#### Conservation Corner

Fresh water in Wisconsin is becoming increasingly salty. According to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, 47 rivers and lakes in our state are categorized as impaired due to high chloride concentrations. Elevated salt levels in lakes, streams, and wetlands threaten our fisheries, tourism, economy, quality of life, and the health of our aquatic ecosystems. Road salt is the primary culprit, followed by salt from conventional water softening systems.

Over 525,000 tons of salt (sodium chloride) are applied to Wisconsin roadways each year. Deicing salt does its job by dissolving into snow and ice, but once it's dissolved it goes where the snowmelt goes - often into storm sewers and directly into our lakes and streams.

Another source of contamination is the 40-lb bags of salt that we pour into our water softener's. The brine that's left also ends up in our freshwater either through infiltration from private septic systems or direct discharge from the sewage treatment plants that are unable to desalinize wastewater. Whether these salts are shuttled straight to surface waters or slowly infiltrate into groundwater, all the salt that we bring into Wisconsin ends up in our fresh water.

Salt is a permanent pollutant in lakes, streams, and wetlands. Elevated salt levels stress plants and animals that have adapted to freshwater environments. Before reaching lethal levels, chloride has a variety of direct and indirect impacts on the health of organisms in aquatic ecosystems. Fish experience decreased rates of growth, frogs are more susceptible to parasites, and the embryonic survival of salamanders declines as salt concentrations increase. Researchers hypothesize that the young of many species are impacted before the adults because the organs (kidneys, gills, etc.) that help with osmoregulation, the regulation of salts in the body, are not yet fully formed. As salt levels go up, the one winner is algae. Expect greener, murkier waters as water gets saltier because the zooplankton that eat algae are highly sensitive

Surface water is not the only victim of salt pollution. In Wisconsin's capitol, salt pollution of both upper and lower aquifers is forcing the Madison Water Utility to prepare for the closure of one drinking water well in the next 10-15 years and another 10-15 years after that. Elevated concentrations of sodium in drinking water are a concern for individuals on low-sodium diets. According to private well water data from the University of Wisconsin Stevens Point, drinking water across the state has elevated levels of chloride; it's likely that sodium levels are elevated as well, but it is not often tested. We do know, throughout most of the state, that our water now comes to our taps presalted. Additionally, now that our groundwater is salted, our lakes and streams are recharged with salty water.

Beyond the very clear impacts to our freshwater resources, over salting is becoming a costly endeavor. By weakening metal, concrete, brick, and stone, one ton of road salt causes between \$800 and \$3,300 in damages as it prematurely ages our roads, bridges, and vehicles. Nationwide, we spend \$5 billion annually to repair salt damage to roads and bridges and we're not keeping up.

Forward-thinking municipalities across the state are rethinking winter maintenance. They are ditching the

outdated mindset around salt that "more is better" and

**Anticipated Surge in COVID-19 Disease Activity due to Omicron Variant** Wisconsin Residents Should Take Urgent **Action to Prevent Hospitalizations and Deaths** 

The highly contagious Omicron Variant of COVID-19 has been detected in Wisconsin and is anticipated to cause a rapid increase in disease activity in the coming weeks. Public health officials are actively researching how Omicron differs from other variants. Current data from other states and regions of the world show that it spreads more easily than previous strains, including the Delta variant. There is a serious risk that continued, increased numbers of COVID-19 cases will overwhelm an already strained health care system, leading to dangerous situations where patients experiencing medical emergencies may not be able to receive immediate, adequate, life-saving attention and care due to lack of hospital capacity.

Taking action to prevent or minimize the impending surge in hospitalizations and deaths is the responsibility of all Wisconsinites. We can all do our part to

#### 1,711 cases of covid-19 (44 active) confirmed in forest county

Forest County Public Health officials have confirmed 133 persons have been diagnosed with novel coronavirus infection (COVID-19) as of December 17th, for a total of 1,711 cases in Forest County. There have been 15 probable cases this month for a total of 98 probable cases along with 7 COVID-19-associated deaths. County health officials and local partners are contacting others with whom the individuals who tested positive had close contact with. There are currently 44 active cases in isolation, 1,631 released from isolation, 5 hospitalized, and 40 deaths related to COVID-19. This is a snapshot of numbers, they are continuously changing throughout the day.

The Health Department encourages community members to practice good hand hygiene, wear a mask or cloth face covering when necessary, and stay alert for symptoms of COVID-19. If you are experiencing any symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, please contact your health care provider and ask to be tested. If you are interested in a COVID-19 vaccine, please call our office or your primary care provider.

#### Wabeno Lions Christmas Caroling











#### COVID-19 surge causing delays in health care access

WAUSAU, Wis. - Wisconsin saw its highest level of COVID-19 hospitalizations this week since January 2021 according to the Wisconsin Hospital Association.

Similar surges are occurring throughout the Midwest and creating critical access issues. The need to care for COVID-19 patients in our communities continues to grow amid industry-wide staffing challenges.

Aspirus Health and many other systems are delaying non-emergent surgeries that would require a hospital stay because patient rooms are currently in high demand.

"When you need access to emergency care or care that requires an inpatient hospital bed, that care may be delayed or it might be harder to come by," said Robin Rudie, Aspirus Wausau Hospital Emergency Department Director. "We might be asking you to consider transferring to another hospital location in our system to get a bed."

Wisconsin surpassed New Hampshire for the most COVID-19 cases per 100,000 people on December 14 according to The New York Times.

Contributing to the current surge is the fact that the majority of patients hospitalized for COVID-19 continue to be unvaccinated.

As of December 17, 106 of the 137 patients in the Aspirus system hospitalized for COVID-19 were not fully vaccinated. Over 90% of the 43 COVID-19 ICU patients are not fully vaccinated.

"I've been a nurse for 20 years. I've been at Aspirus for 22 years and this has been by far the hardest two years of my career," Rudie said.

Patients are still encouraged to seek medical attention if they need care but should be prepared to wait for non-emergent needs.

Aspirus and health systems throughout the region have implemented vaccination programs for their employees to create the safest environment possible within their facilities.

"The staff are committed. They're here. They're ready to continue to keep serving our community, but we do need our communities' help," Rudie said. "We do need help encouraging people to mask in public places, encouraging people to get vaccinated, or get the booster when it's available to them."

COVID-19 vaccinations are available through Aspirus Health and numerous pharmacies in our communities. Boosters or initial vaccination series can be scheduled through Aspirus using the MyAspirus online patient portal or mobile app. Appointments are also available by calling the Aspirus COVID-19 Call Center at 844-568-0701 or 715-843-1454. The Call Center has been experiencing high call volumes, so community members are encouraged to use MyAspirus for convenience.

Dear Editor:

The pandemic has taught us many lessons including how to navigate this new world of social distancing and isolating ourselves. What we've all experienced is a constant reality for many older people and people with disabilities: loneliness and social isolation.

In the U.S., 40% of people who have a disability and 43% of people age 65 or older say they feel lonely some or all of the time. Two-thirds of adults in the U.S. are socially isolated, with 66% reporting that their anxiety levels have increased during the pandemic according to the AARP Foundation. Studies confirm that there are serious physical, emotional, and psychological health impacts due to loneliness and social isolation.

What can we do? We can each check in on friends, family and neighbors now and all year round. Make a friendly phone call or schedule a video chat to see how someone is doing. Ask if they need anything – groceries, supplies for a hobby, or their driveway or walk shoveled. If you live nearby, knock on their door. Have a brief conversation observing safety restrictions, of course. Encourage them to join you outside if they can safely do so – even if it's just for a few minutes. They'll benefit from the human contact – and so will you.

So, let's all do what we can to support older people and people with disabilities. The simple act of showing you care can make a world of difference for someone who is alone and lonely.

#### Felzkowski Statement on Sale of Verso Mill

Yesterday, the Verso Corporation announced that it has entered into a definitive merger agreement with Swedish firm BillerudKorsnäs, which is set to acquire Verso for approximately \$825 million. The merger was unanimously approved by the Verso shareholders board and is expected to be complete in mid-2022.

"It is incredibly exciting news to see movement on the sale of the Verso Mill in Wisconsin Rapids. Just last week, my Senate Forestry Committee and Representative Mursau's Assembly Forestry Committee hosted a joint Informational Hearing on the state of the timber and forest products industries, and the one universal theme we heard throughout the day was the outsize effect and rippling consequences of the mill being shut down. The Verso Mill is one of the foundational pillars of the industry in Wisconsin and I know this news will be a very deep sigh of relief for many in the Northwoods.

Although I am concerned that BillerudKorsnäs' merger statement failed to mention the Wisconsin Rapids mill, while going into detail on the investments they will make in Verso's two Michigan mills in Escanaba and Quinnesec, I remain optimistic that this new ownership is a step in the right direction. I am sure we will find out more in the coming days.

I congratulate BillerudKorsnäs on this acquisition, and their expansion into the North American markets. They will find that many in the Wisconsin paper and timber industries are ready to roll up their sleeves and get back to work. I look forward to learning more about their plans for the Verso Mill in Wisconsin Rapids and stand ready to assist all parties in ensuring the mill can get up and running, become viable and profitable, and provide stability to the timber markets in our region."

embracing precision applications of salt combined with a renewed focus on mechanical removal. Educating operators, calibrating equipment, and incorporating salt brine are several of the methods that are enabling communities to reduce salt use by 30-70%.

As individuals, we can support our municipal public works staff by staying off roads during winter storms as pressure from constituents often drives the over-use of salt. We can also improve personal practices around our homes and places of work by using winter salt wisely and making sure our water softener is not a salt hog. Get tips on how you can be Salt Wise at https://wisaltwise.com/TakeAction. A quality ice scraper could preempt your need for deicing salt. A salt-free water treatment device may solve hardwater scale issues equally as well as a salt-based softener. Whatever steps you take, your local freshwater lake or stream, and the freshwater species that call it home, will appreciate it!



# Increased COVID-19 deaths in unvaccinated pregnant or recently pregnant people in Wisconsin

An increase in COVID-19 related pregnancyassociated deaths was recently identified by the Wisconsin Maternal Mortality Review (MMR) Program. The MMR program is a statewide program housed in the Wisconsin Department of Health Services that facilitates de-identified case review for each pregnancy-associated death (a death during or within one year of the end of pregnancy) that occurs to a Wisconsin resident. These deaths occurred in people who were unvaccinated and developed COVID-19 disease during pregnancy, which resulted in either early delivery or miscarriage. In some cases, the infant did not survive. To prevent additional deaths among pregnant people and infants, DHS is calling for urgent action to increase COVID-19 vaccination, including booster doses, for people who are currently or recently pregnant or may become pregnant in the future.

As of December 6, 2021, there have been 150,036 total COVID-19 cases among pregnant people, resulting in 25,402 hospitalizations and 248 deaths in the United States. Approximately 7,000 pregnant Wisconsinites were diagnosed with COVID-19 between January 2020 and July 2021. Nationally, the largest spike in deaths among pregnant people with COVID-19 occurred during August-October 2021, after vaccines were widely available. This is consistent with Wisconsin data.

COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective for people who are pregnant, breastfeeding, or plan to become pregnant. COVID-19 vaccines are not associated with infertility. Early data suggest that vaccination during pregnancy may also provide protection against COVID-19 for infants. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine all recommend COVID-19 vaccination at any stage of pregnancy or while breastfeeding. Booster shots are further recommended for pregnant people who have completed their primary vaccination series. COVID-19 vaccination is also strongly recommended for people planning to become pregnant in the future. Research has shown that COVID-19 vaccines are not associated with infertility and do not impact a person's ability to become pregnant.

Despite the increased risk of adverse effects of COVID-19 during pregnancy and the safety and efficacy of COVID-19 vaccines, vaccination rates among pregnant people remain critically low. Nationally, only 34.8% of pregnant people were fully vaccinated against COVID-19 as of December 4, 2021. In Wisconsin, 60.7% of female residents of reproductive age (15-49 years) are fully vaccinated against COVID-19, although that percentage is likely much lower among pregnant Wisconsinites.

CDC has called for urgent action to accelerate primary vaccination and booster doses for people who are pregnant, recently pregnant (including those who are lactating), who are trying to get pregnant now, or who might become pregnant in the future. Wisconsin providers should intensify COVID-19 vaccine education and promotion efforts among the groups referenced above.

slow the spread of Omicron by collectively taking several simple actions. These include:

- Getting vaccinated for COVID-19, including a booster dose as soon as you are eligible.
- Wearing a well-fitting mask in indoor spaces when others are present who do not live with you.
- Celebrating safely over the holidays by keeping gatherings small, getting tested before visiting others, and staying home if you test positive or have any symptoms.

Further information regarding the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) recommendations to reduce the spread of COVID-19 is outlined below. All Wisconsinites should follow these actions to protect themselves, and those most vulnerable in our communities, against COVID-19. We all have a critical role to play in stopping the spread of COVID-19. For more information about how to stay protected and stop the spread of COVID-19, call 211, or contact your local health department.

Get vaccinated against COVID-19. Vaccination remains essential to protecting your health and slowing the spread of COVID-19. While cases of the Omicron variant are growing, the overwhelming majority of COVID-19 infections in Wisconsin are still being caused by the Delta variant. The authorized COVID-19 vaccines remain highly effective at preventing severe disease and death from DPH Memo Page 2 of 2 Delta. Evidence also suggests that fully boosted people are protected against serious illness and hospitalization from Omicron. Everyone ages five and older is eligible to get vaccinated against COVID-19. Boosters are also available for everyone ages 16 and older.

**Wear a mask.** Mask wearing is advised for everyone ages two and older at indoor gatherings, regardless of vaccination status. Given high rates of COVID-19 transmission currently occurring in all 72 counties, and given the emerging evidence that the Omicron variant is more contagious than the Delta variant, DHS advises that everyone should wear a well-fitting mask in all public indoor settings. Masks continue to be an effective strategy to prevent COVID-19 infection.

Get tested for COVID-19. Anyone with signs or symptoms of COVID-19 should get tested, regardless of their vaccination status. If you are exposed to COVID-19, get tested five to seven days after exposure. If you are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms, stay home while you are waiting for your results. Trusted testing partners include health care providers, local health departments, and community testing sites. At-home COVID-19 tests can also be used before gathering with family and friends. DHS currently provides free at-home collection kits, a type of athome test, for all Wisconsinites. DHS also recommends that everyone continue to complete the appropriate quarantine or isolation guidance after being exposed to, or diagnosed with COVID-19. Due to the large numbers of cases, not everyone who has COVID-19 or is exposed will get a call from public health. Individuals can assist public health efforts by informing their close contacts who were exposed to COVID-19.

**Special considerations for holiday gatherings.** To prevent the spread of disease, gatherings outside of your immediate household should remain small. It is important for individuals to know whether they have an active COVID-19 infection before gathering. Consider getting tested before spending time with others outside of your household. Gatherings should also occur in well ventilated spaces and are always safer outdoors.

People who are immunocompromised should wear a mask, and take additional precautions like getting tested for COVID-19 before a gathering. Everyone should wear a well-fitting mask if you are celebrating with someone who has a weakened immune system, is at an increased risk of severe disease, or is unvaccinated. Getting tested for COVID-19 before gathering with groups from different households, including if you are traveling, can reduce the risk of spreading COVID-19 to friends and family.
