
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Enough is Enough



Madison, WI – State Senator Tom Tiffany (R-Hazelhurst) and Representative Adam Jarchow (R-Balsam Lake) announce plans to host Great Lakes Wolf Summit:

"Last week's wolf depredation in Shawano County showcases the unfortunate results of the wolf population being allowed to run rampant in Wisconsin. When combined with 14 previous confirmed wolf depredation events this year, it clearly demonstrates the need for state-led management practices to be implemented in our state. Let us be clear: Wisconsin is not a wolf sanctuary and it is irresponsible to allow it to continue to be treated as such.

"The state of Wisconsin is more than willing, and able, to manage the wolf population within our borders when the species is once again delisted. Scientists from across the state have already called on the federal government to delist the wolf and it is about time they take the call seriously."

"In September, we will host a Great Lakes Wolf Summit. We will be inviting public officials, scientists, and interested parties from Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota to discuss the necessity for state-led wolf management programs. Our intent is to send a crystal-clear, grassroots message that it is irresponsible to ignore this issue any longer."

First timber cut under Good Neighbor Agreement in Wisconsin

RHINELANDER, Wis. (May 10, 2016) – The first timber was cut April 29 under the Good Neighbor Authority (GNA) agreement between the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) and the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest (CNNF).

"Through our partnership with the WDNR Division of Forestry and the hard work of Forest Service and State employees, we are able to make progress on our sustainable forestry goals," said Paul Strong, Forest Supervisor of the Chequamegon-Nicolet. "Good Neighbor Authority promises to be a major tool in delivering conservation activities on the national forest."

The first bid opening for GNA timber sales was held April 20 with 30 different companies bidding on eight different sales. The awarded sales totaled 8.2 million board feet (MMBF) of National Forest timber. A second round of GNA timber sales will be advertised and awarded this summer

Some of the first sales included the last unadvertised timber salvage areas damaged during the September 2014 windstorm event in Ashland, Sawyer and Price Counties. One of those sales was the Weasel Creek Sale on the Great Divide Ranger District that was awarded to FutureWood Corp. of Hayward, Wis., for \$69,080. This 124 acre sale area included a variety of wind damaged timber including aspen and northern hardwoods.

The first GNA project agreement allows the WDNR and their partners and contractors to prepare, award and administer 25 MMBF of timber sales on the National Forest. These timber sales come from projects that have already been through the environmental analysis and public involvement process but were not yet being prepared by CNNF staff.

These timber sales fall across the National Forest in Oconto, Forest, Vilas, Bayfield, Sawyer, Price and

Wisconsin's 'Absolute Sobriety Law' means not a drop of alcohol for drivers under age 21

Traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for teens in Wisconsin. To prevent needless deaths and injuries during the start of the graduation season and other springtime celebrations, law enforcement agencies are reminding young motorists and their parents about Wisconsin's Absolute Sobriety Law for drivers under age 21.

The law is quite simple. Absolute sobriety for drivers under age 21 means they may not consume any amount of alcohol—not even a drop—and legally operate a motor vehicle.

Young drivers convicted of violating Wisconsin's Absolute Sobriety Law will have their driver license suspended for three months. They also will have to pay a \$389.50 citation and will have four demerit points assessed on their driver license.

"At any age, alcohol even in small amounts may impair the mental and physical skills needed to drive safely, such as decision-making, concentration, coordination and reaction time. However, teens and young people, who often are inexperienced drivers, are especially susceptible to the adverse effects of alcohol on their driving ability." says Wisconsin State Patrol Captain Steve G. Krueger, North Central Region-Wausau post. "We don't want young drivers or their passengers to suffer serious injuries or tragic deaths because of a disastrous decision, such as getting behind the wheel after drinking."



Wabeno Jr. & Sr. High students do well at Solo & Ensembles Music Festival



On Saturday, May 7th, five music students from Wabeno High School performed at the State Solo and Ensembles Festival at UW-Green Bay. Those learners achieved that honor by performing at a very high caliber at the Conference Solo and Ensembles Festival held at the end of February, hosted by the Florence School District.

Solo and Ensembles is an annual music festival that allows students to perform by themselves or in small or large groups for a judge. The music performed at the festival is selected from a list generated by the Wisconsin School Music Association. 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

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

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Re-opening ceremony of the Mountain Fire Lookout Tower

We are pleased to invite you to a re-opening ceremony of the Mountain Fire Lookout Tower on the Lakewood Ranger District of the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest. The ceremony will be held at 10a.m. Friday, June 10, 2016. The ceremony will take place at the tower approximately two and one-half miles north of Mountain, Wisconsin off of Old 32 (Forest Road 2106). We are planning to serve snacks and refreshments immediately after the ceremony at the Schoolhouse Bar (14007 WI-32) in Mountain.

The Mountain Fire Lookout Tower was built in 1935 by the U.S. Forest Service and the Civilian Conservation Corps. It was once a part of an extensive lookout tower network in the former Nicolet National Forest. The Mountain Fire Lookout Tower was the first tower in Wisconsin to be placed on the National Historic Lookout Register and the National Register of Historic Places. It also was the 41st lookout tower to be registered in the United States. The tower was taken out of service in 1970 and was last restored in 1994. The Mountain Fire Lookout Tower was restored in 2015-2016 through a partnership between the Lakewood-Laona Ranger District of the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest with financial assistance from the Oconto County Economic Development Corporation, numerous local businesses, organizations, communities and residents. Employees from the Lakewood-Laona Ranger District spent more than 500 hours doing the restoration work.

"This was a great partnership and community effort," said Greyling Brandt, Recreation Program Manager on the Lakewood-Laona Ranger District. "Together we were able to restore the tower and now can open it to visitors again to get an up close look at a piece of Wisconsin's history."

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Bipartisan legislation cosponsored by Senator Baldwin passes the Senate Improves training & support for first responders to respond to incidents such as oil train derailments in Wisconsin & across the country

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Bipartisan legislation cosponsored by U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin to support first responders passed the Senate on Tuesday. The Railroad Emergency Services Preparedness, Operational Needs, and Safety Evaluation (RESPONSE) Act, introduced by Senator Heidi Heitkamp (D-ND), improves training and support for first responders to respond to incidents such as oil train derailments in Wisconsin and across the Country.

"First responders put themselves in danger every day in order to keep our families safe," said Senator Baldwin. "The danger facing Wisconsin residents living near rail lanes has materialized quickly. In the past year Wisconsin has had three major oil train derailments. There are more than 40 oil trains a week passing through

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Wisconsin, and that number is growing. As more and more volatile crude oil moves through Wisconsin by rail, it is critical that appropriate safety measures are in place to reduce the risk of deadly accidents and that our emergency personnel have the training, resources, and support to respond in case of tragedy."

Last year in Wisconsin, there were train derailments in Alma, Watertown, and Superior. Senator Baldwin has been pushing to make sure first responders have the tools and resources they need when responding to hazmat incidents on the rails to keep Wisconsin's communities strong and safe.

The bipartisan legislation will enable first responders to get quality training and have access to the appropriate resources and effective communications. Specifically, the bill would establish a public-private council that combines emergency responders, federal agencies, and leading experts to review training and best practices for first responders. This council, co-chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA), would provide Congress with expert recommendations on how to address first responders' safety needs with increased railway safety challenges so they can best protect communities across the country. Companion legislation was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives in February 2015 by U.S. Representative Ron Kind (D-WI).

In addition to Senator Baldwin, the legislation was cosponsored by Senators Angus King (I-ME), Charles Schumer (D-NY), Cory Booker (D-NJ), Claire McCaskill (D-MO), Bob Casey (D-PA), and Joni Ernst (R-IA).

Ashland counties. The sales included more than 2600 acres of oak and northern hardwood, 800 acres of aspen, fir and birch and 2400 acres of pine to be treated. These acres and resulting timber volume are in addition to the Forest's regular appropriated timber program.

The CNNF has found efficiencies to increase its timber sale level from 62 MMBF in 2010 to 80 MMBF in 2015. In 2016, the CNNF plans to sell 85 MMBF and with WDNR assistance through GNA, sell additional timber volume which will total more than 100 MMBF.

The two agencies have been working together for the past year and a half to make this happen. Last August, a master agreement was signed followed by the supplemental project agreement in September outlining the specific timber sale work the WDNR would do in the first year on the CNNF under the agreement.

This partnership results in more wood available to Wisconsin's important forest products industry, while creating and maintaining healthy forest conditions prescribed in the 2004 Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest Land Management Plan. A portion of the receipts from the timber sales will reimburse the state for its costs to do the work, with remaining funds available to be used to conduct additional restoration activities on the forest in the future.

The Good Neighbor Authority provides the opportunity to work across jurisdictional boundaries and manage forest lands in a mixed ownership setting. It leverages state resources to increase capacity to accomplish work on National Forest System lands. It also helps strengthen federal and state partnerships.

The Good Neighbor Authority was authorized in the 2014 Farm Bill for the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management. Good Neighbor Authority allows the Forest Service to enter into agreements or contracts with states for the performance of forest, rangeland and watershed restoration services on National Forest System

Tammy Baldwin of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee held a hearing titled: "Border Security and America's Heroin Epidemic: The Impact of the Trafficking and Abuse of Heroin and Prescription Opioids in Wisconsin." Below is Chairman Johnson's opening statement as submitted for the record: Over the last 15 months, this committee has spent a great deal of time studying and describing the realities related to American border security. Today will mark the 16th hearing focused on border security and our third hearing highlighting the rising heroin epidemic across this country. These topics are closely related, as it is my belief that the primary root cause of our unsecure border is America's insatiable demand for drugs.

The accumulated testimony and information that forms the committee's record indicates that America's borders are not secure. One key indicator of our insecure

But, if Euker is dangerous, we can't adopt him out, and a life of isolation in our shelter is no life for a big, active guy like Euker.

To be clear, I believe Euker will respond to a new master, but all others will be in danger around him. I'm hoping to hear from you, if you have any advice or a solution for Euker. Otherwise our board will have to make some hard choices at our next meeting, May 24th.

Follow-up note: With funds donated by a wonderful supporter, we are going to treat Bunny's heartworm. We are going to try a new product from PetWellness.com; it is much easier on the animal than the traditional drugs. If the treatment is successful, Bunny may be a blessing on future dogs who get heartworm. But she still needs a home, or at least a walking buddy.
