Jameson's Whiskey Darlin' is a local harvest market and unique crafters and vender store. It will sell loose leaf and bubble teas. The loose leaf teas are hot and cold and the bubble teas over ice or blended. They will also feature balsamic oils and vinaigrettes, rock sugars, honey, maple syrup, locally harvested wild rice, bison beef sticks, wine, soups, pancake mixes, dips, jellies and jams and more local vender items. They are planning weekly Tea Taps that feature different freshly brewed teas.

"Logging, Locals, and Lakewood" Holt & Balcom Logging Museum



Lakewood historian Tom Thielke will present "Logging, Locals, and Lakewood" at 1p.m. on July 27 at the Holt and Balcom Logging Camp Museum. Tom will discuss the intersection of Holt Lumber Company's harvest of Northwoods timber with the establishment of a small town given a perfect name for its location: Lakewood.

At first Lakewood catered to lumberjacks and railroaders, but its success was primarily due to it becoming a commercial center to serve local farmers. These hard-working homesteaders were determined to squeeze a living from the cutover lands left behind by the logging companies. Tom's grandfather, Gilbert Thielke, was one of the entrepreneurs who helped make it happen. Gilbert established the first factory in the area, a cheese factory in the town center. The city said that the wooden signs were rotten and that Ron had taken ill and was not in town at the time. They reached out to veterans that they could and they said it was ok and that they understood.

The city and the community member involved also learned that the land that the memorial is on, does not belong to the city. When the memorial was put up, the city thought that the small strip of land was theirs. The land actually belongs to Greg and Jayne Weber. The Weber family gave their blessings for the memorial to stay. The city said that they will continue to mow the area this summer until the veterans group can find volunteers to help. The group of veterans and citizens said that they have plans for keeping the memorial looking great in the future.

This is an additional day and will not take away from the meals that are offered at the Laona Senior Center on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. Those days and serving times will remain the same. The suggested donation will remain at \$3.00. RSVP is preferred but no one will be turned away. We would prefer an accurate count so we are not wasting food. All hands are on deck this Fourth-of-July weekend to stop aquatic invasive species in Wisconsin



MADISON - Fourth-of-July is Wisconsin's busiest and best boating holiday, which makes it a great time for the annual Clean Boats, Clean Waters Landing Blitz, July 3-7. Department of Natural Resources staff, volunteers and regional AIS partners will be at boat launches statewide to remind people that the power to protect against harmful species is shared by all who love Wisconsin's waters. This year, Wisconsin's effort is part of a larger event happening throughout the Great Lakes region from June 28-July 7.

Aquatic invasive species, or AIS, such as Eurasian watermilfoil, spiny water fleas and zebra mussels, pose great risks to the health of our waters and fisheries, and there are often no known control options to rid the waters of these species. Prevention is the key and it's in the hands of visitors as well as full-time Wisconsinites. More lakes than ever are participating in 2019 with inspectors giving away Stop Aquatic Hitchhikers boat towels.

"This is the first time that these valuable educational events will be held simultaneously across the entire Great Lakes region. It's a chance to work directly with boaters and deliver a coordinated, regional message about the importance of AIS prevention during the busiest boating weekend of the year," said Bob Wakeman, DNR's statewide AIS coordinator.

Volunteers, AIS partners and DNR boat inspectors will be on hand at landings around the state to demonstrate the prevention steps and answer questions about invasive species. Their efforts will build on the success of last year's campaign during which volunteers inspected almost 9,000 boats and spoke with more than 18,000 people.

"One of the most exciting things about this campaign is the strong volunteer effort. Every year hundreds of concerned citizens participate as volunteers to help us raise awareness and empower boaters," says Wakeman.

Invasive plants and animals can spread easily by hitching a ride on boats and other equipment, including trailers. They can also hide in the water in livewells, bait and fish buckets and motors, so it's important to drain those and drain your boat. Because many invasive species can also be hidden in mud, it's vital to clean off anchors.

--Always take the following simple steps before leaving a boat landing:

- Inspect your boat, trailer and equipment for attached aquatic plants or animals
- Remove all attached plants or animals
- Drain all water from boats, motors, livewells and other equipment
- Never move live fish away from a waterbody
- Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash
- Buy minnows from a Wisconsin bait dealer
- Only use leftover minnows when either 1) fishing with them on the same body of water or 2) on other waters if no lake/river water or other fish have been added to the container.

Following these steps also helps boaters comply with Wisconsin state law, which prohibits the transport of aquatic invasive species. To learn more about invasive species and their impacts to Wisconsin's waters and economy, visit DNR.wi.gov and search "Invasive Species." For those who use social media, they can help spread the word about the importance of aquatic invasive species prevention by posting photos and messages using #CleanBoatsCleanWaters.

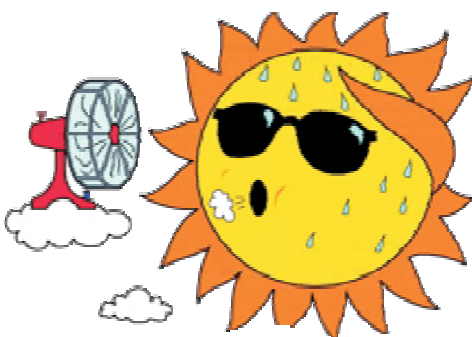

Stay safe as temperatures rise Residents reminded to stay cool, hydrated, and informed during extreme heat

The Forest County Health Department is reminding residents to take steps to stay cool during warm summer days.

"This is our first stretch of hot days this summer, and we want people to be prepared," said Jacee Anderson, Health Officer of the Forest County Health Department. "During heat waves like this one, it's important to stay cool, hydrated, and informed."

Follow these tips to stay safe during extreme heat:

- ** Stay in air conditioning. When possible, stay in air conditioning on hot days. If you don't have air conditioning, head to libraries, malls, and other public spaces to keep cool.
- ** Check on loved ones. Be sure to check on older friends and neighbors who live alone and don't have air conditioning.
- ** Avoid the hottest part of the day. If you have to be outside, stick to the cooler morning and evening hours. Wear light, loose clothing and take frequent, air conditioned breaks.
- ** Beware of hot cars. Never leave a person or a pet in a parked car, even for a short time. On an 80 degree day, the temperature inside a car can reach 100 degrees in less than 10 minutes.
- ** Stay hydrated. Drink plenty of water on hot days. Avoid alcohol and hot, heavy meals.
- ** Stay informed. Watch your local weather forecasts so you can plan outdoor activities safely. Pay attention to any extreme heat alerts.
- ** Remember that anyone can get sick from the heat. In Wisconsin, people ages 15-34 are the most likely to report to the ER for getting sick from the heat. No matter your age or how healthy you are, it's important to stay cool, hydrated, and informed on hot days.

If you start feeling overheated, weak, dizzy, nauseated, or have muscle cramps, you could be experiencing heat illness. Move to air conditioning, drink water, get under a fan, and put on cool washcloths. If your symptoms worsen or don't improve, go to the emergency room.

More Fast Facts about the Fourth of July From the net

- The only two signers of the Declaration of Independence who later served as President of the United States were John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.

- The stars on the original American flag were in a circle so all the Colonies would appear equal.

- The first Independence Day celebration took place in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776. This was also the day that the Declaration of Independence was first read in public after people were summoned by the ringing of the Liberty Bell.

- The White House held its first 4th July party in 1801.

- President John Adams, Thomas Jefferson and James Monroe all died on the Fourth. Adams and Jefferson (both signed the Declaration) died on the same day within hours of each other in 1826.

- Benjamin Franklin proposed the turkey as the national bird but was overruled by John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, who recommended the bald eagle.

- In 1776, there were 2.5 million people living in the new nation. Today the population of the U.S.A. is 316 million.

- Fifty-nine places in the U.S. contain the word "liberty" in the name. Pennsylvania, with 11, has more of these places than any other state. Of the 59 places nationwide containing "liberty" in the name, four are counties: Liberty County, Ga. (65,471), Liberty County, Fla. (8,276), Liberty County, Mont. (2,392) and Liberty County, Texas (76,571).

- The most common patriotic-sounding word used within place names is "union" with 136. Pennsylvania, with 33, has more of these places than any other state. Other words most commonly used in place names are Washington (127), Franklin (118), Jackson (96) and Lincoln (95).

- Fireworks are part of the tradition of celebrating this national holiday. The U.S. imported \$227.3 million worth of fireworks from China in 2012. U.S. exports of fireworks, by comparison, came to just \$11.7 million in 2012, with Israel purchasing more than any other country (\$2.5 million).

- In 2012, vast majority of imported U.S. flags (\$3.6 million) was made in China.

- Barbecue is also big on Independence Day. Approximately 150 million hot dogs and 700 million pounds of chicken are consumed on this day.

- Every 4th of July the Liberty Bell in Philadelphia is tapped (not actually rung) thirteen times in honor of the original thirteen colonies.

- Traditions place the origins of "Yankee Doodle" as a pre-Revolutionary War song originally sung by British military officers to mock the disheveled, disorganized colonial "Yankees" with whom they served in the French and Indian War. It is believed that the tune comes from the nursery rhyme Lucy Locket. One version of the Yankee Doodle lyrics is "generally attributed" to Doctor Richard Shuckburgh, a British Army surgeon. According to one story, Shuckburgh wrote the song after seeing the appearance of Colonial troops under Colonel Thomas Fitch, V, the son of Connecticut Governor Thomas Fitch.

- The tune of the National Anthem was originally used by an English drinking song called "to Anacreon in Heaven." The words have nothing to do with consumption of alcohol but the "melody that Francis Key had in mind when he wrote those words did originate decades earlier as the melody for a song praise of wine."

USDA offers producers options to re-enroll or extend expiring CRP contracts

WASHINGTON, June 21, 2019 Farmers and ranchers with expiring Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts may now re-enroll in certain CRP continuous signup practices or, if eligible, select a one-year contract extension. USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) also is accepting offers from those who want to enroll for the first time in one of the country's largest conservation programs. FSA's 52nd signup for CRP runs from June 3 to August 23.

"Agricultural producers with expiring CRP contracts have set aside land to reduce soil erosion, improve water quality, provide habitat for wildlife and boost soil health for at least a decade," said U.S. Under Secretary for Farm Production and Conservation Bill Northey. "We want to make sure they and their neighbors who may not have a CRP contract know they have opportunities within CRP to continue their valuable contribution to our country's conservation successes."

FSA stopped accepting offers last fall for the CRP continuous signup when 2014 Farm Bill authority expired. The 2018 Farm Bill reauthorized the program this past December, and FSA has carefully analyzed the bill's language and determined that a limited signup prioritizing water-quality practices furthers conservation goals and makes sense for producers as FSA works to fully implement the program.

This year's CRP continuous signup includes such practices as grass waterways, filter strips, riparian buffers, wetland restoration and others. View a full list of practices approved for this signup. Continuous signup enrollment contracts last for 10 to 15 years. Soil rental rates are set at 90 percent of 2018 rates. Incentive payments are not offered for these practices.

Producers with Expiring CRP Contracts

Letters are in the mail to all producers with expiring CRP contracts, describing possible options.

A one-year extension is being offered to existing CRP participants with expiring CRP contracts of 14 years or less that have practices not eligible for re-enrollment under this CRP signup.

Alternatively, producers with expiring contracts may have the option to enroll in the Transition Incentives Program, which provides two additional annual rental payments on the condition the land is sold or rented to a beginning farmer or rancher or a member of a socially disadvantaged group. CRP Continuous CREP Signup

This signup also enables producers to sign up under existing Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) agreements. CREP is part of CRP and targets high-priority conservation concerns identified by a state, and federal funds are supplemented with non-federal funds to address those concerns. Download this fact sheet to learn more.

Other Future CRP Signup Options

FSA is still planning a CRP general signup in December 2019, with a CRP Grasslands signup to follow. Those that extend their contracts may be eligible for one of these signup types or another continuous signup in the future.

More Information

On December 20, 2018, President Trump signed into law the 2018 Farm Bill, which provides support, certainty and stability to our nation's farmers, ranchers and land stewards by enhancing farm support programs, improving crop insurance, maintaining disaster programs and promoting and supporting voluntary conservation. FSA is committed to implementing these changes as quickly and effectively as possible, and today's updates are part of meeting that goal.

Producers interested in applying for CRP continuous practices, including those under existing CREP agreements, or who want to extend their contract, should contact their USDA service center by August 23. 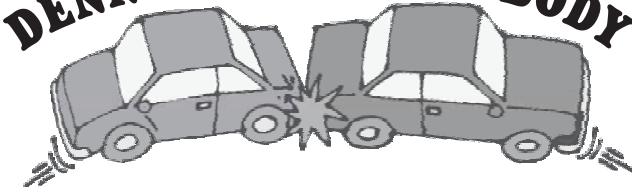

Harnessing thousands of eyes to track down new invasive species
New technology brings together reports from all over Wisconsin, makes it easy to use
 MADISON - Citizens reporting wild chervil and other invasive species they see along roadsides, bike paths, public lands and waters are part of a comprehensive database helping quickly detect new invasive species, so resources can be directed to controlling them quickly.
 Wisconsinites can use this interactive map to see which invasive species are being reported where. Photo credit: University of Wisconsin-Madison, Division of Extension
 The Invasive Species Archive combines monitoring data from the Department of Natural Resources, federal agencies, university researchers, and citizen scientists. It uses new technology to make it easy for property managers, local Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas, and others who work with invasive species.
 "This tool will enable our partners to take the data and immediately use it to create monitoring and control plans for invasive species," says Jason Granberg, the Department of Natural Resources invasive species specialist who built the tool.
 DNR has early detection and response funds that can help local conservationists address a new infestation while the population is still small enough to control, Granberg says. Once an invasive species gets established, the costs to manage and control it can become very expensive.

- The Declaration of Independence was signed by 56 men from 13 colonies.

- The average age of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence was 45. The youngest was Thomas Lynch, Jr (27) of South Carolina. The oldest delegate was Benjamin Franklin (70) of Pennsylvania. The lead author of The Declaration, Thomas Jefferson, was 33.

- One out of eight signers of the Declaration of Independence were educated at Harvard (7 total).

Senior Chatter
Wisconsin's SeniorCare program
extended for 10 years

On April 12, 2019 the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) granted the Department of Health Services (DHS) a 10-year extension for the SeniorCare Prescription Drug Assistance Program. This program is utilized by nearly 50,000 seniors in Wisconsin. Those who use or are planning to use the program now have peace of mind knowing their prescription drug benefit will continue for the long term.

Since it began on September 1, 2002, the SeniorCare program has successfully delivered comprehensive outpatient drug benefits to more than 310,000 seniors in the state. SeniorCare covers most generic and brand name prescription medications and over-the-counter insulin. It has a simplified enrollment process, \$30 annual enrollment fee, income-based deductibles and copayments of \$5 for generic drugs and \$15 for brand-name drugs.

The previous 3-year extension expired in December, 2018, and the state had been operating on 1-month extensions for January, February, and March of this year. With the 10-year extension, SeniorCare members will continue to have affordable access to prescription drugs for years to come!

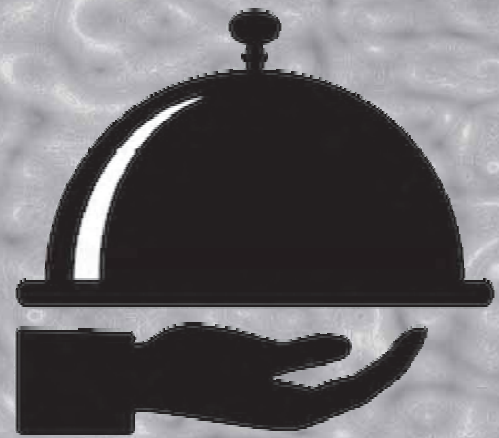

Also on Saturday morning, the Fun Scramble Pickleball Tournament is set to begin at 9:00 a.m.

Saturday afternoon will be KIDS TIME. The Bounce Houses will again be available for kids on Saturday beginning at about 12:00 Noon. The Mardi Gras will conclude with the championship game of the Softball Tournament on Sunday afternoon.

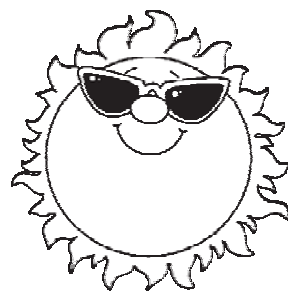

Invasive species CONT FROM 17

DNR has provided all DNR state natural area, parks, forest, and wildlife area managers and local Cooperative Invasive Species Management Areas with lists of all species reported within and near their borders. DNR also has shared the archive with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation to use in their plan to control prohibited invasive species found along road right of ways.

"It's great to have this resource at our disposal," says Bob Wakeman, who coordinates DNR aquatic invasive species efforts. "Our partners and property managers now have some help in identifying what invasive species may be on their property and developing a control strategy that helps them to prioritize where they should spend limited resources for control."

The Lower Chippewa Invasives Partnership, for example used the archive information from DNR to quickly apply for DNR rapid response funds to control amur cork trees and wild chervil. The money is helping the partnership train officials, roadside managers and landowners to address infestations of the two species, and to pay for supplies for local control of them.

Invasive species are non-native plants, animals, or pathogens that take over a new location and alter the ecosystem, affecting its function, economic value and/or human health. Typically, these invasive species can take over an area because they do not have the predators, competitors, or diseases from their home ranges which keep them in check.

Call for the public to report prohibited species to DNR

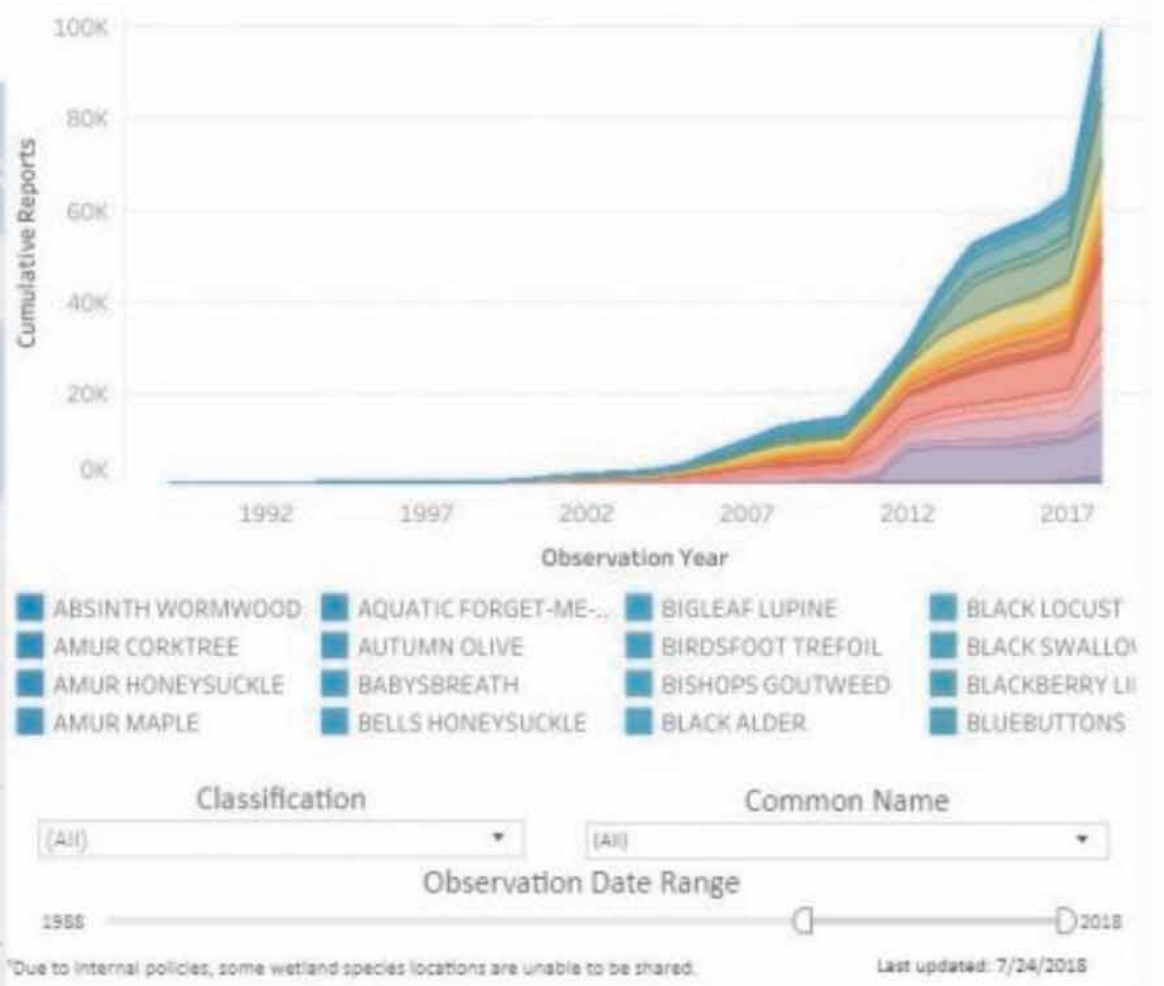
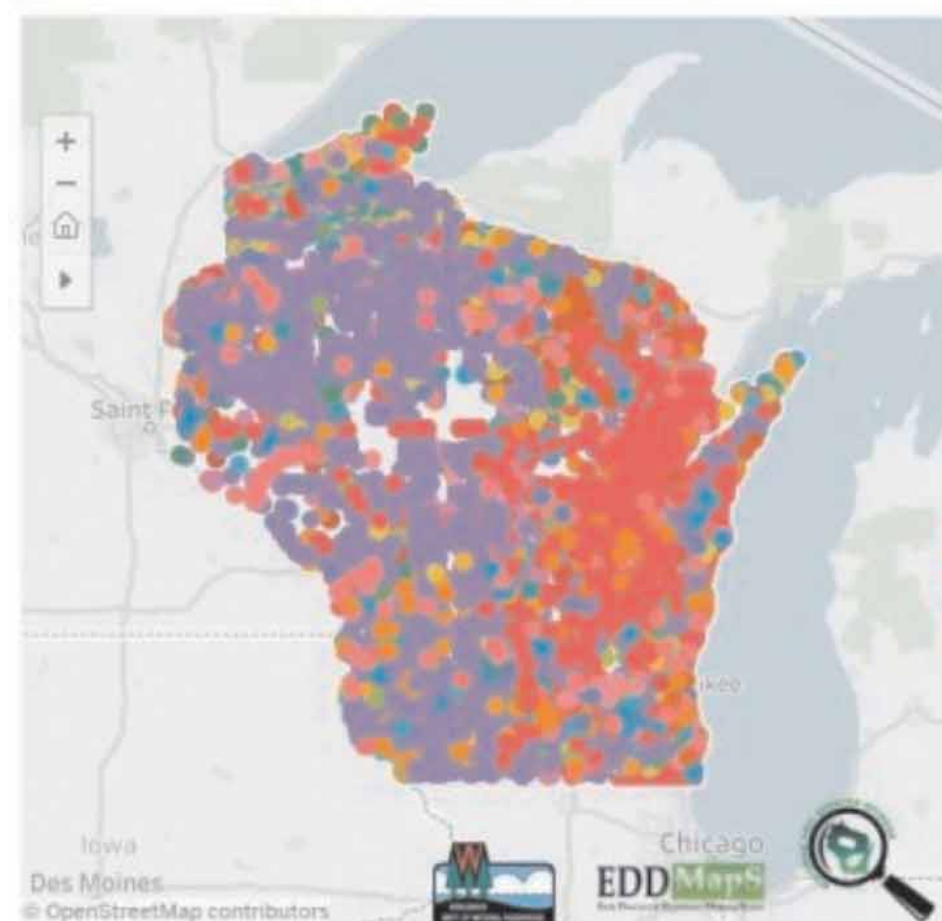
To keep the database current and robust, Granberg is inviting Wisconsin residents and visitors to report if they find species that are prohibited in Wisconsin and if they find a plant or animal they've never seen before. See some of the prohibited terrestrial invasive species DNR is looking for in this slide show.

"Early detection is crucial for the early control of these species," Granberg says. The public can contact the DNR by sending an email to Invasive.Species@Wisconsin.Gov along with a photograph, location, and size descriptions for any invasive species.

To understand which invasive species are prohibited in Wisconsin and which have been reported in an area, people can use the Wisconsin Shared Terrestrial Invasive Plant Presence online visualization tool developed by University of Wisconsin-Madison's Division of Extension. This interactive map provides information on species locations, legal
