This amendment's language does not modify the Endangered Species Act, nor does it stop the Fish and Wildlife Service from returning the wolf to the endangered list if its experts determine the population is again in need of such protection. We agree with the Wisconsinites who sav future gray wolf listing decisions should come from the experts in Wisconsin, not judges in Washington.

All of us can all agree that it's important to protect our environment — and that a crucial part of the success we've seen has been the protections given by the Endangered Species Act to wildlife populations that have needed it. But we need to recognize a win. The wolf belongs in Wisconsin, but so do farmers and rural residents. Federal policy should accommodate both.

Tablet Ergonomics

Since reading, working and keeping in touch socially are now often done on tablets, users need to reexamine the way they hold and read tablets so they don't incur injury or strain. A Harvard School of Public Health study revealed tablet users put a considerable amount of strain on their necks compared to desktop or laptop users. What can you do to prevent neck strain and pain?

- Position your tablet at or just below eye level, which may mean that you place the tablet higher than table or desk level. This prevents constantly bending your neck to look down, which causes undue neck strain.
- Move around. Take advantage of a tablet's portability and take frequent breaks or change positions so you are not sitting in one position for long periods.
- Use a separate keyboard if you plan on using your tablet like a desktop.
- Keep a neutral position when reading your tablet shoulders relaxed and neck straight.

These few pointers should help you avoid unnecessary pain and strain.
