St. Ambrose Catholic Church-Wabeno Stained-Glass Window Restoration



In 1905, the community of Wabeno was a growing logging town, with numerous sawmills on the outskirts of town and an active main street filled with boarding houses and businesses. The St. Ambrose Congregation of Wabeno originated in that year. The church was built in 1906, with the steeple and bell added in 1908. The highlight of St. Ambrose Church has always been the 15 stained-glass windows, added after 1910, which are depictions of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Holy Family, saints, and apostles. After 110 years, it was decided the beautiful windows needed repair and restoration.

The last time the windows were worked on was in approximately 1913, when the church was split in half and the front portion was moved closer to Highway 32 and the back of the church was moved south into the hill behind the church, adding thirty feet to the building. Four new windows had to be added to the extension and the entire interior was redecorated at the cost of \$2800.

Guest Editorial

Dear Editor,

As many are aware, I have repeatedly posted entreaties on social media regarding the need for all citizens to do everything possible to stem the spread of Covid 19 in our communities. I elected to reinforce in local publications the concerns of many in the medical community that we all need to take this virus VERY seriously and do everything possible on a personal and a local level to minimize the spread of this pathogen.

Wash your hands, avoid crowds and social distance, and WEAR A MASK! None of these things are perfect answers but for right now, they are all we have. The sad thing is that masks and minimizing group activities have become political issues and this unfortunate reality is contributing to the fact that we are burying community members who have left before their time as a result of contracting this virus. Odds are there will be more, though one can certainly hope that is not the case. At this time, roughly 5 percent of the people in the county have been found positive for the virus by testing and who knows how many others have it or have had it because of the lack of readily available testing or a personal reticence to be tested. Yes the vast majority of the populace survive this disease, but way too many needlessly die or are potentially irreparably harmed by their battle for survival from this unpredictable disease. In all likelihood, we could significantly lower these numbers by doing our part as individuals to try to protect each other to the best of our abilities.

As mentioned, the vast majority of people who get this illness will survive. However, it is not the flu. Last year the flu took 183 Wisconsin lives during the year. So far, in less than 8 months, over 1800 Wisconsinites have died as a result of Covid 19. This is potentially a very serious disease for certain individuals and though more of a risk to the elderly and otherwise medically compromised, it can and does strike down perfectly healthy individuals with no rational rhyme or reason. In addition, there are many people with significant medical conditions who live very full lives and can do so for years and don't deserve to have their time here shortened because they catch this virus.

Like most people, I HATE all of these mitigating recommendations. I hate masks. I miss church. I miss running to the store, I miss visiting in the homes of friends and touching other people. Things are so abnormal for all of us. However, if minimizing activities and my wearing a mask means it reduces YOUR likelihood of getting infected, I am honored to do it. The strange paradox about all of this is that if all wore masks, we could do MORE, shop more, eat out more, just do more. It is just a piece of cloth and is asking so little. The law forces us to wear seatbelts in a car to protect ourselves. I don't understand why the request to take steps to minimize spread of this virus throughout our communities in the time of a worldwide pandemic is considered to be such an infringement on our right to choose how to live our lives. The second of the Great Commandments is to love your neighbor as yourself and that is what wearing a mask represents.

This nightmare WILL end. We just have to keep as many people as possible alive until then. We can do that if we follow the CDC recommendations and accept some personal compromise and sacrifice. Our lives and livelihoods and those of our friends and families may depend on it. We just all need to do our part. Stay well!

Trees have long been a valued feature of the landscape. They provide a host of benefits such as habitat, aesthetics, energy savings, noise reduction, and are an important part of the hydrologic cycle. However, a community with dense overhead tree canopy may also suffer from excess nutrients leached to nearby receiving waters from leaf litter.

Rake for leaf-free streets

Leaves contain phosphorus. When left in the street, stormwater passes through leaves like a teabag and brings the phosphorus-rich water into the storm sewer. In our watershed, storm sewers deliver untreated water directly to our lakes. Raking leaves from the street

467 cases of Covid-19 (56 Active) in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) for a total of 467 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of today, Forest County has 3,004 negative test results. There are currently 56 active cases in isolation, 401 released from isolation, and 10 deaths.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to minimize their contact with others by staying home when possible, practice physical distancing and good personal hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page daily and local newspapers weekly with current COVID-19 case counts. This will include the number of negative and positive cases in Forest County. Please call our office at 715-478-3371 with any questions or concerns.

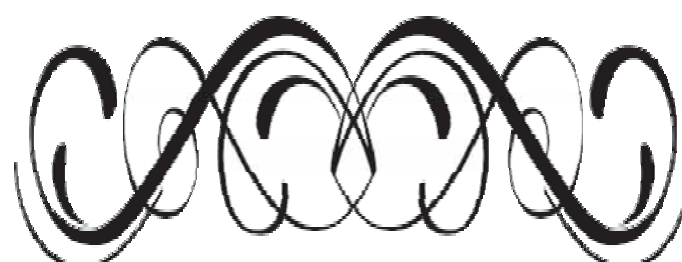

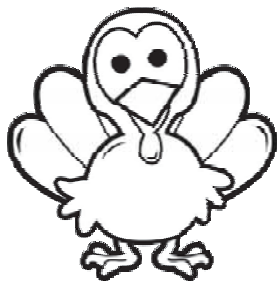

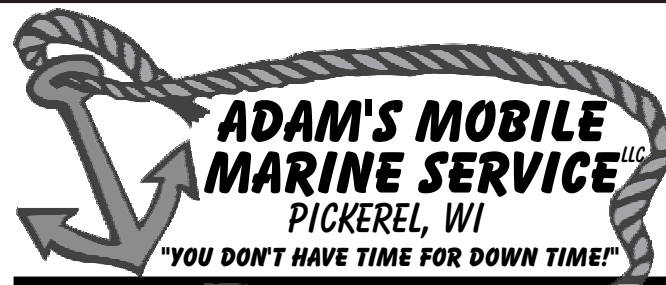

This distribution is split among four beneficiaries in the UW system; the Nelson Institute for Environmental Studies at UW-Madison, UW-Stevens Point's environmental program, UW Extension, and merit-based scholarships for Wisconsin residents attending UW schools.

The federal government provided Wisconsin with a grant of over 3 million acres of land, a majority of which were sold before 1900. The profits from these sales went to establish the Normal School Fund, which developed into an important source of funding for normal schools in Wisconsin. The University of Wisconsin, as the successor of the original normal schools, is the beneficiary of the Normal School Fund.

EDITORS NOTE: While not mentioned in this article, the funds collected and distributed by the BCPL come from logging these timberlands. Stumpage paid by loggers is where the funding comes from.

\$900,000 for scholarships and grants to UW System

Funds Help Make College More Affordable for Wisconsin Students

MADISON, Wis. - State Treasurer Sarah Godlewski and the Board of Commissioners of Public Lands (BCPL) announced today an annual distribution of \$900,000 for scholarships and grants for the University of Wisconsin System this year - nearly doubling the amount from last year. This distribution comes from the Normal School Fund, a trust fund managed by the BCPL.

"As college students embark on an unprecedented school year, I'm proud the BCPL is able to provide \$900,000 in scholarships and grants to help make college more affordable for Wisconsin students," said State Treasurer Godlewski. "As the Chair of the BCPL, we will continue to work to ensure our investments are managed effectively to ensure a strong return our beneficiaries can rely on year after year. I'm very proud that we were able to nearly double the distribution this year to help Wisconsin students."

This distribution provides funding for a variety of different programs and initiatives throughout the UW system. One of which is the Community Environmental Scholars Program (CESP) through the Nelson Institute at UW-Madison. This program connects students with community-based environmental organizations with a goal of linking students' passions for the environment with challenges their communities face. With funding from the Normal School Fund, between 25 and 30 CESP students receive substantial scholarships each semester. Treasurer Godlewski recently joined Matt Dannenberg, a recent CESP graduate and Board of Visitors member for the Nelson Institute, for a conversation about the impact of the program.

edge (three feet from the curb) and onto lawns will help fertilize the grass and reduce cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) blooms in our lakes.

Reduce salt use

Winter salt runoff into our lakes can be toxic to aquatic plants and animals. Reducing salt use does not need to compromise public safety. By shoveling snow, using sand, and limiting salt use, you can be lake friendly and safe at the same time.

Plant native & diverse vegetation

Deep-rooted native plants and trees help absorb water and hold topsoil in place during rain events. As an added bonus, they will add beauty to your property and provide habitat for songbirds and butterflies.

Create a rain garden

Not only will rain gardens capture stormwater runoff and beautify your property, they also provide biodiversity that helps butterflies and bees survive.

Redirect downspouts

This simple action allows you to redirect rainwater to your lawn or garden, while also reducing the amount of stormwater that goes to streets and directly into the lakes via storm sewers.

Pick up pet waste & litter

This simple act helps reduce the potential of E. coli pollution from washing into our lakes and closing our beaches after rain events. If you don't have a pet, simply pick up trash you may see on your walk to reduce pollution and make our community more beautiful for everyone!

CEMETERY RULES TOWN OF NASHVILLE

Town Resident Definition: An individual whose primary residency is within the Town of Nashville, ie; an individual who meets the above criteria at the time of reservation of cemetery plot or death.

Non- Resident: An individual whose primary residency is any other Town, City, or Village, other than the Town of Nashville

Exceptions:

- An individual with health issues that require a Town Resident to move into a health facility in another town, city, or village; ie; nursing home assisted living, etc. OR with a caregiver outside of the Town of Nashville
- An individual to be buried with a spouse (resident) already buried in the Nashville Cemetery. Individual to have previously reserved a plot beside that spouse.

Fees:

- **Town Resident:** Plot is free with proof of primary residence.
- \$50.00 fee to reserve a grave site. Town Residents may reserve only one (1) plot for a husband and one (1) wife or an individual, not multiple plots. The \$50.00 fee is refundable upon burial or cancellation.

Non-Resident: \$350.00 non- refundable fee to reserve/ purchase a single plot. Non-Resident may reserve only one (1) plot for a husband and one (1) wife or an individual, not multiple plots.

Clean up: There is a \$125.00 deposit fee for cleanup after burial. If caretaker does the cleanup the deposit is forfeited. Cleanup must be completed by May 15, for winter burials or within 30 days from burial.

No vehicles allowed in cemetery except for burial purposes.
Official Cemetery map must be kept in Town Office. Copies are to be made/updated for sexton and caretakers.

No Green Burials
Maximum of three (3) cremation burials per plot.
A baby may be buried over the existing grave of another family member but must be identified with a permanent marker

A temporary marker must immediately be in place to mark ANY type of burial. A gravestone (or equivalent permanent marker) must be in place within 6 (6) months of burial.

No Trees, shrubs, or bushes to be planted without approval of the Nashville Cemetery Committee.

Decorations must be secured to foundation or marker. Any decorations placed in the ground or on the grass will be removed.

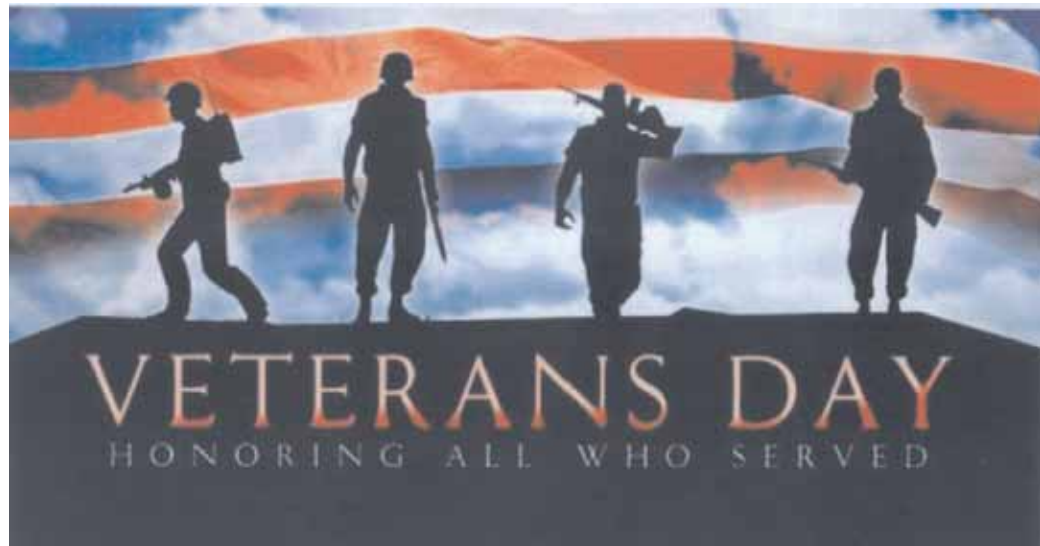

About five years ago members of the parish and their pastor, Father Philip Dinh-Van-Thiep, started to notice missing lead, cracks in the stained glass, years of grime accumulation, rotting sills and inefficient storm windows. For over 100 years parishioners have prided themselves on maintaining their church. It was clear that major restoration of the windows and storms was needed to recapture their original beauty and add energy efficiency.

In 2018, a committee was formed to study and promote the project. Information was gathered and feasibility was determined. Three restoration firms were interviewed and bids were submitted. The committee, after great amounts of prayer and deliberation, chose Allan Staige Restorations to complete the project.

The next stage in the project for the committee was to make recommendations to the parish council and ask for their approval. This was not an easy decision for the council of a parish, of eighty-four registered families, to raise \$79,000. However, the council felt restoration was crucial to the life of the windows and renewal of the parish. Committee members were convinced that in the past the members of the parish always gave generously to projects that supported the spirituality and future of St. Ambrose Parish.

The final step in the planning stage of the project was to seek the approval of the Green Bay Diocese. Because individual commitments had been made to finance some windows and the parish was fiscally strong, the St. Ambrose Congregation got approval to proceed with the restoration.

Staige Stained and Leaded Glass Restorations, of Onalaska, Wisconsin, began the project on February 3, 2020. The team, known throughout the Midwest for its craftsmanship and attention to detail, removed seven of the fifteen windows and carefully transported them to Onalaska. Each window was meticulously restored by disassembling, repairing, cleaning, reassembling,

releading, and glazing each piece of stained glass. In early May, the crew installed the five restored windows and removed the eight remaining windows for their trip to Onalaska and their rejuvenation. When the windows were removed, they were replaced with insulated panels, so church could still be conducted.

In late June, Allan Staige, his son, and nephew installed nine more completely restored windows. In early October, they returned to Wabeno to reinstall the remaining window, repair the wooden frames, and install storm windows on the outside of each window.

Parishioners are in awe of the restored windows. The interior of the church gleams with their reclaimed brilliance and beauty. The members of the St. Ambrose Congregation tackled what seemed like an insurmountable endeavor for their small parish. They are proud of the renewed beauty and historical value of the restored windows. The project has given new light to their house of worship and new life to their parish community. The parishioners are delighted with the enhanced splendor and protection the undertaking has given to their stained-glass windows. The community hopes that the windows will be the highlight of St. Ambrose Catholic Church for another 110 years.
