Crandon International's 25th Forest County Potawatomi Community Brush Run Races

FREE ADMISSION FRIDAY!



The long winter recess is just about over for short course racing in the American Midwest. In exactly two weeks, competitors from around the country and 25,000-plus fans will help usher in a new era for the sport because of the historic debut of the Lucas Oil Midwest Short Course League at the 25th annual Forest County Potawatomi Community Brush Run weekend.

In preparation, track and series management officials today released the event's final schedule for the three day kick-off -- one that holds true to Crandon's legendary mix of action-packed days, music and family-fueled hospitality.

Crandon's popular "Free Friday" promotion will offer fans complimentary track admission and parking all day Friday, June 15th. The first of the schedule's Sportsman classes will turn the opening laps of the 2018 season kicking off at 3:00 p.m. The weekend's five PRO classes will hit the track at approximately 4:30 p.m. for all-important practice around Crandon's high-speed 1.75-mile track.

A total of \$87,000 in cash and Crandon bragging rights are on the line in celebration of the event's silver anniversary. Nearly 200 Sportsman and PRO class racers are expected for the year's first Midwest competition, kicking off a summer-long Lucas Oil schedule including races at Bark River in Michigan and ERX near Minneapolis.

On Saturday, June 16th there will be full slate of 14 races, including the powerful Lucas Oil Midwest Leagues PRO 2 and PRO 4 unlimited trucks finishing off a complete day of intense racing in the late afternoon. Early arriving fans will have the chance to win \$1,000 cash in an 11:00 a.m. drawing. At 8:00 p.m. Wisconsin's-own Crossing Croix band will hit the Crandon stage for a night of live music and the track's legendary margaritas in the nearby Crandon Pavilion.

At 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, June 16th, all five PRO category classes will hit the track for race day qualifying before 15 races slated on the busy schedule get rolling. The weekend hits its crescendo that afternoon as the sport's ultimate showdown takes place. The 25th annual "Forest County Potawatomi Community Cup" race will pit the unlimited Lucas Oil PRO 2 and PRO 4 classes together on the same track with a staggered start. The intense annual race offers a total cash prize package of \$28,000, with the winner picking up a healthy \$10,000 pay day. In addition, the winner will receive valuable product bonuses from Lincoln Welders and MasterCraft Safety.

The upcoming Crandon Forest County Potawatomi weekend will also be the debut event of the newly established Lucas Oil Midwest Short Course League, a four weekend, seven-race championship that represents the first step toward a national unified series for all Lucas Oil PRO short course competitors.

The event will be highlighted via four hours of programming broadcast to 33 million homes on the MAVTV network, as well as professional live streaming of all PRO and most Sportsman classes of racing on LucasOilRacing.TV

Crandon International will open its gates to the public on Saturday and Sunday beginning at 8:00 a.m. Race fans can enjoy watching practice on Friday, June 15th for free. Weekend admission is \$45 for adults, with children 12 and under and seniors 75 and older getting in free. One-day admission is \$25 for adults, children under 12 and senior 75 or older admitted free. All weekend, camping and concert tickets for the Crandon Brush Run races will be available when the gates open beginning at 12:00 noon Thursday, June 14th.

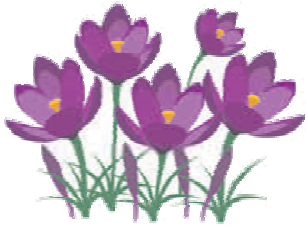

Agent Orange

Agent Orange is the name given to a blend of herbicides the U.S. military sprayed from 1961 to 1971 to remove plants and leaves from foliage in Vietnam that provided enemy cover. Agent Orange itself is not a disability and cannot be claimed as one but it can cause disabilities.

Veterans may be eligible for service-connected disability compensation for diseases the VA has recognized as associated with exposure to Agent Orange if they served in Vietnam between January 9, 1962-May 7, 1975.

Veterans who served in certain areas in Thailand between February 28, 1961-May 7, 1975, veterans who served in or near the DMZ in Korea between 1968-1969, and "brown water" Navy veterans may also be eligible.

The presumed disabilities are:

- Acute and Subacute Peripheral Neuropathy
- ALAmyloidosis
- B Cell Leukemia
- Chloracne
- Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia
- Diabetes Mellitus (Type 2)
- Hodgkin's Disease
- Ischemic Heart Disease

Multiple Myeloma
Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma
Parkinson's Disease
Porphyria Cutanea Tarda
Prostate Cancer
Respiratory Cancers
Soft Tissue Sarcoma

Additionally, any secondary conditions that are caused by one of the aforementioned conditions can also be claimed as a service-connected disabilities. For example, Diabetes Mellitus, Type 2 is a condition that has many other conditions attributed to it such as strokes, kidney disease, diabetic retinopathy, peripheral neuropathy, and erectile dysfunction. In order to claim these secondary conditions, they must be noted in your medical record and they must be diagnosed at the same time as Diabetes or after that diagnosis.

There are still many Vietnam veterans who do not know this information. If you are a Vietnam veteran or know one who might have any of the above conditions, please share this information. It's never too late to file a claim for a presumed disability.

If you are a widow of a Vietnam veteran who died of any of the conditions listed above, there may be survivor benefits for you even if the veteran wasn't service connected at the time of his death. If in doubt, please call my office.

Johnson, bipartisan coalition introduce legislation to reclaim congressional authority on trade

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) and a bipartisan group of his colleagues today introduced legislation to require congressional approval of tariffs designated under Section 232 of the Trade Expansion Act of 1962.

The bill requires the president to submit to Congress any proposal to adjust imports in the interest of national security under Section 232. For a 60-day period following submission, legislation to approve the proposal will qualify for expedited consideration, guaranteeing the opportunity for debate and a vote. The requirement would apply to all Section 232 actions moving forward, as well as those taken within the past two years.

"For too long Congress has ceded important policymaking authority to the executive branch on a wide range of issues," Sen. Johnson said. "It's time for Congress to reclaim its constitutional authorities on tariffs to ensure we don't undermine the significant economic progress we have made over the last 18 months."

Johnson was joined in introducing the legislation by Senators Bob Corker (R-Tenn.), Mark Warner (D-Va.), Pat Toomey (R-Pa.), Heidi Heitkamp (D-N.D.), Lamar Alexander (R-Tenn.), Brian Schatz (D-Hawaii), Chris Van Hollen (D-Md.), Mike Lee (R-Utah), and Jeff Flake (R-Ariz.).

Wisconsin Child Sales Tax Rebate for 2018

Because of a projected budget surplus of nearly \$400 million, Wisconsin Governor Scott Walker and the Wisconsin Legislature have enacted a Child Sales Tax Rebate.

Starting May 15, 2018, eligible claimants may apply for the one-time \$100 rebate for each qualified child. The application can be found online at www.childtaxrebate.wi.gov and must be submitted by July 2, 2018. Application can also be taken by phone at 608-266-KIDS (5437), Monday through Friday from 7:45 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. CT. Late claims will not be accepted.

A qualified child is an individual who is under 18 years of age for all of 2017, is the claimant's dependent, under IRS Code Sec. Section 152, is a U.S. citizen, and was a resident of Wisconsin on December 31, 2017. A qualified child may be claimed by only one claimant. A part-year resident or nonresident of Wisconsin may claim the rebate but must verify that his or her nonbusiness Wisconsin sales or use taxes paid in 2017 were at least \$100 for each qualified child claimed. Note that the claimant does not need to file a 2017 federal income tax return to be eligible for the rebate.

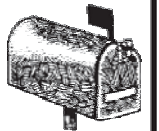

Heat Awareness Alert

As temperatures rise this summer, remember to keep your cool!

Forest County Public Health Department is reminding residents to take steps to stay cool this summer.

"People can get sick from the heat even on mild days in the low 80s," said Jill Krueger, Director for Forest County Public Health Department. "As we head into the summer months, it's important to stay cool, hydrated, and informed."

From 2013-2017, there were 3,548 visits to Wisconsin emergency departments for heat-related illness, according to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services. These trips to the emergency room are preventable when people are prepared. Follow these tips to stay safe during extreme heat:

** Stay in air conditioning. When possible, stay in air conditioning on hot days. If you don't have air conditioning, head to libraries, malls, and other public spaces to keep cool.

** Check on loved ones. Be sure to check on older friends and neighbors who live alone and don't have air conditioning.

** Avoid the hottest part of the day. If you have to be outside, stick to the cooler morning and evening hours. Wear light, loose clothing and take frequent, air conditioned breaks.

** Beware of hot cars. Never leave a person or a pet in a parked car, even for a short time. On an 80 degree day, the temperature inside a car can reach 100 degrees in less than 10 minutes.

** Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water on hot days. Avoid alcohol and hot, heavy meals.

** Stay informed. Watch your local weather forecasts so you can plan outdoor activities safely. Pay attention to any extreme heat alerts.

If you start feeling overheated, weak, dizzy, nauseated, or have muscle cramps, you could be experiencing heat illness. Move to air conditioning, drink water, get under a fan, and put on cool washcloths. If your symptoms worsen or don't improve, go to the emergency room.

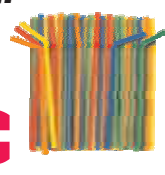

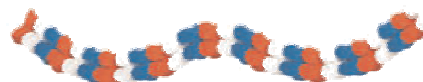

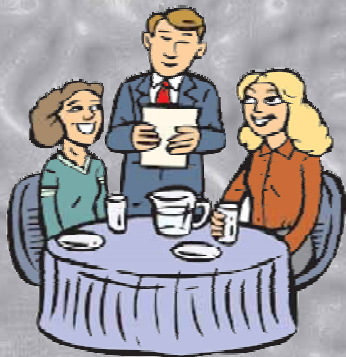

Senior Chatter Older Adults, Dementia, and Guns

A popular topic being debated in America is gun ownership. In Wisconsin, guns are often handed down from generation to generation. Learning to shoot and hunt is a rite of passage in many families. Hunting and shooting are cultural traditions, and guns are often seen as valuable collectibles or family heirlooms. Nationally, roughly 1 in 3 adults over age 65 own a gun, and about 1 in 8 adults live with someone who owns a gun.

That said, as with driving and living independently (and even operating power tools), considerations must be made when a diagnosis of dementia causes an older person's memory to falter and cognitive skills to fade. In these cases, what should happen to firearms that have long been a source of pride and a mark of responsible adulthood?

As with any gun debate, the main concern is safety. Not only is safety a concern for others in the household and the general public, but for the person with the mental decline as well. Close to two-thirds of the U.S.'s roughly 34,000 shooting fatalities are suicides.

Currently, no federal law prohibits a person with dementia from purchasing or possessing firearms. (There is a federal law that prohibits people under a guardianship from owning or possessing a firearm.) However, physicians are beginning to broach the topic of gun ownership and accessibility when a person is first diagnosed with dementia. Often, dementia creates a slow cognitive decline, which allows the older person and concerned family and friends to consider preventative measures.

Most doctors are not suggesting getting rid of the guns entirely. Possible recommendations include locking up guns, disabling them, or entrusting them with someone else outside of the home. Some physicians are even considering an "Agreement With My Family" - an advanced directive of sorts for firearms.

Obviously, each case will be unique to the person, the reason for gun ownership, personal limitations and mental decline, as well as concerns by treating doctors and family members. That said, if you are a gun owner or know someone who is, it is good to have a discussion about wishes regarding gun ownership should it become no longer safe to use them.

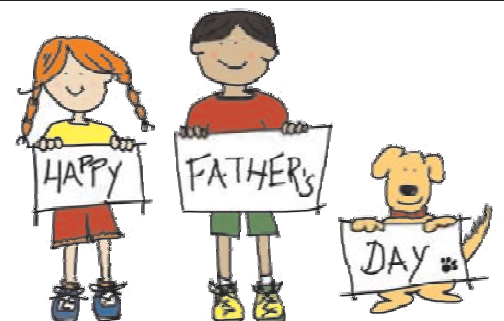

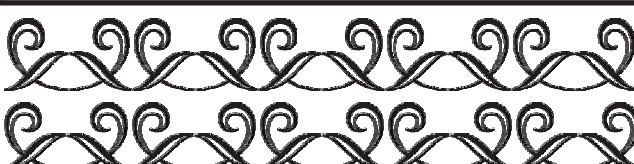
