It is sad to drive by the AGI nursing home in Crandon and see an empty parking lot. At the time of this writing, there were only nine patients in the facility and another leaving the next day. There is a skeleton staff left on duty.

Fortunately, Nu-Roc Nursing Home in Blackwell was able to take some of the patients and staff from the nearly defunct Crandon home.

However, there was a meeting on Thursday, May 4th, at Crandon's City Hall. Forest County Economic Development Partnership (FCEDP) Director, Mark Ferris, held the meeting to give interested parties the latest details on the nursing home closure.

There is a glimmer of hope for the facility. Another company that has had success rejuvenating failing nursing homes is currently negotiating a purchase of the home. At the time of the meeting, it appeared that the nursing home owner would file for bankruptcy on the following Wednesday, leaving little time for negotiation. Since the meeting, it appears that the date has been pushed ahead, giving the possible new owners time to make a deal.


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

The federal rule requiring all public housing units to be smoke-free inside and within 25 feet of buildings became effective February 3, 2017. The rule, however gives housing agencies 18 months to implement. This means that if smoking is still taking place, a housing agency will not violate the rule until August 4, 2018.

Only Applies to Public Housing

The smoke-free rule only applies to public housing. The individual leases govern any smoking rules for people living in privately-run residences with their Section 8 vouchers.

Difference Between Public Housing and Section 8 Vouchers

Many people confuse public housing with the Section 8 voucher program. Public housing buildings are owned and operated by the local Housing Authority (HA), which are overseen by Public Housing Agencies (PHAs). Buildings where people use Section 8 Vouchers (sometimes referred to as just "Section 8" or "subsidized" housing), on the other hand, are typically owned by individual landlords or corporations. This is an important distinction because the smoking ban only applies to those buildings owned by the housing authority.

Smoking Rights in Section 8 Voucher Housing

If you live in private residence with your Section 8 voucher and have a problem with either a) being able to smoke in your unit, or b) someone else smoking, you first need to obtain a copy of your lease. There are several sections within your lease that will determine whether you have rights and if those rights have been violated. For example, you may have a specific smoking clause, or you may have applicable "use and enjoyment" clauses or "reasonable accommodations" clauses. An Elder Benefits Specialist can help review the type of housing you are in and your lease agreement to see what actions, if any, can be taken to address your concerns.

Application period for County Deer Advisory Council membership opens June 1

MADISON -- Qualified applicants are encouraged to apply for County Deer Advisory Council seats. The application period for each county is open from June 1 to July 1, 2017.

Council members meet annually to review deer management data, gather public input from citizens and provide recommendations to the Department of Natural Resources and the Natural Resources Board regarding deer management decisions in their county.

Council seats include representatives in the following areas of expertise: agriculture, forestry, tourism, transportation, hunting, land management and local government. Both hunters and non-hunters are encouraged to apply for vacancies, but applicants must have experience or involvement with at least one of these seven stakeholder categories. To learn more about the application process, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "CDAC."

"County Deer Advisory Councils are the future of Wisconsin's deer management," said Kevin Wallenfang, DNR CDAC coordinator. "We offer council members a great deal of responsibility in providing recommendations to manage deer in their county and they play an important role in shaping the annual deer seasons."

Councils were established in 2014 and continue to provide an excellent venue to develop county-specific deer population objective recommendations and guide deer herd management through permit issuance and season structure. To form these recommendations, councils review a variety of scientific metrics on deer herd trends, impacts to habitat and various human-deer interactions. The three year review of population objectives will occur this fall, likely in August or September.

Councils also meet each spring to review deer season results, winter severity, and other factors to determine future herd management needs. In January 2017, CDACs participated in the 5-year review of the department's Chronic Wasting Disease Response Plan through the formation of recommendations to address CWD in Wisconsin. Councils reviewed public feedback on proposed revisions and submitted a final recommendation for the CWD Response Plan.

To the Editor:

Wisconsin's Forestry and Wood Products industries are the envy of nearly every other state in the nation. Our Governor's 2017-19 budget poses a serious threat of changing that. Everyone reading this paper should stop and take heed.

Most northern Wisconsin residents and visitors are familiar with the Cutover Era. This was the boom time, roughly between 1880 and 1930, when our original forests were liquidated on a landscape scale. In his excellent book, "Mike Monte put it best: "It was an unprecedented rape of Mother Nature".

What people are less familiar with is what followed.

In the ashes of the Cutover the situation was bleak.

** The sawmills, which had provided most of the jobs, were shutting down one after another as the timber was depleted.

** Large landowners paid enormous property taxes on their remaining timberlands. They were taxed annually on the value of the standing timber. Despite their desires otherwise, this encouraged the practice of "cut out and get out".

** The slash-laden, cutover forests of northern Wisconsin burned with a frequency and intensity which, today, is unimaginable. In May of 1925, for example, 75,000 acres were on fire in the northern countiesincluding Forest and northern Oconto.

** Attempts at farming the Cutover were largely failing, resulting in tax delinquency at an alarming rate.

** County governments suffered greatly from the loss of tax revenue.

** Poverty had become the norm in the Northwoods and the future showed no signs of improvement.

Faced with this crisis, many people in our state recognized that short-sighted approaches to natural resource management were bad policy and could not be sustainable. They understood that it would result in economic catastrophe in rural areas. Many wise and thoughtful leaders in our state came together to look for solutions. Together, they came up with many novel and innovative policies that benefited the environment, the economy, and the citizens of the state. Today, many of these names are very well-known in our state and beyond: Aldo Leopold, D.C. Everest, Stanton Mead, W.D. Connor, R.B. Goodman, and others.

The Forestry Mill Tax and the Forest Crop Law were two watershed policies that, along with other initiatives, signaled the end of large scale exploitation of our forests and the beginning of a tradition of natural resource policy that has made Wisconsin a national leader in forestry and in the wood products industry.

The Forestry Mill Tax was authorized in 1924 and is the only property tax authorized in the Wisconsin Constitution. This was one of the most important events in the history of Wisconsin forestry. It has been the largest and most stable source of funding for forestry programs in our state. As of last year, the Forestry Mill Tax was responsible for 77% of the revenue that makes up the Forestry Fund. The Forest Tax Law and timber sales were the next largest sources of revenue at 8.5% and 7%, respectively.

The Forestry Mill Tax collects about \$85- \$90 million per year at a rate of 17 cents per \$1000 of valuation. Statewide, the average landowner was taxed \$27 last year.

Besides funding reforestation efforts, it has funded our 2.5 million acre county forestry program, the widely popular Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program (which provides for the purchase of public lands for future generations), wildland fire control assistance to local governments, world class forestry programs at our state universities, forest health and management assistance on private lands, and much more. In his 2017-19 budget, Governor Walker has proposed the elimination of the Forestry Mill Tax. Instead, he proposes that future forestry programs should compete for general revenue funding. Under this scenario, the forestry programs would be competing with other important programs, such as schools and roads. On the surface, this is an attractive idea to some who have a very short-term view of the world. However, in forest management, one doesn't think in terms of biennia and the next election cycle; one needs to think in terms of decades and centuries. If the Governor's proposed budget goes through. an estimated \$180 million in Forestry Mill Tax revenue would disappear in the 2017-19 biennium and subject our state's forestry programs to the short-sighted whims of folks who have little knowledge of or appreciation for the benefits of forestry.

** The Forestry industry accounts for 1.7% of jobs in the state but provides 4.9% of foreign exports (\$2.3 billion) and 9.3% (\$14.2 billion) of domestic exports.

** Our beautiful Northwoods, a tourist Mecca enjoyed by our residents and visitors alike, has recovered from its degraded state of the past, in large part, due to the stable funding source that is the Forestry Mill Tax.

For those politicians that march under the banner of Pro Economic Development, one wonders how they could possibly support the elimination of the Forestry Mill Tax?

As a result of the Governor's crusade to come up with some tax cuts, someone with \$150,000 in property valuation would save \$25.50 per year (enough to buy a case of good beer). But look at what we'd lose. We have these amazing resources today because of the wisdom and foresight of forward-thinking leaders. With the passage of this provision, it could be gone forever.

Wisconsin's citizens- and our future citizens- deserve better than this.

Please contact your State Senator and Assemblyman and ask them to oppose this proposal.

reassigned, and it has lain hidden since the war. After the discovery the town elected officials decide to find out more about the man addressed in the letter and give it to his living relatives only to discover he is still alive. Inviting him to Wabeno for a civic affair and publicity opportunity, he flashes back to the war, the Andrews Sisters and the story unfolds.

If anyone wishes to volunteer during the performances we have many roles to fill (ticket sellers, parking attendants, table staff, bartenders and many Other info brought out at the meeting was that there have been changes in the nursing home industry. It has been found that most people requiring care can do well in assisted living, and the cost of maintaining a large staff for 24-hour care would be reduced. Another factor is the limit, by the state, of the beds available in the state. The state charges a \$175 per month tax on every bed in a nursing home whether the bed is occupied or not.

Twenty-five years ago, there were 6,500 licensed beds in the state. That number is down to 4,000. When a facility like the Crandon home goes under, other nursing homes in the state will acquire the beds, and it will be impossible to restart the failed facility in the future because the state limits the number of beds. The reason for the tax and limit imposed by the state wasn't made clear.

At this point, it isn't clear if the Crandon facility will be salvaged or not. Hopefully, the negotiations with the owner, the mortgage holder and the interested party will come to a successful completion, and the jobs and services provided by this facility will continue, and be expanded.



Call goes out to report surviving bats this summer

MADISON -- A bat disease that has raced across the eastern U.S. and Canada, killing upwards of 7 million bats, is following the same pattern in Wisconsin, winter hibernacula surveys show.

Twenty-four of 28 counties with known bat hibernacula are now confirmed to have bats infected with white-nose syndrome or the fungus that causes it, and sites in their second and third year of infection are seeing population decreases of 30 to 100 percent.

"The disease has progressed in Wisconsin as it did out east," says Owen Boyle, species management section chief for the Department of Natural Resources Natural Heritage Conservation program. "That doesn't make the numbers any easier to see. The effect of white-nose syndrome on our cave bats in Wisconsin, as nationally, is catastrophic."

Numbers declined 40 to 60 percent at two of the state's largest sites, which combined accounted for two-thirds of Wisconsin's known bat population only a few years ago. Some sites have declined even more: DNR surveyors found only 16 bats compared to 1,200 at a Grant County site where the fungus was first detected, which is now in its fourth season.

Bat populations are important to agriculture and ecosystems. A single bat can

consume thousands of insects each night, and researchers have estimated that bats save Wisconsin farmers alone \$600 million to \$1.5 billion on pesticides every year. Studies are underway at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and elsewhere to understand such impacts.

DNR's focus is shifting to finding surviving bats to learn why bats from certain hibernacula may have survived at higher rates, and understand if certain bats are genetically more resistant to the disease than others. These surviving bats are what will help species rebound after white-nose syndrome, says Paul White, who leads DNR's bat efforts for the Natural Heritage Conservation program.

"Now it's our job to see what's still here and how we can help," White says. "We're not ready to give up hope that we will continue to find survivors and we want the public to remain an important part of telling the story of how bats come back."

White-nose syndrome is named for the powdery white fuzz that develops on hibernating bats' noses, ears and wings during infection with the fungus Pseudogymnoascus destructans. The fungus causes bats to wake more often during hibernation, thus burning up critical stores of fat they need to survive winter.

People can help surviving bats by building and installing bat houses; avoiding disturbing bat roosts between June 1 and Aug. 15, when bats raise their young and helping to monitor bat populations. Most importantly, people can report the buildings where bats are present in summer as well as sites where bats are no longer showing up. Bats continuing to return to summer roosts are likely survivors of WNS. Email location information to DNRbats@wisconsin.gov.
