By the time you read this, we'll have 'sprung ahead' with Daylight Savings Time. This also means that spring is near and that brings commercial and hobby production of maple syrup to Forest County.

Sugar camps have a long history, dating back to Native American tribes who utilized syrup and sugar made from the trees. Sugar and syrup also became an important trading item for many people, especially in North America. Historically there were thousands of sugar camps dotting the forests across the Northwoods.

What makes the sap flow?

Sap flow from sugar maple trees is entirely temperature dependent. The rise in the temperature of the outer layers of the tree (the sapwood) to a temperature above 32 degrees F causes a positive pressure in the tree fibers. This pressure produces the sap flow. Many people assume that sap flows only from the roots, actually on warm spring days which follow cold nights, sap flows down from the tree's branches and then out the spouts or taps. Sap also flows back and forth laterally within a tree, depending on temperature and pressure. Sap flows out breaks in the sapwood. When tapped and the internal


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



March is National Kidney Cancer Awareness Month

pressure of the tree is greater than the atmospheric pressure the sap flows out, much the same way that blood flows out of a cut.

Here are some interesting facts about maple syrup and sap:

- Pure maple syrup is only made on a commercial scale in North America, nowhere else in the world
- It takes approximately 40 gallons of sap to make one gallon of pure maple syrup,

depending on the sugar content of the sap in that year and at that time of the year.

- Each tap can yield 10+ gallons of sap per season. Vacuum collection systems yield approximately twice the sap as gravity systems.
- A gallon of maple syrup weighs 11 pounds as compared to 8 pounds for a gallon of water

There are quite a few commercial grade operations of maple syrup production that have developed within Forest County over the last 10 years. These operations are bringing economic development and business production to our forest in the form of alternative products.

Production of maple syrup is an agricultural operation, however many associate it with forestry because of the trees involved. Depending upon production capabilities and industry standards, property used for maple sap production may receive property tax breaks under agricultural use.

Here in the Land & Water department, we are striving to get an inventory of what is actually produced and any contact with information on location of sugar camps and syrup production within Forest County, please give us a call or send us and e-mail.



This letter is in response to many recent comments and inquiries that have come to my attention. It seems many people have the two Forest County animal organizations confused as being one and the same - namely, Forest County Humane Society and Animal Resource Fund.

This is understandable in a way, because I was one of the founders of Forest County Humane Society years ago, helped see our shelter built and remained President of that organization until my resignation fourteen years ago. Even though I am a part of (and serve as President) a totally new animal welfare organization which we named Animal Resource Fund, (commonly referred to as A.R.F.) my name has understandably remained synonymous in our area with anything relating to animal welfare.

While both organizations are necessary and needed to provide the best possible care and well being of Forest County animals, they serve different animal needs.

The Humane Society/Animal Shelter is just what the name indicates - a place where animals are taken, either as lost, or need to be re-homed, and receive humane care while there.

Animal Resource Fund gives aide to families who are temporarily experiencing financial hard times, and simply need a hand-up with pet care so that they can keep their pets, instead of being forced to surrender to a shelter. We like to feel that we are really aiding the area shelters by helping people keep their beloved pets.

We have had numerous FREE clinics, both vaccines and spay/neuters. We provide pet food when needed, bedding for outside pets, and have paid literally thousands of dollars in vet bills for pets that would probably have perished without our intervention.

We are funded solely with donations and our fund raisers, which we have had few of since the pandemic. We are still in operation, however, and it is worrisome when I hear that there are people who do not realize exactly who we are, or what we have been providing for the animals in need in Forest County.

I hope this will clear up any misconceptions and maybe reach animals who are suffering and could otherwise be saved. If you still have questions, call me 715-478-2398. (People still call me, thinking they are calling the shelter/humane society - the calls usually came to my home, instead of the shelter, anyway!)

Older Crandon folks will remember Lynn Paul and his grocery store that is now the home of the chiropractor on the north end of Lake Avenue.


Lynn is shown here with the little guy from Oscar Meyer that was no doubt here for a promotion of their meat

"Social media too often implies that weight loss leads to improved happiness and leaves out other important factors. Because of social media's fast- paced and flashy style, users are hyper-focused on quick and easy weight loss solutions that tend to overlook viewers' wellbeing, long-term weight maintenance, and actual nutrition," says Ashley Chrisinger, Aspirus Registered Dietitian. "The direction of weight loss messaging on social media is chaotic and conflicting and ultimately leaves people feeling defeated and hopeless."

Diet culture emphasizes fad or quick diets that claim fast weight loss results and health improvements. Diet trends may offer food-specific fad diets that rely on the myth that some foods have special properties that can cause weight loss or gain.

"What rarely gets mentioned are the unsexy strategies: finding enjoyable ways to be more active, getting in control of emotional eating, learning to prepare your own meals, and enjoy more veggies," says Chrisinger. "It's not new or trendy, but it is the most sustainable strategy for most people."

Although society has normalized dieting, it is still a harmful and risky practice. People can develop eating disorders, depression, nutrient deficiencies, alter their gut microbiome, and suppress their immune function focusing on weight loss in an unhealthy manor.

For those interested in losing weight, it's important

to remember that everyone's body is different, making everyone's diet and nutrition plan unique. Misinformation regarding health and nutrition is everywhere, especially on social media.

Here are five debunked myths about food and weight loss to remember, according to the National Institutes of Health and the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion:

Myth #1: Carbs make you gain weight.

Fact: Carbs, or carbohydrates, are an important food group that helps your body create energy to support bodily function and physical activity. Carbohydrates are an essential part of a healthy diet.

Tip: Keep complex carbs such as whole wheat bread, beans and fruits on the menu, as these foods have a lot of nutritional value. Simple carbs found in foods such as cookies and candy, on the other hand, lack vitamins, minerals and fiber. It's best to limit these foods.

Myth #2: Doing regular juice fasts/detox/cleanse helps rid the body of toxins.

Fact: Fast/detox/cleanse are unnecessary and don't remove toxins in the body. They can even have serious side effects such as fainting, weakness, dehydration, dangerous electrolyte imbalances and kidney problems.

Tip: As long as we are hydrated, the body can rely on organs like the liver and kidneys to remove toxins from food, alcohol and medication.

Myth #3: Late night snacking causes weight gain.

Fact: Eating at night will not make you gain weight. Weight gain is not determined on what time you eat but rather by how much and what types of food are consumed throughout the whole day.

Tip: If you're hungry after dinner time, choose healthy foods and be mindful of portion sizes.

Myth #4: You should aim for 1,200 calories a day to lose weight.

Fact: A 1,200-calorie diet is much too low for most people and can result in negative side effects like dizziness, extreme hunger, nausea, micronutrient deficiencies, fatigue, and headaches. Everyone's body is different and needs a different number of calories to function.

Tip: Calorie needs vary based on age, sex, height, weight, and level of physical activity. Talk with a registered dietician to determine what's best for your body.

Myth #5: All sugar is bad.

Fact: Sugar is a type of carb which provides energy to the body and fuels the brain. However, like most foods, too much can be harmful to the body. Maintaining a healthy weight is most effective when individuals eat balanced meals, incorporating foods from all food groups, including sugar.


Tip: It's OK to eat sugar and sweet foods, especially when you're fueling intense physical activity! Just have them in moderation.
