"We appreciate the great working relationship with Mole Lake and their annual Lake Metonga Banquet is very successful in raising money while being held here at our Casino. Last year they raised over \$33,000 at the event," said a representative of the Lake Metonga Lake Association.

"Mole Lake has been very helpful and beneficial. We have not had any invasive species in Roberts Lake," said Lee from from Roberts Lake Association. Jane from Roberts Lake Association said, "We are grateful for the contribution! They have been working on the blue/green algae found in our lakes. They also hire youth to work in the summer on lake projects."



Any food made from wheat, rice, oats, cornmeal, barley or another cereal grain is a grain product. Bread, pasta, oatmeal, breakfast cereals, tortillas and grits are examples. Grains are divided into two groups: whole grains and refined grains.

It is recommended that half of the grain we eat be whole grains. Whole grains contain the entire grain kernel -the bran (outer most layer), endosperm (middle layer) and the germ (inner layer). When the bran and germ are removed during the refining process, many of the vitamins and most of the fiber are removed.

People who eat whole grains as part of a healthy diet have a reduced risk of some chronic diseases, such as heart disease, diabetes and cancer.

You can't always tell the difference between a whole grain and a refined grain just by looking at it. For example, darker color does not help identify whether or not bread is a whole grain. Sometimes coloring can be added to a refinedgrain product to give you the idea that it's whole grain. Bread can be brown because of molasses or other added ingredients. Other times, a white variety of whole grain can be used, making the whole-grain product a lighter color.

Try these ideas for eating more whole grains:

- · Eat whole-wheat pasta. Mix half regular and half whole grain to start and gradually switch to all whole grain.
- · Make simple changes like eating 100% wholewheat bread instead of white bread.
- · If you bake at home, experiment by substituting whole-wheat or oat flour for half the flour in pancakes, muffins, and other flour-based recipes.
- Popcorn is a tasty whole-grain snack; make it with little or no salt or butter.
- · Eating oatmeal or whole-grain cold cereals are a great way to start your day right.

Look for clues to find out whether the food contains whole grains. For example, look for the word "whole" as the product's first ingredient on the package. Oatmeal, corn, popcorn, brown rice, barley, wild rice and bulgur are whole grain foods. Foods labeled as multi-grain, stone-ground, 100% wheat, seven-grain, or bran are usually not wholegrain products; the only way to be certain is to check the ingredient list.

Check the label

If the first ingredient listed is a whole grain, then the product is considered a whole grain food. Also, use the Nutrition Facts panel to check the fiber content. The percent daily value (%DV) of fiber is a good indication of the amount of whole grain the product contains. Good sources of fiber contain 10% to 19% of the DV; excellent sources contain 20% or more.





Guest Editorial Rural school budgets can use your support

By Ben Niehaus

Wisconsin is in full swing in preparation of its next two year state budget. The largest line-item of the state budget is the funding of its 424 public school districts. With this, there is always great attention to what our state's policymakers have in mind. I'm encouraged to share that I have more optimism in the upcoming state budget as I had in the prior budget, specifically of the positive impact it may have for our rural schools.

I have the opportunity, and pleasure, to serve on two statewide organizations, the Wisconsin Rural Schools Association and the Fair Aid Coalition. I serve as a board member for both, but I was honored and humbled to be nominated by my colleagues throughout the state to serve as President of the Fair Aid Coalition beginning in January of 2016.

The Fair Aid Coalition has been in existence since 1981 and today advocates for more than 50 Wisconsin school districts that do not fair well in the school funding formula. The majority of these districts are in northern Wisconsin, and other property-rich school districts throughout the state. These districts lose 15% in general state aid each year. All things equal, this forces a local Board of Education to shift these decreases in state aid, and make up the difference on the back off the local taxpayer. The school funding formula looks upon property value as the sole factor in the determination of general state aid distribution per pupil, and does not at all take into consideration the income level of the taxbase. I'm happy to share, that after consistent lobbying efforts over the past two state budgets, and into the new two-year state budget, that a proposal to establish a minimum aid of \$1,000 per pupil for all children of Wisconsin, regardless of residency and correlating property wealth, is being put forth by the Assembly majority.

Representative Jeff Mursau has been the champion for this legislation in the Assembly, and persevered in his efforts by circulating a memo within both the Assembly and Senate. This memo to Governor Walker is signed by seven fellow assemblyman, and three state senators, including our Senator Tom Tiffany. I'm happy to share that this memo was delivered to Governor Walker last week by Representative Mursau for consideration in the governor's state budget proposal. I'm optimistic that with the Assembly majority supporting the establishment of a \$1,000 per pupil minimum aid as outlined in their 2017 Forward Assembly Republican Agenda, along with the memo to Governor Walker, that there is a better chance than ever that more than a decade of continual decline in state aid to many of our area schools may finally come to

Please reach out to your local representatives, and Governor Walker, and share your support of the establishment of a minimum aid of \$1,000 for all students in Wisconsin. The state would need to invest \$24.7 million statewide for approximately 50 school districts. This is only a 0.54% increase of the \$4.6 billion total aid that is distributed statewide; this is not too much to ask, especially when we see our state continue to send millions each year to the expansion of private school vouchers. The cost for the state support of private school vouchers in fiscal year 2014-2015 was \$7.3 million dollars, and in 2015-2016 it grew to just over \$10.5 million. These voucher dollars were spent on approximately 2,500 students statewide, yet the collective enrollment in the 50 school districts that would be impacted by the establishment of a

minimum aid is in the ten's of thousands.

Veteran's Corner

VA's Rule Establishes a Presumption of Service Connection for Diseases Associated with Exposure to Contaminants in the Water Supply at Camp Lejeune

VA to provide disability benefits for related diseases

WASHINGTON — The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has published regulations to establish presumptions for the service connection of eight diseases associated with exposure to contaminants in the water supply at Camp Lejeune, N.C.

The presumption of service connection applies to active duty, reserve and National Guard members who served at Camp Lejeune for a minimum of 30 days (cumulative) between August I, 1953 and December 31, 1987, and are diagnosed with any of the following conditions:

- adult leukemia aplastic anemia and other myelodysplastic syndromes bladder cancer kidney cancer liver cancer multiple myeloma non-Hodgkin 's lymphoma
 - Parkinson's disease

"We have a responsibility to take care of those who have served our Nation and have been exposed to harm as a result of that service," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Robert A. McDonald. "Establishing a presumption for service at Camp Lejeune will make it easier for those Veterans to receive the care and benefits they earned."

Environmental health experts in VA's Technical Workgroup conducted comprehensive reviews of scientific evidence, which included analysis and research done by the Department of Health and Human Service's Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR), the Environmental Protection Agency, the International Agency for Research on Cancer, the National Toxicology Program, and the National Academies of Science.

Veterans with 30 or more cumulative days of active duty service, at Camp Lejeune during the contamination period are already eligible for certain medical benefits, following passage of the Honoring America's Veterans and Caring for Camp Lejeune Families Act of 2012.

In the early 1980s, volatile organic compounds, trichloroethylene (TCE), a metal degreaser, and perchloroethylene (PCE), a dry cleaning agent, as well as benzene and vinyl chloride, were discovered in two onbase water supply systems at Camp Lejeune. The contaminated wells supplying the water systems were shut down in February 1985.

The area included in this presumption is all of Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River, including satellite camps and housing areas.

The rule will be effective either 60 days after publication in the Federal Register, or following conclusion of the 60-day Congressional Review, whichever is later.






