Senator Ron Johnson visits Forest County national forest stewardship timber sale

On Monday, May 2nd, Senator Ron Johnson visited a timber sale purchased by Bob Connor, Jr. on the Bushafer Road, near Wabeno. The timber sale was a result of a new way of bringing timber to market on the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest. As Senator Johnson has been an active elected representative in trying to bring more timber utilization to the logging industry on our national forests, he had an interest in seeing an active sale using this new approach.

Bob Connor, Jr. is the owner of the sale, and his logging crews are actively cutting the timber. Connor is happy to have a timber sale close to home, and said that having a four-mile haul to Butch Piontek's sawmill is a plus.

Piontek said he was also happy with the timber sale. Through the years that federal timber sale numbers declined, he was forced to haul timber from longer distances to keep his headrig filled with sawbolts. In some cases, Piontek said, they had to buy wood from 100 miles plus to keep raw material in the mill yard.

Senator Johnson was pleased to see progress made in the timber industry and in establishing more federal timber sales, as he has spent considerable amount of time on the issue. He thanked timber industry representatives for educating him on how the industry works and how important it is not only to northern Wisconsin but to the entire state.

With stewardship timber sales, the budgets of local ranger districts are not reduced. Using stewardship, service work is performed on the national forest lands that is used to pay the costs of setting up and administering the sale. The program is operated by the Sustainable Resource Institute.

Local Forest Service budgets are affected by outside events such as fires in western states. Personnel from local ranger districts are routinely sent to fight severe fires, which uses up budget that could have been used for timber sales. The Stewardship Program is one step that is being used to correct the problem. It should also be noted that money generated from the timber sale doesn't have to be spent on the timber sale area. These funds can be used for everything from boat launch restoration, to wildlife openings, reforestation and more marking projects for future timber sales.

That's the day they will gather with family and friends in the Forest County Potawatomi Auditorium to take part in a first-of-its-kind graduation ceremony Nicolet College will hold in the tribal community.

"We're all very excited," said Leach, who will walk across the auditorium stage to collect her college certificate in Professional Communication. "It's been a great experience and really interesting to see how much we've all grown and how much we've learned taking the classes."

The journey started last fall semester when the students, all tribal employees, started taking Nicolet classes that were held right in the Forest County Potawatomi Community in Crandon.

The original idea for the classes took root several years ago when Potawatomi Administrator Eugene Shawano was looking to expand professional development opportunities for employees working in tribal enterprises.

In the past, sending staff to conferences and workshops was a mainstay. While many conferences were good, they wanted training more tailored to their specific needs.

"There were times when we just weren't seeing







Stress Management 101

Stress is unavoidable, but it needn't be unmanageable. Changing how you respond to stressful situations can help protect your health. Because we all react differently to stress, it's best to personalize your management plan. Start with these steps:

- Identify the source of your stress. Is it something external (long commute, recent loss) or internal (illness, attitudes)? Is there a pattern of the things that upset you?
- Review how you handle stress. Keep a stress journal: Note stressful events, how you felt, how you responded and what helped you feel better. Reduce stress by following the 4 As: **avoid** stressors, **alter** situations, **adapt** to change and **accept** reality.
- Take care of health priorities. Do you get enough rest, nutritious food, exercise and social support? These are the foundations of a healthier, happier life.
- Be honest. Do you aggravate the situation by procrastinating; distracting yourself instead of addressing the problem; soothing yourself with food, alcohol or drugs; blaming others or denying that you are stressed?
- Do something fun or relaxing every day. Even 5 to 10 minutes of deep breathing, stretching, playing with a pet, or enjoying nature can do wonders.

Plan for success: Adopt a few stress-reduction changes and then check regularly for signs of improvement.

the return we wanted," Shawano said. "We wanted to make sure all of our training dollars went to good use so I contacted Nicolet."

After conversations, the tribe and the college agreed that offering the four-class, 12-credit Professional Communication certificate would be an excellent option.

"We knew going into this that we would be breaking new ground," said Nicolet College President Richard Nelson. "It was only by working together, in partnership on many different levels, that we were we able to put all the pieces together to make this a success."

Nicolet Dean of Liberal Arts and Business Emily Stuckenbruck said offering the Communication Certificate was a natural fit for the college and the Potawatomi.

"Good communication is key to any successful business," Stuckenbruck said. "It's important for good customer service, good decision-making, it decreases the potential for errors, it builds morale, and enhances many other aspects that businesses need to be successful."

All of the students in the certificate program work in various Potawatomi enterprises, including the casino, tribal government, the local newspaper, health clinic, and child care center. As such, the tribe pays for every student's tuition.

Shawano noted that many staff members begin working for the tribe right out of high school and that, looking across all employee groups, the average length of time an employee works for a Potawatomi enterprise is nine to 12 years.

"We saw this as a long-term investment for the tribe as a whole and for each of these individuals," Shawano explained. "These college classes help build the foundation that's necessary for continued growth and success in the future for everyone involved."

Billie Leach, manager of the tribal child care center, said it didn't take long for her to notice what was being taught in the classroom being applied in the workplace, a dynamic that continued to grow from semester to semester.

"We all learned so much on how to communicate more effectively in so many different ways," said Leach. "Working with customers, public speaking, writing, knowing your audience, it was great to have the opportunity to get this type of training. I know it has helped me in my job and in my life and I can see it helping others as well."

The graduation ceremony for students to receive their Professional Communication certificates from Nicolet will be held at 3:45 p.m., Wednesday, May 11, in the Auditorium in Crandon.

U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin supports legislation in fight against Zika Virus

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin is supporting legislation that would provide the necessary investment to fight the spread of the Zika virus.

More than 800 Americans have been infected with the Zika virus, including about 90 pregnant women, in 40 states, Washington, D.C., and 3 U.S. Territories. On April 13, 2016, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention confirmed that the Zika virus does, in fact, cause microcephaly and other birth defects.

"I believe Congress has a responsibility to act on the public health crisis posed by the Zika virus," said Senator Baldwin. "Zika has been linked to many health problems, but most notably a terrible birth defect. This is a serious and dangerous threat and we must take steps to prevent, detect, and respond to the Zika virus."

The legislation, introduced by Senator Bill Nelson (D-FL), would fund the Obama Administration's request of \$1.9 billion to fight the Zika virus, providing resources to the Department of Health and Human Services, Department of State, and global health programs, while also ensuring that funding allocated to fight Ebola remains in place.

In addition to cosponsoring this legislation, last week, Senator Baldwin joined her colleagues in sending a letter to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) and Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Thad Cochran (R-MS), calling for passage of the President's emergency funding request for prevention and treatment of the Zika virus outbreak.

This notice serves to inform parents and guardians of students with disabilities that the State of Wisconsin has established the Special Needs Scholarship Program. Under this scholarship program and as further specified in state law, a child with a disability who has been denied the opportunity to attend a nonresident school district under the full-time open enrollment program may be eligible to receive a scholarship from the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) that allows the child to attend an eligible private school that is participating in the Special Needs Scholarship Program.

This is a state-administered program. A parent or guardian who is interested in the Special Needs Scholarship Program should independently verify the participating private schools and the specific terms, eligibility criteria, and application procedures of the scholarship program with the DPI.

The Special Needs Scholarship Program is further defined under section 115.7915 of the state statutes. However, special eligibility requirements not found in that statute exist for program scholarships that are awarded for private school attendance that initially begins in the 2016-2017 school year. EDUCATIONAL INFORMATION

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water includes rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:



There is no maximum age and parents and adults are encouraged to enroll and participate. There is no actual operation of an ATV in this class, so there is no need to bring your ATV or personal equipment. Fees for the course are \$10.00 per student. Fee is waived if you or parents are members of the Hidden Bear Trail ATV Club or Red Arrow Snowmobile/ATV Club.

Persons successfully completing the course will receive ATV safety graduate certificates. It is important to note that students must attend both sessions. Anyone born after January 1, 1988 and at least 12 years old must have ATV certification to operate on public areas.

Advanced registration is required. Please contact Jim Wisneski, Secretary, Hidden Bear Trail ATV C I u b a t 7 1 5 - 2 7 6 - 6 6 1 2 o r e m a i I a t hiddenbeartrailatvclub@centurytel.net. You can also register on line by going to www.dnr.wi.gov. Click on education, safety classes, ATV Class and then Oconto County. Class size will be limited to 40 participants. Students with special needs will need to contact the instructor at least two weeks in advance to request special accommodations.

Students are now required to obtain a DNR customer ID number for any recreational safety class they attend. Please contact the DNR at 1-888-936-7463 between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. daily to obtain this number prior to registering for this course.

Stepping On is a workshop offered in Mole Lake by the Sokaogon Chippewa Community. The workshop helps older adults prevent falls. The workshop is for two hours, once a week, for seven weeks, at SCC Elder Complex, May 18 through June 29 from 2 to 4 p.m. Contact Stephanie Quade at 715-478-7629 or stephanie.quade@scc-nsn.gov to register for the workshop.

Stepping On will help participants identify why they fall and different ways to prevent falls, including strength and balance exercises, home safety check suggestions and a medication review. Participants will view a display of falls prevention products. The workshop is both for people who have fallen and for people who fear falling. Participants will leave with more strength, achieve better balance, and experience a feeling of confidence and independence as a result of performing various exercises and sharing personal falls experiences as a group.

The program was developed by Dr. Lindy Clemson of Sydney, Australia, to help other adults learn ways to prevent falls. It was brought to the United States by Dr. Jane Mahoney, Executive Director of the Wisconsin Institute for Healthy Aging, with funding from the Centers for Disease Control and other partners. The research has found that people who complete the workshop have a 31% reduced rate of falls. The Sokaogon Chippewa Community is a proud sponsor of the Stepping On program.

"Honey Bunny" because I remind him of a black & white version of Winnie the Poo. Last month my family got in some trouble, and had to surrender me to the Forest County Humane Society.

But, the really sad part of my story is that I have heartworm. If I get treated for heartworm, it will take at least 6 months, over 20 visits to the vet for shots, pills every day, and I will have to be kept isolated. Vet bills alone will be about \$1,000. I might die during treatment. Because I'm a "pitty" (pit bull terrier, mutt, mix) there are few families, or individuals who can and want to adopt me. If someone is willing to rescue me, and treat me, they should fill out an to find a recreation area near you please visit our website adoption application as soon as possible.

President's note: If a responsible, loving family wants to adopt Bunny, we will do whatever we can. If the expense of her treatment is an issue, maybe we can start a "Bunny Lovers Club." But the real issue is this; it's not fair to put Bunny through treatment if her future is being kept in a pen at the shelter for months and years afterward.

Heartworm is a growing concern in the north woods. It is spread by mosquitoes. Treatment costs about \$5.00 per month, and the dogs like it. It may not kill a dog like Bunny for a while, but she could infect lots of other dogs, and she will get sicker until it takes her life. Please let the Bunny situation have a greater purpose; treat you dogs for heartworm.

One day while I was walking a shelter dog, a friend asked me, "What's with all the pit bulls?" The only way to answer that is with my own experience....

When I lost 'Nana-Dog' three years ago, I was lost, and spent hours on Pet Finder Dot Com, looking at shelter dogs. I was amazed at how many were "pittys" and would not even consider adopting one. My wife and I adopted a German shepherd mix, and then another. They are now our kids, since our kids have left the nest. But, I also started working with the dogs down at the shelter, and my perception of these pit-bull-mix dogs has drastically changed.

I've worked closely with about a dozen 'pittys' and can honestly say that if I outlive our girls at home, my next dog (or dogs) will be a pitty. When I picture myself 15 years from now, I'll be 75 years old, have a cane in one hand and a dog leash in the other, with my pitty. I look forward to training, and generally working with the pittys that come into our shelter.

This is my experience, and it has been very humbling.

Senator Baldwin's Bipartisan Jason Simcakoski Memorial Act moves forward

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin today applauded the announcement by the Chairman and Ranking Member of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs, U.S. Senators Johnny Isakson (R-GA) and Richard Blumenthal (D-CT), of the Veterans First Act, which includes an updated version of Senator Baldwin's Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act - bipartisan VA reforms aimed at providing safer and more effective pain management services to our nation's veterans.

"I am grateful to the members of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs for their bipartisan support of the Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act as this critical VA reform continues to move forward. Families like the Simcakoski family have a story to tell that needs to be heard," said Senator Baldwin. "After two decade-long wars, our veterans and their families are facing the difficult challenges of physical injuries, addiction, PTSD and other mental illnesses. We must find safer and more effective ways to confront these problems to help them meet those challenges. My reforms propose a number of solutions to strengthen opioid prescribing guidelines; improve coordination and communication throughout the VA; and put in place stronger oversight and accountability for the quality of care we are providing our veterans. My goal is to put these reforms in place to prevent Jason's tragedy from happening to other veterans and their families."

Senators Isakson and Blumenthal announced the Veterans First Act, which aims to begin to change the culture at the VA, improve medical care and enhance benefits. An updated version of the Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act was included as a major component of this larger legislative package, which also includes Senator Baldwin's bipartisan bill with Senator Jerry Moran (R-KS) to make naloxone rescue kits more affordable and accessible to our nation's veterans by eliminating copayments for them. The entire section of the Veterans First Act that is related to veterans' health care is titled The Jason Simcakoski Memorial Act.

Senator Baldwin's Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act, introduced in June of 2015 with Senator Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV), was produced in close consultation with medical professionals, veterans' service organizations, and the Simcakoski family. Senator Baldwin's bill that is included in the Veterans First Act focuses on strengthening VA opioid prescribing guidelines and improving pain management services by putting the following reforms in place:

Requiring stronger opioid prescribing guidelines and education for VA providers including stricter standards against prescribing dangerous combinations of opioids with other drugs and for prescribing opioids to patients struggling with mental health issues;

Increased coordination and communication throughout the VA with medical facilities, providers, patients and their families surrounding pain management and appropriate opioid therapy by strengthening patient advocacy and expanding access to complementary and integrative health; and

Holding the VA system accountable for appropriate care and quality standards through strengthened hiring and personnel practices, consistent internal audits as well as GAO reviews and reports to Congress.

"I know Jason is looking down and smiling at us because this will be something that I know he would be proud of, I'm grateful to Senator Baldwin and her staff for their tireless work on this reform because it's going to help other veterans and active duty servicemen and women. We want Jason to be remembered as someone who gave his life to save the lives of other veterans. This bill gives people hope for a brighter future," said Marv Simcakoski, Jason's father.




