It was also home to 59 heads of milk cattle and up to 50 tons of hay before the land was purchase by the Crandon Wolfsman Sportsman Club in 1984. The house was eventually moved, but the barn stood all the way through 1998, when the lower portion was turned into the track office, a meeting room and a special VIP area. "We take huge pride in our corporate partnerships, especially with top-level brands like BFGoodrich," said Crandon International President Cliff Flannery. "The BFGoodich Barn was a popular fan favorite last year, and we are looking forward to completing the new entrance to the BFGoodrich PRO Pits this summer." Changes coming to 63rd Annual Lakewood Mardi Gras



The Lakewood Area Chamber of Commerce has announced some changes as it finalizes plans for the 63rd annual Mardi Gras, the long-time mainstay of celebrations in the Northwoods. The annual event will be held on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, July 14, 15, & 16, 2017.

While some activities that have been a part of past Mardi Gras' will remain, including the softball tournament, the Sunday noon parade, and music, the organization's planners have made some changes in an effort to breathe some fresh life into what has seemed to be a somewhat stale and declining event the past few years. Among the changes will be moving the softball tournament back to Saturday and Sunday only, with a very different surprise event being planned for Friday evening, followed by music from 7:00 p.m. until 11:00 p.m. by A-Town Unplugged.

While there will be a carnival on the midway all three days, Saturday will hold some additional activities. There will be a trout pond for the little kids to try out their angling skills. Long one of the most popular activities at Mardi Gras in the distant past, this effort will offer the kids a unique experience. Then from 3:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m., there will be a pig roast on the Mardi Gras grounds. Music on Saturday night from 7:00 p.m. until 11:00 p.m. will be provided by Nash Vegas.

The Chamber has made plans for a special offering at the new community building, adjacent to the park, for Saturday and Sunday. (The old community building has been demolished and removed from the park.) Organizers of this year's Mardi Gras have made arrangements with the Thielke family to present their Lakewood historical displays in the new community building from 11:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Saturday and from after the parade until 4:00 p.m. on Sunday. The Thielke family, which has been in Lakewood since 1925, has a large collection of photos and memorabilia depicting the history of Lakewood. The focus of the displays this year

Concerts on the Riverwalk Summer Concert Series begins June 21

On Wednesday, June 21, the first day of summer, Concerts on the Riverwalk 2017 will begin with the Rhinelander Area Community Band taking the stage at the band shell next to Trig's in downtown Rhinelander. Every following Wednesday at 7 p.m. a different musical group will entertain at free performances through August 9.

The community band, led by director Jim Pekol, plans an exciting line-up of marches, concert pieces and lots of big-band jazz and swing. They will play three times over the summer, and one of the themes, according to Pekol, is a look at classical music heard in cartoons and animated movies.

"I was re-watching Fantasia recently," he explained, "and the music is great. We all remember the classical music playing to Bugs Bunny and other Saturday morning shows from our childhood, and I thought it would be fun for the band and the audience."

Such classics as The Sorcerer's Apprentice, Night on Bald Mountain and Ride of the Valkyries are being prepared by the band as well as toe-tappers like In the Mood, One O'Clock Jump and Leap Frog.

Concerts on the Riverwalk organizer Jan Leschke has set a varying list of local musical groups including the Dixie Six, playing Dixieland jazz on June 28; The Wildcats, performing old and new country music on July 5; the community band again on July 12; Unemployed Eleven big band on July 19; Tess and Chris playing old-

time fiddle and blue-grass on July 26; the popular Paco Fralick and Friends on August 2; and the final series performance by the community band on August 9.

The concert series is marking 35 years of summer music in downtown Rhinelander, and Leschke hinted at a celebration in appreciation of past organizers and the great musicians and audiences that have shared music over the decades.

As always, the Wednesday night concerts are free for young and old, locals and visitors, with good-will donations gratefully accepted. Some benches are available, but listeners are encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets and drinks and snacks to accompany the free popcorn. In case of bad weather, concerts will be held across the parking lot at the senior center (Department on Aging).

USDA Home Repair Loans and Grants Available

STEVENS POINT, Wis., May 26, 2017 --- May has been declared "Older Americans Month" to recognize and show appreciation to our Nation's older citizens. Older Americans have provided a lifetime of contributions to their communities.

"Older adults are a growing and vital part of our country," stated Dave Schwobe, USDA Rural Development Housing Program Director. "The baby boomer generation is now between the ages of 53 and 71. As they grow older, they may need services to allow them to retire, live with dignity and enjoy new opportunities

To ensure decent, safe and affordable housing remains available, USDA Rural Development can provide assistance through home repair loans and grants to remove health and safety hazards or make a home accessible for household members. Funds can be used to repair or replace furnaces, appliances, electrical, foundations, siding, roofing windows, plumbing, wells, septic systems and other health and safety hazards. Loans are available up to \$20,000 at a one percent fixed interest rate for up to 20 years. Seniors age 62 and older, who do not have repayment ability for a loan, may be eligible for a loan and grant combination to make needed repairs and improvements. The maximum lifetime grant amount is \$7,500. Program eligibility is based on household income that cannot exceed 50% of the area median income and the property must be located in a rural community. For example, the two person household income limit in Portage County is \$27,950. Portions of all counties in Wisconsin are eligible for housing programs with the exception of Milwaukee County. Prevent Medicare Fraud Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) urges Medicare beneficiaries to participate in fraud prevention.

First, Medicare beneficiaries should protect their identities. The HHS website suggests that beneficiaries should protect their personal information. A beneficiary should do the following:

· keep Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security information confidential

· remember that Medicare does not call or visit to sell anything

· keep records of doctor visits, tests and procedures

· save Medicare Summary Notices and Part D Explanation of Benefits

Secondly, Medicare beneficiaries should be on the lookout for potential errors, fraud and abuse. A beneficiary should do the following:

 review Medicare Summary Notices and Part D Explanation of Benefits to check for accuracy

· compare Medicare Summary Notices and Part

Tobacco Sales Training Website unveils new URL

For the past decade, Smokecheck.org has been the online destination for Wisconsin tobacco retailers looking for training to help them avoid illegal tobacco sales and hefty fines. Now, the site has a new name, www.WITobaccoCheck.org, along with new features.

The training at www.WITobaccoCheck.org is still free, but new features for tobacco retailers are now included, like the ability to create a store account, monitor employee training progress, and download employee training certificates.

The reason for the new URL was chosen to include other tobacco types beyond cigarettes that are increasingly popular with young people. In Wisconsin, 13% of Wisconsin high school students report smoking ecigarettes, compared to 8.1% who report smoking cigarettes. The current illegal sale rate to minors in Forest County is 23.5%, and has increased 2.45% from last year's illegal sale rate of 21.05%. We hope to decrease this number in the next year. One way to achieve this is to make certain that those individuals selling tobacco in our county have the training. The site is designed to help retailers comply with Wisconsin State Statute 134.66, which forbids the sale of tobacco products to anyone under the age of 18. The consequences for not following Wisconsin tobacco sales law can be severe, including fines up to \$500 or suspension of license. The new site is very user friendly and easy to navigate. It will keep track of who is trained so employers can access that information easily. Again, the site is completely free. We would like to thank all retailers that check ID's and don't sell tobacco products to minors. Together, we are making a difference in this community. 

Being Mortal: a film exploring end of life care



The film investigates the practice of caring for the dying and explores the relationships between patients and their doctors. It follows a surgeon. Dr. Atul Gawande, as he shares stories from the people and families he encounters. When Dr. Gawande's own father gets cancer, his search for answers about how best to care for the dying becomes a personal quest. The film sheds light on how a medical system focused on a cure often leaves out the sensitive conversations that need to happen so a patient's true wishes can be known and honored at the end.

"Being Mortal" underscores the importance of people planning ahead and talking with family members about end-of-life decisions.

Seventy percent of Americans say they would prefer to die at home, but nearly 70 percent die in hospitals and institutions. Ninety percent of Americans know they should have conversations about end-of-life care, yet only 30 percent have done so.

This film is adapted from Dr. Gawande's 2014 nationally bestselling book of the same name. This free screening is made possible by a grant from The John & Wauna Harman Foundation in partnership with the Hospice Foundation of America. These events are being presented locally in partnership with Ministry Home Care, Ministry Saint Mary's Hospital and Minocqua Public Library.

Natural Resources Board approves 2017 deer harvest quotas and season structure

MADISON - The Wisconsin Natural Resources Board approved deer hunting season framework and antlerless deer quotas for 2017 at its May 24 meeting in Madison.

Final season framework reflects recommendations from County Deer Advisory Councils -2017 marks the third year these councils have played a key role in Wisconsin's deer management efforts. In addition to direct feedback from councils, more than 6,500 questionnaires were received during a public input process that ran from April 3-13, 2017.

"I'm looking forward to an excellent deer hunt throughout all the seasons this year - we had another very mild winter, which will bode well for the herd throughout the state, so I anticipate another year of increased harvest," said Kevin Wallenfang, Department of Natural Resources big game ecologist. "County Deer Advisory Councils worked hard to weigh the many factors and public desires that drive deer herd management, and we thank them for their work in helping to shape this year's hunting seasons."

In 2017, four deer management units within the Northern and Central Forest zones will allow only bucks to be harvested, while the rest of Wisconsin will have a total quota of 276,515 antlerless deer (compared to 256,775 in 2016).

A decrease in "buck-only" counties compared to the last two years (12 in 2015 and 10 in 2016) is a good indication that councils and the DNR are seeing herds rebound in Northern Forest Zone counties. As a reminder, rules are in place to allow disabled hunters, military personnel on leave, Deer Management Assistance Program cooperators, and youth hunters (the Junior Antlerless Tag is valid statewide) to harvest antlerless deer in buck-only units. As a result, there will be some antlerless deer harvested in each of the 4 buck-only units in 2017.

The sale of bonus antlerless deer hunting tags will include 31,945 tags valid on public access lands (compared to 22,775 in 2016) and 168,210 tags valid on private lands (compared to 136,875 in 2016). Bonus antlerless tag sales will occur as follows (sales begin each day at 10 a.m.):

• Monday, Aug. 14 - Northern and Central Forest zones;

• Tuesday, Aug. 15 - Central Farmland Zone;

• Wednesday, Aug. 16 - Southern Farmland Zone; and

•Thursday, Aug. 17 - all remaining bonus tags can be purchased until sold out or the season ends.

In addition, Farmland Zone antlerless tags will be available with the purchase of every deer hunting license. The number of tags offered will depend on the county of choice, which must be indicated at the time of issuance. These tags will be issued as early as June 1.

A Holiday Hunt will be held within 17 counties and provide for an additional antlerless-only opportunity for firearm hunters from Dec. 24, 2017 to Jan.1, 2018.

The department's deer hunting webpage will be updated within the coming weeks with additional resources regarding the 2017 deer hunting quotas and season framework. To help hunters prepare for the 2017 deer hunt, the following documents are now available at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "deer".



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
