Crandon, Wisconsin has a wood-working plant that turns hardwood into high-rate cutting boards. Snow River has been operating in Crandon since 2002 in a building on the north side of town that has an interesting past.

Back in 1932, prohibition was officially ended. Crandon, like many towns across the nation, didn't necessarily go dry. Making whiskey went from the big distilleries to backwoods occupations, and Crandon had a leg up on many other communities. Many of the early settlers were from northeast Kentucky, and making whiskey was as common as making coffee. They had been in the whiskey business for years in Kentucky, learned to make good stuff, and turned their talents to supplying the illegal whiskey market. Unlike many places, Crandon area



February is Children's Dental **Health Month**

February is National Children's Dental Health Month, placing emphasis on the need for parents and caregivers to take action early to ensure the health of their children's teeth.

The Forest County Health Department reminds the public that tooth decay is the most common chronic disease found in children. Each year, more than 51 million school hours are lost due to dental related problems. Fortunately, with good oral health care habits, tooth decay can be prevented.

CDC lists some things you can do to ensure good oral health for your child:

Encourage your children to eat regular nutritious meals and avoid frequent between-meal snacking.

Use a fluoride toothpaste. If your child is less than 7 years old, put only a pea-sized amount on their toothbrush.

If your drinking water is not fluoridated, talk to a dentist, physician, or health department about the best way to protect your child's teeth.

Talk to your child's dentist about dental sealants. They protect teeth from decay.

If you are pregnant, get prenatal care and eat a healthy diet. The diet should include folic acid to prevent birth defects of the brain and spinal cord and possibly cleft lip/palate.

Taking care of your children's teeth, including baby teeth, from the very start is the key to good oral health. A child should visit the dentist when his or her first tooth appears, or by his or her first birthday. Parents and caregivers are very important to serve as role models and teaching their children good oral (dental) health care habits, including proper brushing and flossing techniques, eating nutritious foods and making regular visits to the dentist.

Forest County Public Health partners with the Northwoods Dental Project to provide dental varnishes, sealants, and exams in area Head Starts and schools. Please visit our Northwoods Dental Project website under Services/Dental to find out about our programs to keep your child's teeth healthy!





WI Wins is making changes to fines for illegal tobacco sales in 2017

As the New Year starts, the Northwoods Tobacco-Free Coalition (NWTFC) will again be completing tobacco compliance checks through the WI Wins program. This means that any retailer in Forest County that has a tobacco license is subject to a compliance check in 2017 to make sure tobacco products are not being sold to youth under the age of 18. This year WI Wins is making changes to lower Forest County's current illegal sales rate of 23.5%.

All kids deserve a healthy future and tobacco retailers play a big role in keeping kids tobacco-free. Retailers can help kids avoid tobacco use by checking the ID of anyone that tries to buy a tobacco product. Wisconsin has several rules to help prevent tobacco sales to minors; State Statute 134.66 bans the sale of tobacco products to people under the age of 18 and requires that staff who perform tobacco sales be trained. Below you will find more information on training and fines for 2017:







It's not too late to obtain an ID to vote in the spring primary

Wisconsin's spring primary is Tuesday and voters who don't already have a Wisconsin driver license or ID or other form of ID needed to vote can still get a Wisconsin ID from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV). The Wisconsin Elections Commission website explains the options for IDs. There is no separate "voter ID".

There are documentation requirements, such as a birth certificate, proof of identity and Wisconsin residency, to obtain an official Wisconsin ID card. If all documentation is not readily available, the ID Petition Process (IDPP) can be used to obtain a receipt valid for voting while the remaining documents or verifications are obtained. DMV's webpage explains the IDPP process.

The voter should bring any documentation available to the DMV and fill out two forms. DMV's website has a locator to find the nearest DMV and check wait times. A photo ID document will be sent in the mail that can be

DMV offers this IDPP service and ID card for voting purposes free of charge. DMV's voter ID hotline (844) 588-1069 is available for questions on obtaining an ID to vote. DMV does not have information regarding voter eligibility, poll locations, voter registration information or other election information. This type of information can also be found on the Wisconsin Elections Commission website.

author's life starting when she was a little girl whose father had "itchy feet." Her father was always on the move, looking for that perfect place to settle and farm.

Laura Ingalls Wilder was born in Pepin, Wisconsin and was the second of five children. Her parents were married in Concord, Wisconsin, but early in their marriage, they moved to the Indian Territory in Kansas. She pointed out that it wasn't legal for settlers to be there, as the land belonged to the Osage Indians. Not happy with this venture, her father moved the family to Burr Oak, Iowa. While there, he managed a hotel, living above the business, which also housed a rowdy saloon.

Once again they hooked up the wagon and moved. This time the move took them to Walnut Grove, Minnesota, where Laura had relatives. Her Grandpa Ingall had a sugar bush on his farm, and she met cousins and her Uncle George, a Civil War Vet who had head issues after serving in this bloody conflict.

Once again, they moved. This time it was to De Smet, South Dakota, a place that is truly prairie. It was there, as a teenager, that she passed the tests that qualified her as a teacher. While in De Smet, she met a New York stater who became her husband. Almanzo James Wilder was a farmer who married Laura in August of 1895. A daughter, Rose, came from this union.

When the couple's house burned, they moved to Mansfield, Missouri, and a modern home. This is where she lived when she decided to write down her life story, in 1930. Her daughter Rose then helped distill the material into the book that is now so famous.

Ms. Michna did a very good job playing the role of Laura Ingalls Wilder, and it was easy to imagine homesteaders here in the Northwoods living a similar life.

This presentation was brought to us by the Crandon Public Library with assistance from the Forest County Historical Society, and a lot of work by the Hotel Crandon. Stick to your list - Organize your list according to the store layout or by food type and department (i.e. meats, canned foods and dairy products). This saves time, keeps you from forgetting items, and reduces temptation to buy foods not on the list.

Look high and low - You may have to do a little bending and stretching to find bargains. More expensive items are at "eye-level." Store brands that may be cheaper and just as good are often placed higher or lower on the grocery shelves.

Convenience foods - You can buy a lot of nutritious carrots, apples, bananas and potatoes for the price of a large bag of chips and box of cookies. Save money on groceries by taking a few minutes to do some of the work yourself.

Shop the store's perimeter - Grocery stores are designed to encourage shoppers to spend money. Try to stick to the outer perimeter, or edges, of the grocery store. Fresh produce, meats, dairy, breads and healthier, less processed foods usually are found in this area. Keep foods safe by shopping for cold items last.

Tips at checkout - Make sure prices ring up as advertised or as indicated on the shelf label. See that all your groceries get put into your bag or cart and that breakable and crushable items are bagged correctly. Ask that cold foods be bagged together so you can spot them easily and unpack them first when you get home.

Sales are not always the best deal - Ask yourself these questions to determine if the sale is a good deal:

- · Is the cost less than I usually spend? Be sure the item costs less than the store brand or brand you usually buy.
- Do I need it? Are you out of this food item or will it be extra. • Is this food something I usually purchase? Most
- sale items are for the more expensive, highly processed foods or for foods in abundant supply. • Will I use this item? Choose foods that you will
- use in your typical meal preparations.
- · Is this a healthy choice? Coupons are usually available for sugary snacks and convenience foods.
- · Can I afford it? Some food items may not be within your budget even if it is on sale.

Be aware that specials and coupons are designed to get your to make an impulse buy. Be sure that items you select are things you need and will use.



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

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

February is Children's Dental **Health Month**

February is National Children's Dental Health Month, placing emphasis on the need for parents and caregivers to take action early to ensure the health of their children's teeth.

The Forest County Health Department reminds the public that tooth decay is the most common chronic disease found in children. Each year, more than 51 million school hours are lost due to dental related problems. Fortunately, with good oral health care habits, tooth decay can be prevented.

CDC lists some things you can do to ensure good oral health for your child:

Encourage your children to eat regular nutritious meals and avoid frequent between-meal snacking.

Use a fluoride toothpaste. If your child is less than 7 years old, put only a pea-sized amount on their toothbrush.

If your drinking water is not fluoridated, talk to a dentist, physician, or health department about the best way to protect your child's teeth.

Talk to your child's dentist about dental sealants. They protect teeth from decay.

If you are pregnant, get prenatal care and eat a healthy diet. The diet should include folic acid to prevent birth defects of the brain and spinal cord and possibly cleft lip/palate.

такing care of your children's teeth, including baby teeth, from the very start is the key to good oral health. A child should visit the dentist when his or her first tooth appears, or by his or her first birthday. Parents and caregivers are very important to serve as role models and teaching their children good oral (dental) health care habits, including proper brushing and flossing techniques, eating nutritious foods and making regular visits to the dentist.

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Representative Kitchens on **Earlier School Start Date**

A bill is currently circulating in the state legislature that would allow school districts to begin classes earlier than September 1st. I am opposed to this legislation. The current start date, which has been in place for 17 years, is a perfect balance between educational and economic priorities.

As a father of three Wisconsin public high school graduates and a former school board president, I understand the importance of an exceptional education. Education is the key to success for our young people and I have spent my career in public service fighting to expand their opportunities. This legislation does nothing to enhance student achievement and has the potential to do great harm to our economy. Proponents of this bill argue that an earlier start date would have a positive impact on student success. They say that Wisconsin students are put at a disadvantage in Advanced Placement testing because students from other states have additional class time to prepare for the spring tests. There is no evidence to support this. Wisconsin AP scores have steadily risen over the past 17 years since our current start date was implemented. Indeed, we have some of the highest AP test scores in the nation. Wisconsin boasts a robust tourism industry, thanks in large part to the enthusiastic leadership of Department of Tourism Secretary Stephanie Klett, and small business owners around the state. In the last five years alone, Wisconsin Tourism has grown 30%, representing a \$19.3 billion impact statewide. Minnesota and Michigan, two major tourism competitors to Wisconsin, have state laws requiring schools to start after Labor Day, even later than Wisconsin. It is both irresponsible and irrational to harm our tourism industry for no reason

Like many places around the state, the first assembly district relies on tourism. It is an economic force that helps support many family run small businesses. The impact of an earlier school start date would be catastrophic for small businesses. These businesses not only rely on young employees, but crucial tourism dollars flood in during the month of August. In just the month of August, visitors spent \$130 million more when compared to the month of June. These are not inconsequential numbers- they are the difference between success and failure for many businesses.

As Vice-Chairman of the Assembly Committee on Education, I will continue to support the success of our schools in measurable ways. Until I am given proof that our current system is negatively impacting our children, I will not support this attack on our tourism industry.



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County Deer Advisory Council meetings start in March

MADISON -- Beginning March 13, County Deer Advisory Councils will review deer population data and other key information in order to develop preliminary antlerless quota and permit level recommendations on public and private lands within their counties.

Council meetings will also determine if any additional deer hunting opportunities beyond the normal seasons may be offered in 2017. Each CDAC meeting is open to the public - a meeting schedule is available by searching the Department of Natural Resources website, dnr.wi.gov, for keyword.

"There is never a shortage of opinions on deer continued to grow as people learn more about the process and opportunity to provide important feedback," said Kevin Wallenfang, DNR deer and elk ecologist. "CDAC meetings will help shape the 2017 deer seasons."

March CDAC meetings will develop preliminary recommendations, and a public feedback period in early April will include an online survey -- councils will reconvene in mid-April to determine final deer season recommendations in each county. Final permit levels and deer season structure will be determined at the May 2017 Natural Resources Board meeting.

Councils will accept public comments prior to forming both preliminary and final recommendations. The public may attend and provide feedback at any CDAC meeting or send comments to CDAC members - a contact list for each council and other helpful information is neckloops and wireless systems. available at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "CDAC." 1. Look for these key features:

- · Custom-programming-the sound processor inside the hearing aid is programmed to your hearing test

- · Directional processing enhances the sounds in front of you while reducing distracting background noise beside and behind you.
- · Feedback manager allows for greater amplification while minimizing whistling.
- · Noise reduction improves listening comfort and speech intelligibility by reducing distracting environmental noise such as fans or motors.
 - · Telecoil connects to telephones, hearing loops,
- 2. Have reasonable expectations. Hearing aids can't completely restore normal hearing or eliminate all background noise, but they can improve the quality of life for users by amplifying soft sounds and reducing loud background noises. If you are new to hearing aids, it can take a few weeks before you are completely comfortable with them. Be patient as you adjust to hearing sounds you may not have heard in a long time.
- 3. Evaluate new options. Some new companies are changing the way hearing aids are sold, helping to bring down costs. By unbundling the price of the device from additional, often unneeded services, people are able to purchase high-quality, custom-programmed hearing aids for less than \$1,000 per device—a savings of 60 percent or more compared to devices sold through traditional channels. As technology has improved, fewer visits are needed because the programming has become more precise.
- 4. Consider other hearing products. In conjunction with hearing aids, there are assistive listening devices that can remove distracting background noise and, effectively, bring the relevant sound closer to the user. Devices such as neck loops, wireless systems or loops that can be installed in rooms help transmit sounds directly to people wearing hearing aids, greatly improving the sound quality and clarity, especially when listening at a distance.
- 5. Check with your insurance plan. Some insurance plans, including employer-sponsored and Medicare Advantage plans, now cover some or all of the cost of hearing aids, helping to make treatment and support more affordable. Find out what coverage is available to you.





whiskey, at least a sizable amount, could be called "top shelf." The whiskey technology had followed them to the Northwoods.

With the end of prohibition, which didn't work very well, one of Crandon's big-time moonshiners and bootleggers, Black Gambill, started a distillery, a legal distillery. He made whiskey for Four Roses, and brought a good still man up from Kentucky, Everett Beam, he learned a lot from the family business, Jim Beam.

All went well until WWII, when the federal government ordered them to stop the whiskey business and start manufacturing alcohol for the war effort. After the war, the whiskey trade was resumed, but the four year wait to age the whiskey put financial pressure on the business and they closed in 1950.

There was no more whiskey, area cattle and pigs likely suffered alcohol withdrawal when their diet of whiskey mash was cut off, and a very nice brick building sat gathering dust. By 1955, a plywood manufacturing business was put in the building, but after a few years it faded, and the Bemis corporation from Sheboygan took aver the facility in 1965, and a number of wooden products were produced, including toilet seats and bowling pins. They sold out to Snow River, and they are still making sawdust.

Snow River specializing in wooden cutting boards. For years, they made the wooden cutting boards for Weber grills, but like a lot of products in this country, that manufacturing went to China. The Chinese do use North American maple, but the logs are sent to China. One of the reasons for this was the switch by Americans to gas grills from charcoal. In Europe, charcoal and the famous Weber "pot" grills are the way people cook out. So the majority of Weber grills, with American maple attachments, are sold in Europe.

Different markets were sought, and producing a large selection of wooden cutting boards was the route chosen. There is actually a very wide assortment of cutting

boards made at Snow River. If you would like a board in the shape of Wisconsin, you can order that board from Snow River. Boards in the shape of Louisiana were manufactured in the plant, as well as some Texas shaped boards.

Kohler Corporation contracts Snow River for boards, as does Bed, Bath & Beyond, and they do a big business with Wal-Mart. Currently, there have been contacts from other companies looking for custom boards, and there is hope that these calls will come to fruition.

Snow River is also capable of making custom cutting boards for special events and occasions. Because of their ability to laser etch text and art on the boards, and to make custom boards in small quantities, it is an option for people or organizations to have a unique gift to present to guests or for small shops to handle with custom art and their name on the board. How many do you have to order? They will make a custom order down to 25 boards.

Another product made at Snow River are the wooden bowls. This is a bowl turned from composite pieces that comes out of the turning and sanding machinery looking very classy. Lately, they have made some custom I-pad stands, and are more than willing to do more.

Plant manager Brian Sinclair added that they don't just do maple cutting boards. They also do cherry and walnut combinations, and, he added, they might be pretty, but they are very practical and usable.

Sinclair said they are always open for orders to increase their business, and they are there to cater to the needs of the customer. If you have an idea for a wooden product, by all means contact Sinclair.

Another interesting note about Snow River is that they are making these attractive wooden products out of left-overs. What this means is that they are utilizing the pieces cut by other manufacturers for their product, and the ends of things like cabinet doors that would normally be thrown in a chipper or even a landfill, are bought by Snow River and turned into attractive, practical and worthwhile products. Sinclair calls it "re-purposing."


Plant manager Brian Sinclair is an old veteran at manufacturing products from wood. He is from the state of Maine, and he found his way to Wisconsin to run U.S. Stick, a company in Rhinelander, Wisconsin that made ice cream bar stick, corn dog sticks, paint stirrers and more. From U.S. Stick, he made his way to Laona to work with Superior Flooring, and stayed there until W.D. Flooring bought them out. The next step was to Merrill, Wisconsin, where he worked in metal manufacturing. This didn't work for him. It seems that he caught the disease known well by many in the Lake States. He suffered from "Sawdust in the Blood." I have been told there is no cure for this, and Brian found that out when he took a job with the pet supply retailer, Foster & Smith. The logical step was to come to Crandon and run Snow River.



A very small sample of the large variety of cutting boards manufactured at Snow River


