Land Conservation and Land Information to be a new dept. in the county pending board approval

On Monday, September 17, there was a joint Forest County Board committee meeting of the Land Conservation and Land Information committees.

There was discussion on grant applications, aquatic invasive species and other business, but the main topic was whether or not to split these two offices from the zoning office and whether or not to combine Land Conservation and Land Information into one committee and a separate office, with Al Murray in charge of the new department.

The result was a decision to make the change, pending approval of the full county board.

The Land Information department has the job of providing maps with up-to-date data, providing information on emergency services and making it available to the public online and in printed material.

The Land Conservation department is charged with numerous tasks, including shoreland protection, agricultural runoff problems, and helping owners of shorelands with plantings, rip rap, stream crossings, farmers with fencing problems near water and a host of other tasks designed to keep the quality of the land and water.

Murray says he already has a long list of projects that have come to him from land owners, and with a dedicated committee to these issues, the county will be able to get more funding from state and federal sources. In addition, the Zoning Department will have more time to do their jobs well.

Forest County's lakes and streams offer an escape for residents and visitors alike. From flowages to glacial lakes, our waters provide abundant recreational opportunities, as well as a chance to simply get away from the sights and sounds of an urbanizing society.

The escape has become so popular that many lakeshores and streambanks are now growing more houses than trees, often with more consequences than meet the eye. Soil exposed during construction can wash into the water, and the development itself permanently alters a portion of the natural landscape. Buildings and access drives replace vegetation, increasing the amount

"Written Off" chronicles the life of Matthew Edwards, a Crandon High School graduate, whose addiction to opioids began at age 15, after being prescribed pain medicine for a minor surgery. His grippingly honest writing reveals the secrets he tried so hard to conceal throughout a decade long struggle to escape addiction. Matthew's mother, Jane Funk, currently

Aldo Leopold wrote, "There are two kinds of hunting: ordinary hunting, and ruffed-grouse hunting." Like Leopold, Mark Parman takes to the woods when the aspens are smoky gold. He distills twenty seasons of grouse hunting in an evocative almanac that chronicles the early season of the grouse hunt through its end in the snows of January. He writes of old dogs and gun lust, cover and clear cutting, climate change, companions male and female, wildlife art, and stumps.

Mark Parman is a member of the Ruffed Grouse Society and the Loyal Order of Dedicated Grouse Hunters. NFL backing bill by Sen. Johnson to take down drones

Last week, the NFL's top security official backed a bipartisan legislation that would authorize the federal government to track, seize and destroy drones considered a threat to large, public gatherings.
"This is growing technology that's becoming more

and more sophisticated, and we need law enforcement to have the authority to begin studying how exactly they handle this, and in extreme cases, to be able to knock them out of the sky or bring them down in one way, shape or form," said Republican Senator Ron Johnson.

The NFL's senior vice president of security, Cathy Lanier, spoke with the Senate Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee about what she said was a "dramatic increase in the number of threats, incidents, and incursions by drones" at NFL stadiums across the country. One of the biggest instances comes from last year when the San Francisco 49's had a drone fly over their field and drop leaflets in the end zone.

"The first thing this bill does is give the Department of Homeland Security the same limited authority we're given to the Department of Defense and Department of Energy to at least begin studying how to study the malign use of drones, which is a pretty complex issue in and of itself," explained Sen. Johnson.

The NFL fully supports this legislation, which is sponsored by Republican Senator Ron Johnson, the committee's chairman, and Senator Claire McCaskill of Missouri.

"For example, if there's a malign use of drones over stadiums or airports, there's no authority right now that can knock those drones out of the sky or counter them, and that's what we're trying to fix," Sen. Johnson said.

The NFL spoke to Congress saying that they want them to take this legislation further by allowing not just federal authorities, but also local authorities to take down drones due to the slow response time it could take a federal authority to make a drone call.

Lanier has also made it known that NFL fully supports the Federal Aviation Administration or FAA's proposal to require drones that are owned and operated be labeled with an ID number, similar to a license plate.

These concerns have been brought up because of the number of disturbances from drones at NFL games in the past, from drone usage by terrorist organizations, as well as NFL teams using drones to spy on other teams practices.

Senator Johnson hopes to get limited first step authorization into law within the next couple of months.

VERAP will be available at the Minocqua, Rhinelander, Eagle River, Tomahawk, Merrill, and Antigo libraries by the end of September.

of storm water runoff and pollutants entering the lake or stream.

Owners of existing and new homes typically bring with them traditional landscaping ideas centered on the conventional yard. Too often that means manicured lawns extending to the water's edge, along with the fertilizer and pesticide applications that are the norm in the cities and villages left behind. Over time, and combined with other sources of pollution, shoreline development can have profound impacts on water quality. The impacts can be minimized, however, with a landscaping plan that places less emphasis on lawns and incorporates a variety of plants adapted to conditions near the water's edge.

The Forest County Land Conservation Department has now expanded its ability to assist with shoreland habitat restoration plans and has developed listings of native trees, shrubs, and ground layers which would benefit the shoreland habitat on your property. This type of planting will benefit wildlife and fish, add natural color and plants and assist to stabilize the soils to preserve water quality.

Sen. Johnson statement on passage of Opioid Package

WASHINGTON — U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, said this after the Senate passed a bipartisan bill to help combat the opioid epidemic:

"Communities across our state have been devastated by the scourge of opioid addiction. I'm pleased that the Senate came together in a bipartisan fashion to pass this important bill to combat the opioid epidemic on multiple fronts. To improve upon the work of the Senate, I will continue to work with my colleagues on the SOFA Act—supported by the Attorneys General of all 50 states, Washington, D.C. and Puerto Rico—to give law enforcement additional tools to curb the supply of illicit fentanyl."

Sen. Johnson introduced the Stopping Overdoses of Fentanyl Analogues Act, or SOFA Act, to close a loophole in current law by immediately scheduling particular fentanyl analogues known in our communities under Schedule I, and provide the Drug Enforcement Agency with additional tools to quickly schedule other dangerous fentanyl analogues as they are identified. In August, attorneys general from all 50 states, Washington, D.C and Puerto Rico sent a letter to Congressional leaders urging swift passage of the SOFA Act.

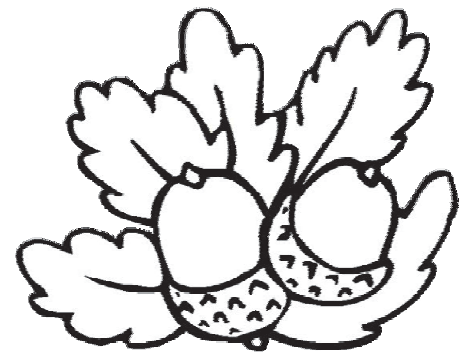

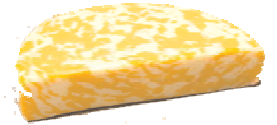



Senior Chatter

Aging in Place

The goal of aging in place is avoiding the move to an assisted living facility or nursing home. For many seniors, aging in place can provide significant emotional, social and economic benefits. Seniors who age in place welcome the emotional security of knowing they will remain supported by the same connections to family, friends, and community that have enriched their lives over many decades. They take comfort in the fact that they are familiar with their external social environment – the local park, pharmacy, grocery store and post office. And aging in place can be the most financially sensible housing option. Seniors can take steps to preserve their ability to age in place, including the following steps to maintain their independence:

- Assess their home's livability. It is important for the senior to do a thorough assessment of his or her home to assure that it properly enables the senior to comfortably live there. Here is a link to a website that has common issues that a senior may confront and possible remedies to these issues: <http://www.seniorresource.com/ageinpl.htm#items>.

- Ensure household maintenance is performed. One of the main reasons seniors move to senior living communities is because they have trouble "keeping up with the house." But, if a senior makes a list of household tasks – both routine and intermittent (mowing the lawn, cleaning the rain gutters, taking the trash cans to the curb) – and figure out which tasks the senior can still handle and which one the senior needs help with, the senior may be able to avoid an unwanted move. If a senior is no longer able to perform a task, there may be a professional, neighbor or nearby loved one who will help.

- Utilize technology to stay safe and connected. Technology can be extremely helpful in accomplishing several important steps to remaining independent:

- 1) Many medical alert buttons use cellphone technology that works anywhere a senior goes and links to a call center 24 hours per day. The buttons come with a monthly monitoring fee.

- 2) Laptops and smartphones enable video chatting with loved ones, so you can see a friendly face. You can also place a video camera in your home (for example, the living room) that connects to an app on your loved one's smartphone. IF you desire this option, it will enable the loved one to get a visual check on you at any time.

- Arrange transportation. If public transportation and taxis are not an option, learn how to use an on-demand ride-sharing service ordered via smartphone if your community has such services. Sometimes local governments provide low-cost bus or taxi rides to seniors.

- Address in-home safety. Seniors will want to do top-to-bottom review of their home for comfort and potential safety hazards. Look for (and be prepared to install) things like bright lighting throughout the house,

light switches at the top and bottom of stairs, and grab bars in the bathroom, for starters.

- Personal care. Some seniors find bathing, washing their hair, or dressing to be difficult without assistance. A relative or friend may be able to help. Or, a personal care aide could come into the home to help with these tasks for a short time each day.

- Have food delivered. While it remains important to get out and about (and going to the grocery store may be one way of achieving this goal), sometimes having this responsibility may help with remaining in your home. Many large grocery stores and online retailers offer grocery delivery. Seniors can also order subscription meal kits that deliver fresh, premeasured ingredients ready to prepare. And, there are nonprofit meal delivery services specifically for seniors, such as Meals on Wheels. Some nonprofit groups also deliver medically tailored meals based on a senior's needs.

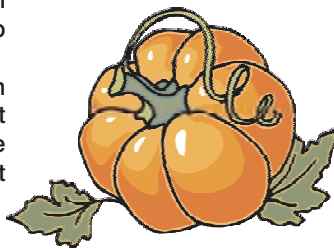

a teacher at Crandon High School, published the book "What I Couldn't Tell you: One Man's Struggle with Opioid Addiction" in June of 2017 and worked with filmmakers Molly Hermann and Rob Lyall on the "Written Off" documentary.

In addition to the film, parents, grandparents and caregivers are encouraged to tour Forest County Health Department's "Hidden in Plain Sight" mock teen bedroom, which will be set up at the school. The interactive room is a simultaneously amusing and horrifying scavenger hunt, which helps adults spot the signs of substance abuse or addiction that may be hiding in a teen bedroom. This will be set up to view at 5:30 pm and "Written Off" will begin at 6:00 pm. A discussion panel of local law enforcement, Matthew's mother, Jane, and local recovery coaches will follow the documentary. Admission is free and no registration is required.

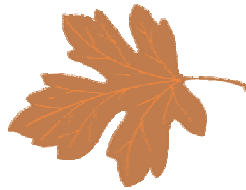
