2nd Annual - "The Big House" Legionnaire Mud Challenge



Community Connect LLC has announced that it will be holding its 2nd Annual Legionnaire Mud Challenge event in Forest County this summer. On Saturday, July 2 2017, they will be holding a 5 mile mud obstacle challenge at Crandon International Off-Road Raceway.

"We are excited to be holding an event in Forest County that promotes physical activity, teamwork and, of course, FUN," states Stacey Jameson, Director of Community Connect LLC. "The Big House Legionnaire Mud Challenge will feature over 15 obstacles: some small, some big, some creative and some a bit wild. Taking part in this event is all about taking on obstacles in your life, overcoming them, and feeling a great sense of accomplishment". This year's mud run will be part of the First Annual Forest County Festival slated for June 30 – July 2 at the International Off-Road Raceway in Crandon. The festival will include a jam packed weekend of events including carnival rides, tractor pulls, kid's games, talent show, day and night entertainment, fireworks and more to come.

Jameson indicates that this is a race designed for personal challenge and the goal is to complete the course. Amateurs, competitive and elite athletes will be competing for prizes and bragging rights. Each participant will receive a race day t-shirt and light breakfast. Individuals, teams and corporate groups will be able to register for the event.

Jameson also states that 3 area agencies will receive profits from the event. The American Cancer Society, Northwoods United Way, and Community Connect Substance Abuse Scholarship will be sharing in proceeds from the Mud Challenge. "What a great way to support the communities we all live, work and play in...as well as have some fun in the mud!", says Jameson. This event will donate profits on behalf of the community as well as to the community.

There is plenty of room for spectators to watch the messy fun and visit our sponsors' booths. We are looking for more community partners to sponsor the event. 



But for Northwoods native Josh Gustafson, the direction he would take became clear in the spring of 2011 when he first stepped on stage to perform in a play at Lakeland Union High School.

"It was my junior year, and I remember walking on to the stage and thinking 'This is what I want to do.' I've been completely hooked on theater ever since," said Gustafson, who recently graduated from the University of Wisconsin - River Falls with a bachelor's degree in Stage and Screen Arts.

"It's a great role but also very challenging," Gustafson said.

The classic comedy tells the tale of two sweet, old sisters, Abby and Martha Brewster, who are known for their virtues and charitable acts.

"Some would call them quirky, but I think that would be an understatement," Gustafson explained. "As nice as they are, they think it's perfectly OK to lure in lonely old men, give them elderberry wine laced with arsenic, and watch them drop dead."

When their buttoned-down, straight-laced nephew Mortimer shows up at their house one day, shocked after discovering their nefarious ways, comedy and chaos erupt.

Toss in nearly a dozen other off-the-wall characters - including Mortimer's delusional brother who thinks he's Teddy Roosevelt - and all the makings are there for a classic comedy that has stood the test of time.

"All the twists and turns the storyline takes make this a hilarious and highly entertaining play," Gustafson added.

"For Mortimer, his world gets turned upside down. He's known for always being composed and in control, and as the story unfolds, he becomes anything but that."

Performances are scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Friday and Saturday, May 5 and 6, and the following week Thursday through Saturday, May 11 to 13. Sunday performances will take place at 2 p.m. May 7 and 14.



For Old Time's Sake

It is quite unusual to have a flood in a place that was chosen by the Soo Line as a switch yard because it was so flat and level, but in 1961, we think, it happened. It was a deep snow year, and when the melt came in the spring, it came hard and fast. Unfortunately, the ditch that had drained the streets to the swamp lands to the west had filled up with dirt through the decades. There was no place for the melt to go, and this is what the town looked like when standing by the Burger home looking east. The Burger family took these photos, and they were supplied to us by Dan Tomaschefsky.

Basements were flooded, including the basement of Jock's store, which is the second building on the left. But, Leo Pelek saved the day. Leo owned and ran the Argonne Dairy, and he had spent time as a Marine in the Korean Conflict. He had learned how to use explosives. Leo pointed out that the ditch could be opened up with judicious use of dynamite. I watched as men used iron bars to break through the frost so Leo could place his charges. They worked their way to the west, opening up the ditch. It was a rainy and dismal night, and Leo in his raincoat, lit the fuses walked a few steps with his back to the explosion. All of the dirt clods and small stones went up and over his head, pelting the helpers who ran when he lit the fuse. By morning, the ditch was open and the flood subsided. The fire truck was used to pump out the basements that were flooded, and life returned to normal.

Dear Editor,

I am the Public Health Nurse writing on behalf of the Forest County Health Department. I have been in my role for less than one year but have had the opportunity to learn about tobacco prevention programs and the efforts made by various groups in our community and in the state. It is imperative that Wisconsin continues its efforts in tobacco prevention to provide healthy, safe communities across the state.

According to the Centers of Disease Control (CDC), tobacco use is a major preventable cause of premature death and disease worldwide. Approximately 6 million deaths related to tobacco use occur each year, including 600,000 from secondhand smoke. The CDC lists reducing tobacco use as one of its "winnable battles". Tobacco prevention is a smart investment. Dropping the adult smoking rate from 20% to 17% saved Wisconsin an estimated \$1.4 billion in health care expenditures. Wisconsin needs a fully funded comprehensive program that includes evidenced based programming, systems and policy changes so that all families can be protected and live longer, healthier lives.

With more resources, Wisconsin could reach more children, parents, teachers, and community members with expanded community education on the dangers of tobacco use, build partnerships to serve at risk populations, and support mental health and substance use disorder providers with incorporation of tobacco cessation resources into their care plan. They could also expand Quit Line services and help more tobacco users take advantage of Medicaid's cessation benefits.

Together, we can improve the environment and overall health of our communities, save lives, and lower healthcare costs.

We've all heard the song "YOU WON'T MISS ME TILL I'M GONE". The same would hold true for the Crandon Nursing Home.





"We want to increase the ease with which Wisconsin customers have access to information about their utility service and encourage their continued involvement in our decision-making processes." The PSC launched the website with Wisconsin Interactive Network, LLC. Highlights include three-tier navigation to improve organization; prominent search; and mobile responsiveness. Frequent updates will improve the website and ensure accuracy of its contents. "PSC staff spent a great deal of time detecting and eliminating usability issues and making sure the new site is user-centric," Klein said. "We hope web visitors will see the improved functionality and find that it's an efficient way to interact with the PSC.' PSC's website allows customers to file utility complaints online, and collects comments related to applications before the PSC during comment periods associated with each proceeding. PSC's electronic regulatory filing (ERF) system provides for the electronic submission of filed documents and online access of these documents including those submitted in formal cases before the Commission. ERF reduces the time necessary to make decisions on proposed actions, increases public access to formal case information, and provides an easy, convenient way for utilities, applicants, and other parties to participate in the Commission's formal case process. PSC's home on the web is www.psc.wi.gov.




