## John Doane II to speak at 2018 Crandon Memorial Day Service

Sgt. John Doane II joined the Wisconsin Army National Guard in 1993 during his junior year of high school, becoming a private for the 724th Engineer Battalion. John was sent to Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri at the age of 17 to spend eight weeks of basic training. He returned home for his senior year and graduated in 1994 from Crandon High School. John then returned to Fort Leonard Wood to continue and complete another 8 weeks of combat engineer training.

During his time of service, John was promoted to a sergeant in 2002, built many Bailey Bridges and was able to experience many parts of the world. In 1996, the 724th Engineer Battalion was able to visit and train in Hohenfels, Germany, to take part in war games, setting up obstacles in a combat zone.

John traveled to Nicaragua for a two week training. While the battalion was there they were able to give support by upgrading schools, hospitals, and ultimately giving a better life to the local community.

In February of 2003, John and his battalion were called for active duty for Operation Enduring Iraq Freedom. They were first sent to Fort McCoy, WI for out-processing and to prepare for departure to Kuwait. Once in Kuwait the battalion was attached to the 130th Engineer Brigade and then they moved into Iraq. Sgt. John spent the next year stationed in Tallil, Iraq. During this deployment, his battalion was tasked with building a thousand-man base camp, patrolling 30 miles of roads to keep supply lines open, searching for IEDS and working with the locals to improve their conditions for living and to help the children of Iraq have suitable schools.

John parted ways with the 724th Engineer Battalion and the Army National Guard in 2005 by receiving an Honorable Discharge from service. John continues to live in Crandon, where he was born and raised by his parents, John and Patricia. He and his wife, Christy, have raised their two boys, Isaiah and John, in this community. Isaiah is currently attending UW-Whitewater and John plans on attending UW-River Falls in the fall. John spends his free time with his boys, hunting, ice fishing, and enjoying the outdoors.

After a deep clean of the Holt & Balcom Logging Camp Museum in Lakewood in early May, the site is ready for what looks to be another excellent year. Camp Manager Bob Brown: "Our staff volunteers Dave Zulegar and George Richards helped us spruce up the camp in anticipation of a very busy school tour schedule with six schools booked for May and June. We begin our regular public tours on the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend.

School visits began May 14 with a new participant in 2018, Maranatha Seventh-Day Adventist Christian School, Lena. Other schools coming for their annual field trips are Suring, White Lake, Oconto, Wabeno and Gillett. "It's always fun to watch the excitement as the children enjoy a hands-on interactive look at their logging heritage," says Brown.

## Advisory From the Forest County Sheriff's Department

Now that the snow has melted and Spring cleanup is beginning we want to remind everyone on items to be aware of throughout the community. For those of you that volunteer to do roadside clean up or help with clean up in your communities be very careful on the items that you are picking up. You will be finding pieces of aluminum foil with burn marks on them. This is commonly known as drug paraphernalia. Aluminum foil is the most common way used to smoke Opiate pills and Heroin. If you pick up the used aluminum foil with bare hands the opiate or heroin residue left on the foil can be transmitted to you. Please wear gloves whenever doing clean up or handling suspect pieces of aluminum foil. As long as you are protected with gloves and don't have any skin to foil contact you can properly dispose of the foil into the garbage.

We have also had several reports of syringes being located in the community. If you have a way to safely collect the syringes you may do so however the syringes must be disposed of in a sharps container. If you do not feel you can safely collect and dispose of the syringes contact the Forest County Sheriff's Office and we will have a Deputy stop out and safely dispose of the syringes.

Another item to be aware of are chemical

## For Old Time's Sake



The man on the left is Lynn Paul in his World War I uniform. Lynn joined the army in July of 1917 when Himes threw a big recruiting party on the courthouse square. Lynn was part of a group of 84 men who joined that day, full of patriotism and likely beer as well.

Lynn survived World War I, and went on to run his grocery store on Lake Avenue in Crandon. The store now houses the chiropractor. He married Adah Moe and raised two girls and a boy, Jimmy Paul.

In the picture below, you can see Jimmy Paul in the back row, second from the left. He served as a tail gunner in a B-24 in the next World War.

Jimmy Paul and the B-24 were on a mission to bomb a target in Yugoslavia, it is thought. The plane was hit and trying to make it back to Italy, but it never made it. Jimmy and the rest of the crew are still in the Adriatic Ocean, somewhere. Wars aren't nice.

Jimmy died on a Thursday, and in the years that followed, Lynn and Adah closed their store every Thursday in his memory.

This Memorial Day think of all the young men who were denied their lives in war.

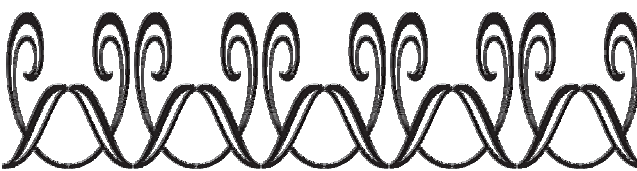

generators used to make Methamphetamine. These are usually in 20 ounce soda bottle or 20 to 32 ounce Gatorade or Powerade bottles. The bottom of the bottle will contain a chunky substance similar to the gravel in the bottom of a fish tank. These bottles are highly explosive and dangerous. If you locate a bottle that you think may have been used in the manufacturing of methamphetamine please do not pick up or move the bottle. Contact the Sheriff's office so we can check the bottle and have it neutralized and properly cleaned up. Items that may be found along with the bottles would be coffee filters, lithium batteries, table salt, cold packs, Coleman fuel, Acetone and cold/sinus medication that contains Pseudoephedrine. Here are some examples of these items.

## Fast Facts about Memorial Day From the Net

### Early Observances of Memorial Day

The Civil War, which ended in the spring of 1865, claimed more lives than any conflict in U.S. history and required the establishment of the country's first national cemeteries.

By the late 1860s, Americans in various towns and cities had begun holding springtime tributes to these countless fallen soldiers, decorating their graves with flowers and reciting prayers.

### Did You Know?

Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time.

It is unclear where exactly this tradition originated; numerous different communities may have independently initiated the memorial gatherings. Nevertheless, in 1966 the federal government declared Waterloo, New York, the official birthplace of Memorial Day.

Waterloo—which first celebrated the day on May 5, 1866—was chosen because it hosted an annual, community-wide event, during which businesses closed and residents decorated the graves of soldiers with flowers and flags.

### Decoration Day

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, leader of an organization for Northern Civil War veterans, called for a nationwide day of remembrance later that month. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed.

The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there.

Many Northern states held similar commemorative events and reprised the tradition in subsequent years; by 1890 each one had made Decoration Day an official state holiday. Southern states, on the other hand, continued to honor their dead on separate days until after World War I.

### History of Memorial Day

Memorial Day, as Decoration Day gradually came to be known, originally honored only those lost while fighting in the Civil War. But during World War I the United States found itself embroiled in another major conflict, and the holiday evolved to commemorate American military personnel who died in all wars.

For decades, Memorial Day continued to be observed on May 30, the date Logan had selected for the first Decoration Day. But in 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees; the change went into effect in 1971. The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

### Memorial Day Traditions

Cities and towns across the United States host Memorial Day parades each year, often incorporating military personnel and members of veterans' organizations. Some of the largest parades take place in Chicago, New York and Washington, D.C.

Americans also observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries and memorials. On a less somber note, many people take weekend trips or throw parties and barbecues on the holiday, perhaps because it unofficially marks the beginning of summer.

Open Letter to the Community and Editor,

The can has been kicked around for far too long and after the May 14 board meeting, it's clear the kicking continues. As the public speaker for Citizens United for Education, I have brought before the board many concerns the people have voiced, and yes, there are many.

First and foremost, I want to clarify some of the misnomers I've heard about this community group. This is, and has never been exclusive, never once has the group excluded anyone from attending a meeting. Each and every meeting is open for discussion and opinions from whomever wishes to attend and speak their mind. Meetings are not run by myself nor by anyone. I do however typically open the meeting with a synopsis of the previous week's events then let the community members open up with discussion. Once discussion is over, the group as a collaborative whole, formulate a plan and begin whatever process of implementation that was discussed.

Yet, the majority of the board continues to kick that can further down the road. Again, fire him, and do it sooner rather than later and let the chips fall where they may. The board has not only enabled this behavior for the past two plus years but is also culpable for the damage that has already been done and any future outcome of allowing him to remain in office. This truly is a shame.

The time has come to stop kicking the can. The can is no longer intact but damaged from all the kicking in such a capacity that it may not ever be able to regain its former shape and function. The stage is now set for the silent majority which includes teachers, district staff and community members alike, to step up and continue to support change for this district. As stated before, the community group has brought forth sufficient information regarding the current administrator's behavior and actions. His removal and the removal of the other tenured board members are the only way community members can reverse the ways of the past and move forward in a positive direction. If this change doesn't happen, the continued can kicking will kill the school and ultimately the community (I truly hope I'm wrong). This school should be the pillar and the backbone of this community, which was displayed when the girls basketball team went to the state tournament. This bright, shining moment was but a hiccup and the district of late been reduced to a money and morale sucking beast that needs to be stifled, immediately.

### UTV/ATV Safety tips

**MADISON** -- Motorists could be sharing the road more frequently in some areas with all-terrain and utility-terrain vehicles (ATV/UTV) under a change in state law granting local authority to allow use on roads within territorial boundaries.

The state Departments of Transportation and Natural Resources urge motorists and ATV/UTV operators to stay cautious and be aware of these changes in the law: 2017 Wisconsin Act 87 enacted November 30, 2017, allows a town, village, or city to authorize the operation of ATVs/UTVs on roads within their territorial boundaries that have posted speed limits of 35 mph or less regardless of which municipality has jurisdiction on that road.

2017 Wisconsin Act 193 enacted April 3, 2018, allows a town, village, city or county to place a sign on each road that crosses its boundary alerting motorists that all roads under the municipality's jurisdiction have been designated as ATV routes.

"As the weather warms up, we're asking everyone - drivers and riders alike - to eliminate distractions and stay safe," said WisDOT Secretary Dave Ross. "Also, be mindful that motorists may see more ATVs on state and local roads than in the past, and fewer signs indicating ATV routes."

WisDOT has published a website with resources for riders and for local officials who are interested in learning more about requirements to establish ATV routes within their jurisdiction. The website also contains a downloadable flier for anyone who'd like to encourage motorists and riders to share the road.

The DNR publishes additional resources to assist ATV and UTV riders with safety courses, vehicle registration and knowledge of the law.

"ATVs and UTVs are growing in popularity throughout Wisconsin and, in some areas, it can be a sure sign of spring and summer to have more four-wheelers out on roads and trails," said DNR Off-Highway Vehicle Administrator Gary Eddy. "Keep safety in the forefront of your thinking - no matter what you drive."

**Safety tips for motorists:**

When you approach ATV/UTVs on the road, slow down and be patient for a safe opportunity to pass. As ATV/UTVs are much wider than bicycles or motorcycles, motorists will need to ensure they can achieve a wide berth that many times can extend into an oncoming traffic lane. Keep an eye out for ATV/UTV Route postings, and remember that the new law allows postings at territorial boundaries so motorists might not see additional signage along individual roads.

Watch for riders. Always eliminate distractions, be patient and stay focused.

**Safety tips for ATV/UTV riders:**

If riding on a road, stick to authorized areas. Most highways and roads statewide remain off limits. Check for posted signs or with local authorities to see if certain highways and roads are legally open.

Travel at an appropriate speed and stay aware of your surroundings.

Stay as visible as possible, as some drivers might not expect to be sharing the road with ATVs.

Riders are required to operate headlight(s) when on or around roadways.

Always remember the basics by wearing your helmet and protective gear. Most importantly, never consume alcohol or drugs before or during ATV operation.

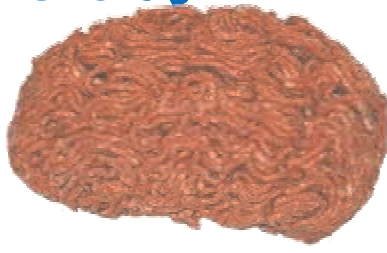

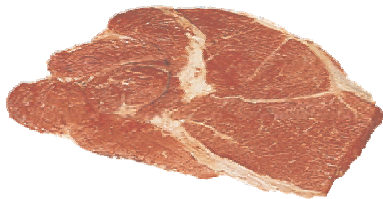

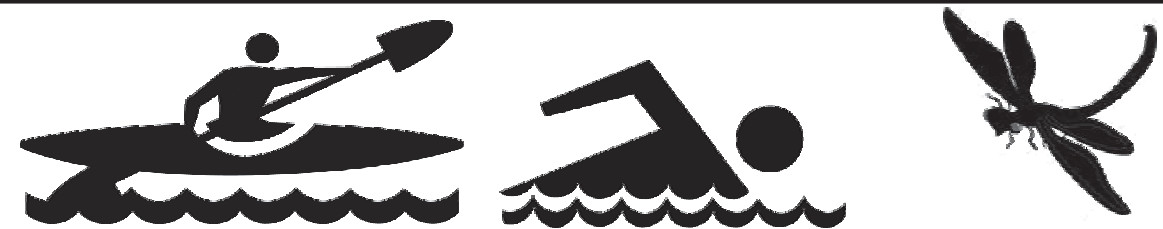

One of short-course racing's most coveted prizes, the first Forest County Potawatomi Chairman's Cup race was won in 1994 by desert racing veteran Curt LeDuc, driving a Ford 4x4 truck. Since that time, off-road racing's biggest names have earned the Chairman's Cup title, a list that includes Scott Douglas, Rob MacCachren Carl Renezeder, Jack Flannery, Scott Taylor, Ricky Johnson and Jeff Kincaid. In 2017 Johnny Greaves piloted his Toyota 4x4 to his fifth race win, also setting the record for the most Community Cup wins by any Crandon driver.

In the PRO categories competitors in the PRO 4, PRO 2, PRO Lite and two PRO SXS classes will race for an estimated total purse of \$48,240 for the weekend, or \$24,120 for each day of the Brush Run event. An estimated total of \$3,950 per day will be on the line for the two PRO SXS (side-x-side) classes that seem to grow on a race-by-race basis.

Crandon's long-established support of the hard charging, grass roots Sportsman category racers will continue at the 2018 Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run weekend. The track has committed an additional \$10,000 in cash purse money to be distributed over two days and covering eight separate Sportsman classes.

June's Crandon Forest County Potawatomi weekend will also be the debut event of the newly established Lucas Oil Midwest Short Course League, a four weekend, seven-race championship that represents the first step toward a national unified series for all Lucas Oil PRO short course competitors. The event will be highlighted via four hours of programming broadcast to 33 million homes on the MAVTV network, as well as professional live streaming of all PRO and most Sportsman classes of racing on Lucas Oil Racing TV.

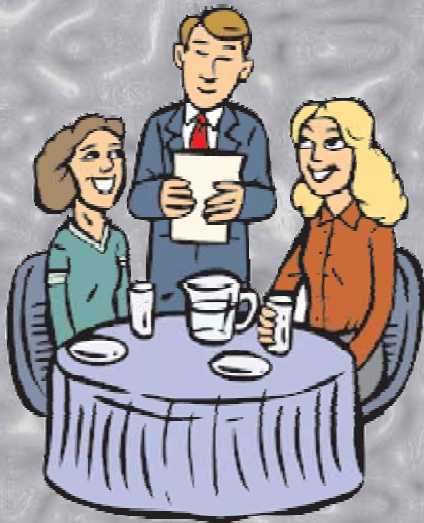

## Senior Chatter

### Silver Alert

A Silver Alert is a specific type of alert, similar to an Amber Alert, sent via the Wisconsin Crime Alert Network within Wisconsin. It is a way of notifying the public when an older adult is missing in hopes of helping that person return home safely.

The Silver Alert program started in Wisconsin in 2014, and since then has had 234 activations. Approximately one-half of the people missing were in a vehicle, and were eventually located an average of 70+ miles away from their last known location.

What are the requirements for issuing a Silver Alert?

- The missing person is age 60 or older;
- The missing person is believed to have Alzheimer's, dementia, or another permanent cognitive impairment which poses a threat to his or her health and safety;
- There is a reasonable belief that the missing person's disappearance is due to his or her impaired cognitive condition;
- The Silver Alert request is made within 72 hours of the person's disappearance;
- There is sufficient information available to disseminate to the public that could assist in locating the missing person; and
- The missing person is entered into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) database.

No official medical diagnosis is required, and there is no waiting period before a Silver Alert can be issued. In fact, the sooner a Silver Alert is issued, the better. Alerts can be issued at any time of the day or night. The local police department makes the referral to the staff at the Silver Alert program. Members of the public are notified of the Silver Alert via Facebook, Twitter, lottery terminal screens at gas stations, digital advertising billboards, and DOT messaging boards on the highways. Local news stations and websites will also share information about Silver Alerts.

Members of the public are a vital part in ensuring missing people return home safely. Oftentimes, people with dementia will stop at a gas station or a fast food restaurant and they will be "missing in plain sight." Sometimes they can be tracked by using a credit or debit card. Or, a member of the public may recognize them from an alert sent out and then notify authorities.

How can families be prepared for this type of situation?

- Have a recent picture of the person.

- Know the license plate, make, and model of the car the person drives.
- Note if the vehicle has any distinguishing characteristics (bumper stickers, damage, etc.).
- Consider purchasing On-Star, GPS, or other vehicle location/assistance systems.
- Make sure the person has a cell phone on and fully charged when going out.

### Fair Meeting Cont. from pg. 1

During the conversation, Michelle Gobert pointed out that the 4H people are covered under their policy, but the spectators to events like the horse shows are not. The Silver Dollar Saddle Club wants to use the fair grounds for events, and it was pointed out that if they were part of the 4H, they would be covered.

The insurance issues need some work, but the next subject was a bit thornier.

As has been reported in the past, future expansions in the Crandon Industrial Park will likely need land that is currently fair grounds. A possible expansion by Hometown Trolley would need approximately 200 feet of the current fair grounds.

One of the suggestions was to move the fair to the site of the former trailer park in the City of Crandon, at the foot of West Hill, on Hwy 8. This land is owned by the city, and according to Mayor Rosa, who was in attendance at the meeting, the city council would rather see that property used for commercial purposes in the future and become part of the tax base.

The thought of the fair committee was to arrange a trade with the city, to trade the current fair grounds for the site on Hwy 8. These negotiations will no doubt continue, and in the meantime, other sites for a possible move of the county fair may be considered.

In the mean time, the fair will stay where it is, as there is a deed restriction on the current grounds that states any other use of the fair grounds would require another site of equal or better value.

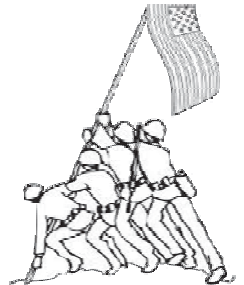

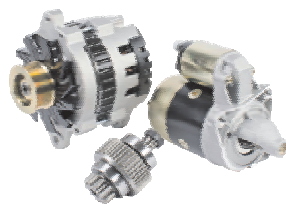

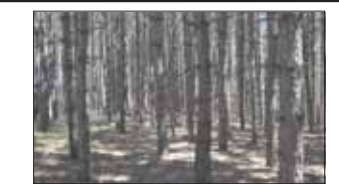
