#### Laona, named "Wisconsin's Unofficial Capital of Gravel Road Cycling"

Laona, Wisconsin has been named "Wisconsin's Unofficial Capital of Gravel Road Cycling." Unincorporated, with a population of around 400, the community of Laona and the Laona Rescue Squad have been hosting gravel cycling events including The Bear 100, Hibernator 100, Nicolet Frosty Bear and Crystal Bear since 2013. Drawing participants from as far away as Anchorage Alaska, London Ontario Canada and states throughout the lower US, there is something special that draws up to 500 gravel road cyclists per event to Laona, Wisconsin.

At the heart of the Nicolet National Forest, Laona allows easy access to seemingly endless miles of gravel roads to explore. With few large lakes in this corner of the Nicolet, there are fewer cabins, less vehicle traffic, and no reason to pave the roads. The rolling, winding terrain is rideable by gravel novices, but conditions and extended distances challenge even the burliest seasoned pros.

The Rat River Trail is a hidden gem rediscovered. Wisconsin's logging history from the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries unknowingly created the perfect infrastructure for gravel road cycling. Originally a railroad spur for the Connor Logging Company, the Rat River Trail winds along the boulder strewn Rat River and was cleared and redeveloped as a non-motorized trail starting in 2012. (The section linking to the ATV trail was ready for use at the Bear 100 in 2014, while the section linking Blackwell Junction to Bear Lake Campground was completed as funding became available a couple years later.) A ride down the tranquil Rat River Trail is a ride through railroad and logging history.

The Laona Rescue Squad has been providing emergency and on-route support to help to keep riders safe since 2014. Like many small rural EMS squads, funding for training, equipment, and supplies is a constant challenge. Laona Rescue's average transport to a hospital is over 40 miles. Past event proceeds enabled the purchase of a \$40,000 Lifepak 15 monitor/defibrillator to help save lives in the field. All donations, entry fees, and bike raffle proceeds from the events go to the Laona Rescue Squad to help them achieve their EMS mission.

During a recent 'grandbaby' visit, one of mine asked me, 'Papa, how do fishes survive under the ice?' His question got me thinking about how they really do make it till spring.

While other animals huddle up for winter hibernation, fish have their own way to cope with winter. First, most fish are cold blooded, meaning their body temperature matches their environment. As lakes, rivers, and ponds freeze over in the winter months, fish utilize a method of survival known as torpor. Torpor is a state of decreased physiological activity where fishes' hearts slow down and metabolic rate drop. This allows fish to conserve energy and reduce their need for food and oxygen, which is essential for survival in these periods of reduced food

For example, Northern Snakeheads are torpid for about 8-9 hours of the day in winter. During those hours

#### Forest County Health Department **Updates:**

2023 Child Care and 2023-2024 School Year Immunization **Requirements:** 

On January 30, 2023, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services updated Wisconsin's administrative code for immunization requirements for child care and school entry. The changes will improve protection for children against vaccine-preventable illnesses, including meningitis, whooping cough, and chickenpox. Changes:

Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis vaccine) is now required at the start of seventh grade. Previously this vaccine was required at the start of sixth

Adding Meningococcal vaccine to the requirements for students entering 7th grade, and a booster dose for students entering 12th grade.

Permitting exceptions to the varicella (chickenpox) vaccine requirement only if the child's case has been confirmed by a qualified health care provider. Parental confirmation is no longer accepted.

#### What has not changed?

The updated requirements leave in place the established list of required vaccinations.

The existing exemption options for medical, religious, or philosophical reasons are still available.

There is no requirement for flu or COVID-19 vaccination. These remain strongly recommended.

#### Baldwin reintroduces legislation to lower health care costs & expand access to insurance

An estimated 8.9 million Americans have lower premiums thanks to enhanced tax credits passed in Inflation Reduction Act & the American Rescue Plan Act.

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) joined Senator Jeanne Shaheen (D-NH) to reintroduce the Improving Health Insurance Affordability Act, legislation to make permanent enhanced tax credits that led to record enrollment in the Affordable Care Act (ACA) marketplace, while reducing health care costs for millions of additional Americans.

The premium tax credit enhancement provisions were originally put into effect under the American Rescue Plan. This expansion of premium tax credits marked the biggest improvement to the ACA since it became law over a decade ago. Under the Inflation Reduction Act. the enhanced tax credits were extended for an additional three years. The Improving Health Insurance Affordability Act continues to build on these efforts by making these tax credits permanent while also lowering out-of-pocket costs for Marketplace enrollees.

"Thanks to enhanced tax credits, countless American families have access to quality health coverage on the insurance marketplace," said Senator Baldwin. "We need to protect and expand access to affordable health insurance. By making these tax credits permanent, millions of Americans can rest assured they can continue to find the quality health care coverage they need, at a price they can afford.'

The Improving Health Insurance Affordability Act would make permanent premium tax credits for individuals signing up for health care coverage through the ACA marketplace, tax credits that were improved and extended through the Inflation Reduction Act. Those enhanced tax credits increased the value of the financial assistance available to people with incomes between 100 and 400 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) while expanding eligibility for premium tax credits to include individuals with incomes above 400 percent of FPL. The bill would also make the second-lowest-cost Gold plan the benchmark plan upon which premium tax credits are based, which helps substantially reduce deductible and out-of-pocket costs for families of all incomes. Finally, the bill would also increase the value of cost-sharing reduction (CSR) assistance for people with incomes between 100 and 250 percent of FPL (who are already eligible), while also expanding eligibility for CSR assistance to people with incomes up to 400 percent of

According to the most recent data, nearly 15.9 million Americans have signed up for 2023 individual market health insurance coverage through the Marketplaces since the start of the 2023 Marketplace Open Enrollment. That record-breaking enrollment represents a 13% increase over last year. According to a June 2022 report from the Department of Health and Human Services, absent the enhanced tax credits, 8.9 million Americans stood to have their tax credits reduced

Alzheimer's disease affects more than six million people in the United States. It is the most common form of dementia and causes memory, thinking and behavior problems that interfere with daily living. #### What is Vertigo?

Having good balance is important for many daily activities. When balance is impaired, simple tasks such as walking across a gravel driveway, going up or down the stairs, or even getting out of bed, can be extremely trying and sometimes dangerous.

70 percent of the nation's population will experience vertigo, dizziness, or balance problems in their lifetime, making it a common issue.

Vertigo is defined as the sensation of spinning or the environment moving around you.

"The balance system or vestibular system is made up of three different systems that work together to keep us upright: the visual system, the vestibular (inner ear) system, and the proprioceptive (sensory nerves) system," says Susanne Schaars, PT, Aspirus Physical Therapist.

The brain receives information from these three systems and then the body responds by engaging muscles and joints to make corrections in our balance.

According to the National Library of Medicine, vestibular dysfunction most commonly occurs due to inner ear problems, medicines, infections, and traumatic brain injury.

"If impairments occur in any of these systems, balance may be affected," says Susanne.

Vertigo can be temporary or permanent, depending on the cause. Symptoms can range from barely noticeable to severe, lasting a few hours or days, to several weeks or even months if untreated.

The most common cause of vertigo is BPPV or Benign Paroxysmal Positional Vertigo.

Benign - non-life threatening.

Paroxysmal – It comes and goes in short bursts of dizziness.

Positional – it is dependent on head position.

**Vertigo** – the sensation of spinning.

BPPV occurs when debris from one part of the inner ear falls into one or more of the fluid-filled semicircular canals in the inner ear and causes an error signal that tells the brain that your head is moving when it is not. Typically, the sensation of spinning lasts less than a minute, but people will complain of feeling off balance and nauseated even after the sensation of spinning is gone.

"Vertigo can happen at any age, but it is more common in people over the age of 65 and more common in women than men," says Susanne. "Sometimes BPPV can be the result of a brain injury or concussion."

BPPV can be treated by physical therapists, doctors, or occupational therapists that have training in vestibular rehab. Research shows treatment is over 90 percent effective. Sometimes exercises are used for home treatment.

Aspirus therapists, across the entire system, are educated and trained in treating vestibular conditions.

If you experience vertigo talk to your primary care provider to determine if you may benefit from therapy to decrease or eliminate your dizziness.

The Crandon Masonic Lodge donated a second portable fire suppression unit in Forest County on Monday, February 6. This unit was given to the Forest County Sheriff's Office. The first unit was given to the Laona/Wabeno Rescue Squad in August.

Masonic lodges across the state of Wisconsin are donating these devices to local fire, emergency and police agencies. It takes on average, 5 minutes from the call to the fire station to the scene, all while the fire is gaining energy. These devices called Fire TKO, helps the emergency services save lives and structures. The Fire TKO is a condensed aerosol based fire suppression system that extinguishes and suppresses fires in seconds.

This unit does not remove the oxygen from the air so it is not harmful to people, animals or the atmosphere. The aerosol is also non-corrosive and it lessens the amount of water needed to finish fighting the fire. A portable fire suppression unit could cost up to \$1,300.00







To the Editor:

Few Americans have ever heard of the Bank of International Settlements (BIS). Time to search it out and learn a bit more .

BIS is located in Basel Switzerland. It has worldwide diplomatic immunity, is an autonomous institution (it's, it's own country/region) and has freedom to govern itself. They pay no taxes. There were in history five BIS Directors charged with war crimes. BIS accounts for 95% of World GDP.

This bank is owned by sixty three central banks around the world. Sam Bankman-Fried spoke at their 2022 Innovation Summit.

BIS has barred the central bank of Russia from accessing "all BIS services, meetings and other BIS activities".

We must as citizens learn to understand not only our countries debt ceiling, but more about the World Bank, the IMF and for sure the Bank of International Settlements.

#### Where do fishes go in winter?

After I explained how fish are cold blooded, he continued with asking me where the fishes went in winter.

As winter begins and lakes become blanketed in a layer of snow and ice, temperature gradations change in the water. This blanket of ice acts as insulation to the water below. Warmer water settles to the bottom of the lake (known as lake turnover), creating a cozy haven for fishes. It's here that these aquatic creatures congregate in groups, entering torpor and riding out the temperature fluctuations.


#### **Torpor vs. Hibernation**

So, most animals hibernate in winter. What's the difference between torpor and hibernation? distinction is that torpor is temporary, lasting only hours, while hibernation is when an organism spends the winter in a state of dormancy; it is long-term multiday torpor for survival of cold conditions.

Just as there is a seasonality to the woods, a cyclical pattern can also be observed in fishes' behavior. Knowing this can increase our understanding of the intricate ways in which nature operates (and help you catch fish).

A popular winter recreation activity for many Wisconsinites is ice-fishing. Lake conditions change dramatically during the winter months, leading to elusive fishes with unpredictable feeding and movement schedules. It's these challenges that make ice fishing such a thrilling and rewarding sport. For some, braving the cold to catch a fish is not just a hobby, it's a passion, a test of strength and determination.

All veterans from Wisconsin honored through In Memory will have their photos and names on display as part of the mobile Education Center exhibit when The Wall That Heals is at Nicolet College from May 18 to May 21.

"We want to honor as many Vietnam veterans from Wisconsin as possible. If your loved one served in Vietnam. returned home and later died - we want to be able to proudly display their name and photo in our community. We're asking for the public's help to identify eligible veterans and get their applications into VVMF so their veteran can be on display in Rhinelander," said Casev Lehmann, Financial Aid Advisor and The Wall That Heals-Nicolet College Site Host.

There is no cost to have a veteran honored and the application process is simple. To honor a loved one, you only need to complete a short application and submit the veteran's DD214 showing their proof of service in Vietnam, a copy of their death certificate and two photographs. Additional information on the In Memory program and the application form can be found here: www.vvmf.org/inmemory.

In addition to The Wall That Heals display, having a veteran honored through In Memory includes:

- As part of the In Memory Honor Roll, an online personal remembrance page is created for each honoree with their photo and biographical information. Family members can share the page and leave remembrances about their loved one. To see the Honor Roll, visit vvmf.org/Honor-Roll/
- An invitation to In Memory weekend in Washington, D.C., which includes a touching ceremony on the site of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial where each honoree's name is read aloud. Each applicant also receives a printed personal tribute certificate with their veteran's photo(s).

The plaque on the grounds of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial site in Washington, D.C. that honors these veterans was dedicated as a part of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in 2004 and a replica plaque is part of The Wall That Heals exhibit. It reads: "In Memory of the men and women who served in the Vietnam War and later died as a result of their service. We honor and remember their sacrifice.

"The impact of the Vietnam War stretches far beyond the 58,281 names on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. More than three million Americans served in Vietnam and an untold number of those who served have suffered from service-connected illnesses. No one knew that when the war ended, Vietnam veterans and their families would still be feeling the effects of their service more than 50 years later. In Memory is our way to honor these Vietnam veterans for the sacrifices they made," said Jim Knotts, president and CEO of VVMF, the nonprofit organization that founded the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. in 1982 and manages The Wall That Heals and In Memory


