



#### DNR hires two new deer biologists in Black River Falls and Rhinelander

MADISON - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has added two new deer field biologists to its ranks. Matt Esser will be stationed in Black River Falls, while Curt Rollman will work out of Rhinelander.

"We are excited to have Curt and Matt on board," said Bob Nack, DNR big game section chief. "They will work directly with landowners, hunters and the general public that have a keen interest in white-tailed deer management. Their on-the-ground efforts will seek to improve habitat for deer and other wildlife, monitor disease outbreaks and deer mortality events, support deer research efforts, and engage the public in local deer management recommendations."

Esser graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point with a Bachelor of Science in wildlife and a minor in biology. He was employed as a wildlife technician by the South Dakota Department of Game, Fish and Parks and the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission before moving back to Wisconsin to work as a wildlife biologist and forestry technician in the private sector. Subsequently, Esser founded and operated a wildlife management and forestry consulting company serving 17 counties in west-central Wisconsin. Most recently, he obtained his teaching license and worked as the Agricultural Science Instructor for the school district of Alma Center-Humbird-Merrillan.

Rollman received his undergraduate degree from University of Wisconsin-Madison in wildlife ecology and his graduate degree from University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, completing a thesis on deer browse and snow behavior in a northern hardwoods forest near Crandon. Prior to his graduate work, Rollman worked for seven field seasons with the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Wildlife Services as a nuisance bear and beaver specialist in Rhinelander and Ashland. He then started working for the DNR out of Rhinelander, with the last year spent as a working as a wildlife technician and a habitat coordinator for the Wisconsin Young Forest Partnership.

Esser and Rollman are avid deer hunters and experienced habitat managers. They started in their new positions on July 27. Rollman's area of responsibility will cover northern and eastern Wisconsin and Esser will cover the western and southern part of the state. #### DNR updates fish eating guidance

MADISON -- Updated fish eating guidance, Choose Wisely: A Health Guide for Eating Fish in Wisconsin [PDF], is now available online through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources website.

Detailed information also is available through "Find Advice," an online search tool that allows anglers to select their county and fishing spot to see local consumption advice.

For rivers where polychlorinated biphenyls build up in fish, new testing reconfirms current advisories with slight modifications for some species from Lake Michigan, the Lake Winnebago/Wolf River system and parts of the lower Fox (Little Lake Buttes des Morts to De Pere Dam), Menominee and lower Manitowoc Rivers.

Changes include less stringent advice for some Lake Michigan and Winnebago species meaning people can safely eat some of those fish more frequently. Advice does remain the same for several systems including the upper Manitowoc and Mississippi Rivers.

Advice for some inland lakes and impoundments, where mercury is the primary fish contaminant, was also updated. Fish consumption advice varies by location and species of fish and ranges from unrestricted or one serving per week to "do not eat." These changes include advice to eat fewer of some fish from the Twin Falls Flowage in Florence County, Long Lake in Oneida County and Loretta Lake in Sawyer County. Included is less stringent advice for Lake Noquebay in Marinette County

DNR, in consultation with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, examines contaminant results for fish samples obtained each year at a subset of Wisconsin's waters, along with data from recent years, to re-evaluate fish consumption advice.

The 2016 fish consumption advisory reflects new results for fish collected mostly in 2014-2015 from 32 locations and also considers results from bordering states and the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission as well as DNR.

Most waters in the state are covered by general statewide advice. In 2016, the number of waters that carry more specific, stringent advice due to higher contaminant levels in some species from those waters is 146 due to removal of more stringent advice at two locations and addition at two other locations.

Candy Schrank, the DNR toxicologist who coordinates the fish contaminant monitoring and advisory program, urges anglers to check the 2016 advice to see if there have been any changes to the advice for those waters they fish frequently.

"We test contaminants in fish from a number of locations each year," Schrank said. "Using these new results along with past testing, we update the advice, so it is important for anglers who frequently eat fish to check each year."

Karen McKeown, state health officer of the Department of Health Services, noted that fish are a lowcost, low-fat source of protein, minerals and vitamins, but that people need to be aware of the kinds of fish they eat and where the fish come from.

## Ron Johnson: Amendment Aimed at Curbing Federal Abuse of Power

Last summer, I saw just what was at risk from regulatory overreach when a young Milwaukeean testified at a hearing of the Senate committee that I chair, sharing her story of adversity, compassion and commitment. Justine "Justice" Shorter told how her eyesight faded to legal blindness when she was a student at Milwaukee's Messmer High School — and how the school responded.

Messmer is a Catholic school that educates many students in Milwaukee's groundbreaking parental school choice program. It does this on a voucher that delivers a fraction of the funding that the city's public schools get. On its own, Messmer couldn't afford the costly adaptive equipment Justice would need. Donors stepped in, but Justice pointed out the crucial role Messmer played: "That technology, coupled with love, support, attention and time that I received from the staff at Messmer, allowed me to truly thrive and excel."

Justice was testifying at a hearing last July examining the success of Milwaukee's school choice program—and how these schools had been affected by a years-long federal investigation. More than 25,000 Milwaukee children use the program to attend schools that their parents pick. As Justice said, those schools should know that the state funding that parents use will complement, not complicate, the education of children with disabilities.

The U.S. Department of Justice was complicating it. By last summer, its probe of the choice program had run four years without finding any wrongdoing.

The Obama administration's hostility to school choice programs is well known. The administration tried defunding a program in Washington. It conducted legal warfare against one in Louisiana. School choice opponents, many of whom are allies of the administration, for decades had tried to kill Milwaukee's choice program. I and many others worried that the Department of Justice's probe was fueled by politics.

We had reason to worry. The Obama administration has an undeniable pattern of using regulatory overreach and intimidation to further its political aims. The president is unilaterally rewriting immigration and labor law by his infamous "phone and pen." Lois Lerner used the power of the IRS to systematically target President Barack Obama's political enemies.

The Department of Justice closed its school choice investigation in December 2015 without ever finding wrongdoing. It did so after the Senate Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs, which I chair, sent three letters asking about the scope, reasons and findings of the probe. No answers existed to some of my questions, and the department refused to answer the others. It did not come to Milwaukee to explain itself to the people whose schools it endangered.

I have been involved in improving and supporting both public and private schools since before I ran for office. I have heard over and over for six years from Wisconsin families about how they value the power that school choice gives them to find better opportunity for their children.

Those families' stories motivated me to offer an amendment to the bill that appropriates money to the Department of Justice — an amendment to close off the discredited legal excuse the department used to drag out its probe. My amendment simply requires the American with Disabilities Act to be followed as written; to be used as intended. The amendment does not restrict the government's current authority to investigate discrimination. It only keeps the federal government from expanding its power beyond what the law provides.

It stops the Obama administration from reopening this front in its attack on school choice. The damage this administration has done to the rule of law and our constitutional protections is so grave that it sometimes seems abstract. But that damage hurts individual Americans, and, in Milwaukee, we can see that it endangered a fundamental need — education.

"We all should be able to make the very best choices for ourselves, our families, our future," Justice testified. She's right. My amendment is aimed squarely at protecting Wisconsinites' right to make those choices.

2016 Fall Season Dates

Fall wild turkey
Zones 1-5: Sept. 17 through Dec. 31

Zones 6 & 7: Sept. 17 through Nov. 18 Sharp-tailed grouse: Oct. 15 through Nov. 6

Bobcat hunting and trapping:

Period 1: Oct. 15 through Dec. 25

Period 2: Dec. 26 through Jan. 31, 2017

Fisher (trapping only): Oct. 15 through Dec. 31

Otter (trapping only):

North Zone: Nov. 5 through Apr. 30, 2017

Central & Southern Zones: Nov. 5 through Mar. 31, 2017 Fall Turkey

There will be 101,300 wild turkey permits available to hunters for the fall 2016 turkey hunting season, a 600-permit increase over 2015 levels. Permit availability was increased by 200 in each of the three northernmost turkey management zones (Zones 5, 6 and 7) in order to better meet hunter demand. Any fall turkey permits remaining after the initial drawing will go on sale beginning at 10 a.m. on Saturday, August 27. Leftover fall turkey permits will be sold by zone until sold out or the season ends.

Harvest for the 2016 spring season increased by 11 percent, compared to the 2015 season, largely due to the unseasonably comfortable weather that characterized most of the season. Increased harvest may have also been due to relatively mild conditions during the winter of 2015-2016.

Turkey numbers may increase further, given the warm and relatively dry conditions during the critical June brood-rearing period. Turkey hunters can therefore expect excellent opportunities to pursue turkeys during the fall 2016 season.

The 2016 fall season will run from Sept. 17 through Dec. 31 in Zones 1-5. In Zones 6 and 7, the season will run from Sept. 17 through Nov. 18. This is the first year that turkey hunting will be allowed statewide on the Friday before the opening of the nine-day gun deer season and during the gun deer season in Zones 1-5 only. Hunters may use dogs to hunt wild turkeys during the fall season throughout the state of Wisconsin. The bag limit is one turkey of any age or sex per fall turkey hunting permit (also known as a carcass tag).

#### **Sharp-tailed Grouse**

For 2016, 25 sharp-tailed grouse hunting permits will be available in Unit 8 only. This is a 75 percent decrease from 2015, when 100 permits were available in the same unit. Permit levels were decreased in order to balance hunter opportunity with a more prudent level of harvest. Sharp-tailed grouse management units use the same boundaries and designations as game management units (GMUs); a map is available on the sharp-tailed grousepage of the DNR website. Hunters are reminded to carefully review the zone map and apply only for the open unit. Applying for closed units will result in an invalid application.




The approved quotas for bobcat, fisher and river otter will be available on the trapping page of the DNR website in early August. Quotas for most zones will likely be similar or slightly higher than last year. Permit numbers, based on success rates, will be determined and drawings for all three species will take place in August, with permits issued in early September. Applicants can check their online account in early September to see if they've been awarded a permit by visiting gowild.wi.gov.








