Youth Education Committee Hosts Virtual 64th Annual Conservation Awareness Poster and Speaking Contests

The Wisconsin Land and Water Conservation Association (WI Land+Water) hosted its 68th Annual Conservation Conference virtually on March 2-5, 2021.

The youth speeches are always the highlight of the conference and usually kick-off the WI Land+Water conference.

This year, with a virtual conference, the Youth Education Committee hosted its 64th Annual Conservation Awareness Poster and Speaking Contest and first virtual competition.

Students from across Wisconsin submitted their speeches about relevant conservation topics, and these were judged prior to the start of the conference. WI Land+Water Association members and guests were able to view the first-place winning speeches and vote on the conservation posters that were displayed on the virtual conference platform.

The first-place winning speakers from the elementary, junior and senior divisions were viewed by over 400 conservation professionals and guests from across the state. Speeches had to address a relevant, soil and water conservation issue, with emphasis on the impact of the issue in their locality or in Wisconsin.

For the poster contest, the first-place winners in the primary, elementary, middle, junior and senior division will move on to represent Wisconsin at the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) Poster Contest held at the NACD annual meeting in 2022. The conservation poster awareness theme this year was "Healthy Forests=Healthy Communities"

"Despite all of the challenges that this pandemic has presented this past year, we were thrilled that so many students from across the state of Wisconsin participated in our virtual conservation awareness poster and speaking contests," said Matt Krueger, WI Land+Water Executive Director.

The conservation awareness poster and speaking contests are two of the many programs that the Youth Education Committee coordinates to educate and inspire Wisconsin's youth about the importance of stewardship and caring for our natural resources.

"It is encouraging to know that students took the time to research and speak out about compelling conservation topics and took the time to share their viewpoints on how healthy forests=healthy communities," added Krueger. "Congratulations to the winning speeches and posters and thank you to all of the students for your hard work and your commitment to protecting and conserving our natural resources."

The topics of the winning speeches were: • "Live at 6-Interview with a Homeless Prairie Chicken," by Caydie Thompson from Trempealeau County, discussing the importance of native Prairie Chickens as an indicator species helping to determine the health of our prairie ecosystems; • "Healthy Forest, Healthy You" by Joseph Jarrell from Washburn County discussing how forests are critical to our communities, health and environment; • "Not so Boring News" by Paige Lietz from Marquette County, highlighting the negative impact the Emerald Ash Borer has had on most of the Ash trees in our state.

Forest County COVID Vaccine Update

The Forest County Health Department is currently helping to provide COVID-19 vaccine to eligible individuals as determined by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS). This includes:

- Frontline healthcare personnel
- EMS
- Those who provide direct patient service or other healthcare services
- Law enforcement/Fire personnel
- Anyone 65 and older
- Educators and child care
- Individuals enrolled in Medicaid long-term care programs including Family Care, Family Care Partnership, IRIS, Wisconsin's Children's Long-term Support Waiver, and Katie Beckett
- Some public facing essential workers including 911 operators, utility and communications infrastructure, public transit, and food supply chain
- Non-frontline essential health care personnel
- Congregate living facility staff and residents including employer-based housing, housing serving the elderly or people with disabilities, shelters, transitional housing, and incarcerated individuals

Wisconsin DHS has announced that individuals age 16 and older with certain medical conditions will be eligible for the vaccine beginning March 29th, 2021. These medical conditions are associated with an increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19 and includes:

- Asthma (moderate-to-severe)
- Cancer
- Cerebrovascular disease (affects blood vessels and blood supply to the brain)
- Chronic kidney disease
- COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
- Cystic fibrosis
- Down syndrome
- Heart conditions, such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, or cardiomyopathies
- Hypertension or high blood pressure
- Immunocompromised state (weakened immune system) from solid organ transplant, blood or bone marrow transplant, immune deficiencies, HIV, use of corticosteroids, or use of other immune weakening medicines
- Liver disease
- Neurologic conditions, such as dementia
- Obesity (body mass index [BMI] of 30-39 kg/m2)
- Overweight (BMI of 25-29 kg/m2)
- Pregnancy
- Pulmonary fibrosis (having damaged or scarred lung tissues)
- Severe Obesity (BMI 40 kg/m2 or more)
- Sickle cell disease
- Type 1 or 2 diabetes mellitus
- Thalassemia (a type of blood disorder)

The Forest County Health Department continues to receive weekly vaccine allocations from the state. Individuals are then scheduled based on that allocation and their eligibility.

FCHD has provided 1,531 COVID vaccines as of March 12th, 2021.

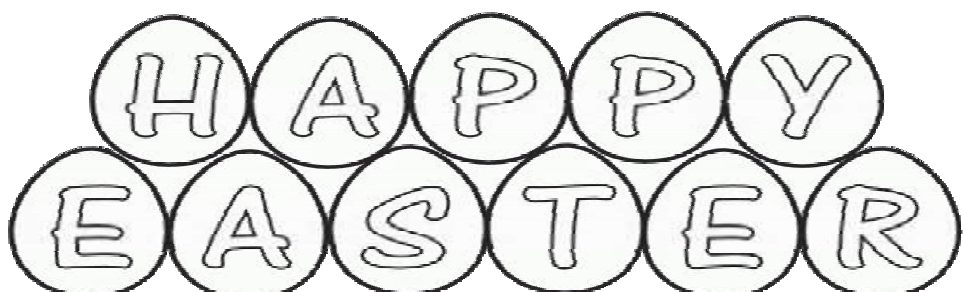

Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest announces

seasonal trail closures

Trails on the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest are closed to motorized vehicles, bicycles and horses to protect the ground during the spring thaw. Hiking trails remain open, and the forest expects trails to reopen to all uses on May 1, or when conditions safely allow.

"Melting snow coupled with spring rain makes for wet ground that's vulnerable to damage," said Susan Jenkins, acting wilderness and lands program manager for the forest. "We need to keep heavier traffic off the trails until they're dry and ready for summer recreation."

Every spring, the forest closes trails to snowmobiles, all-terrain vehicles (ATVs), utility terrain vehicles (UTVs), mountain bikes, and horses or other pack or saddle animals. Due to the heavy rain and sleet this week, the forest ordered trails closed a bit earlier than usual.

The seasonal closure reduces rutting and erosion, which are more likely when the ground is saturated. Protecting the recreation trails now minimizes the need for summer closures to repair damaged segments.

The scheduled May 1 reopening depends on weather and ground conditions later in spring. Forest staff will monitor the trails and determine when it's safe to reopen. The forest will make announcements of any delays through social media on Facebook and Twitter.

ATV/UTV routes and other trails designated by towns under state law are not subject to this closure. Riders and other users should check local regulations for trails they plan to use.

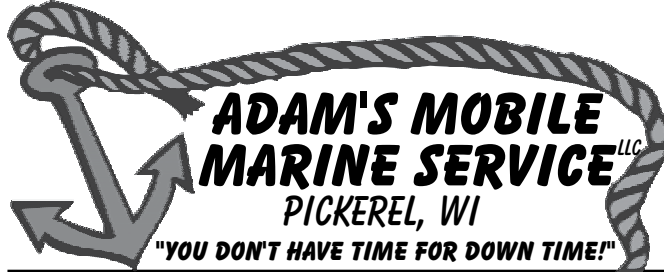

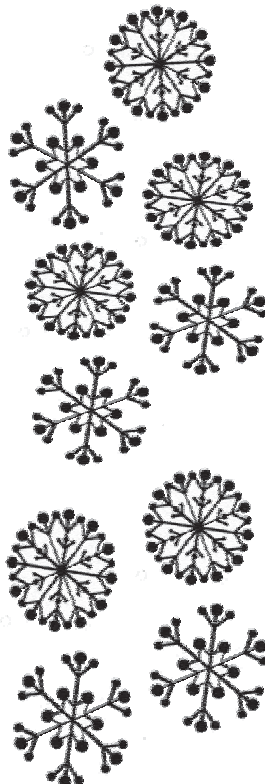
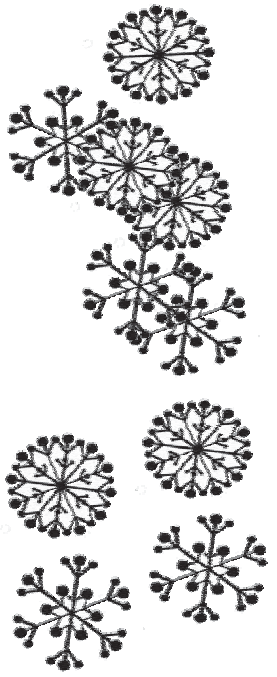

March 15-19 is Flood Safety Awareness Week in Wisconsin



MADISON, Wis. — Warmer spring temperatures are a welcome relief in Wisconsin, but they also mark a return to flood season across the state. Flooding from melting snow or heavy spring rains is one of the most common hazards in Wisconsin, and it puts lives and property at risk each year.

To encourage everyone in the state to be prepared, Gov. Tony Evers has declared March 15-19 Flood Safety Awareness Week in Wisconsin. ReadyWisconsin and the Department of Health Services asks everyone in the state to take this week to assess their flood risk and learn how to protect themselves before, during, and after a flood.

"Floodwaters can put you in life-threatening danger in just a matter of seconds," said Dr. Darrell L. Williams, Wisconsin Emergency Management administrator. "In the last decade alone, 10 people in the state have lost their lives due to flooding, showing just how deadly this hazard can be and why it's important to learn more about what you can do to keep yourself safe."

As Wisconsin's climate gets warmer and wetter, these changing conditions are bringing more destructive storms and dumping heavy rainfalls in short timeframes, creating devastating impacts on communities and families.

"Climate change is a growing public health crisis and health risks from frequent flooding are a big concern — whether it's well contamination, physical injuries, or respiratory diseases and allergies that are worsened from excessive mold exposure," said Julie Willems Van Dijk, Deputy Secretary and Acting Public Health Officer at the Department of Health Services.

Each year, flooding also causes millions of dollars in damage to homes, business, and public infrastructure throughout the state of Wisconsin. Many of those losses are not covered by basic insurance policies either, often requiring special coverage through the National Flood Insurance Program or through a private company.

While you can't always stop the waters from rising, the following tips can help improve safety for you and your community before a flood:

- Know your flood risk. Assess the potential for flooding on your property if you live in a flood plain or near a body of water, or have a basement. Plan with your family for what you will do if the floodwaters begin to rise.
- Build a "Go Kit." Include items such as food, water, cash, medications and copies of important documents (personal identification like passports and birth certificates, medical records, insurance policies, and financial documents).
- Make an emergency plan — If you can't make it home or need to leave quickly, identify a meeting place for your family. Make a list of emergency numbers and important contacts.
- Keep water out of your house. Clean gutters regularly, direct downspouts away from your foundation, repair cracks in your foundation, improve grading so water flows away from your house, and cover window wells.
- Investigate flood insurance. Standard insurance policies generally do not cover flooding. Most flood coverage requires 30 days to take effect. Find more information about flood insurance options at <https://www.floodsmart.gov/>.
- Move valuables out of the basement. Store important records and documents in waterproof containers on upper levels of your home.

• Stay up to date on the forecast. Identify multiple ways to receive alerts about dangerous weather conditions and potential flooding, such as a NOAA Weather Radio, trusted local news outlets, and mobile weather apps.

• Never drive or walk through flooded areas — turn around, don't drown! Just six inches of fast-moving water can sweep adults off their feet, while 12 inches can carry away a small car. Be especially careful while driving at night. Driving through floodwaters puts lives at risk — more than half of flood fatalities are vehicle related. Flooding killed one person in Wisconsin in 2020.

• Take steps to protect your health:
• Stay out of floodwaters, which can contain bacteria from human and animal waste, sharp objects, hazardous chemicals, downed power lines, and other dangerous items.

• If your home floods, follow cleaning and disinfection guidelines to avoid mold growth.

• If the power goes out for more than four hours, throw out refrigerated food or any food that came into contact with floodwater.

• If your drinking water well is flooded, disinfect the well and test the water to make sure it's safe before drinking it.

• If you use a generator, keep it outside at least 20 feet from your home to avoid illness or death from carbon monoxide, which can occur in enclosed spaces.

Spring into Better Health

After a long winter, the signs of spring are sprouting up all around us. Now is a good time to focus on your health so you can enjoy all that this season has to offer. And taking advantage of Medicare preventive benefits is the perfect way to spring into better health!

Preventive services can help you prevent illnesses and detect health problems early, when treatment works best. People with Medicare have access to a wide range of preventive tests and screenings, most at no extra cost. If you're new to Medicare, a "Welcome to Medicare" preventive visit is covered during the first 12 months you are enrolled in Part B. The visit includes a review of your medical and social history as well as education and counseling about preventive services, including certain screenings, shots and referrals for other care, if needed. Once you've had Part B for longer than 12 months, you can get a yearly "Wellness" visit to develop or update a personalized prevention plan based on your current health and risk factors. Note: The Wellness visit is not the same as an annual physical exam.

You pay nothing for the "Welcome to Medicare" visit or yearly "Wellness" visit if your doctor or other health care provider accepts Medicare assignment. If additional tests or services are performed during the same visit that aren't covered under the preventive benefit, you may have to pay coinsurance, and the Part B deductible may apply. Medicare also covers screening tests for breast cancer, diabetes, heart disease, obesity management, and osteoporosis, just to name a few. You can find a complete list of Medicare-covered preventive services in your Medicare and You 2021 handbook or on the Medicare website at www.medicare.gov. Talk to your doctor about what screenings and shots are right for you.

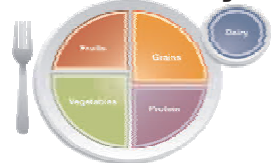

Dear Community Members,

The School District of Wabeno Area is proposing an operational referendum on April 6, 2021.

This referendum will be used to support existing District operations and improve student opportunities. We are asking permission for a maximum of \$2.5 million over each of the next five school years (2022-2023, 2023-2024, 2024-2025, 2025-2026 and 2026-2027.) We need this referendum as the current funding formula used by the State of Wisconsin does not provide the dollars necessary for us to continue to offer a high level of educational programs and services for our students.

Previously approved referendum monies have allowed for greater student access to technology and revised courses aligned to higher academic standards. Our ability to stay up-to-date with technology has allowed our District to transition to At-Home Learning efficiently when needed.

The remaining public informational meetings being held by the Board of Education are as follows:

- Monday, March 22, WHS Auditorium, 6 p.m.
- Tuesday, March 23, Freedom Town Hall 7 p.m.

The School District has been financially frugal with general spending, staff reductions, and changes of insurance. These reductions have had a minimal impact on the School District. Further reductions will be detrimental to the educational success of our students and community.

If we fail to pass this referendum, the District will have several options: another referendum next spring, continued staff reductions, cuts in extra-curricular activities, fees for food service programs, or dissolution of our School District. **If the District dissolves, your taxes do not disappear. You will pay taxes at the mill rate of the new district where your property is located.** Currently, the mill rates of our neighboring school districts are higher than the mill rate would be in our District with this referendum. The following chart provides mill rate information.

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

Additional Health Information

Term Definition

Level 2 Assessment: A Level 2 assessment is a very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why an E. coli MCL violation has occurred or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system, or both, on multiple occasions.

MCL: Maximum Contaminant Level: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

MCLG: Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

MRDL: Maximum residual disinfectant level: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

MRDLG: Maximum residual disinfectant level goal: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.
