Expansion of Hometown Trolley and a change of fair grounds

Progress is being made on the issue of the Forest County Fair grounds. To recap, Hometown Trolley needs to expand their operations and their building, which will put them into the existing fair grounds. A covenant put on the deed years ago specified that should the current fair grounds be needed for another purpose, the county would have to replace the fair grounds with a facility of equal or better quality.

Last week, the Finance Committee authorized a survey of the grounds so all of the boundaries were in place. This week, the Fair Committee met and passed a resolution, that will have to be passed by the full county board, which will authorize Forest County to find and build new fair grounds.

However, the fair will still be held at the current site in 2018, so there will be time to find and establish a new grounds.

Nicolet College Visit Day October 27

Anyone thinking about attending Nicolet can learn more about the college, its academic programs, and the careers graduates can pursue during College Visit Day, Friday, October 27.

The event will run from 9:30 a.m. to noon in the Lakeside Center on the Nicolet Campus.

Those attending will be able to connect with a Career Coach to learn about mapping a plan for college, completing the application, and paying for college.

Students will also have a chance to get a feel for the college's labs and classrooms and meet with instructors.

"This is a great way for anyone to see what the college has to offer and see if Nicolet is right for them," said Nicolet Director of Enrollment Erika Warning.

Nicolet offers 67 different academic credentials. These range from short-term certificates that can be earned in one semester to two-year associate's degrees, all of which transfer to four-year campuses for students who have their eyes set on earning a bachelor's degree.

"For me, Nicolet was the perfect place to start," said recent Culinary Arts graduate Dan Resch, who worked his way up to chef at a top local restaurant while earning his associate's degree. He plans to transfer his Nicolet credits to the University of Wisconsin-Stout to earn his bachelor's degree in Hotel, Restaurant, and Tourism Management.

Resch's path is common, Warning explained.

"Students in many different programs will start by earning a certificate, use that to get a job in their field of study, and continue taking classes to earn a more advanced one-year technical diploma or a two-year associate's degree to advance in their career," Warning said.

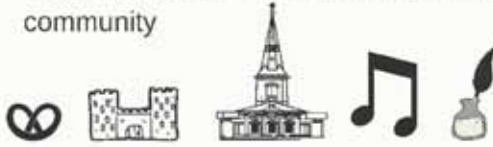

Tree seedlings and shrubs can be ordered from DNR Reforestation Program starting October 2

WISCONSIN RAPIDS, Wis. - The Department of Natural Resources Reforestation Program will begin its annual tree seedling and shrub sales starting October 2. The orders will be distributed in April and early May and can be picked up at the state nurseries located in Boscobel, Hayward, or Wisconsin Rapids, or delivered to a central location designated by the local DNR forester.

Tree and shrub seedlings are available to all Wisconsin landowners interested in planting for conservation purposes such as forest products, wildlife habitat and erosion control. Landowners can get information on seedling availability, species information, tips on how to prepare a site for tree planting and ordering instructions at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "tree planting." There is a minimum order of 1,000 tree seedlings, 500 wildlife shrubs or a mixed packet of 300 seedlings, usually good for landowners new to planting or those with small acreages.

"Every year, Wisconsin private landowners and public land managers plant millions of tree seedlings to create, enhance and restore our forested lands," said Joe Vande Hey, DNR Reforestation Program supervisor for the Division of Forestry. "The Reforestation Program offers affordable, high-quality seedlings to meet that need."

The local DNR office is also a great source of information for landowners on how to plan their tree planting, and DNR foresters are available throughout the state to visit landowner properties, answer questions and assist landowners to get the maximum benefit from their tree planting activities. Contact information can be found at dnr.wi.gov, keyword "forestry assistance locator."

"Landowners contemplating tree planting projects should contact their local DNR forester, private consulting forester, or nursery staff for advice on species selection, site preparation, planting methods, cost-sharing programs, tree planter rentals, and other considerations in establishing a successful forest tree planting," Vande Hey said. "For those who want to do more research before visiting a forester, there is an online planting plan tool available at dnr.wi.gov, by searching for "tree planting plan."

Seedlings are not available for planting until spring, but even so, Vande Hey stressed it is important to order now because many species sell out quickly. "The seedlings grown at the state nurseries are native species from seed adapted to growing in Wisconsin," Vande Hey said. "Planting these Wisconsin-grown trees and shrubs is a great way for landowners to get to know their own properties better and understand the greater role tree planting has in the local environment."

Hardwood tree species available from state nurseries include native oak (bur, red, swamp white and white), maples (red, silver and sugar), shagbark hickory, black cherry, butternut, black walnut, river birch, aspen and hackberry. Conifer tree species available include white spruce, black spruce, white pine, tamarack, red pine, jack pine, hemlock and white cedar. Wildlife shrubs available include American plum, redbosier and silky dogwood, hazelnut, junberry and choke cherry. A current inventory of which species are available is maintained on the DNR website.

Game bird brood production increased in 2017 from 2016, but levels still below long-term means

MADISON - Game birds should have been in good condition going into the spring breeding season due to a mild winter this year. This, combined with an early spring green-up, led to better game bird breeding and nesting conditions than previous years.

Average temperatures and above average precipitation during the months June through August resulted in varied weather impacts across the state for brood production. While Wisconsin's game birds showed increased brood production from the previous year, most areas were still below their long-term mean for brood production.

"Brood production surveys for these species were conducted by DNR employees during the months of June, July and August as they went about their normal work duties," said Brian Dhuey, DNR wildlife survey coordinator. "These data are still preliminary and may change," added Dhuey, "But they can be used as an index to production and help in the forecast of fall hunting prospects."

Game brood observations indicate birds are generally making a comeback.

Temperatures during the spring brood-rearing period were average and precipitation was above normal for much of the summer brood rearing season. Although Wisconsin's winter had below normal snowfall and above average temperatures, the lack of heavy snow cover may have led to an early spring green up, early June weather is the most critical for turkey, pheasant and grouse broods as this is when recently-hatched chicks are most susceptible to hypothermia if they get wet. Most of the summer was wet, but didn't seem to negatively impact brood survival as drastically as it had in 2016.

Ruffed Grouse

Statewide, ruffed grouse broods seen per observer hour were up 18 percent compared to 2016, but still 44 percent below the long term mean. Ruffed Grouse production was up in two of the three regions that compose the primary range for ruffed grouse, central (13.7 percent), northern (16.5 percent), and southwestern (-38.0 percent) part of Wisconsin. Ruffed grouse brood size fell from 4.0 in 2016 to 3.6 young per brood in 2017.

"Spring breeding grouse numbers were up in 2017, and brood production in the primary ruffed grouse range showed an increase from last year, but still remained below the long term mean. Ruffed grouse are currently coming out of their cyclic low, an increase in breeding grouse and brood production shows the expected increase which will build to a cyclic high in a few years," said Dhuey. "While some areas of the primary ruffed grouse range will be better than others, it appears that ruffed grouse numbers should be at least similar or better than last year."

Ruffed Grouse season opens in the primary portion of their range, Zone A, Sept. 16. For more information regarding ruffed grouse management in Wisconsin, search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, keywords "ruffed grouse."

Pheasant

The number of pheasant broods seen per observer-hour was up 8.8 percent in 2017 compared to last year. Pheasant broods per observer-hour while higher than last year, were 59.4 percent below their long-term mean. Pheasant brood production was a mixed bag with a large increase in the primary (82.4 percent) pheasant range but a decrease in the secondary (-52.3 percent) pheasant range from the 2016 levels. Pheasant brood size was unchanged, with an average of 4.7 young per brood in both 2016 and 2017.

"While pheasant breeding and brood production numbers have rebounded a bit from 2016 levels, overall breeding numbers have been declining for several years and pheasant numbers are down from the highs of the 1990s," said Dhuey. "Overall pheasant numbers are likely impacted by declining grassland habitat due to losses in Conservation Reserve Program grassland acres throughout the pheasant range."

Pheasant season opens statewide Oct. 14 at 9 a.m. For more information regarding pheasant management in Wisconsin, search keyword "pheasant."

Turkey

"Wild turkeys also saw an increase in brood production, with a statewide increase of 47.8 percent in the number of broods seen per observer-hour over last year's level. Four of the five turkey regions saw increases, northeast (28.2 percent), northern (88.7 percent), southcentral (16.9 percent), and western (25.2 percent), only the southeast saw a decrease (-33.4 percent). The size of those broods did show a decrease though, from 4.5 in 2016 to 4.1 this summer," Dhuey said. "Turkeys, like the other two game bird species, saw increases from the previous year, but were below their long-term mean in broods per observer hour."

The fall turkey season opens statewide in all zones Sept. 16. Fall turkey permits have been issued via US mail, and leftover tags are currently available. For more information regarding wild turkey management in Wisconsin, search for keywords "wild turkey management."

Senior Chatter Pumpkins
 Submitted by Kathy O'Melia
 The bright orange color of pumpkins gives it away that they are a great source of Vitamin A. Vitamin A helps you resist infection, and helps in the growth and repair of body tissue.
How to select and store fresh pumpkins:
 Pumpkins are readily available during the late summer and through the fall season. Watch for them on sale around Halloween and Thanksgiving. When purchasing pumpkins or picking pumpkins, choose pumpkins that are firm and heavy for their size. Round pumpkins tend to be lighter and less meaty than oblong pumpkins. Store pumpkins in a cool, dark place. They have a 2 to 3 month average storage time.
Cooking:
 Due to their tough outer skin, pumpkins are cooked and only the inside flesh is eaten. To make pumpkin puree, cut a fresh pumpkin into 5-inch square pieces and remove the seeds and strings. Arrange pieces in a single layer, skin side up, in a large, shallow baking pan. Cover with foil. Bake at 375° for 1 to 1.5 hours, until tender.
Canned Pumpkin:
 Unable to make your own pumpkin puree? Don't worry. Canned pumpkin is just as healthy and loaded with the same nutrients as fresh pumpkin. Be sure to buy regular canned pumpkin and not pumpkin pie filling that has added sugar.
Pumpkin Angel Food Cake:
 Ingredients:
 • 1 package angel food cake mix
 • 1 tablespoon flour
 • 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
 • 3/4 cup canned pumpkin puree
 • 1 cup cold water
 Directions:
 Preheat oven to 350°F. In a large bowl, beat all ingredients with an electric mixer on low speed for 30 seconds. Beat on medium speed for 1 minute. Pour into an ungreased 10-inch angel food cake pan. Bake 37-47 minutes or until golden brown and cracks are dry. Remove from oven and immediately turn pan upside down until cooled.

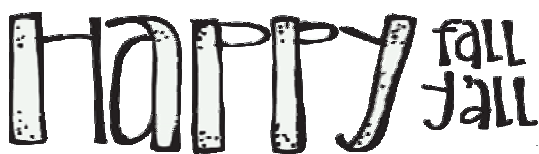

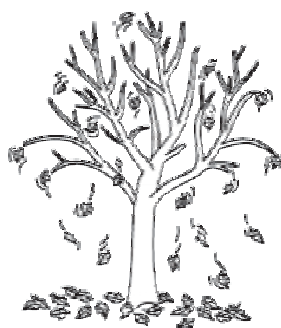

According to the County Health Rankings, only 68% of women in Forest County are getting routine mammograms, even though they meet the recommended guidelines.

Most women can survive breast cancer if it's found and treated early by getting your routine screenings.

****** If you are a woman age 40 to 49, talk with your healthcare provider about when to start getting mammograms and how often to get them.

****** If you are a woman age 50 to 74, be sure to get a mammogram annually unless directed otherwise by your primary care provider.

Talk to a doctor about your risk for breast cancer, especially if a close family member of yours had breast or ovarian cancer. Your provider can help you decide when and how often you should be scheduling your mammograms. Young women and men can also be diagnosed with breast cancer; it is important to be aware of the warning signs since they are not the same for every individual. The most common signs are a change in the look or feel of the breast, nipple or nipple discharge. Self-breast exams and clinical breast exams should be done routinely. If you have any of the warning signs, risk factors or need further education please talk to your health care provider.

Jennifer Vogler, District Administrator, reported on the following:
We were excited to be able to bring Rachel's Challenge program to the School District of Wabeno Area for our students, parents and community members. Rachel Scott was the first person killed at Columbine High School in April of 1999. Rachel's vision was to start a chain reaction of kindness and compassion that will counter the negative feelings and actions we see in our schools and in society today. Mrs. Suzanne Bell was instrumental in bringing this program to our school district. She and the local Presbyterian Church came to us and offered to act as an advocate for the program. They reached out to many civic organizations, charitable groups and individuals to raise the money required for this program. We are thankful to all of the organizations who provided funds for this wonderful opportunity for our students, parents and community members.

We have been awarded a Mentor Grant in the amount of \$25,000. This grant will help pay for the mentors in the school district and some professional development activities for our new teachers.

We are updating policies in our school district. We will be reviewing them tonight. I am taking time to research companies who conduct climate surveys with school districts. Climate surveys are intended to provide schools with information to help celebrate strengths and respond to area of challenge when maximizing student learning. Climate surveys will help provide an understanding about what we are doing well, help us prioritize accountability of our faculty members in reaching our school district improvement plans / district goals, address staff engagement and retention, and develop strategies to help increase student learning. The information gathered from the survey may also help develop a merit pay schedule for faculty members.

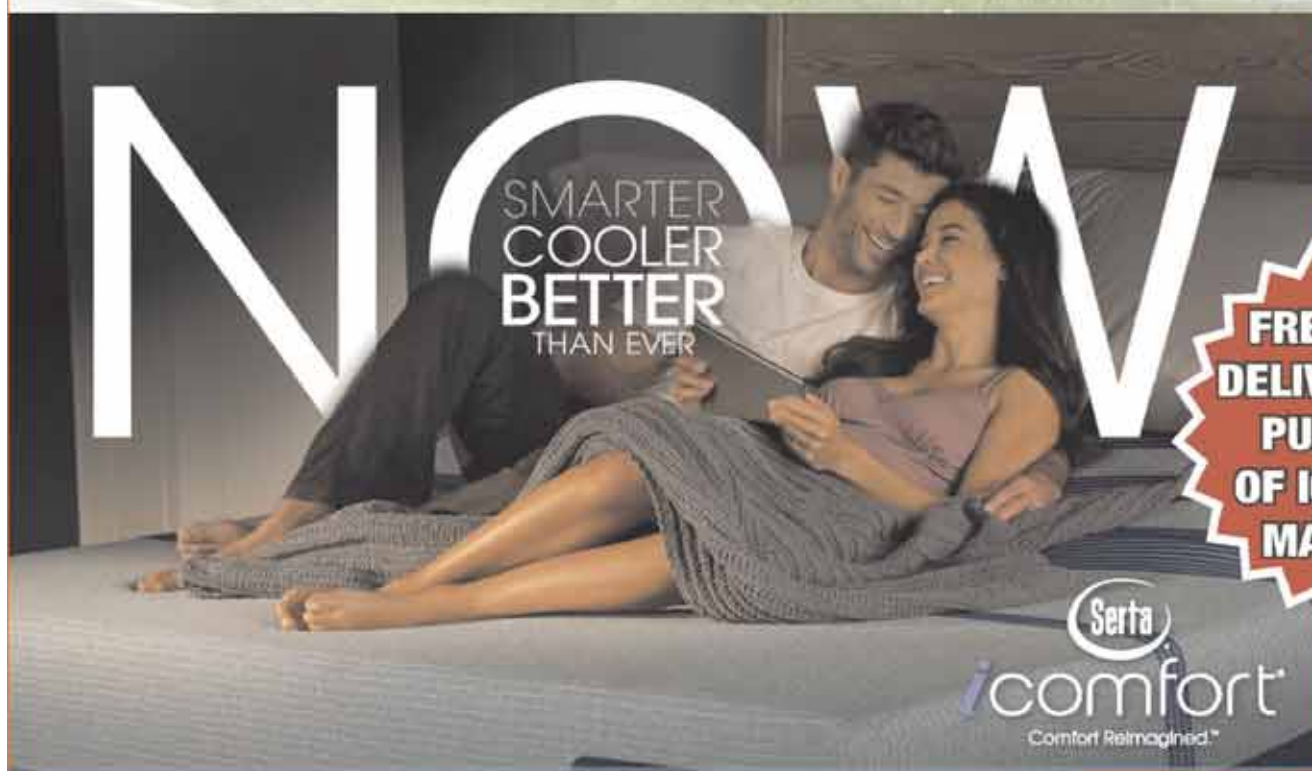
