#### The Decline of Insect Populations: The Impact of **Neonicotinoids**

I recently read an article in the Trout Unlimited magazine that talked about the alarming decline in insect populations. Among the various factors contributing to this decline, the use of neonicotinoid pesticides has emerged as a major concern. Neonicotinoids, often referred to as "neonics," are a class of neuro-active insecticides chemically similar to nicotine. Introduced in the 1990s, these pesticides have become the most widely used insecticides globally due to their effectiveness in protecting crops. However, their pervasive use has raised critical questions about their impact on non-target insect species and broader ecological systems.

Neonicotinoids work by targeting the nervous system of insects, leading to paralysis and death. Their systemic nature allows them to be absorbed by plants, making all parts of the plant toxic to pests. This feature, while beneficial for crop protection, also means that beneficial insects such as bees, butterflies, and other pollinators are exposed to these chemicals through pollen, nectar, and

## Courthouse dome up for major repairs

The Forest County courthouse dome is being restored, and the scaffolding itself is quite a sight.

There are numerous repairs being made. The roofing is being changed. Tuck pointing will be done on the concrete seams of the brick. The waterproofing on the seams where the landmark dome fastens to the courthouse proper will be repaired also.

The courthouse is a 1909 building that was built after a big political fight within the county to move the county seat to Laona. Remembering some details from a history piece we ran years ago, the vote was decided by one vote. The board chair cast the deciding vote to keep the county seat in Crandon. That man was Charles Ross, who had a farm just north of Cavour, near Ross Lake.

Ross, even though Laona was in the center of the county, voted to keep the county seat in Crandon. He probably didn't make many friends in Laona, but whatever the reason, this pretty building with the landmark dome was built near the former courthouse, which was moved from the courthouse square. History buffs haven't been able to find out what happened to the building.

Regardless of the history, the lovely courthouse dome has to be maintained, and it is.



Homer Rosa died May 25th at the Veterans Hospital in Iron Mountain.

Homer was born July 24,1926, on a farm near Scranton, Iowa. As a child, he walked several miles to a one-room school house where he was responsible for starting the wood stove each morning. When still a young boy, he was treated to a biplane ride by the famous barnstormer Roscoe Turner. That ride led to Homer's lifelong love of flying. Later in life he flew his own Taylorcraft airplane.

Homer's parents, Lucy and Glen, moved to Crandon in the 1930s. As a teen, Homer milked cows, drove livestock trucks to the Chicago stockyards, and he delivered horses to loggers.

Graduating early from high school, Homer enlisted into the Army Air Corp in March 1944 at the age of 17. Homer was trained by the military as a pilot and airplane mechanic. He served at an airbase in Caserta, Italy, where he okayed planes for take-off. He occasionally guarded German POWs.

At the end of the war, while based at Trieste, the C-47 he was aboard was attacked by Yugoslav partisans, knocking out the plane's controls. He parachuted out at 300 feet, badly injuring his leg. Italian partisans found Homer comatose and carried him to an airbase.

Later, Homer was one of a crew that flew around Europe, escorting notables to the Nuremberg trials; Homer was impressed by the devastation of Europe as seen from the air. At sometime during his tour of duty, he flew cargo to Egypt, where he and buddies commandeered a jeep for a joy ride around the pyramids.

Back home, Homer settled down as a dairy farmer after eloping with Marcella Streckert. They raised two children. Homer became adept at treating sick animals, and he survived being gored by a bull.

Homer had been elected to the boards of his county, township, and school district. The UW Extension twice sent him to Washington, DC, to speak for local issues.

Homer requested there be no public memorial service.





#### Baldwin Hosts Roundtable to Discuss Lowering Inhalers Costs and Holding Drug Companies Accountable

U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin hosted a roundtable in Green Bay to hear from parents and nurses and discuss her progress to bring down the price of inhalers and hold big drug companies accountable. At NEW Community Clinic, Senator Baldwin heard stories about the reality families and communities face when cost is a barrier to accessing an inhaler. In Wisconsin, more than 500,000 people have asthma and nearly six percent of the population is estimated to suffer from Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease.

"No parent should have to think twice if they can afford an inhaler for their child when they get to the pharmacy – but for decades, big drug companies have been price gouging working families, putting parents in impossible situations," said Senator Baldwin. "I'm proud to have taken on these big drug companies and lowered the cost of inhalers to \$35 per month and helped families breathe easy."

"My son is now an adult still dealing with asthma and the financial burden of expensive inhalers," said roundtable participant Jayne Black. "These are his words: 'In a world of escalating inflation, from essential groceries to fuel prices, affording the necessary items to effectively manage asthma can prove to be an immense challenge...The dilemma of choosing between securing basic necessities for oneself and one's family or ensuing the ability to breathe freely should not be a decision anyone is forced to confront."

As a member of the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions, Senator Baldwin and three of her colleagues launched an investigation into the extremely high prices four large pharmaceutical companies charge for inhalers. Senator Baldwin also called on the four biggest inhaler companies to stop improperly listing patents for inhalers in an attempt to protect their exclusivity and block out competition that may force them to lower their prices. Less than three months after Senator Baldwin launched an investigation into the four major manufacturers of inhalers, three of the companies have made commitments to cap the out-ofpocket costs of their inhalers at \$35 for patients at the pharmacy counter.



Conservation Corner Cont. from pg. 1 agricultural fields to gardens and waterways.

The detrimental effects of neonicotinoids on insect populations are multifaceted and well-documented. Studies have shown that exposure to neonicotinoids can lead to reduced foraging ability, impaired navigation, decreased reproductive success, and increased susceptibility to diseases in bees. These impacts have significant consequences for pollination services, which are crucial for the production of many fruits, vegetables, and nuts.

Beyond bees, neonicotinoids affect a wide range of non-target insect species. Research indicates that these pesticides contribute to declines in butterfly populations, with species such as the monarch butterfly experiencing dramatic reductions.

Additionally, ground-dwelling insects and aquatic invertebrates are also at risk, as neonicotinoids can leach into soils and waterways, contaminating habitats far from the point of application.

A study published in the journal "Nature" highlighted the broader ecological consequences of neonicotinoid use. The researchers found that regions with high neonicotinoid contamination experienced significant declines in insect-eating birds, suggesting that the reduction in insect prey is cascading through food webs. This finding underscores the interconnectedness of ecosystems and the far-reaching impacts of pesticide use.

In response to mounting evidence of harm, several countries and regions have implemented restrictions or outright bans on neonicotinoid use. The European Union, for instance, has banned the outdoor use of three major neonicotinoidsimidacloprid, clothianidin, and thiamethoxamdue to their impact on bee populations. Similarly, Canada has announced plans to phase out the use of imidacloprid over concerns about aquatic invertebrates.

Despite these regulatory actions, neonicotinoids remain widely used in many parts of the world, including the United States. The challenge lies in balancing the need for effective pest control with the imperative to protect biodiversity and ecosystem health. Integrated Pest Management (IPM) approaches, which emphasize the use of non-chemical pest control methods and the careful management of chemical applications, offer a viable path forward. Farmers can adopt practices such as crop rotation,



the use of biological control agents, and the planting of pestresistant crop varieties to reduce reliance on neonicotinoids.

Furthermore, research into alternative pesticides and pest control methods is crucial. Innovations such as biopesticides, which are derived from natural materials like plants, bacteria, and minerals, hold promise for reducing the ecological footprint of pest control. Enhanced regulatory frameworks that prioritize environmental safety and support for farmers transitioning away from neonicotinoids are essential to mitigate the impact of these chemicals on insect populations.

The decline of insect populations due to neonicotinoid use is a pressing environmental issue with profound implications for ecosystems and human wellbeing. While neonicotinoids have provided effective solutions for pest management, their extensive use has revealed significant unintended consequences. Protecting insect biodiversity requires a multifaceted approach, encompassing stricter regulations, the adoption of sustainable agricultural practices, and ongoing research into safer alternatives. By addressing the root causes of insect decline, society can work towards a future where both agriculture and natural ecosystems can thrive.



Crandon Area Community Foundation installs bluebird houses



As you travel around Crandon and the outskirts. you may notice pairs of fresh-looking birdhouses mounted on fenceposts. This is the result of a new project underway through the Crandon Area Community Foundation (CACF). The project spearheaded by Andy and Karen McMillion and sponsored by Ron and Winnie Krueger - involved building and placing 20 nesting boxes for the Eastern Bluebird.

This bird is not formally "threatened', but loss of habitat has made it more difficult for them to find their preferred nesting sites. Houses are placed in pairs because other birds will compete for the boxes. Bluebirds will not nest near other bluebirds, but will tolerate other species in their territory one box in the pair gets bluebirds

#### DMV offers option to add emergency contact information to license data

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV) now offers an option for motorists and individuals to add emergency contact information to their driver license or ID record. Adding the information is voluntary and will not appear on the card.

Governor Evers signed the "To Inform Families First" or "TIFF" law last year. It was put in place to provide law enforcement the ability to contact a family member or other loved one more quickly in the event of an emergency. Adding this information is not required. Only law enforcement, including police in other states, are able access the information.

To add emergency contact information to a DMV record, visit wisconsindmv.gov/emergencycontact for the convenient online self-service application. A visit to a DMV customer service center is not necessary.
