


Happy Birthday to Sylvester Schaenzer age 103! arty at Madonna Hall!





Adopt-a-Highway crews keep Wisconsin roadsides clean and green

More volunteers needed—plenty of state highway segments available for adoption

In a typical year, Wisconsin's 2,900 Adopt-a-Highway groups collect nearly 210 tons of trash and recyclables along state roadways, saving taxpayers' money and keeping roadsides looking clean and green for state residents and visitors.

"It's that time of year when our Adopt-a-Highway workers are out picking up a winter's worth of debris along state highways," said Rose Phetteplace, director of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's (WisDOT) Bureau of Highway Maintenance. "These volunteers provide a tremendous service to their state and community, and we're asking drivers to be alert and cautious anytime they approach roadside workers."

Of the 11,800 miles of state highway in Wisconsin, about 8,600 miles or about 72 percent are adopted, meaning there's still plenty of room for more volunteers. Groups interested in adopting a state highway segment can find more information on the WisDOT website.

Adopt-a-Highway workers are asked to clean-up their assigned two-mile state highway segment at least three times per year. WisDOT furnishes safety vests, highway worker signs, a safety training video, trash bags, and two permanent signs identifying the group. Each group must provide one adult supervisor for every five or six volunteers. Groups do not work in dangerous areas like medians, bridges or steep slopes. Trash and recyclables are placed along roadways and picked up by county highway workers.

April is National Distracted Driving **Awareness Month**

Last year in Wisconsin, 94 people were killed in distracted driving crashes

A hairbrush, a hamburger and a cellphone—all are harmless except when you're behind the wheel of a

"When drivers comb their hair while looking in the rearview mirror, eat a meal, or text message while driving, they are in fact distracted and in danger of causing a crash or failing to avoid one," says David Pabst, director of the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Bureau of Transportation Safety. "Trying to multi-task while driving is a recipe for disaster."

To remind people that they must give driving their undivided attention, Congress has designated April as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month.

"The dangers of distracted driving, also known as inattentive driving, are not exaggerated and are a growing threat to everyone on the road. Last year in Wisconsin, 94 people were killed in crashes in which at least one driver was listed as driving inattentively. In addition, 10,615 people were injured in distracted driving crashes in 2015," Pabst reports. "That's an increase from 2014 when 72 people were killed and 9,704 were injured."

To help motivate people to pay attention behind the wheel, WisDOT has produced new TV, radio and online messages that creatively highlight how distracted driving is entirely preventable. The video messages, featuring a new super-villain known as the "Distractor," also will be available on WisDOT's Facebook and Twitter.

To help local communities combat distracted driving, WisDOT has allocated federal funding to support law enforcement task forces in Crawford, Grant, Iowa, Juneau, La Crosse, Sauk, Waupaca, Portage and Wood

In addition, WisDOT will continue to display messages warning about the dangers of distracted driving on electronic signs on major highways.

Pabst says, "Even though you may have a busy life and have thought about multi-tasking behind the wheel, it's time to put a stop to distracted driving habits, which put your life and the lives of others in grave danger."

Although many actions are distractions while driving, significant public and legislative attention has been focused on talking and texting on cell phones. Wisconsin law prohibits texting while driving, and drivers with an instruction permit or probationary license, which includes many teenagers, are prohibited from using a cell phone while driving except in an emergency.







When do I sign up for Medicare Part A and Part B?

I am turning 65 this year. When do I sign up for Medicare Part A and Part B?

When you're first eligible for Medicare, you have a 7-month Initial Enrollment Period (IEP) to sign up for Part A and/or Part B. Your IEP includes the three months before, the month of, and the three months following your 65th birthday. The date when your Medicare coverage begins depends on when you sign up. For example, if you enroll during the first three months of your IEP, coverage begins the month of your 65th birthday. However, if you enroll during the fifth month of your IEP, coverage begins the second month following the month of enrollment. If you enroll during the sixth or seventh month of your IEP, coverage begins the third month following the month of enrollment. Remember, you must contact the Social Security Administration to enroll, unless you are already receiving Social Security retirement or disability benefits.

If you did not enroll in Medicare during your IEP, you can sign up during the next General Enrollment Period (GEP), which occurs annually from January 1 through March 31 every year; however, your premium costs may increase as a result of this delay. You will have to pay a 10 percent Part B premium penalty for each 12-month period you delayed enrolling in Medicare Part B. You could have to continue paying this penalty for as long as you're enrolled in Medicare. If you enroll during the GEP, your coverage will begin July 1 of the year you sign up.

Moratorium for heating season coming to an end

Consumers encouraged to make payment arrangements on delinquent heating bills

MADISON - The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) encourages utility customers to stay connected as the heating season comes to an end. The PSC advises consumers to contact their local utility company if they have fallen behind in their utility payments for the 2015-2016 winter season. Utility service may be disconnected on or after April 16, 2016, if energy bills have not been paid or a payment plan has not been arranged with the utility.

To provide health and safety protections during Wisconsin's cold winter months, PSC rules prohibit utilities from disconnecting consumers between November 1 and April 15 for nonpayment of utility bills. However, after April 15, utilities are not required to provide service to customers who are behind on their bills. To avoid disconnection, customers who have fallen behind in payments are encouraged to contact their local utility to set up a payment plan.



Excitement and anticipation were in the air as a cast of 30 local men impersonated the town founders who made and seconded motions that would legally establish the Town of Townsend. A dozen women portrayed their wives, many of whom were visibly upset that their voices at

the ballot box would be silent and remain that way until

The original script, taken directly from the meeting's minutes as recorded by Mathew Bolund on April 4, 1916, served as the basis for a much-embellished program written by Kathleen Marsh, who directed the production which included interactive elements and a mini-suffragette demonstration.

Opening and closing music was provided by God's Guys, a Barbershop Quartet from St. John Lutheran Church. They led off with a rousing rendition of the "National Anthem" and closed with "America the Beautiful." A highlight of the afternoon was "A Townsend Day" sung by Don Franzen (lyrics by Kathleen Marsh, music by Scott Wycherley).

Marsh's latest book titled "Townsend Time 1916-2016: A Centennial Tribute" was also introduced that day, and a number of attendees picked up maps, directions and details for the Road Warrior "Walk 100 miles for 100 Years" activity which will run from April through October.

Robert Glocke, grandson of Fred Glocke, who was elected one of the Town Supervisors a hundred years ago, drove 500 miles, from Fairfield, lowa, to see the reenactment. Jay Rietz, direct descendant of Carl "Charlie" Rietz who surveyed and laid out the township came to roleplay his great-grandfather. He brought along Charlie's compass and read a poem his great-grandfather had written about the beauty of the surrounding area

Also on hand were Representative Jeff Mursau and Senator Tom Tiffany, who presented Town Chairman Bruce Karow with a commemorative plaque recognizing Townsend's hundredth birthday.

The Centennial Committee is hosting monthly events from April to October. Next up is a Quilt Show hosted by the Looney Ladies Quilting Circle under the direction of Carole Haggstrom. A variety of antique and modern quilts will be displayed on May 29 at the Townsend Town Hall beginning at noon. At 1:00, the Looney Ladies will present their beautiful commemorative quilt to the town. Following will be a 45 minute Townsend history program titled "Townsend Time: the First Hundred Years".
