Board of Commissioners of Public Lands Overturns Gag Order on Climate Change

MADISON- The Board of Commissioners of Public Lands (BCPL) unanimously voted to lift a gag order prohibiting staff from engaging in activities related to climate change.

"As trustees, we have a fiduciary responsibility to the people of Wisconsin. Ignoring material risks such as climate change is reckless," said BCPL Chair and State Treasurer, Sarah Godlewski. "Our investments can be impacted by erratic weather and natural disasters that can affect commodity prices and cause markets to tumble. Furthermore, a key component of our portfolio is timber, and pests can impact our harvest practices. We will not ignore such risks on our watch."

The Board's decision to overturn the order follows the precedent of the U.S Securities and Exchange Commission, which has acknowledged the economic materiality of climate change.

Board Chair Godlewski continued, "As fiduciaries, we will be assessing all financial risks. Climate change is a risk we need to monitor and evaluate to ensure the best returns for our public schools and Wisconsinites."

Whitetail buck tests positive for CWD in Forest County

MADISON – A whitetail buck from a Forest County hunting ranch has tested positive for chronic wasting disease, according to the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.

The finding will also extend a state-mandated feeding-and-baiting ban in Forest County for three years.

The 6-year-old buck was born on a breeding farm in Marinette County and was moved to the 230-acre hunting ranch in 2014, according to DATCP.

Both the breeding farm and hunting ranch have been quarantined since June 2018 because the breeding farm tested positive for CWD and both locations are registered to the same owner.

A quarantine means no animals may move in or out of the locations, which helps to prevent the spread of disease.

According to the owner's most recent registration, the hunting ranch contains only whitetail deer.

DATCP said its Division of Animal Health is working with the owner of the Forest County facility to determine if any changes are needed to the existing herd plan. A herd plan provides restrictions under a quarantine that the owner must operate under to prevent the spread of disease.

The deer died on Jan. 3, and the result was confirmed by the National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, Iowa on Feb. 7, according to DATCP.

At the Marinette County breeding farm last June, a 2-year-old doe tested positive for CWD. It had been born on the 230-acre farm and died during fawning. The fenced farm, which at the time had 320 whitetail deer, had not been enrolled in the CWD Herd Status Program since May 2017. Previously, the farm was enrolled in the CWD Herd Status Program since 2002.

A feeding-and-baiting ban for Forest County, issued after the June 2018 positive test, was set to expire in June 2020.

With this new captive detection, it will both renew the Forest County ban and reset it for three years. That means it won't expire until February 2022, according to Tami Ryan of the DNR's wildlife health section.

The first finding of CWD in Oconto County occurred in September 2016, when a captive whitetailed deer killed at a shooting preserve near Gillett tested positive for CWD. The finding triggered a state-mandated baiting and feeding ban in Oconto and Menominee counties.

Those bans are due to expire in December 2021 in Oconto County, and October 2020 in Menominee County, Ryan said.

CWD is a fatal disease of deer, elk and moose caused by an infectious protein called a prion that affects the animal's brain. Testing for CWD can only be performed after the animal's death.

For more information about CWD, visit the state's DATCP's website. DATCP regulates deer farms for registration, recordkeeping, disease testing, movement and permit requirements.

To learn more about deer farm regulations in Wisconsin, visit DATCP's farm-raised deer program. DATCP's Division of Animal Health monitors animal health and disease threats, promotes humane treatment of animals, and provides licensing and registration regulation for animals in Wisconsin.

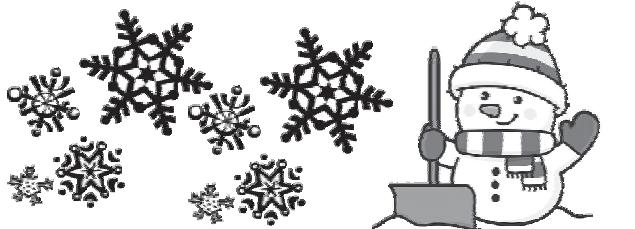

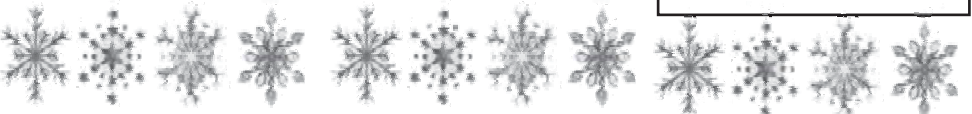

- 1. IRS Impersonation Scam.** In these scams, callers accuse the older person of owing back taxes and fines. The caller threatens that, without immediate payment, they may be arrested, deported, or their home foreclosed upon. The callers asked for payment in all forms – certified check, credit card, electronic wire transfer, prepaid debit card, or even gift cards for stores such as iTunes.
- 2. Robocalls/Unsolicited Phone Calls.** “Robocalling” is when machines, rather than humans, dial phone numbers in a sequence. These robocalls usually originate overseas, however, the scammers are able to mask the number they are calling from to look like it’s from the government or another legitimate agency, or sometimes even the person’s home state of local area code. Scammers use robocalls for many types of scams, and can usually get around the Do-Not-Call registry.
- 3. Sweepstakes/Jamacian Lottery Scam.** Sweepstakes scammers convince victims that they have won a lottery and only need to take a few actions to obtain their winnings. The scammers usually contact victims by phone or through the mail to tell them that they have won or have been entered to win a prize. Scammers then require the victims to pay a fee to either collect their supposed winnings or improve their odds of winning the prize. Sweepstakes scams often come from a number beginning with “876” – the country code for Jamaica.
- 4. “Can you hear me?” Scam.** In this scam, individuals receive a call where the caller simply asks “Are you there?” or “Can you hear me?” in order to prompt the recipient to say “yes.” After responding “yes,” the call immediately drops or gets disconnected. Scammers record the consumer’s voice to obtain a voice signature, and use the recording to authorize unwanted charges on items like utility bill, phone bills, or even stolen credit cards.
- 5. Grandparent Scam.** In this scam, callers either pretend to be the victim’s grandchild and/or claim to be holding the victims’ grandchild. The scammers claim the grandchild is in trouble and needs money to help with an emergency such as getting out of jail, paying a hospital bill, or leaving a foreign country. Scammers play on victims’ emotions and trick concerned grandparents into wiring money to them. Sometimes the scammer pretends to be an arresting police officers, a lawyer, or a doctor. It is also common for the scammer to impersonate the victims’ grandchildren to talk briefly with the grandparent and then hand the phone over to an accomplice impersonating an authority figure. This gives the scammers’ stories more credibility and reduces the chance that the victim will recognize that the voice on the phone does not belong to their grandchild.
- 6. Computer Scam.** In this scam, callers pretend to be associated with a technology company such as Microsoft, Apple or Dell. They falsely claim that the victims’ computers have been infected with a virus. The scammers convince victims to give them remote access to their computers, personal information, and credit card and bank account numbers so that victims can be “billed” for fraudulent services to fix the virus. In a related scam, individuals surfing the internet may see a pop-up window on their computer instructing them to contact a tech-support agent. Sometimes scammers use the pop-up window to hack into victims’ computers, lock them out, and require victims to pay a ransom to regain control of their computers.



7. Romance Scam. Scammers may contact older adults online through chatrooms, dating sites, social media sites or email. Scammers often create elaborate profile pages, which gives their fabricated story more credibility. Scammers may call and chat on the phone to prove that they are real. These conversations can take place over weeks and even months as the scammers build trust with their victims. In some instances, scammers have even promised to marry their victims. Inevitably, scammers will ask their victims for money, such as travel expenses so they can visit the victims in the United States. They may also make up stories about needing emergency money for hospital bills for a child or other relative, visas or other official documents, or losses from a temporary financial setback.

8. Elder Financial Abuse: Financial abuse against older adults is often committed by family members; paid home care workers; those with fiduciary responsibilities, such as financial advisors or legal guardians; or strangers who defraud older adults through mail, telephone, or Internet scams. Unfortunately, money that is stole is rarely recovered, which then makes it difficult for the victim to support or care for themselves.

9. Identity Theft. Scammers can often access an existing customer’s account simply by entering that individual’s username, e-mail address, or name and correctly guessing the password. This is often referred to as an “account takeover.” The scammer can use this method to access an existing account or use stolen personal information to create a new account. Or, a scammer can steal personal information – an individual’s name, SSN, or health insurance claim number (HICN) – to obtain medical care, buy prescription drugs, or submit fake billings to Medicare. Some scammers even use stolen personal information to obtain medical care for themselves or others, putting lives at risk if the theft is not detected and the wrong information ends up in the victims’ medical files.

10. Government Grant Scam. In this scam, older adults receive an unsolicited phone call from scammers claiming that they are from the “Federal Grants Administration,” or the “Federal Grants Department” – agencies that do not exist. In another version, scammers place advertisements in the classified section of local newspapers offering “free grants,” and request that victims wire money for processing fees or taxes before the money can be sent to them.

- Tips from the United States Special Committee on Aging for Avoiding Scams:
- Con artists force you to make decisions fast and may threaten you.
 - Con artists disguise their real numbers, using fake caller IDs.
 - Con artists sometimes pretend to be the government (e.g. IRS).
 - Con artists try to get you to provide them personal information like your Social Security number or account numbers.
 - Before giving out your credit card number or money; please ask a friend or family member about it.
 - Beware of offers of free travel.

Nicolet College accepting applications for Law Enforcement Recruit Academy

Nicolet College will hold a Law Enforcement Recruit Academy June 3 to Oct. 11 for individuals interested in starting a career in law enforcement.

Classes will typically run from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Thursday on the Nicolet Campus, one mile south of Rhinelander on Hwy. G.

Application deadline is Tuesday, April 30.

On Friday, May 10, applicants will go through a mandatory interview process at Nicolet This will be followed by a mandatory fitness test the following day, Saturday, May 11, at Rhinelander High School. Cost for the fitness test is \$25, payable the day of the test.

The academy is open to anyone who has at least 28 college credits in any field. Applicants to the academy will have to pass the oral interview, criminal background check, a physical, and the physical readiness test.

The 720-plus hours of instruction will include lectures and hands-on scenario training covering numerous areas of law enforcement. These include professional communication, emergency vehicle operation, emergency medical response, tactical skills, traffic and patrol procedures, investigations, and defense and arrest tactics. Graduates will also be proficient in firearms, radar, and field sobriety testing.

Upon completion of the 18-week academy, graduates will be eligible to go before the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Standards Board to become certified to work in law enforcement in the state. Graduates commonly secure employment with municipal police departments or county sheriff's offices.

Many recruits entering the academy are graduates of Nicolet College's two-year Criminal Justice associate degree program. From 2013 to 2017, every graduate, 100 percent, reported they were satisfied or very satisfied with the program at Nicolet. Oftentimes they cited the quality of instruction as the reason.

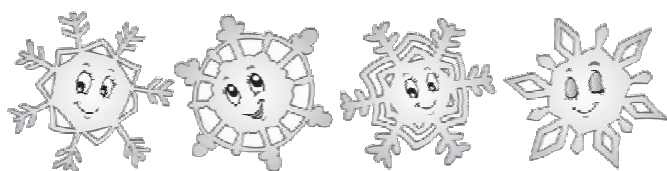

February is American Heart Month

In celebration of American Heart Month this February, the Forest County Health Department wants to help increase awareness of high blood pressure, which is often times referred to as the "silent killer." Normal blood pressure is 120/80 or less. Nearly half of the American population over age 20 has high blood pressure and many do not even know it. You may not feel that anything is wrong, but high blood pressure could be quietly causing damage that could threaten your health. Certain risk factors for high blood pressure cannot be controlled, such as, family history, race/ethnicity, age and gender. The good news is that you can do some things to improve your blood pressure. Don't smoke and avoid second hand smoke, reach and maintain a healthy weight, eat a healthy diet that is low in saturated and trans fats and rich in fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and low-fat dairy products, reduce your daily intake of sodium, be more physically active, limit alcohol intake.

High blood pressure can lead to stroke, vision loss, heart failure, heart attack, kidney disease, and sexual dysfunction. The best prevention is knowing your numbers and making changes to prevent and manage high blood pressure. The Forest County Health Department would like to encourage you to increase your activity level this month. Challenge yourself to get 150 minutes of physical activity per week. This might sound like a lot if you haven't been active this winter but you can start small with 10 or 15 minutes and work your way up. If you are looking for a place to walk, try your local school. All of them allow the public to walk inside during certain hours- you will need to sign a waiver and check into the hours. You could also try walking on your lunch break or walking in place at home. You can track your times by jotting them on the calendar each day, you will be amazed at how it adds up, even just 10 minutes three times a day.

Holli from the health department will be visiting each Senior Meal Site this month to offer blood pressure screenings and information about ways to control blood pressure and information about conditions that affect heart health. February 5th at 10:30-11:30 at the Armstrong Creek Meal site, February 7th 2:30-3:30 at the Alvin Town Hall, February 12th at 11:00-12:00 at the Laona Senior Citizen Center, February 19th at 10:45-11:30 at the Wabeno Town Hall, and February 20th at 11:15-12:00 at the Crandon Community Building. You can also walk in to the health department Monday through Friday 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. to have your blood pressure checked.

In addition, the Board amended an energy efficiency policy and is now accepting applications from school districts looking to finance energy efficiency projects that are in accordance with state law.

Godlewski stated, "Energy efficiency is an important initiative not only for our environment, but also for our bottom line. It lowers energy consumption and costs and provides a win-win for our districts."

About the BCPL

The BCPL operates entirely on program revenue, without taxpayer money, and distributes more than 96 cents of every dollar of interest earned on BCPL State Trust Fund investments to Wisconsin's public schools. The 2018 earnings of \$35.7 million provide the sole source of state funding for K-12 public school library materials.
