Broadband and a generator for the Law Enforcement Center the major issues at county meeting

A joint meeting of the Forest County Finance Committee and the Building Committee was held at the courthouse last Tuesday evening, October 8th.

While a variety of subjects were discussed, the most prominent subjects were the county's possible involvement with supplying broadband towers to the county to fill in the areas where broadband internet access isn't available. According to Mark Ferris, director of the Forest County Economic Development Committee (FCEDP), all of the communities in the county are for expanded broadband and the building of broadband towers except Alvin, and he thinks they will come on board with the idea. FCEDP is working with Northwoods Connect, a Rhinelander firm, on the project

Ferris notes that broadband is important to the area, and he says: "It impacts workforce availability, housing growth, and business expansion. Obviously, it also compromises services such as e-medicine and quality of education for our students. Everyone is affected by a lack of service. With the expansion of Forest County broadband services, our county will be ahead of the curve in comparison to many other rural Wisconsin counties."

There would be three towers built to start the program. The county would have to pay \$30,000 per year for ten years, with money obtained from the Wisconsin Public Lands Commission. There will also be grant money applied for by the county. There could be as high as 15 towers to serve the county, but existing towers could be rented for the use of the broadband, saving money.

Those who want the broadband offered would pay a monthly fee, and there may be others who will opt for the coverage in areas that have broadband internet access already. In time, when the equipment is paid for, the county will also share in the profits of the enterprise.

The other part of the meeting that became contentious and chaotic at times was the purchase of a new emergency generator for the Law Enforcement

Currently, the county has a bid for \$299,621 and another for \$219,805. At the last meeting, Supervisor

The Lake Ecology Field Day which is sponsored annually by the Forest County Association of Lakes (FCAL) was a good educational experience for high school students from Crandon, Laona and Wabeno Environmental Science classes. Lake Ecology Day took place on Tuesday, September 17th from 9 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. at the Veterans Memorial Park on the south end of Lake Metonga.

Crandon HS, under the guidance of Mrs. Kay Coates, had 42 students signed up to attend. Laona sent 15 students under the supervision of Mr. Steve Kircher, and Wabeno sent 11 students under the direction of Mrs. Liz Watson. The students were assigned to eight groups with students from all three schools in each of the groups. The eight groups rotated through 9 workshops through out the morning. 4 lucky students per rotation received tickets which had been issued at random, to ride on the shocking boat that was provided by the Sokaogon tribe and was captained by Fish Biologist Mike Pruell.

The other eight learning stations included a pontoon boat ride to an Eurasian Water Milfoil bed where the students learned about the various invasives such as milfoil, zebra mussels and rusty crayfish as explained by Les Schramm and Harry Resch. Station number 2 was a class on aquatic macroinvertebrates led by RT Krueger of Northern Lakes Service. Station 3 was co-led by Chad Mullis of the FC Sherriff's Dept. and Brad Dahlquist of the WDNR. They taught about laws and regulations for boaters and fishermen. Amber Butterfield of the Wild Rivers Invasive Species Coalition (WRISC) taught the importance of and techniques for decontaminating watercraft that are moved from lake to lake. The USFS sent two representatives to teach about the important role that bats play in our ecology. Jennifer Mabrier from the FC Potawatomi Educational Department taught about lake stratification. Retired Crandon High School science teacher Cindy Edlund returned to lead a workshop on biomagnification. Station number 8 was led by Michelle Gobert who represented the FC Forestry Department and FC 4H, teaching about the importance of trees in the shoreline environment. She took photos of each person who attended her workshop as they got to help plant a tree.

A large round of applause must be given to all the students and their teachers for the interest shown and the cooperation given by all during the day. All presenters and those helping to set-up this very worthwhile event are to be commended on a job well done. 



Bunda asked a third firm for a bid that came in at around \$86,000, but that bid wasn't complete because it didn't allow for the changes in wiring and switches, and the bid was compliant with the law: pulled back.

In the meeting on Tuesday, Bunda pushed for a rebid of the generator project that would include a total of three bids, with the idea that the county could save money on the project.

The other school of thought brought up at the meeting is that the current generator can only service the needs for a third of the Law Enforcement Center, and if there is a major weather event, the jail could be non-functional with prisoners having to be transported at county cost to other iails in the region.

The debate was hot and wasn't always polite, but from this lively argument came a resolution to accept the \$219,805 bid, because the committee recognizes this as an emergency situation.

Another motion by Bunda to obtain at least three bids for the project was defeated by a vote of 4 to 3.

The resolution that was passed has also to be passed by the full county board at the October 15th meeting. It is possible that neither bid will be accepted and another round of bidding for the generator project will be started in an attempt to save money for county taxpayers. Time and the meeting will tell.

Launched in 2015, Target: BP is a national initiative between the American Hospital Association and American Medical Association aimed at addressing the growing burden of high blood pressure in the U.S. The initiative aims to help health care organizations improve blood pressure control rates through use of the AMA's evidence-based M.A.P. quality improvement program, and recognizes organizations committed to improving blood pressure control.

There are 116 million U.S. adults living with high blood pressure, the nation's number one risk factor for heart attack and stroke, and less than half have it controlled to target level. Many patients are unaware of the deadly consequences associated with high blood pressure and that it can be managed working in partnership with their physician to create and follow a treatment plan.

"Although we have the tools to treat high blood pressure, many patients face a variety of barriers that make it difficult to successfully manage the condition. That's why the American Heart Association and American Medical Association created the Target: BP initiativeto bring patients and providers together to successfully get blood pressure under control," said AMA President





Deer baiting bans

Before taking part in upcoming hunting seasons or placing feed for wildlife, hunters, landowners and wildlife enthusiasts should verify which counties currently prohibit wildlife baiting and feeding activities by searching the Department of Natural Resources website, dnr.wi.gov, for baiting and feeding.

Since the conclusion of the 2018 deer hunting season, new baiting and feeding bans are now in place in Green Lake, Kenosha, Waushara, Wood, Racine, Burnett, Barron, Polk and Washburn counties. Additional baiting and feeding bans may be added in 2019 if there are new chronic wasting disease or bovine tuberculosis (bTB) detections in captive or free-roaming deer. All current county-level baiting and feeding bans will remain in effect throughout the 2019 deer hunting season.

The effects of baiting and feeding may artificially increase and sustain deer populations beyond carrying capacity and alter deer behavior. The primary intended goals of a baiting and feeding ban are to protect the local wild deer herd and reduce the spread of disease.

Individuals may still feed birds and small mammals, provided feeding devices are within 50 yards of a human dwelling and at a sufficient height or design to prevent access by deer.

The DNR is required by state statute (29.336, Wis. Stats) to enact a ban on the baiting and feeding of deer for a period of three years in any county where CWD or bTB has been detected in a wild or captive deer or elk as well as a two-year ban in any county that is within 10 miles of a CWD or bTB positive detection. Baiting and feeding bans may eventually be lifted if no new CWD or bTB positive detections are found or may be extended if there are additional positive detections.

Hunters, landowners, hunters, and wildlife enthusiasts can also contact a local wildlife biologist to determine if baiting and feeding ban end dates have changed within individual counties. For more information regarding baiting and feeding, search the DNR website, dnr.wi.gov, for baiting and feeding. For more information regarding CWD in Wisconsin, search for keyword "CWD."

Editor's Note: All of northeast Wisconsin has a baiting ban, and in our area that includes Forest, Oneida, Florence, Langlade, Oconto and Marinette counties.







Senator Baldwin Calls for Financial Certainty for Rural Counties Bipartisan group of 31 Senators request two-year reauthorization for PILT and SRS programs

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) joined 30 of her Senate colleagues today requesting that any end-of-year legislation include at least a two-year reauthorization of the Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) and the Secure Rural Schools and Community Self-Determination Act (SRS) programs.

The SRS program was created to provide consistent and reliable funding for more than 775 rural counties and 4,400 schools located near national forests across the country. SRS helps pay for schools, roads, and emergency response services in rural counties, and forest health projects in national forests. The PILT program is administered through the Department of the Interior and compensates rural counties for certain federal lands that cannot be taxed, including Bureau of Land Management land and national parks, forests, and wildlife refuges.

In a bipartisan letter to Majority Leader Mitch McConnell and Minority Leader Chuck Schumer, the senators wrote, "Congress has an obligation to ensure counties with large swaths of federally-owned, tax-exempt forests and rangelands can adequately provide essential services for their residents. As history has proved, without the certainty of these two critical programs, schools, libraries, and jails will close. The services counties continue to provide will see a reduction in staffing and resources. Roads will go unpayed and become unsafe. Mental health and physical health services will be scaled back and in some cases even ended. Fewer and fewer law enforcement officers will be forced to patrol larger and larger areas.

"As we work to establish a permanent county payments solution, diversify rural economies, improve forest management and forest health, strengthen historic forest revenue sharing with local governments, and ensure that our public lands provide a range of values such as clean water, jobs, grazing opportunities, and wood fiber for local economies, a short-term reauthorization of at least two years is critical to provide fiscal certainty for counties containing federally-owned lands.'

The letter was led by Senators Ron Wyden (D-OR), Jim Risch (R-ID), Jeff Merkley (D-OR), and Mike Crapo (R-ID) and signed by Senators Michael Bennet (D-CO), Maria Cantwell (D-WA), Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV), Catherine Cortez Masto (D-NV), Kevin Cramer (R-ND), Steve Daines (R-MT), Dianne Feinstein (D-CA), Cory Gardner (R-CO), Kamala D. Harris (D-CA), Martin Heinrich (D-NM), Amy Klobuchar (D-MN), Joe Manchin (D-WV), Martha McSally (R-AZ), Lisa Murkowski (R-AK), Patty Murray (D-WA), Gary Peters (D-MI), Mitt Romney (R-UT), Jacky Rosen (D-NV), Mike Rounds (R-SD), Kyrsten Sinema (D-AZ), Tina Smith (D-MN), Debbie Stabenow (D-MI), Dan Sullivan (R-AK), Jon Tester (D-MT), Tom Udall (D-NM), and Roger Wicker (R-MS).

Countdown to new Federal ID requirement begins Get REAL ID by October 1, 2020

When enforcement of the REAL ID Act begins October 1, 2020, the regular Wisconsin driver license or ID will no longer be accepted identification for domestic air travel or to enter a federal building or military base. On October 1, 2020, travelers will need to present a REAL ID-compliant driver license or state ID card or another acceptable form of identification (such as a passport).

"Since a driver license or ID is the most convenient form of identification, Wisconsin DMV encourages travelers to prepare their paperwork then visit a DMV before the October 1, 2020 deadline," Wisconsin Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Administrator Kristina Boardman said. "Our customers are encouraged to visit the DMV sooner rather than later. Delay could mean longer lines at the DMV and travelers without a REAL ID will be denied boarding their plane."

What documents are required to get a REAL ID?

To obtain a REAL ID-compliant driver license or ID card, individuals must visit a Wisconsin DMV and bring the following original documents or a certified copy (not a photocopy, fax or scan):

- -- Proof of Name and Date of Birth
- -- Proof of Legal Presence in the U.S.
- -- Proof of Identity
- -- Proof of Name Change (if applicable)
- -- Proof of Social Security Number
- -- Proof of Address

For a complete list of acceptable documents, visit wisconsindmv.gov/REALID.

DMV's interactive Driver Licensing Guide will help customers develop a personalized checklist of the required documents needed to bring to the DMV. It also allows customers to pre-fill any required application(s), print and bring the forms or submit them electronically (if eligible), and print a checklist of required documents to bring.

Costs to get a REAL ID

If it's time to renew a driver license or ID, DMV customers can receive a REAL ID-compliant card for no additional fee if the upgrade takes place at the same time as the renewal. Customers whose current driver license or ID will not expire before 2020, may obtain a REAL ID-compliant card for \$14 (the cost of a duplicate driver license), or \$16 for a duplicate ID card.

ite ID card. Wisconsin offers both REAL ID-compliant and non -compliant driver licenses and ID cards. The cards look similar; REAL ID-compliant cards are marked with a star. Non-compliant cards do not have the star or are marked "NOT FOR FEDERAL PURPOSES." People may use other forms of ID, such as a passport. TSA offers a list of acceptable alternative identification cards: TSA.gov/REAL-ID.

Wisconsin DMV has been offering REAL ID compliant driver licenses and IDs to customers since January 14, 2013. Since this time, nearly every Wisconsin customer has been given REAL ID information, and the opportunity to enroll in the federal program, as a part of their renewal notice. DMV is committed to helping residents who want the convenience of a REAL ID get one on their driver license or ID before the October 1, 2020 deadline.

Duck Season opened Sept. 28



Duck hunters in the North, South and Mississippi River zones will begin another fall duck hunt one-half hour before sunrise on Saturday, Sept. 28.

"With average spring breeding counts and a fairly wet summer, Wisconsin waterfowl hunters have the potential for a good hunting season," said Taylor Finger, migratory game bird ecologist with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

The Northern Zone hunt will begin Sept. 28 and run through Nov. 26. The Southern Zone hunt will run from Sept. 28 to Oct. 6, close for a five-day split, then remain open from Oct. 12 to Dec. 1. The Mississippi Zone will be open Sept. 28 to Oct. 4, close for a seven-day split, and reopen from Oct. 12 to Dec. 3. Opening day shooting hours will begin one-half hour before sunrise.

The goose season in the southern portion of the Exterior Zone will also be closed during the five-day split in October. Also, hunters should note that goose season in the Mississippi River Subzone will not open until Sept. 28 and will be closed during the seven-day split in the Mississippi River Zone.

The 2019 continental breeding surveys showed a drop in populations of most species, though most populations remained above their long-term averages. Even with promising breeding indications, local conditions and scouting will be the most important factors when pursuing ducks this fall. Because parts of the state have experienced wet conditions leading up to the duck season and some areas of the state remain dry, scouting this fall will be particularly important to identify the areas that are holding birds.

The daily bag limit statewide is six ducks, including no more than:

four mallards, of which only one may be a hen; two black ducks; two canvasbacks; three wood ducks; one pintail; three scaup; and two redheads.

Five mergansers may be harvested daily, of which no more than two may be hooded mergansers; 15 coots may be harvested daily.

Licenses and stamps required for duck hunting include a Wisconsin small game license (included in the Conservation Patron and Sports packaged licenses), a Wisconsin waterfowl stamp and a federal migratory bird stamp. The federal stamp can be purchased at a U.S. Post Office. Hunters will also have the option of purchasing the federal stamp privilege at DNR license vendors for an additional \$3 surcharge. The purchase will be noted on their license, but the stamp itself will arrive several weeks later in the mail.

Waterfowl and other migratory bird hunters must also register each year with the federal Harvest Information Program, which places them on a list of hunters that may receive a mailing asking them to provide a summary of their harvest. HIP registration is free. Hunters can register for HIP when they purchase their licenses or added later if a hunter decides they may pursue migratory game birds. Regular Goose Season

With resident Canada goose breeding numbers similar to recent years and average production of the Ontario breeders, hunters should have ample opportunities this year and will again enjoy a full 92 days of hunting in the Exterior Zone with a three-bird daily bag limit.

Exterior Zone Canada goose season structure is as follows: Northern Zone - Sept. 16 to Dec. 16;

Southern Zone - Sept. 16 to Oct. 6 and Oct. 12 to Dec. 1 and Dec. 16- Jan. 4, 2020; and Mississippi River Subzone - Sept. 28- Oct. 4 and Oct. 12 to

Jan. 4, 2020.

While afield, hunters must carry proof of their Canada goose harvest permit. Acceptable methods of proof include a paper copy, Go Wild-generated PDF displayed on a mobile device, an authenticated Wisconsin driver's license or Go Wild Conservation Card. As a reminder to Canada goose hunters, registration of Canada geese and in-field validation of the Canada goose hunting permit is no longer required.

State licenses and stamps, permits and HIP registration are also available through Go Wild. For more information regarding waterfowl hunting in Wisconsin, visit dnr.wi.gov and search keyword "waterfowl."





Meeting on sex trafficking in Laona

Human sex trafficking is the most common form of modern-day slavery. Estimates place the number of its domestic and international victims in the millions, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Forest County Health Department and Forest County Potawatomi Community Health are collaborating with 5-stones: a nonprofit organization that raises awareness about the magnitude of sex trafficking in Wisconsin. Join us for a parent's night October 15th at 6 p.m. at the Laona School to learn about sex trafficking in Wisconsin, and what you can do to help prevent it in Forest County! What is Sex Trafficking?

Many people probably remember popular movies and television shows depicting pimps as dressing flashy and driving large fancy cars. More important, the women adults consensually and voluntarily engaged in the business of prostitution without complaint. This characterization is extremely inaccurate, nothing more than fiction. In reality, the pimp traffics young women (and sometimes men) completely against their will by force or threat of force; this is human sex trafficking.

Not only is sex trafficking slavery, but it is also big business as the fastest growing business of organized crime in the world reports the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, with an average of \$99 billion per year. The United States not only faces an influx of international victims but also has its own homegrown problem of interstate sex trafficking of minors. In Wisconsin, Human trafficking exists in both urban and rural areas. 5-stones reports Milwaukee consistently ranks among the top five cities in the US for the recovery of trafficked adolescents.

The majority of these victims are runaway or throw-away youth, but can also be forced into victims of prostitution through abduction, pressure from parents, or through deceptive agreements with traffickers through family. The average age of victim of any sex is 12 to 14 years old. Many of the victims are socially isolated form their friends or family and feel as if they cannot return to their previous lives. The lifestyle of these victims revolves around violence, forced drug use, and constant threats.

Forest County Sheriff John Dennee reports, "due to our drug epidemic, the likelihood of sex trafficking and the actual sex trafficking has increased drastically over the last few years."

Semior Chatt Medicare Part D Open Enrollment

—An Opportunity to Save Money

Open enrollment for Medicare plans in 2020 is October 15 through December 7, 2019. This is an important time for people with Medicare to review their current Part D prescription drug plan, take note of any changes, and determine if it is still the best option for them. Since insurance companies can change their Part D plan's premiums, deductibles and co-pays each year, switching to a different plan could result in extra money in your

If you have had changes in your medications this past year it seems obvious that reviewing your plan and comparing it to other plans is a good idea. But even if you have not had medication changes, the new pricing structure for the plan could mean that the costs for your same drugs will increase next year. Likewise, a different company may now offer better coverage for those same medications. Some people have saved hundreds of dollars in a year by switching to a different Part D plan. The only way to find out is to review your plan and compare it to other Part D plans.

In addition to changing the list of medications that they cover (known as their "formulary") and how they cover them, Part D plans can also impose drug restrictions on covered medications. When you are reviewing your plan or comparing it to other plans, be sure to note any drug restrictions for your specific medications. In some cases, you may need to get prior authorization before your medication is covered. Another type of restriction, step therapy, means that the insurance company will have you try an alternative drug before they pay for the one your doctor has chosen for you. And if quantity limits are in place, you are limited to a certain number of pills each month. These are more reasons it is important to carefully review your Part D plan each year.

People on SeniorCare. Wisconsin's prescription drug assistance program, are not affected by this open enrollment period. They only need to renew their enrollment every 12 months. A renewal notice will be sent in the mail to the beneficiary. If you are on SeniorCare and have had medication changes, you might want to check on the cost of a part D plan to see if SeniorCare is still the best option for you.




