Brian DeByl is the new Forest County Forest Administrator. He was originally from Stevens Point and graduated from the university there in 1994. He has acquired a great deal of forestry experience in the years since.

Brian worked for the Forest Service for the two years following graduation out of Rice Lake. The Forest Service didn't offer the advancement or experience he was after, and he moved to Fountain City, in Buffalo County, and worked as a forester and in procurement.

His next career move was to Consolidated Paper Company, where he experienced the various ownerships after the sale of Consolidated Papers. Subsequently, he was a forester for Stora Enso, NewPage, and then Verso. He worked for this string of companies out of Loretto and then moved to Fifield, where he purchased pulpwood and managed logging crews.

He set up a forestry consultant business, and that led to his job with Forest County.

Brian said his goals are to acquire more forest lands for the county and to keep timber sales available on county land for the logging industry. His job as administrator also entails providing recreation opportunities in Forest County, from the campground on Metonga to trails for hikers, skiers, snowmobiles and ATV users.

Brian is excited about the opportunity. His wife Megan and 13 year-old daughter are still back in Fifield, but will be moving to Forest County in the not too distant future.

100 years ago, in World War I

It has been 100 years since America entered what was called the Great War, and after World War II was called World War I. Back in 1917, when the U.S. declared war on Germany and her allies, there was great patriotic fervor and young men joined in great numbers. It was also the beginning of the draft. For the first time, young men were forced to join the military by a selection of numbers. The people and industry and agricultural united in a great war effort to whip the Hun. Then reality set in.

One hundred years ago, on October 23, 1917, the date of this paper, the first three American soldiers were killed by a hand grenade near Nancy, France. Tens of thousands of young men would be killed or crippled in the months that followed, until the folly of World War I ended on November 11, 1918.

The deaths of young men brought the war home, when parents were notified that a son would never be seen again, and would be buried in a huge cemetery in France, along with other young Americans. Others would remember the nice young man that lived next door and was now gone forever. Girlfriends and wives found themselves without a boyfriend or husband.

It is important to remember the lessons of making war, and maybe, some day, the nations of the world will learn about making war.

Crandon and Hyland Lions Clubs vision screen Crandon Elementary School

The Crandon Lions Club and the Hyland Lakes Lions Club screened 259 students of the Crandon Elementary School on Monday, October 16. Children in kindergarten, first grade, third grade and fifth grade were tested. The kindergarten class is the first class at the Crandon Elementary School to use the spot vision screener.

The spot vision screener is a safe handheld device that can screen for and detect amblyopic risk factors in children as young as six months. Those factors are: nearsightedness, farsightedness, blurred vision, unequal refractive power, eye misalignment and unequal pupil size.

The Hyland Lakes Lions Club used the vision spot screener. The Crandon Lions Club set up in the auditorium and used the eye chart. If a child failed the eye chart, the spot vision scanner was used. All of the kindergarten class used the spot vision scanner. The scanner prints out a chart that will be sent home and should be brought to the optometrist if that child needs to go. The Lions Club is please to announce that out of the 259 children screened, 13 children will need to have a visit to the optometrist.

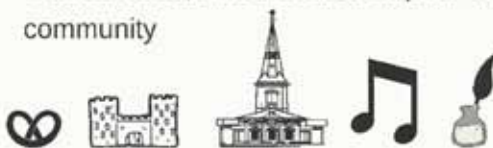

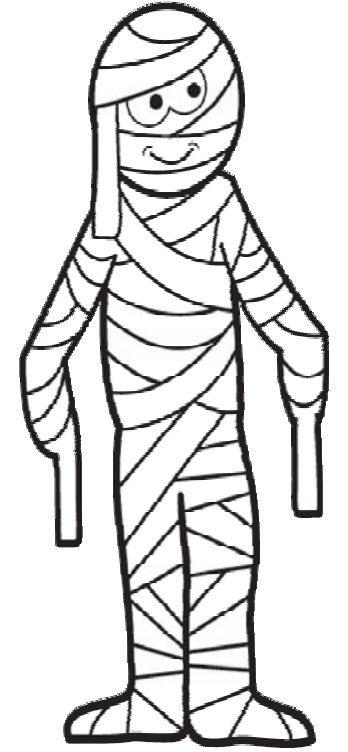

Targeted CWD surveillance efforts ramping up in Oneida, Forest and Vilas counties

RHINELANDER, Wis. - In cooperation with local businesses, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources will collect deer heads for chronic wasting disease surveillance testing Oneida, Vilas and Forest counties during the 2017 archery, crossbow and gun hunting seasons.

If you harvest an adult deer within those counties, please consider submitting a sample from any harvested adult deer for CWD testing.

These efforts are in response to the detection of CWD in a deer harvested from a local game preserve in November 2015; there have been a total of seven CWD deer positive deer harvested of 30 tested to date. A legislatively mandated enactment of a baiting and feeding ban has been ongoing in the three counties since January 11, 2016 to protect the wild deer herd by reducing risk for disease transmission.

Steps that followed for this targeted area of the state included developing sampling strategies including car-killed deer, sick and injured deer reports, and deer harvested during regular hunting seasons and is a consistent response to new CWD detections in either wild or captive cervids.

Sick deer reports

Samples will also be collected from sick adult deer exhibiting signs of CWD in all three counties. Everyone is encouraged to keep an eye out for deer that appear sick or are otherwise acting abnormally so biologists can assess if symptoms are consistent with CWD infection. Sick deer can be reported to your local DNR office or directly to the following DNR Wildlife Management staff:

Vilas County - Michele Woodford, 751-356-5211, ext. 207; Oneida County - Jeremy Holtz, 715-365-8999; and Forest County - Chuck McCullough, 715-623-4190, ext. 3131.

Car-killed deer

DNR staff will collect samples from adult deer killed by vehicles within ten miles of Three Lakes as opportunities arise. Individuals who wish to keep car-killed deer can still do so, but are encouraged to allow

DNR staff to collect samples beforehand. Deer can be sampled by contacting the biologists listed previously. Hunter harvest

CWD samples will be collected from adult deer harvested by hunters in all three counties during the 2017-18 deer hunting seasons. Head samples will be collected at cooperating locations throughout the area: Rhinelander DNR Service Center, 107 Sutliff Ave., Rhinelander (24-hour DNR self-service kiosk available); Eagle River Ranger Station, 1861 Hwy 45 North, Eagle River (24-hour DNR self-service kiosk available); and Crandon Ranger Station, 404 N. Lake St., Crandon (24-hour DNR self-service kiosk available).

In addition, hunters may also contact the DNR Wildlife Management staff listed above.

Wisconsin's citizens and cooperators have played a key role in CWD sampling efforts in Wisconsin, and department staff would like to thank all participants and collection cooperators for their continued efforts.

Deer breeding season is about to begin, drivers reminded to be cautious through out October and November

MADISON - Drivers should be aware that over the next month the state's white-tailed deer breeding season is beginning and will continue through the end of November. The fall breeding season coincides with the highest rate of deer-vehicle collisions as deer move around substantially more during this time of year.

Deer can be active at all times of day or night, but are most active around the sunset and sunrise time periods. Motorists can limit their chances of hitting a deer by remaining vigilant especially in areas where trees and vegetation are in close proximity to roads, as these are the places deer are most likely to be encountered.

Whitetail bucks will soon be entering the rut, or their mating season, and deer will become more active over the next few weeks.

To reduce the chance of a deer-vehicle collision, drivers are encouraged to follow these tips:

- Be on the lookout for deer, eliminate distractions while driving and slow down in early morning and evening hours-the most active time for deer.
- Do not rely on deer whistles (not proven to be effective);

- If you see a deer by the side of the road, slow down and blow your horn with one long blast to frighten the deer away.
- when you see one deer, be prepared for another one-deer seldom run alone.
- If you see a deer looming in your headlights, do not expect the deer to move-headlights can confuse a deer and cause the animal to freeze.

To take possession of a car-killed deer, drivers should register the deer by calling 608-267-7691 or online prior to removing the deer from the scene. Individuals will be required to provide their DNR customer ID and carcass location to complete the phone registration system. DNR customer ID's can be found in your Go Wild account or created online. A physical tag is not required to take possession of a car-killed deer after completing registration.

Deer carcass movement restrictions intended to stop the spread of Chronic Wasting Disease also apply to car-killed deer from CWD affected counties. Individuals should go to dnr.wi.gov and search 'CWD' for more information. Car-killed deer from CWD affected counties should not be taken beyond the adjacent county unless taken to a licensed taxidermist or meat processor within 72 hours.

Trappers who incidentally trap wolves encouraged to contact department staff

MADISON - Trappers who incidentally capture wolves are encouraged to contact department staff and participate in Wisconsin's wolf collaring and monitoring program.

"Tracking collared wolves is a critical component of Wisconsin's wolf monitoring program. Trappers can help improve the quality of Department of Natural Resources wolf population data by allowing us to collar incidentally captured wolves before they are released," said Nathan Libal, DNR wildlife biologist.

Voluntary participation from Wisconsin's trappers is an important part of the department's work with many stakeholders and partners to monitor the state's wolf population.

In the event of an incidental wolf capture, DNR staff will work closely with the participating trappers to determine if the wolf is a good candidate for our monitoring program. Interested trappers can contact DNR wolf program staff by calling 715-401-1764.



Forest County Drug Take-Back Day October 28

The Forest County Sheriff's Department, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), will participate in National Prescription Drug Take Back Day on Saturday, October 28th at the Forest County Sheriff's Department.

This effort will continue to bring focus to the issue of prescription painkiller abuse in Wisconsin. Drug Take Back Day provides a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposal, while also educating the community about the potential abuse and consequences of improper storage and disposal of these medications.

"More than two thirds of people who have abused prescription painkillers got them illegally from a friend or family member," said Wisconsin Attorney General Brad Schimel. "Wisconsinites can help cut down on prescription drug abuse by storing prescription drugs securely and disposing of unused medication through proper methods, like DOJ's biannual Drug Take Back Day." Unused or expired medicine should never be flushed or poured down the drain. Water reclamation facilities are not designed to remove all of them and trace amounts of pharmaceuticals are showing up in rivers and lakes.

Bring: Prescription (controlled and non-controlled) and over-the-counter medications, ointments, patches, inhalers, non-aerosol sprays, creams, vials and pet medications.

Do Not Bring: Illegal drugs, needles/sharps, acids, aerosol cans, bio-hazardous materials (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens), household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas), mercury thermometers.

Community members are also reminded that the Forest County Sheriff's Department has a 24-hour drop box in their lobby that can be used 7 days per week.

The Forest County Health Department will also be holding a Household Sharps/Needle Collection the week of October 23rd through the 27th from 7:30 am 5:00 pm. Community members are encouraged to bring: used needles, lancets, and syringes that are in a sturdy, puncture-proof container, and unused capped needles, syringes, and lancets in original packaging. Please label containers as "Sharps".

VA schedules free flu Shot clinics for Veterans

IRON MOUNTAIN-Flu vaccinations are now available for Veterans enrolled in VA health care. Veterans may request the flu shot at their regularly scheduled VA appointments.

Veterans may also get vaccinated during free walk-in flu shot clinics at the Rhinelander VA Clinic from 1 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. (CT) each Friday from October 20 to November 24. No appointment is necessary. The clinic is located at 639 West Kemp Street. Veterans may call (800) 215-8262, extension 34758, for updated VA Flu Shot Clinics throughout the Upper Peninsula.

In addition, the VA has partnered with Walgreens to provide no-cost flu shots to enrolled Veterans without filling out VA forms or carrying paper records. Veterans can simply go to their local Walgreens, tell the pharmacist they receive care at a VA facility, and show their Veterans Identification Card or other proof they are enrolled in the VA health care system.

The immunization record will be updated electronically in the Veteran's VA medical record.

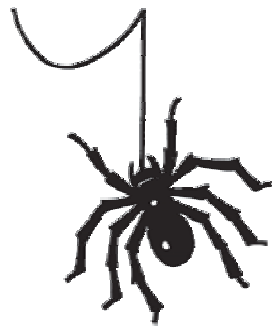

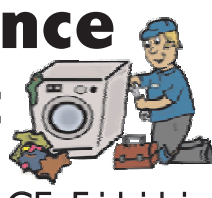

Medicare Part D Annual Enrollment Period

Submitted by Kathy O'Melia

Each year from October 15 through December 7, there is an Annual Enrollment Period (AEP), also known as the Open Enrollment Period, for Medicare Beneficiaries to change their Part C and/or Part D plans.

During the AEP, a person can make any of the following changes:

- Join a Part D plan (if not already enrolled)
- Drop a Part D plan
- Switch to a new Part D plan
- Drop a Medicare Advantage plan and return to Original Medicare
- Join a Medicare Advantage plan with or without drug coverage

Changes made during the AEP will be effective on January 1, 2018. Even if Medicare beneficiaries are happy with their current Part D plan, they should still re-evaluate the drug plan to determine if it will best meet their needs for 2018. Because Part C and Part D plans are privatized, they are allowed to change the terms of coverage each year. New Part D plans become available and some Part D plans stop offering coverage in the state. Even if a plan continues to offer coverage for the following year, its monthly premium, formulary, pharmacy network, deductible, and copay amounts could all change. It's important that Medicare beneficiaries review their Annual Notice of Change (ANOC), which arrives in the mail on or before September 30. This document notifies Medicare beneficiaries of the changes to their Part D plan that becomes effective January 1, 2018.

The most effective way to choose a Part D plan is by going on the www.medicare.gov website and using the "planfinder" tool. The planfinder asks a person to enter his or her zip code, prescription medications, and preferred pharmacies. Based on this information, the planfinder will list the plans that would be most cost effective for that person.

Unfortunately, research shows that fewer than 10% of Medicare beneficiaries are enrolled in the most cost-effective Part D plan. Name recognition or looking at a plan's monthly premium alone are not good ways to choose a plan. If a person is unsure how to pick and evaluate a plan, the person can utilize the following free resources:

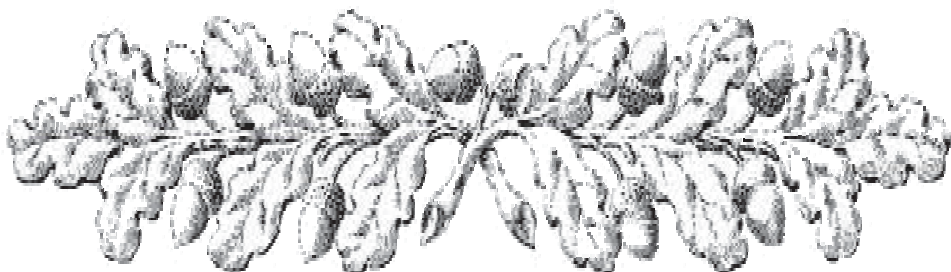

Getting into character with Anna Schwarz as God of Carnage comes to the Nicolet Theatre

Having performed in nine different productions with the Nicolet Players, Anna Schwarz is one of the most experienced actors with the theater troupe today.

And for play number 10 she'll need to dig deep and muster up every bit of her previous experiences to pull off her most challenging role yet.

In early November, she'll take to the Nicolet stage and become Veronica in the Tony Award-winning play God of Carnage.

"Veronica is a very intense and complicated character with all of these different layers to her personality," Schwarz explained.

Premiering on Broadway in 2009, the play is a study of two sets of upper-middle class New York parents who try to resolve a playground spat started by their children, only to find that a resolution is far from easy. The wives and husbands find their lives and emotions torn open for all to see in the attempt to resolve their children's conflict.

"As raw as the story can be, I think the audience will really be able to see parts of themselves in the characters at times," Schwarz explained. "We're all human with many good traits and perhaps some that are less than desirable when they're expressed in the heat of the moment. I'm guessing there will be moments when people will be able to say, 'Been there.'"

Along with making her character come alive, another challenge will be that all four characters appear on stage for the entire duration of the hour-and-a-half-long play with no intermission.

"In every other play I've been in you'd get a break when you weren't in a scene, a chance to rest and regroup before you went back out. But not this one," she said. "All of us are on stage all of the time."

That in itself posed a special casting challenge for Nicolet Theatre Director Jim Nuttall. He knew he needed an ensemble that was up for the task.

"During auditions it all came down to chemistry," Nuttall explained. "You see different personalities, different approaches to specific characters. Who works best with who? That was the challenge for me, matching up the right people to create that chemistry."

Another factor for the actors will be stamina: physically, mentally, and emotionally to be on stage and in character for that long.

"It will be a challenge," he said. "But I know the four people in the cast can pull this off and do so with flying colors."

Along with Schwarz, from Rhinelander, others in

the cast are KC Hofer, Hazelhurst, Amanda Stroede, Rhinelander, and Justin Tucker, Wabeno.

By the end of the two months of rehearsals, they'll have been on stage more than 100 hours together, honing their roles and sharpening the dynamics between the characters.

Nuttall noted that with the intensity of the interactions will come some strong language that one doesn't normally encounter in a Nicolet Players production. There's also a comedic aspect to many scenes where "good intentions quickly disintegrate into a 'comedy of no manners.'"

He compared the storyline to the type of comedy common on the hit network television show Everybody Loves Raymond, albeit a cable version with rougher language at times "A lot of it is rooted in conflict. But when done right, it's hilarious."

Even though it's been a lot of work, Schwarz said she's been having a great time working with the other cast members to bring all of the pieces together.

"It's work that I just love doing," she said "It's not always easy, but there's this incredible sense of accomplishment when you really connect with the other actors and the audience to create this entirely make believe world."

Perhaps her greatest example of this to date was when Schwarz performed in Outside Mullingar in spring of 2016.

"My dad came to see the play, and he said at one point he forgot he was watching his daughter on stage. I almost cried."

Performances for God of Carnage will take place in the Nicolet College Theatre at 7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Nov. 3 and 4, Thursday through Saturday, Nov. 9 to 11, and at 2 p.m. on Sundays, Nov. 5 and 12.

The Pathways Internship program offers paid career development opportunities to students enrolled in qualifying educational programs or institutions. 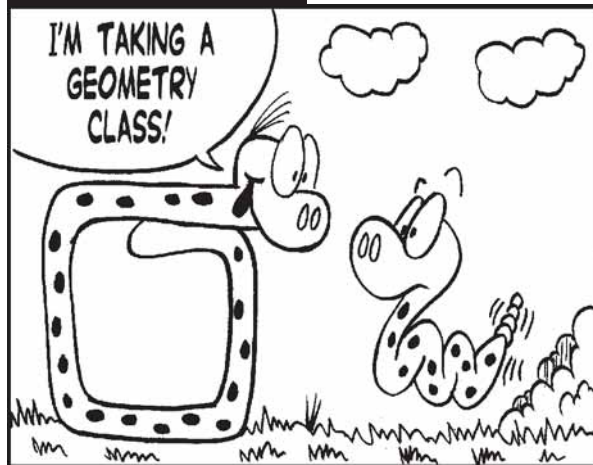

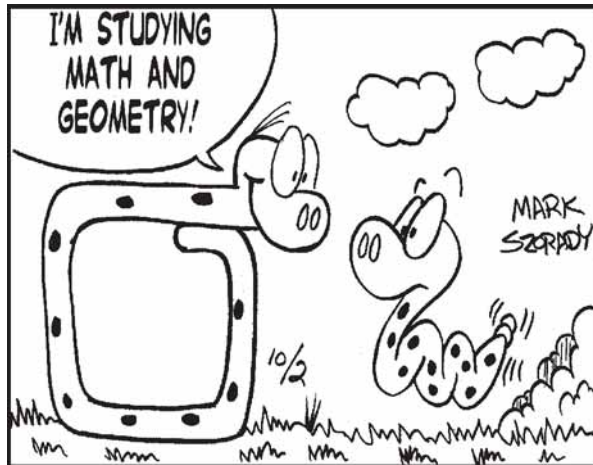
