Drivers License online No standing in line

"It's no secret; everyone wants to make their visit to a Wisconsin DMV shorter. The new Driver License Guide retrieves the form(s) you need, walks you through the process to fill in the form(s), and can even submit the paperwork electronically for you," explains Ann Perry, Bureau of Driver Services director. "Depending on your eligibility, the new enhanced features may even help you schedule an appointment with the DMV."

The Driver License Guide, available at www.wisconsindmv.gov or linked through https://app.wi.gov/DLGuides/, takes out the guesswork and walks customers through a multi-step process. First, it accesses the needed forms. Although the Guide can provide general information through an anonymous search, customers may also allow the Guide to determine eligibility, customize information, and pre-fill forms specific to the customer's current driving record. From there, the customer can print/download the information found and the tailored checklist.

Next, customers can begin the online application process. At the end of the application process, the customer will have the opportunity to electronically submit the application(s) to the DMV and, depending on eligibility, schedule an appointment.

"The DMV will already have the forms, and the checklist provided in the Guide will help the customer remember to bring any needed documents with them to the DMV," Perry said. "This will help ensure that customers are able to complete their transaction with one visit to DMV, and will reduce the amount of time spent at the DMV service center."

Wisconsin already has some of the shortest wait times for DMVs in the country. In fact, the wait time for nearly 90 percent of DMV customers is less than 20 minutes. With this new process, DMV customers using the Driver License Guide and appointment scheduler will be served within 10 minutes of checking-in when they arrive for their appointment. Wisconsin DMV service centers conduct more than 2 million in-person transactions each year.

When accessing transportation-related forms, please note that www.wisconsindmv.gov (with the extension .gov) is the official state website. Others with .org and .com are not official and may have extra charges for forms or list information that is dated or incorrect.







President Obama signs Sen. Baldwin's bipartisan VA reforms into law

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin released the following statement today after President Obama signed into law bipartisan VA reforms that Senator Baldwin authored in the Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act (S.1641). Baldwin's VA reforms were included in the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act, which passed the Senate last week.

"I'm proud to have worked with the Simcakoski family to introduce these VA reforms. We earned bipartisan support in Congress and I'm very pleased President Obama has signed them into law," said Senator Baldwin. "Our VA reforms will strengthen the Department of Veterans Affairs' opioid prescribing guidelines and put in place stronger oversight and accountability for the quality of care that we are providing our veterans. My goal is to prevent Jason's tragedy from happening to other veterans and their families. We have made these reforms a reality and moved closer to achieving our goal of safer and more effective pain management services for our nation's veterans."

Senator Baldwin's Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act, authored in close consultation with medical professionals, veterans service organizations, and the Simcakoski family, focuses on strengthening the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) opioid prescribing guidelines and improving pain management services by putting the following reforms in place:

· Requiring stronger opioid prescribing guidelines and education for VA providers, including stricter standards against prescribing dangerous combinations of opioids with other drugs and for prescribing opioids to patients struggling with mental health issues;

· Increasing coordination and communication throughout the VA with medical facilities, providers, patients and their families surrounding pain management, alternative treatments for chronic pain, and appropriate opioid therapy; and

· Holding the VA system accountable for appropriate care and quality standards through GAO reviews and VA reports to Congress.

In addition to improving opioid therapy and pain management, the Jason Simcakoski Memorial Opioid Safety Act strengthens the VA's patient advocacy program by ensuring advocates are independent and truly work for veterans, expands access to complementary and integrative health and wellness, and enhances VA hiring practices to help prevent bad doctors from treating veterans.

The legislation signed by President Obama also includes Senator Baldwin's bipartisan bill with Senator Jerry Moran (R-KS) to make naloxone rescue kits more affordable and accessible to our nation's veterans by eliminating veteran copayments for naloxone.



(Do Not) Call Me Tomorrow

If you are receiving unwanted calls or texts, you can sign up on the National Do Not Call Registry to reduce the frequency of unwanted calls. According to the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection, once you sign up on the Do Not Call Registry, your registration is permanent as long as you keep the same number. If you change your number, just sign up again.

Wisconsin residents who sign up on the Do Not Call Registry receive federal protection and protection under Wisconsin's telemarking laws. Keep in mind that certain organizations and businesses are still permitted by law to call numbers that are on the registry. Examples include tax-exempt non-profit organizations, organizations you have given prior consent to contact you, or political organizations. The same rules apply to texts. Signing up on the Do Not Call Registry helps reduce the number of sales calls you receive and helps deter fraud. Scammers frequently use telemarketing as a way to target their victims. If your number is on the Registry, and you receive an unsolicited call, the call is probably a scam. To register, call 1-888-382-1222 from the phone you want to register. Your number shows up on the Registry the next day, and telemarketers covered by the Do Not Call Registry have 31 days from the date you register to stop calling you. If you receive a call from a telemarketer after 31 days, you can file a consumer complaint with the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection here: https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/FileCons umerComplaint.aspx.





Precautions You Can Take if You Think Your Identity's Been Stolen By the GWAAR Legal Services Team (for reprint)

Many of us learn that our credit card information or Social Security number has been stolen after-the-fact when we get an alert from our credit card company about suspicious purchases or we go to apply for something and a red flag is raised. However, some people might have a hunch that their information has been compromised before actual proof of theft has occurred.

For instance, we recently learned of a woman who gave her credit card information and Social Security number to someone whom she thought was a customer service representative from a television shopping network. At the end of the call, she realized that she had never before been asked for her Social Security number when making purchases, and the whole conversation didn't sit well with her. She immediately called family members who were able to help her take precautionary steps to avoid further vulnerability to her financial accounts and personal information.

If something like this happens to you, there are steps you can take. Here are some things you can do if you suspect personal information has been stolen but do not yet have concrete proof of a theft:

Contact Your Financial Institutions. Call each credit card company and bank where you do financial business to report a suspected theft. Each company will have a different method of monitoring suspicious activity. You should also keep a record for yourself of the institutions you called, the time/date, and the name of the person with whom you spoke.

Place a Fraud Alert. The next level of protection is to call one of the three credit reporting companies (Equifax, Experian, or Trans Union) and ask for a fraud alert to be placed. Whichever company you call is required to notify the other two companies, but you should still confirm with the company you call that they will follow up with the other two companies. A "fraud alert" means that if anyone tries to open an account using your information, the business must contact you to verify your identity first. Placing a fraud alert is free and stays on your credit report for 90 days. After 90 days, you can renew the alert if you want.

Monitor Your Financial Accounts. If you weren't already in the habit of checking your financial accounts, you should be now. Whether you check online or by phone, now is the time to make sure nothing unusual appears on your accounts. This includes checking your credit report regularly. Everyone can get one free copy per year of their credit report at www.annualcreditreport.com. Contact the IRS (Internal Revenue Service). Often times scammers use your Social Security number to file taxes for you in order to receive your tax refund, if you are owed one. Other times scammers use your Social Security number to apply for jobs, and then report their income under your name. This can cause problems when you go to file your taxes because it will appear as if you haven't reported all income. File an Online Complaint with the Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3). Rather than report suspected identity theft to a local law enforcement agency, the Social Security Administration (SSA) recommends that you file an online complaint with IC3 at www.ic3.gov. IC3 will review and investigate your complaint and then send it to the law enforcement or regulatory agency that has the power to follow through with your claim. You should print a copy of your complaint so that you have a record of filing such a complaint.



ANNUAL NOTICE OF SPECIAL EDUCATION REFERRAL AND EVALUATION PROCEDURES

Upon request, the School District of Wabeno Area is required to evaluate a child for eligibility for special education services. A request for an evaluation is known as a referral. When the district receives a referral, the district will appoint an Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine if the child has a disability, and if the child needs special education services. The district locates, identifies, and evaluates all children with disabilities who are enrolled by their parents in private (including religious) schools, elementary schools and secondary schools located in the school district.

A physician, nurse, psychologist, social worker, or administrator of a social agency who reasonably believes a child brought to him or her for services is a child with a disability has a legal duty to refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides. Before referring the child, the person making the referral must inform the child's parent that the referral will be made.

Others, including parents, who reasonably believe a child is a child with a disability may also refer the child, including a homeless child, to the school district in which the child resides.

Referrals must be in writing and include the reason why the person believes the child is a child with a disability. A referral may





You may see algal blooms on our lakes this summer and they may be different colors such as blue, green, white, red or brown. They may look like pea soup or thick paint, foam or scum floating on the water and might have a foul odor. They can also accumulate along the shoreline.

Cyanobacteria (Blue green algae) can cause

alone has already experienced two Pokémon GO-related crashes. Simply, distracted driving is dangerous driving.

"The dangers of distracted driving, also known as inattentive driving, are not exaggerated and are a growing threat to everyone on the road," says David Pabst, director of the WisDOT Bureau of Transportation Safety. "Last year in Wisconsin, 94 people were killed in crashes in which at least one driver was listed as driving inattentively. In addition, 10,615 people were injured in distracted driving crashes in 2015."

WisDOT has been working on a number of initiatives to combat distracted driving, including new TV, radio and online productions that highlight how distracted driving is entirely preventable. The video messages, featuring a new super-villain known as the "Distractor," are available on WisDOT's YouTube channel. WisDOT has also allocated federal funding to support anti-distracted driving efforts of law enforcement task forces in select counties, and WisDOT will continue to display messages warning about the dangers of distracted driving on electronic signs on major highways across Wisconsin.

Wisconsin State Patrol tells Pokémon players to be aware of their surroundings, and challenges them to consider safety over a high score. If you must travel longer distances to catch the rarest Pokémon, designate a driver or check out free ride services in your area. Take safety to the next level, and join Wisconsin in keeping Pokémon out of the driver's seat.

can produce toxins and can harm the liver or nervous system in humans and animals if ingested. They can also cause eye irritation, rash, vomiting, diarrhea or cold and flulike symptoms.

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services recommends these actions:

Don't swim, water ski, or boat in areas where the water is discolored or where you see foam, scum, or mats of algae on the water.

Don't let pets or livestock swim in or drink from these areas.

Don't let pets lick the algae from their fur.

Do rinse yourself and your pet off immediately if there is contact with algae infected waters.

Do look for beach postings and water quality notices before swimming.

Do get medical treatment right away if you think you, your pet, or livestock might have been poisoned by algal toxins.



subjects, selling her work online. A June 2017 wedding is planned.


