Crandon International prepares for 23rd Forest County Potawatomi Community Brush Run Weekend



The world's largest off-road facility gets set to swing open its massive, custom-made gates to welcome guests, racers and teams back to Crandon International Raceway's "Big House." Located inthe heart of Wisconsin's scenic Northwoods, the legendary track will host the first of two major weekends on Friday, June 24 through Sunday, June 26 for the 23rd annual Forest County Potawatomi Community Brush Run event. A combination of racing, camping and concerts, the weekend will feature three days of TORC PRO and Crandon Sportsman competition.

The Brush Run race weekend will feature many of the sport's fastest off-road vehicles and star drivers that make up The Off-Road Championship (TORC) series presented by Amsoil. Crandon's legendary high-speed dirt track will host a full schedule of intense, door-to-door action including the ultra-competitive PRO truck classes for Rounds 5 and 6 of the 2016 TORC season.

A list of supplies is being made to improve the sandbox area and we are constructing a donation letter to send out to local organizations.







Watch out for Garlic Mustard this spring



As new plants leaf out this spring, it is a great time to keep an eye out for a plant you don't want lurking in your yard, Garlic Mustard. If the woods near your house are sporting a carpet of round green leaves, you could have garlic mustard. Garlic mustard was originally brought to the U.S. from Europe as a culinary herb (as the name implies it is a mustard plant that tastes like garlic), but now it is notorious as a highly invasive plant in forested areas. Like many invasive plants, it spreads very quickly and has no natural predators or diseases to keep it in check. A single plant can produce nearly 8,000 seeds per year that are viable for about 7 years. This helps garlic mustard take over forest understories, covering the forest floor and pushing out native wildflowers and shrubs, going so far as to release chemicals that interfere with tree seedling growth. This can cause devastating impacts for wildlife, recreation, and commercial interests such as timber harvest and tourism.

Spring and early summer are the best times to spot garlic mustard. Plants emerge as small rosettes with leaves that are mostly round, have scalloped edges, and smell like garlic when crushed. Toward the end of May or beginning of June, 2nd year plants send up a stalk with alternate triangular leaves. Garlic mustard has numerous small, white flowers that quickly develop into seedpods before the plant dies.

You can also help by reporting invasive plant locations and/or sending in pictures of potentially invasive plants. The Wild Rivers Invasive Species Coalition (WRISC) is available to identify unknown plants and assist in control efforts. Senator Baldwin calls for renewed Congressional effort to close "Terror Gap"

"Congress must act to close the terrorist gun loophole by giving the FBI the authority to block gun sales to potential terrorists." WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin today called for a renewed effort to close the "terror gap." Last November, Senator Baldwin cosponsored the Denying Firearms and Explosives to Dangerous Terrorists Act of 2015 to give the Department of Justice authority to prevent a known or suspected terrorist from buying firearms or explosives, which would close this gap. The legislation was introduced by Senator Dianne Feinstein (D-CA) and Representative Peter King (R-NY).

"We must address a serious national security and public safety weakness and close this loophole that allows a known or suspected terrorist to swiftly pass a firearms or explosives background check and obtain a dangerous weapon," said Senator Baldwin. "Preventing people on the terrorist watch list from purchasing firearms and explosives is a commonsense action we can take to protect American lives. Congress must act to close the terrorist gun loophole by giving the FBI the authority to block gun sales to potential terrorists."

The Department of Justice under President George W. Bush initially proposed the legislation in 2007. Attorney General Eric Holder testified at a 2009 Judiciary Committee hearing that the Obama administration also supported the legislation.

According to information prepared by the Government Accountability Office, individuals on the consolidated terrorist watch list, which includes the no-fly list, cleared a background check for a gun transaction in 94 percent of attempted transactions in 2013 and 2014 (455 out of 486 times). Between February 2004 and December 2014, individuals on the consolidated terrorist watch list cleared a background check in 91 percent of attempted transactions (2,043 of 2,233 times), according to GAO

The Denying Firearms and Explosives to Dangerous Terrorists Act of 2015 would:

- · Allow the attorney general to deny the purchase or transfer of a firearm or explosive to a known or suspected terrorist if the prospective recipient may use the firearm or explosive in connection with terrorism.
- · Maintain protections in current law that allow a person who believes he has been mistakenly prevented from buying a firearm to learn of the reason for the denial, and then to challenge the denial, first administratively with the Department of Justice, and then through a lawsuit against the Justice Department.
- · Allow the Justice Department, in any administrative or court proceeding challenging the accuracy of a denied firearm or explosive transfer under the bill, to protect information that, if disclosed, would compromise national security.

Last November, one week prior to the San Bernardino shooting, Senator Baldwin and 37 Senators sent a letter to House Speaker Paul Ryan and Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, calling for the bill to be brought to the House and Senate floor for consideration and a vote.

"There is no reason why suspected terrorists who we consider too dangerous to board airplanes should be able to walk into any gun store in the United States and purchase a firearm or an explosive for the purpose of carrying out a terrorist act. But today, suspected terrorists can legally purchase guns in the United States-and they're doing so, even while law enforcement may be investigating them or pursing their arrest or indictment," wrote the senators last November.





"The goal was to create a pathway for students to learn the basic skills they need to get a job in the field relatively quickly and then follow that with more in-depth instruction that allows them to advance in their position," said Jeff Labs, interim dean of Trade, Industry, and Apprenticeships at Nicolet.

The one-year Automotive Service Technician technical diploma is the first step in the pathway where students learn how to diagnose and repair multiple vehicles systems. These include engines, transmissions, fuel and electrical systems, steering and suspension systems, brakes, and climate control systems.

Students completing this diploma will have the skills to enter the workforce. They can also apply the 29 credits they earned to the two-year, 55-credit Automotive Technician technical diploma.

"Classes in the second year take everything they learned in the first year to a more advanced level," Labs explained. "It's more in-depth and qualifies graduates in all the disciplines they need to become ASE Certified Master Technicians. As we've seen in other programs, we expect many students will get jobs after their first year and continue taking classes to earn the two-year diploma."

Nicolet also worked closely with automotive employers when building the curriculum. "We heard time and again about the value of employees being able to communicate effectively with co-workers, supervisors, and customers," Labs explained. "To meet that skills need, we included two Applied Communication classes to the second year of the program to make employees even more valuable to their employers."
