County broadband build-out moving forward



The long-awaited need for quality broadband service is now seeing a response that will ultimately provide county residents with access to quality service at an affordable price. In early 2019, the county formed a Broadband committee to explore expansion of internet services. That committee eventually became the Forest County Broadband Commission; tasked with coming up with a solution to poor county-wide internet service. The result was a broadband expansion grant application to the Wisconsin Public Service Commission in late 2019. In April, 2020 the county was awarded one of 72 grants throughout Wisconsin.

Forest County was the recipient of a \$939,000 broadband expansion grant. In total with contributions from Forest County and the chosen service provider, Northwoods Connect of Rhinelander, the total cost of the build-out will be completed at a cost of approximately \$2.1 million. The grant required a contribution of \$750,000 from the county. The Forest County grant application was the only one submitted that ultimately would provide internet service to an entire county. The application sited three priorities that have compromised county residents. County Emergency Services do not have full connectivity throughout the county; compromising safety and health of our residents. The other priorities were identified as compromised education for our students and the increasing importance of connection to e-health services for county residents. Many other issues such as economic development/impact and working remotely point to the need for better service..

2021 Forest County Land Conservation Plant Sale

The first annual "Forest County Land Conservation Department Plant Sale" is here! Although winter is just around the corner, it is time to start thinking about what colorful additions you can add to your landscaping next spring. This year, our Land and Water Conservation Department has decided to host a plant sale, selling only plants that are native to Wisconsin. Not only are the native plants eye catching, they help the environment. Wisconsin-native plants help conserve water, reduce your mowing costs, provide habitat for birds, butterflies and other wildlife, and protect the soil. The June pick up dates were decided based on our average temperatures here in Forest County that time of year. By June the soils should be warm enough to take on these native plants. This time of year has several weeks of warm soil temperatures for the plant roots to establish before the soil temperatures drop.

On our order forms we will have ferns, grasses and wildflowers. You can find the forms on our website, forestcountylandandwater.org under 2021 Plant Sales or pick them up at the Forest County Land Conservation office. This year we are working with a local nursery, and to make sure we have all orders filled, we are doing pre-order only this year.

The election in the Northwoods

It is safe to say that Forest County is now a Republican leaning county, looking at the election results. Trump carried the county with a total of 3,287 to Biden's tally of 1,722 votes. Only one ward, Nashville Ward 2, went for Biden.

There was a time in Forest County when it was not safe to say that you voted for a Republican. If you did, you were subjected to a stern lecture by the senior members of the county. Times do change!

Tom Tiffany won handily in his bid for re-election to Congress in his race with Tricia Zunker in Forest County with a total of 3,238 votes to Zunker's total of 1,781 votes.

Mary Felzkowski easily won in Forest County with a total of 3,144 votes to Ed Vocke's 1,690 in their race for the 12 District Senate seat formerly occupied by Tom Tiffany.

Rob Swearingen won back his seat in the 34th Assembly District with a score of 1,018 votes compared to the 385 votes for challenger Kirk Baugstad.

Jeff Mursau was given a vote of confidence. His total was 2,720 votes with no opponent.

Forest County District Attorney Chuck Simono was also given a vote of confidence with a total of 3,361 votes running unopposed.

In northern Oconto County, Trump was also the winner. Trump carried Townsend by a vote of 483 to 255. In Lakewood, Trump ran up a total of 411 to Biden's 203. The vote in Doty was 159 to 87 in Trump's favor. Mountain went to Trump by a vote of 362 to 203. Riverview had total of 345 to 221 in favor of Trump. For all of Oconto County, Trump carried the election with a vote of 16,226 to Biden's 6,715.

Representative Mursau had another vote of confidence in Oconto County with a vote total of 10,951. In the 12th District Senate race, Felzkowski won the day with a total of 9,155 votes to Vocke's total of 3,619.

It is obvious to see that the Northwoods is heavily Republican, at least this voting cycle. We are in a democracy. If you don't like the outcome of this election, just wait a few years. It may go your way in that election cycle. (Or not!)

At the time of this writing, Wednesday, the election for the presidential race hasn't been decided. This includes which presidential candidate carried Wisconsin.

516 cases of Covid-19 (68 active) confirmed in Forest County

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed additional persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) for a total of 516 cases in Forest County. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. As of today, Forest County has 3,116 negative test results. There are currently 68 active cases in isolation, 434 released from isolation, 3 hospitalized, and 11 deaths.

The Forest County Health Department encourages community members to minimize their contact with others by staying home when possible, practice physical distancing and good personal hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested.

In an effort to keep our community members up to date on COVID-19, the Forest County Health Department will continue to update our Facebook page daily and local newspapers weekly with current COVID-19 case counts. This will include the number of negative and positive cases in Forest County. Please call our office at 715-478-3371 with any questions or concerns.

Air quality in WI improving

MADISON, Wis. – Wisconsin's air quality is improving. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) 2020 Air Quality Trends Report has been released and confirms decreasing concentrations of most pollutants across the state.

The report, which includes air quality data through 2019, finds that concentrations of most pollutants for which the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has set national air quality standards have decreased in all regions of the state since monitoring began. Due in part to these significant reductions, 95% of Wisconsin's population lives in areas meeting all federal air quality standards.

The photos top and bottom were taken when a referendum was held to see if Crandon, a town and not a city back then, could issue tavern licenses.

In the top photo, the date is April 7, 1908. The bottom photo isn't dated. In both photos, the election result is listed. In the top photo, "no license" won by a 202 majority. In the bottom photo, the saloons lost out by a 113 majority. The bottom photo, unfortunately, isn't dated.

It was a heated election. The results are a little surprising when you consider the fact that women didn't have the right to vote in these years. It was the men who voted down saloons in town! Women, however, were behind the scenes. Notice the school kids taken out of class to demonstrate at the polling place. One of the signs reads, "Vote For The Home!"

While our presidential election might seem important today, think of the poor guys who had to ride a horse or a horse and buggy, maybe even walk, to outside the city limits just to enjoy a cold glass of beer!

The Shaws were one of the founding families of the community, and did not want saloons in town. They had their way for awhile. I'm not sure when saloons were allowed in Crandon, but eventually, they were established, much to the relief of all those who like to belly up to the bar.

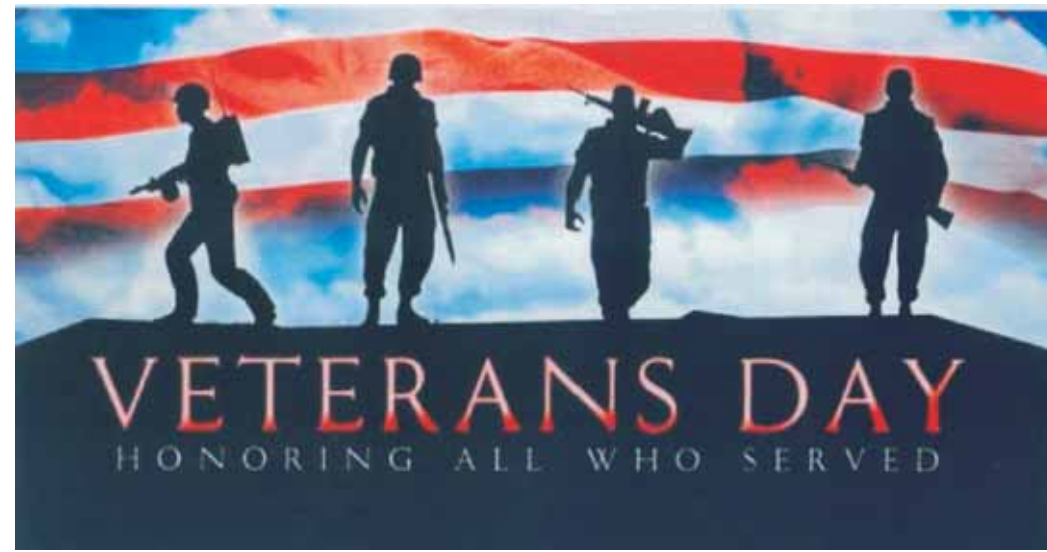
Donating venison to food pantries

"There are a couple of ways hunters can help," said

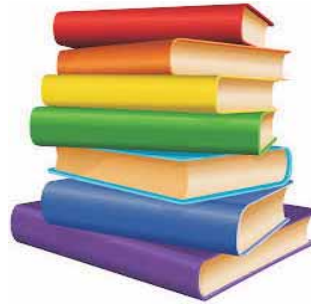

The build-out will result in the construction or use of some existing towers; totaling seventeen towers in Forest County. The first tower is now under construction in the Town of Hiles at the town's south transfer site on County Hwy. S, just off of Hwy. 32. This is a 300' tower which will provide service to parts of Hiles, Town of Crandon, Argonne and Little Rice Lake area. Service is expected to go live in mid to late November. Also, this fall, there will be equipment mounted on an existing tower in Armstrong Creek on the Town Hall property. There has been installation of fiber surrounding Lake Metonga the past several weeks which will provide service in that area.

With the winter months on the horizon, the project will now focus on identifying specific sites throughout the county that will maximize service availability for our residents. Identifying those sites is critical for establishing use in 2021. Tentatively, a tower site has been identified in the Roberts Lake area as well as other potential sites serving the towns in the county. Northwoods and the Commission want to maintain an aggressive approach to have ten additional towers in place during 2021. The requirement to complete all construction and service availability is fall, 2022. Mark Ferris, Commission Chairman stated, "While Northwoods Connect has targeted general locations for towers throughout the county, we really are looking for input from county residents to suggest locations that best serve our towns and residents. We want our residents engaged in the process." Ferris adds that any and all suggestions will be evaluated. Anyone with a potential site is asked to please contact Northwoods Connect at 715.544.8025 or email; carrie@northwoodsconnect.com.

Ferris also noted other initiatives that Forest County Economic Development Partnership is addressing related to improved connectivity throughout the county. "The virus has really brought our inadequate internet service to the attention of everyone. The grant we received is huge, but we cannot stop looking forward. We're fortunate to have many individuals engaged with the goal of making Forest County a leader in developing technology. I look for more exciting things to happen here." **Pickereel Chain
Lake Association
aeration system news info**

The Pickereel Chain Lake Association urges everyone that uses Pickereel, Smoke, and Little Pickereel Lakes this upcoming winter season to use extreme caution as aeration systems will be in operation on each of the three lakes.

These lakes, located just north of Townsend in northern Oconto County, will use aeration to help prevent past fish kills from reoccurring as the result of low dissolved oxygen levels that tend to develop in these lakes.

An open water warning system consisting of posts and rope surrounding each of the open water areas will be placed by the lake association after ice on the lakes is at least 6 inches thick and considered safe for foot travel. Caution signs warning of the open water areas will also be posted at the Pickereel Lake boat landing and at other locations where fishermen, snowmobilers, and other lake users typically access the lakes.

The Pickereel Lake aerator is located off the north shore and across the lake from the boat landing at Townsend's Oughton Park.

The Little Pickereel Lake aerator is located on the north end of that lake, and the Smoke Lake aerator will be located in the northeast quadrant of that lake.

The aeration systems will operate once ice begins to form on the lakes, and the size of the open water areas will vary depending on wind and temperature. Thin ice conditions can extend out beyond the open water area that the aeration creates, and the lake association reminds all lake users not to assume the ice is safe at the warning rope location and to always check ice conditions prior to travel near the aeration systems or elsewhere on the lakes. Lake users should also use extreme caution if they travel on the ice prior to the post and rope warning systems being erected.

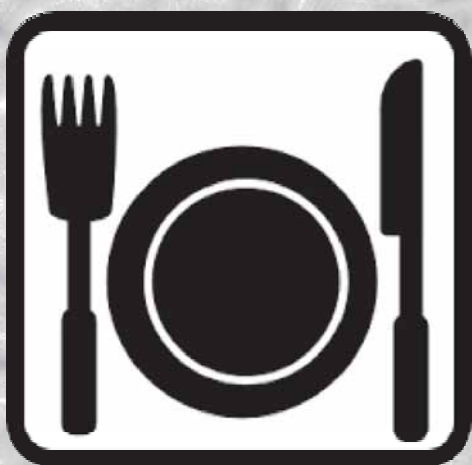

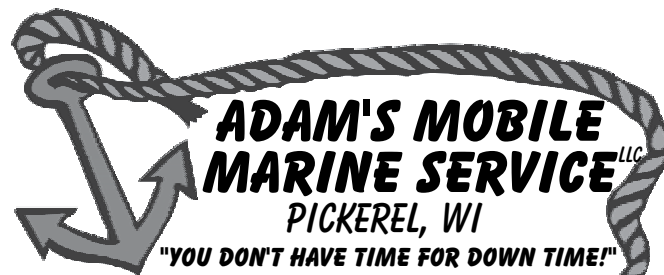

The state's air quality improved along the Lake Michigan shoreline, an area historically impacted by elevated ozone concentrations. The lakeshore areas have experienced an average reduction in ground-level ozone concentrations of 25% since 2001.

This notable decrease in ozone concentrations allowed the EPA to recently determine that several lakeshore areas are now meeting federal ozone standards, including parts of Door and Sheboygan counties.

The report also includes updated emissions data, which shows that air pollutant emissions in Wisconsin decreased substantially from 2002 to 2017. Some highlights include:

- **A 63% drop in emissions of nitrogen oxides (NOx) and a 58% drop in volatile organic compounds (VOCs), the compounds that form ground-level ozone;
- **An 89% drop in sulfur dioxide (SO2) emissions;
- **A nearly 60% reduction in carbon monoxide emissions.

The 2020 report also includes updated maps of nitrogen dioxide (NO2) densities in the atmosphere, derived from National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) satellite data. From 2006 to 2019, the Ozone Monitoring Instrument (OMI) on NASA's Aura satellite observed reductions of NO2 across the entire state, with the largest reductions found in the Milwaukee area.

The DNR Air Program attributes the decrease in pollutant concentrations to the implementation of a variety of federal and state pollution control programs. The greatest reductions are the result of cleaner burning and more efficient fuel combustion from highway vehicles and electric utilities.

"State and federal air pollution control programs, as well as voluntary actions taken by companies and citizens, are responsible for the improvements in air quality in Wisconsin," said DNR air program director Gail Good. "The Air Management Program will continue to work with our partners to study and resolve remaining air quality concerns."

The 2020 Air Quality Trends Report, along with historic reports are available on DNR's Air Quality webpage. Current Wisconsin air quality conditions can be found on the Wisconsin Air Quality Monitoring data webpage.

Senator Johnson statement of Grey Wolf delisting

WASHINGTON – U.S. Senator Ron Johnson (R-Wis.) said the following upon news that the Trump administration is delisting the gray wolf from the Endangered Species Act (ESA) in the lower 48 states and returning management and protection of gray wolves to states and tribes following successful recovery efforts:

"I'm pleased the Trump administration is listening to guidance from wildlife experts and scientific data and delisting gray wolves from the Endangered Species Act. I've fought for Wisconsin's farmers, ranchers, hunters, and land owners to delist the gray wolf through multiple pieces of legislation and amendments since 2015, but Congress has repeatedly failed to act. Though the administration's decision is the right one, it will undoubtedly face legal challenges from irrational activists as past attempts at delisting have. To ensure this policy isn't obstructed, Congress must do its job and act to codify it."

Sen. Johnson has worked to remove the gray wolf from the endangered species list in the western Great Lakes region since 2015 when he introduced legislation with former Rep. Reid Ribble (WI-8) to address the issue. The gray wolf maintains a stable and growing population with an expanding territory in Wisconsin. A brief explanation of the issue from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service can be found here.

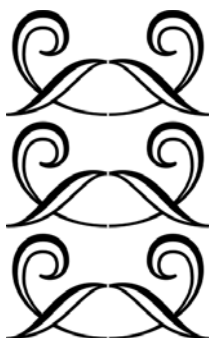

One that is missing today is the Opera House. Zooming up on the computer, it appears that it is in the photo, which places the date of the picture between 1908 and 1912. The Opera House burned in February of 1912. Looking to the right, the Shaw building, which was next to where Group Therapy is today. The old first courthouse, barber shop and the site of numerous other businesses is still there, but the Arcade building hasn't been built yet. And, the Park Hotel, which is now gone, was still doing business giving shelter to travelers to the town. Obviously, the second block of the street has changed a bit too. There is no Crandon Hotel! The building that now houses Subway and Rustic Allure and Group Therapy was the company store for the Keith & Hiles Lbr. Co. The drug store was then a Rexall Drug, and today, it still functions as Crandon Pharmacy. The building that has part of Tricia's Treasures, the Hellstrom Hotel, appears to be doing business in this photo. The last building that appears to still be here today and is still functioning as a business is the last one on the right. BC Cakes is now doing business in this building. Obviously, over time, nothing stays the same! And by the way, we don't know who the malingers are, and we don't know who owned the horse and buggy by the pharmacy. No electric lines either.

Wyrick. "Hunters can donate a deer at one of the participating meat processors, or when they purchase a hunting license, they can make a monetary donation to help cover venison processing costs."

Hunters are advised to plan for their donation by locating a participating processor and having their deer tested for CWD. Hunters should also call the participating processor before dropping off deer to make sure the processor is prepared to accept the deer.

Visit the DNR website to learn about the DNR's deer donation program and how to help, as well as find a list of participating meat processors and CWD sampling requirements.



Three-Digit Suicide Prevention Hotline signed into law

Bipartisan legislation designates 9-8-8 as the suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline

WASHINGTON, D.C. – U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin's bipartisan legislation to designate a three-digit phone number (9-8-8) for a national suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline has been signed into law.

The National Suicide Hotline Designation Act will help ensure states have the flexibility to strengthen local crisis call centers and save lives. Baldwin introduced this bipartisan reform in October 2019 with Senators Cory Gardner (R-CO), Jerry Moran (R-KS) and Jack Reed (D-RI). On May 13, 2020, the Senate unanimously passed Baldwin's bipartisan legislation and in September 2020, the House of Representatives passed Baldwin's National Suicide Hotline Designation Act.

"In America, we lose about 45,000 people every year to suicide, including more than 6,100 veterans, making it one of the leading causes of death in this country," said Senator Baldwin. "We need to do everything we can to prevent suicide and that means improving the tools we have to help people who are suffering from depression or other mental health concerns. I'm very proud our bipartisan legislation has finally been signed into law, so we can make it as quick and easy as possible for Americans in crisis to get the help and support they need through the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline and the Veterans Crisis Line. I urge the Federal Communications Commission to move expeditiously to implement this change and get 9-8-8 up and running."

"As the first explicitly LGBTQ-inclusive bill to ever unanimously pass the House and Senate, the National Suicide Hotline Designation Act of 2020 not only makes history, but will also undoubtedly save countless lives," said Sam Brinton (they/them), Vice President of Advocacy and Government Affairs for The Trevor Project. "Our research shows that 40% of LGBTQ youth seriously considered suicide in the past twelve months. This legislation addresses this crisis by requiring - for the first time - specialized services for LGBTQ youth. The Trevor Project is grateful to Senators Gardner and Baldwin and commends their leadership in championing the expansion of vital suicide prevention resources."

The current National Suicide Prevention Lifeline and Veterans Crisis Line are 10-digits, which is a barrier to Americans in crisis seeking support. The National Suicide Hotline Designation Act directs the FCC to designate 9-8-8 for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline, and allows veterans to press "1" after dialing 9-8-8 to be routed automatically to the Veterans Crisis Line for veteran-specific mental health support. Death by suicide is a severe problem in the veteran community with about 17 veterans committing suicide every day, on average. In 2017, in Wisconsin for example, one out of every five people who died by suicide was a veteran.

The bipartisan legislation also recognizes that certain groups, including LGBTQ youth, Native Americans and people in rural areas, are at greater risk of suicide. It requires the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to report to Congress on its plans to facilitate specific training programs for serving these communities through the hotline, as well as how best to implement a process so that callers from these and other high-risk populations can access specialized services.

Until the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) finalizes the technical implementation of 9-8-8 as the nationwide number, anyone seeking help should still call 1-800-273-8255.
