Crandon International Raceway purchased by Cliff Flannery

Created as a way to ensure the future while remaining true to its unique roots, Crandon International Raceway management today announced that the historic facility and all its assets have been purchased by longtime track President Cliff Flannery. One of the most iconic motorsports venues in the world, the 400-plus acre track located in the picturesque Northwoods of Wisconsin has hosted the largest off-road races in the sport since first opening in 1984.

Details of the historic purchase were officially finalized on Monday, March 28th, with the new agreement resulting in the historic raceway and its events operating as a for-profit business venture instead of a Wisconsin 501c3 non-profit entity for the first time since 1970. The highly popular facility, affectionately known as "The Big House" by three generations of fans, is now owned by the newly formed Crandon Off-Road Entertainment LCC, while the creation, execution and promotion of all Crandon events will be managed by the recently formed Crandon Motorsports LLC.

Crandon International Raceway is comprised of a 1.75-mile short-course off-road track, more than 2,100 designated grass camping sites, a modern grandstand and a hospitality facility, corporate hospitality suites, a trap range and a VIP center and office located at the track's original dairy barn.

Save Time & Stress with an Advance Directive

People don't like to talk about it, but it's important to have a plan if you find yourself in a situation where you cannot make a medical decision for yourself.

April 16 is National Healthcare Decisions Day. It was created to inspire, educate and empower the public and providers about the importance of advance care planning.

"You can ensure that your preferences are understood if you become unable to make medical decisions for yourself due to an accident, injury or sudden illness by having proactive conversations about what type of care is acceptable or not to you," says Aspirus Advance Care Planning Coordinator Heidi Kraege.

An advance directive is a legal document that explains how you want medical decisions to be made and who to make those decisions if you cannot make them yourself.

This would guide your family and medical team if there was a sudden car accident or illness that left you unable to communicate your wishes.

"Determining who has the authority to make these decisions on your behalf if you cannot becomes much more difficult and time-consuming in the absence of a properly prepared health care directive," says Kraege.

The track plays host to two major race events each year, including June's Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run and Labor Day's massive Polaris World Championship Off-Road Races® – an event which drew a record crowd of just under 65,000 people at its 52nd anniversary running in 2021. Both the exceedingly popular AMSOIL Champ Off-Road and recently expanded Ultra4 series are scheduled to run at the track as part of their 2022 race seasons.

The venue also serves as home to the annual Red Bull Crandon World Cup, held each Sunday of Labor Day weekend. Representing the biggest single payday in short-course off-road racing, the event crowns Crandon World Championships to all of the sport's Pro-category classes culminating in the annual "Cup" race -- pitting unlimited Pro 2 versus Pro 4 trucks via a unique staggered timed start.

This next chapter in Crandon International's remarkable story also provides members of the track's longstanding Board of Directors time to enjoy family and a well-deserved retirement from the facility's day-to-day operation. These generous people have devoted decades of service in building Crandon and its events to a world-class level, while also staying true to the club's cornerstone mission of donating millions of dollars back to the local community. Each year hundreds of volunteers earn these charitable donations by helping in all phases of track operation during major race weekends.

Keeping Crandon International Raceway a locally owned entity is part of the Flannery legacy, and an important factor in the family decision to purchase the venue. Cliff's brother and legendary racer was the late Jack Flannery, while nephew Jamey (Jack's son) was also a champion racer at Crandon. Both Cliff and Jack are also inductees into the Off-Road Motorsports Hall of Fame, the first family to earn such honors.

"The road to today's announcement has been a long one that required us to overcome some bumps along the way," explained Cliff Flannery. "This small but very faithful community, and our hard-working staff, have spent the better part of our collective lives building Crandon International literally by hand. After 53 years it was time to make a change on how we operate and do business. I am proud of where we have come, and also what we have achieved. Considering the success of the past six or seven years, our future looks better than ever."

Crandon Office Manager Tina Kulaf will remain in her role of managing the track's business operation, while current Promoter Marty Fiolka and his California-based TRG Rennsport group will continue their roles in event promotion and execution, sponsorship, marketing, content and public relations.

Nicknamed the "Big House" for both its size and influence on the sport, Crandon International is also home to an impressive list of corporate partnerships with top-tier brands including Lucas Oil, Red Bull, Polaris, MAVTV, Forest County Potawatomi, Ponsse, Fox Shox, STEEL-IT, Vision Wheel, Yokohama Tire, MasterCraft Safety, Rugged Radio and many others.

Currently the 29th annual Forest County Potawatomi Brush Run weekend is scheduled for June 24 - 26, 2022 and the 53rd Polaris Crandon World Championship/Red Bull Cup will take place September 1 - 4, 2022.

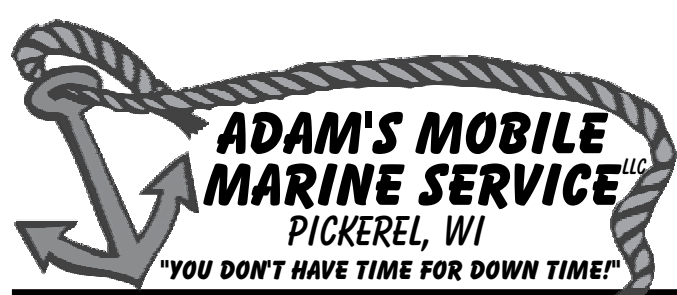

Governor Signs Four Felzkowski Bills into Law

On Friday, Governor Evers signed a number of bills into law, including AB 765, AB 874, AB 909, and SB 520, all of which were authored by Senator Mary Felzkowski (R-Tomahawk). These bills received strong bipartisan support in the legislature earlier this year, as they are common-sense pieces of legislation that will benefit Wisconsinites throughout the state.

AB 765, now 2021 Wisconsin Act 225, creates and modifies administrative rules which will allow Group Physical Therapy to be covered under the state Medicaid program. "Group Physical Therapy is already covered under the federal Medicaid program, so it only makes sense to create parity between state and federal services. In rural areas of Wisconsin, access to medical services such as physical therapy is extremely limited. This bill will allow healthcare providers to see more Medicaid patients at a time, despite a shortage of therapists in many parts of the state."

The second bill signed by the Governor, AB 874, now known as 2021 Wisconsin Act 228, will furnish public and private EMS providers with the ability to invest industry dollars, which will pull down a federal match for the Medicaid services that they provide to the people of Wisconsin. "The ease of access to emergency medical services can mean life or death to those waiting for quick care, yet many of our rural EMS providers are severely underfunded. While this won't solve all of the issues plaguing our public and private service providers, it'll be a step in the right direction when it comes to alleviating some of the financial pressure."

The third bill, AB 909, signed into law as 2021 Wisconsin Act 230, makes a number of improvements and updates to the Managed Forest Land program in Wisconsin based on input from the DNR and private woodland owners throughout the state. These changes improve an already strong program that provide ecological and economic benefits to Wisconsin.

Lastly, SB 520, now 2021 Wisconsin Act 252, funds the creation of a new Type 1 juvenile correctional facility in Milwaukee County. This is the crucial next step needed for the closure and conversion of Lincoln Hills and Copper Lake. "The state is long overdue in taking this action and I'm excited we were able to get this bill across the finish line. I have faith that the Department of Corrections will move quickly to take the next necessary steps and get the new facility built."

Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

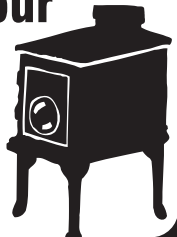

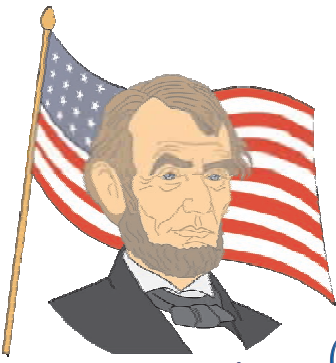

Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest prepares for prescribed fires in 2022

The Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest is preparing to conduct prescribed fire activities to restore and improve wildlife habitat and to reduce wildfire risk across the Forest starting in April.

Certified professional fire specialists expect to begin work as weather and fire safety conditions allow. Neighboring residents and state and local officials will be notified in advance of conducting the prescribed fires.

Also known as prescribed burns, prescribed fires are applied by highly trained and experienced fire staff with careful planning and coordination. Weather conditions are closely monitored, as wind, relative humidity and fuels moisture can affect decisions about how and when to implement a prescribed burn.

Prescribed fires simulate historic, naturally occurring wildfires and burning done by indigenous communities, and they provide great benefits to native plants and animals. Burning the previous years' plant matter returns nutrients to the soil, encouraging healthier and more productive plant growth.

"We are taking all the necessary precautions as we move forward with the planned burns," said Mike Mattmiller, West zone fire management officer. "We are planning additional notification and outreach to neighboring communities. We are always happy to talk with anyone who has concerns about local effects of our planned burns. They can contact us directly at our District Ranger offices."

Work is expected to begin as early as April 13 and may continue through fall, as weather conditions allow. The following prescribed fires are scheduled for this year:

- Eagle River- Florence Ranger District**
Whisker, Grub Hoe, and Hedmark (Florence County)
- Lakewood-Laona Ranger District**
ORSO (Langlade County)
- Sleeping Bear, Twin Pine, and Thunder Barrens (Oconto County)

Most locations scheduled for prescribed fire projects will remain open for recreation use, but access will be restricted during active fire operations. Residents and passersby should stay alert to signage, road closures, and other notices.

Announcements will be made about planned and active fires through social media on Facebook. Maps and additional details are also available through district offices.
